
Burman is still a gas plant operator for Kinder Morgan so he relies on his great manager Kim Falkenhagen to run the day-to-day operations. Falkenhagen, along with the staff of 24 other individuals do their utmost to make everyone's experience the best it can be whether in the Waterhole #3 or the Oasis Casino. Both are open seven days a week from 11 a.m.-2 a.m. Stop in for a tasty home cooked lunch special Monday-Friday from 11 a. m. til gone or savor one of the 16 beers on tap, which includes many regional craft beers.

Events such as the Putt Putt Put Crawl which happened last weekend, and the Yellowstone Poker Float scheduled for Aug. 19, were started by Burman when he worked part time at the Waterhole. As a musician, he would like to have more live music although band costs can make that difficult. He hosted a guitar Karaoke night recently where singers could choose a song and Burman had to play it on his guitar. "It was half comedy, half talent," he said of the night. "It went pretty good, everyone had a good time."

The Waterhole #3 has the only patio in town, the perfect spot for the daiquiri bar Thursdays starting May 25. There might even be some random music there during the summer Burman suggested. There will be live music during Fairview Festival the third weekend in July as well.

The Waterhole ballroom is available for any occasion, and is the home for cornhole league and pool league in the winter months.

Early May of this year, locals noticed that ground had been broken on the land in front of the Candlewood Suites, Sidney, northeast of the Shops at Fox Run.

The land has been bought and sold more than once. The land had been owned by Jack Reynolds, the owner of Reynolds and Fox Run. During the most recent oil boom, he sold it to a gas station company which did not seem to do anything with it. Now, it is owned by Les Schwab Tire Center, and on which they plan to put their first tire center in eastern Montana.

Les Schwab Tire Center is a tire and maintenance shop that is based out of Bend, OR,. It opened in 1952 with one little tire shop in Bend but has since spread to over 500 locations across 10 states. They do tires of all sizes from wheelbarrows and cars to tractor and construction equipment tires. They also do brakes, wheels, alignments, batteries, shocks, and struts. They have snow chains, and towing accessories, and have lowering, lifting, and leveling options, as well as on-the-farm service.

The center in Sidney is to offer tire sales, maintenance, brakes, alignments, and shocks and struts. Dale Thompson, Les Schwab Tire Centers CMO said, "All helping you to stay safe on the road." Les Schwab is hoping to have their new Sidney tire center completed and open by the end of 2023. This, of course, is dependent on weather and they may not be able to open until early 2024.

Les Schwab has several other stores in Montana in different cities and towns. The closest store to Sidney is the one in Sheridan, WY, and there is one that will

open in Billings in June. Thompson said, "We started in the Pacific Northwest and expanded out. We have been successful in western Montana and Sidney seems like the kind of town we have been successful in."



The Ford failed to negotiate a slight curve in the road and crossed into the eastbound lanes. The Ford pickup struck the Toyota head on, causing both vehicles to spin and come to rest in the south ditch.

Robert Ndahigwa was pronounced deceased on scene. Ronald Nanan was transported via ambulance first to Tioga Medical Center and then to Trinity Health in Minot due to the injuries sustained. David Seiferd was transported to Tioga Medical Center via ambulance due to injuries sustained.

At the time of the crash, it was raining and the road conditions were wet.

The agencies that responded were North Dakota Highway Patrol, Williams County Sheriff's Office, Tioga Ambulance and Tioga Fire Department.



On May 13 from 8 a.m.-5 p.m., homesteaders were to come together at the Richland County Fairgrounds to hold the first Homesteader Swap of 2023. In true eastern Montana fashion, however, the weather had other ideas, and after an hour and a half of vendors not showing up because of heavy rain, the event ended early.

