

Volunteers Needed

The Richland County Health Department and Sidney Health Center, with oversight from a community steering committee, have teamed up to conduct a Community Assessment survey throughout all of Richland County July 29 and 30 from 3-7 pm each evening. Volunteers wearing bright green t-shirts will be canvassing the county asking participants to answer some general questions. Responses are totally confidential. The survey should only take about 15 minutes and surveyors will not be going into homes. Please be courteous if you are contacted.

The assessment is critical on several levels. It is a tool to determine the overall health of the community and the quality of life from a broad cross section of people who may not normally voice an opinion. Health includes health behaviors, physical environment, socioeconomic factors and clinical care. Each of those categories influences the other. The assessments help drive community opinion. Voices are stronger and more accurate when they come from the community, and therefore gradually cause change. Because of the results of community conferences and assessments, much has been accomplished over the past 20 vears such as the Boys and Girls Club of Richland County,

The Richland County Community Foundation, the VISTA volunteers, and potentially the community complex.

Sidney Health Center is federally mandated to conduct an assessment every three years to keep its tax-exempt status. It also helps with strategic planning to make sure the services offered are meeting the needs of the community. The survey is also a great way to engage people who may have never needed the services offered at SHC.

The Health Department must do a survey every five years. With limited resources, they use the final data to make sure funds are used in the most effective way, and to focus efforts on areas of most concern to the community. The survey is also critical to maintaining accreditation, which helps with grants and other federal and state funding. Both entities will use the information to develop more prevention programs as well.

The survey will also be testing emergency preparedness and will be used to determine ways of both receiving and disseminating information

in the event of an emergency. All information will be available on both the SHC and Health Department websites

to be used by the public. Using CASPER (Community Assessment for Public Health Emergency Response)

as the tool for assessment has provided assistance from the state, which has connections to the CDC. The CDC has mapped out clusters in Richland County, which will be visited by the volunteers. The state is helping to format the questions, build a database, and will do the final report.

Volunteers are still needed throughout the county to conduct the survey. Lunch will be served from noon - 1pm, with training from 1-3. Groups of 2 or more will then conduct the assessment from 3-7pm. Each volunteer will receive a t-shirt and a goodie bag.

Volunteers who conducted a similar survey in Dawson County found the work very rewarding, feeling like they were making a difference and improving the community.

Do your part to improve the overall health of Richland County, either as a volunteer, or by taking a few minutes out of your day to complete the survey.

MDU Solar Fee Will Limit Customer' Energy Choices

Montana-Dakota Utilities is proposing to increase rates by 21% for their electric customers in Montana. In addition to the double-digit rate increase, MDU is proposing an arbitrary fee on customers who have invested in their own renewable energy systems. MDU's proposal to place an additional charge on solar,

> rgy customers is unprecedented for any utility in Montana.

Under the proposed fee, MDU customers who offset their electricity use with their own renewable energy system would be charged an additional fee for every kilowatt they use during their highest use period each month. MDU has provided only a cursory explanation of this new charge in their Public Service Commission filings, so residential customers have no way to estimate the total impact of this fee on their monthly energy bills.

Rooftop solar is just getting off of the ground in Montana and proposed utility fees like MDU's demand charge are an attempt to halt this growth. "MDU's attempt to penalize solar customers has come at the worst possible time," said Ben Reed, an Eastern Montana based renewable energy system installer. "While the utility is proposing a large rate increase, they are also attempting to block customers from generating their own power and insulating their families from rising electric bills."

Some MDU customers disagree with the company's proposed solar fee. "We are planning to install a solar array at our place this year to reduce the large electric loads we have for our farming operation," said Floyd Dahlman of Forsyth. "This proposed fee will make it harder for that investment to pencil out. I think it's unfair for the utility company to limit our energy choices to protect their profits."

Expanding options for home and business owners to invest in solar and other renewable electricity options was a prevalent topic during Montana's 2015 legislative session. A legislative energy interim committee is currently devoting the next year studying specific cost and benefits of onsite, small-scale renewable energy generation. Diana Maneta, Executive Director of the Montana Renewable Energy Association, points out, "MDU's proposed demand charge attempts to circumvent the legislative process by imposing a fee without thorough analysis."

MDU filed its proposed rate increase with the Montana Public Service Commission on June 24, 2015. PSC hearings on the rate increase will begin later this summer. Comments on the proposed net metering fee can be submitted to the PSC before July 24 by email: PSC_UtilityComment@mt.gov, or by mail: Montana Public Service Commission, PO Box 202601, Helena, MT 59620. Include reference in comments to docket number D2015.6.51 and the proposed demand charge for net metered customers.