The Homesteaders' Swap was the brainchild of Charlie and Jamie Land, Edmonton, KY. They ranch in Kentucky but often frequent Richland County in Montana. Jamie was born and raised in Sidney and still has friends and family here. May 13 was to be the first day of a biweekly event that will continue to occur until the end of August. For the sake of the animals, it is being held on the grass in the east parking lot of the Fairgrounds in case of accidents. The Lands plan on holding a homesteader swap every other Saturday through August. In August, the dates will be changed to work around the Fair and Lone Tree Gun Show as they are running booths at both events and the parking lot will be in use. They plan to make this an annual event.


restoring freedom back into the process as the Founders intended.

After the traditional auction by auctioneer Grady Larson, the crowd left to go home having enjoyed a very full, informative and fun evening.





The McKenzie County Heritage Park & North Dakota Oil Museum invites you to their seasonal opening Saturday, May 27, with extended summer hours, Wednesday-Saturday from 10 a.m.-6 p.m. and Sundays from 1-5 p.m.

Arts and crafts vendors will be set up so park goers can do a little shopping starting at 11 a.m. The local Lions Club will be serving burgers in the park starting at 11:30 a.m. so be sure to grab a bite to eat before or after strolling the six acres of exhibits including several historical McKenzie County buildings that have been relocated to the grounds. These include a barber shop, blacksmithing shop, homestead shack, church, George Shafer's Law Office and the "end of the line" train depot from the Great Northern Railroad. The McKenzie County Heritage Park & North Dakota Oil Museum also has antique cars and farming equipment for viewing, as well as several exhibits and artifacts housed in the museum. Be sure to also check out their wooly mammoth femur bone, tusk and tooth.

In November 2022, the former Pioneer Museum relocated their exhibits and artifacts to McKenzie County Heritage Park & North Dakota Oil Museum. Formerly located in the Long X Trading Post Visitor Center, the decision was made to transfer items from the Pioneer Museum as the Long X Trading Post Visitor Center is transitioning to the Long X Arts Foundation.

One of these relocated exhibits is the Charles Bannon exhibit; Bannon confessed to killing the Haven family who lived near Schafer, ND. Despite being detained by authorities, in January 1931 a lynch mob broke down the jailhouse door, overpowered the deputy sheriff and took Bannon, ultimately hanging him from the bridge over Cherry Creek. It was the last lynching in North Dakota and the story was recently told in the movie "End of the Rope", which was filmed in the area. In fact, the McKenzie County Heritage Center & Oil Museum has the entire movie set open for public viewing.

The grand opening of the North Dakota Oil Museum has been postponed until construction on the building is finished. Additionally, a full-size oil pumping unit still needs to be moved in.

Jessie Veeder has been a symbol of folk music in western North Dakota since she released her first original album when she was only 16 years old. It was an effort that took her from performing at fairs and festivals around her home state to managing a national college and coffeehouse tour and launching a music career that recently landed her in Nashville to record her fifth original album.

Since then, she has gone on to tour nationally and record five more generation stewards of the Veeder Ranch where she chronicles life on the land as a weekly columnist for state-wide newspapers and on her popular blog titled "Meanwhile, back at the ranch..." They connect listeners to the ranch weekly on their podcast by the same name.

The couple are raising two daughters, Edie, 7 and Rosie, 5. Jessie's book "Coming Home," released in 2017, is a compilation of her favorite photos, poems, stories, and recipes. In 2022, Jessie released her first children's book, "Prairie Princess," to help tell the story of rural living and ranch life through the eyes of a young girl. She tours extensively in the upper Midwest as an entertainer, motivational speaker and advocate for agriculture, rural living and the messy side of motherhood. In addition to her career. Jessie is a founding member of McKenzie County's Long X Arts Foundation where she works to help create and promote cultural and arts-based activities in her hometown, blending her love and connection to the arts with her drive to make her community a better place to

work and live.

Jessie has taken the stage multiple times at the National Cowboy Poetry Gathering and the Red Ants Pants Music Festival. Sidney's Memorial Day Program

Sidney is home to a unique program called "The Flags of Honor" which originated in 1965. This program originally began as a community effort with members of 13 civic organizations who made the decision to ask members of the community to donate any casket flags from deceased veterans. The organizers were able to obtain 83 flags for the first Memorial Day parade in 1966. Materials and labor were donated to make bins for the flags, agate name plates, flag poles, and people willing to be caretakers of the flags. On Memorial Day the flags were displayed in the original Nutter Park located on 4th St. SE and a grand parade through Sidney included members of the community carrying the flags. Veterans' Day was also the sight of the parade of casket flags. During the remainder of the year the flags were stored in the basement of City Hall until

 in the basement of City Hall
was being overcrowded and had problems with humidity.

In the mid '80s efforts began to find a new home for the "Flags of Honor" and several years later it became a reality. The entire facility is located in what was called Central Park, now Veterans Memorial Park, and consists of public bathrooms. a stage area, a concessions area, and a storage room for the City. This was completed with the help of several different organizations. Community members were asked for financial and labor donations to make the existing Flag Room area a reality. Many hours were spent planning and painting the room, moving the flags, and making new name plates for the flags. The City of Sidney assisted in installing the cabinets. The first program at the new facility was in 1989 with 289 flags and enough cabinets to house them until more funds were raised.

The Flags of Honor room is humidity controlled and is now home to over 650 the park. Gov. Nutter's flag is one of the 650 flags on display.

In 2014, another major project was completed to increase the availability of space for more flags. Cabinets were built on top of the original cabinets and now display the 141 flags representing veterans from the Civil War, the Spanish American War, and WW1. These flags are no longer flown outside.

Sidney is very proud to have the Lions Club help with posting a representation of these flags beginning at 7 a.m. on Memorial Day and take them down about 4 p.m. that evening. The rotation of displayed flags allows for a complete cycle every 4 years. Flags not flown, but are not in the retired section, can be checked out and carried folded or on a pole for the parade and refolded after the parade. The VFW has a Memorial Day program and service at the stage after the parade. A picnic in the park follows the program.

By 1975, most of the original organizers of the Flags of Honor had died and the number of flags became too numerous for the original caretakers, the World War 1 Ladies Auxiliary. The Ladies Auxiliary VFW (now VFW Auxiliary since 2015 as men can now join) began the job of caretakers for the 200 flags. It soon became apparent that the job was more efficient with only a couple people. The storage area flags behind glass doors. Once a year the flags are rearranged in alphabetically order. Yellow Tag Paddlefish Season Started May 15

Miles City - The 2023 yellow tag paddlefishing season on the Yellowstone River and Missouri River downstream of Fort Peck Reservoir started Monday, May 15.

Wednesday, May 17, will be the first harvest days of the season during which paddlefishing is allowed in all designated areas. Sunday, Monday and Thursday are designated catch-andrelease days for paddlefish, and Tuesday, Wednesday, Friday and Saturday are harvest days. Catch-andrelease days restrict paddlefishing to the Intake Fishing Access Site only near Glendive.

The paddlefish season will run through June 30, unless catch rates approach

the 1,000-fish harvest cap and trigger an earlier closure

A free paddlefish cleaning service will be provided and funded by Montana Fish, Wildlife & Parks at the Intake FAS for the first five weeks of the season.

There is one regulation change to note this season. The entire length of the newly constructed two-milelong Intake Bypass Channel is closed to paddlefishing. This new regulation was adopted after printing of the 2023 fishing regs booklet and is not listed. The bypass channel will remain open for passage of boats and angling for other fish species.

Prior to construction of the bypass channel, fish migrating upstream to spawn would concentrate below Intake Diversion Dam and draw large crowds of anglers. But the new bypass could shift those historic

patterns and more widely disperse paddlefish upstream.

High, turbid river flows trigger paddlefish to migrate, and area rivers are already on the rise. According to FWP Region 7 Fisheries Manager Mike Backes, river flows are predicted to increase modestly next week at Sidney. Flows on May 9 approached 20,000 cubic feet per second, which is generally adequate to stimulate a few fish to migrate upstream. Similar conditions are projected for opening week. Based on that, Backes anticipates that most angler success will come from downstream locations (Sidney Bridge-Richland Park-State Line), as the concentrations of fish will be higher in these locations. He expects fish densities will be low at Intake and upstream locations until river flows exceed 20,000 cfs.