Parents: New Vaccines Added To School **Attendance Requirement** For 2015 **MNAXLP**

The Department of Public Health and Human Services (DPHHS) reminds parents that it is not too early to start thinking about back-to-school immunizations.

Parents need to be aware that the immunization requirements in Montana have been changed.

During the 2015 Legislative session, Governor Bullock signed into law House Bill 158 that added two more vaccines a student needs for school attendance. The law is effective October 1, 2015.

For the coming school year, students will need to be vaccinated against varicella disease, more commonly known as chickenpox. All students in kindergarten through 12th grade will need to have two doses of varicella vaccine. Students attending a preschool or prekindergarten will need one dose of varicella. If a student has already had a case of chickenpox, docucan be accepted in lieu of the vaccine. Additionally, students who already had two doses of the vaccine do not need to repeat it.

According to DPHHS officials, many students may already be current on their immunizations. "National surveys show that many students are already in compliance with the new law," said Jim Murphy, chief of the DPHHS Communicable Disease Control and Prevention Bureau. "Parents may just need to check their child's immunization status and provide an update to the school."


Students in 7th -12th grades will also be required to have one dose of pertussis (whooping cough) containing vaccine. In previous years, only a Td, or tetanus/diphtheria, shot was required. The new law adds the pertussis component.

As long as a student has received at least one vaccine in the required series, that student may qualify for a conditional attendance as allowed by current regulations. A conditional attendance provision allows the student to stay in school while they finish the required shots.

The changes to the law were made to bring Montana's immunization requirements more in line with the most current immunization recommendations made by the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practice (ACIP). Of note, Montana was the only state that did not require the varicella series and one of five not requiring a pertussis booster at middle school for attendance.

Additionally, the new requirements are intended to reduce the incidence of diseases like chickenpox and whooping cough both in school settings and in the community. Montana's rates for both of these diseases are typically higher than any other state in the region.

DPHHS encourages parents to talk to their family physician or local health department should they have questions about whether or not their child has the necessary shots for school.

County Agent Update

Wheat Insects

Throughout the summer months, we are always seeing insects. Two insects to be on the lookout for when growing wheat in North Dakota are the Armyworms and Wheat Midge. Armyworms are starting to become a concern for the eastern part of North Dakota. When the armyworms are moths, they can invade a new area and their infestations can be sporadic. In fields where armyworms are present, there will be a low number of insects found. The damages are defoliated leaves which are generally only reported along field edges and in lodged areas of the fields. Mature armyworm larvae can clip heads, but it becomes more common as the crop matures. Pre-Harvest Intervals (PHI) are important and you need to follow the limits of which insecticides need to be applied for armyworm control. Malathion and Lannate, both restricted use pesticides, are the only two insecticides registered in barley and wheat. They both have a PHI of seven days, which means you need seven days after application until harvest. Armyworms are the most active at night, which means spraying in the evening would have the most control. Make sure you use enough water to get the insecticide down into the crop canopy. This information was gathered from the NDSU Crop and Pest Report, July 9th edition.

The other insect to be on the lookout for is Wheat Midge. Wheat midge, or also known as the orange wheat blossom midge, is one of the most destructive pests in the wheat crop.

The adult midge is orange, fragile and very small, about half the size of a mosquito. Wheat midge only has one life cycle per year, they start to emerge from the soil late June to early July. These insects are seed eaters, they infest the plant during heading through flowering. When the eggs hatch, the larvae will crawl down into the seed and starting eating the enzymes, which will leave the kernel small and shriveled. The economic damage that occurs because of wheat midge will cause reduced yields, grain quality and germination and growth vigor of seedlings. The wheat midge adults can also act like a vector for other diseases to enter the plant such as wheat scam and glume blotch. The economic threshold levels are as followed; hard red spring wheat- one or more wheat midge for every four to five heads. Durum wheat- one or more wheat midge for every seven or eight wheat heads. It is not recommended to treat after 50% of the heads have flowered. Using a general insecticide is what is recommended, spraying at dusk is best because the wheat midge is most active at night. This information was gathered from Janet Knodel and Mangala Ganehiarachchi

Mentioned above were two insects you should look out for, but what about the good insects. One that we want to keep around is the Megarhyssa atrata, a giant black parasitic wasp, which is beneficial insect that attacks wood borers. These adult wasp are active from June through September and live for up to 27 days. The females will lay their eggs on top of wood borer insect eggs, so when they hatch, the wasp young will eat the larvae of the wood borers. Most of us do not like the wasps that we see in our flower beds, but these ones we want to keep

around. They do not harm the plants, only the insects that eat them.