"I do expect a few lucky anglers will find a paddlefish or two anywhere between Miles City and Intake the first harvest day, May 16, and certainly by the first weekend of paddlefish season Friday, May 19 and Saturday, May 20," Backes said.

Paddlefish anglers are subject to mandatory harvest reporting within 48 hours via the phone hotline, MyFWP, angler check stations, or self-reporting boxes (Sidney Bridge and near Powder River Hwy 10 Bridge).

Harvest data and updates will be available on the Region 7 Facebook site at Montana Fish, Wildlife & Parks - Region 7. Daily updates may not be practical until nearing the harvest cap, but anglers can expect weekly updates.

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are subtle and fear of making a wrongful accusation keeps many people, including those being abused, from speaking up. Often times it is because they feel ashamed or embarrassed or are in denial that the abuse is actually occurring. If the abuse involves a family member the victim may be worried that their abuser will get in trouble or they will end up in a nursing home if no one is there to take care of them. These are all real concerns but so is the reality of the crime.

As we age it becomes harder to stay involved with and connected to our communities. As a result, older people are more likely to experience social isolation which increases their odds of abuse and neglect. It happens across all socioeconomic groups and cultures and can happen anywhere they are disconnected from social supports. These places can include the senior's own home, in institutional settings or even in hospitals. While anyone can be a target,

studies show that women and people over the age of 80 are the most likely to experience abuse.

So what can we do to stop it? The biggest thing we can all do is to be aware!

 Keep in contact with your older friends and relatives

 Remain alert for the possibility of abuse

· Ask questions and really listen to the answers especially if you notice a change in an older adult

· Don't be afraid to report the situation

Elder abuse is an injustice with many consequences and is, unfortunately, a wide-spread problem. It is up to all of us to help prevent it and, when it happens, report it. Reports to Adult Protective Services remain anonymous and can be made on-line at https:// dphhs.mt.gov or by calling 844-277-9300.

Remember, aging is natural but abuse is not. Remain alert and keep a look out for your friends, neighbors and especially yourself.

How Do You Know If Someone Is Having A Stroke?

Time is of the essence when a stroke occurs. Here are the signs to look for.

When someone has a stroke, recovery can be greatly impacted by how quickly medical treatment is received. Knowing what the symptoms of stroke look like can help you determine when someone needs help.

How can you tell if someone may be having a stroke?

Remember the words BE FAST! This acronym was created by the National Stroke Association to identify the warning signs of stroke:

B - BALANCE LOSS: Is the person suddenly having trouble with balance or coordination?

E - EYE SIGHT CHANGES: Is the person experiencing sudden blurred or double vision or a sudden loss of vision in one or both eyes without pain? F - FACIAL DROOP-

ING: Ask the person to smile. Is one side of the face drooping or hard to move?

A - ARM WEAK-NESS: Ask the person to raise both arms. Does one arm drift down?


S - SPEECH DIFFI-CULTIES: Ask the person to repeat a simple phrase. Do you notice slurred speech or trouble forming words?

T - TIME: Time lost is brain lost. If you notice any of the above symptoms, call 911 right away.

Other symptoms of stroke include a sudden severe headache with no known cause, sudden numbness on one side of the body, trouble walking, dizziness, loss of balance or coordination, and arm or leg weakness. If something seems "off" with someone and you suspect it's due to a stroke, call 911 immediately.

According to the National Stroke Association, 87% of all strokes are ischemic. which means that the stroke is due to an obstruction within a vessel supplying blood to the brain, such as a blood clot. If people with ischemic strokes get to the hospital quickly enough, a clot-busting drug known as tissue plasminogen activator (tPA) may improve chances of recovery.

It's a race against the clock to administer tPA in time to improve stroke outcomes, which is why it's so important that a person