About one third of Montana's 60 crypto cases reported swimming as likely exposure in 2014.

"People need to be aware that chlorine and other pool water treatments don't kill germs instantly," said Erik Leigh of the DPHHS Food and Consumer Safety Section that oversees the licensing and inspection of public swimming pools. "We all share the water we swim in, and we each need to do our part to keep ourselves, our families, and our friends healthy."





MSU Extension Guide Helps Distinguish Native Thistles From Exotics



A new publication from **Montana State University** Extension is designed to help identify invasive/ exotic thistles and verify those that are native.

BOZEMAN - A new publication from Montana State University Extension is designed to help identify invasive exotic thistles and verify those that are native to Montana. People often think that the only good thistle is a dead thistle. While this can be true for well-known invasive exotic thistles like Canada or musk thistle, some thistles are Montana natives and better off alive than dead due to their beautiful flowers and foliage and the habitat they provide for wildlife. Five exotic thistles and ten native thistles grow in Montana. Why is it important to identify invasive exotic thistles and differentiate them from natives? Invasive exotic thistles can spread quickly,

especially with disturbance, have poor forage value, and their sharp spines can limit recreational activities and injure livestock. From a weed management perspective, even differentiating among exotic thistles is important because a perennial rhizomatous thistle will require different control measures than taprooted annuals or biennials. Compared to exotic thistles, native thistles do not spread quickly with disturbance, are rarely or ever reported as invasive and are important for wildlife. For example, birds feed on thistle seed, and some may time their nesting around thistle flowering, using plumes on seeds to line nests. Bees, wasps, flies and beetles feed on thistle pollen and become food sources for other wildlife.

For some large ungulates like elk, native thistles are a source of forage. The new publication can be used to verify whether a thistle is native or exotic before implementing thistle control strategies. The publication includes a tutorial of how to use a simplified key and a brief description of the important anatomical features and terms that are needed to successfully identify the thistle. Agro-Security Critical For All Farms And Ranches

Many people involved in agriculture believe that agro-security centers around large farms and ranches with multiple buildings housing chickens and swine. They picture workers and visitors suiting up in white plastic coveralls with hair nets and booties dipped in disinfectant.

However, in many cases, agro-security is paramount to keeping your animals from contracting a contagious disease, whether it's quarantining a new horse or not sharing water buckets at a 4-H show.

"We frequently think of agro-security focusing around a big disease, such as avian flu or hoof and mouth disease," notes Jeanne Rankin, DVM, who spoke on agro-security at Montana Farm Bureau's Summer Conference last month in Sidney. "These are very serious, quickly spreading diseases. Foot and Mouth (cloven hoofed livestock), High Pathogenic Avian Influenza, Vesicular Stomatitis (all livestock including horses) and other contagious diseases can even be passed around by

someone in a delivery truck driving onto your place."

Rankin explains that once Foreign Animal diseases are detected, often herds and flocks are depopulated and international trade is stopped immediately which has a devastating effect on everyone from breeders to the middleman to consumers. It's important to prevent spread of any disease and take action when necessary.


"You can do a lot of your own bio-security. For instance, use your own good sense. If you buy a bull or bring an animal back from a show, don't just dump him out with the others. Do a two-week quarantine with separate feed buckets, water buckets, and don't allow your livestock to rub noses with other animals. Remember, some diseases spread on clothes, so be aware of that," the veterinarian says. "Bio-security can be something as simple as using separate cleaning utensils for sick pens and healthy pens, and having different forks for the hay pile and the manure pile and changing your boots, coveralls and gloves between

local accredited state veterinarian to your place because if there is a disease, movement can be stopped and the impact to your herd is contained." Rankin cautions. "Your vet can contact the state vet if the disease is suspected, and sampling and investigation must be done by a specially trained veterinarian known as a Foreign Animal Disease Diagnostician (FADD) within 24 hours of receiving the report. Laboratory diagnosis is done by the National Veterinary Lab


at Plum Island, NY." "We are working to get people trained in handling animal medical emergencies," says Rankin. "We are trying to spread the word about what to do if FMD, VS, Swine Vesicular Disease, or another disease is suspected. State and federal veterinary agencies will be involved if it is a foreign animal disease but all emergencies are local in impact and response."

It's very important to have an Agriculture/Animal Emergency Preparedness team in place and a hierarchy for when a disease does strike. It's so significant that many people are involved, from producers and Extension to agricultural organizations, feed stores and non-government agencies.






