Seed Crushing Plant Offers New Possibilities

North Dakota leads the United States canola production, with Montana following in third place. Canola oil use extends far beyond the kitchen and includes farmed fish feed, especially salmon, and biodiesel. Omega 3 canola, a new and exciting breed is, per Nuseed's website "the world's first plant-based omega-3 and will help relieve the pressure on our oceans to supply this essential nutrient. One acre of omega-3 canola produces as much DHA as 10,000 one-kilogram fish. Nuseed is partnering with contract growers to supply aquafeed and nutrition markets." Currently, the closest seed-crushing plant for omega-3 canola is in Redwing MN. Mark Erickson, Buckshot Seeds co-owner, is hoping to change that.

Buckshot Seeds, a dealer of Gold Standard Seed, was awarded an APUC (Ag Products Utilization Commission) grant from the North Dakota Department of Agriculture to use towards a feasibility study. His goal is to determine if a seed-crushing plant would be successful in the western North Dakota, eastern Montana area. This would benefit canola and soybean producers, encouraging them and others to grow more of both. Sunflowers and safflower producers would possibly benefit from the plant as well, as the company interested in installing one would create a very versatile operation, capable of crushing multiple varieties.

The current goal of the plant is to process 75% canola and 25% soybeans. The resulting oils would be shipped, most likely by railcar, to countries that farm fish. Norway, Argentina, and Chile top that list, but with BNSF being a mostly East to West rail line, Norway would be the most likely recipient. With considerations to shipping needs, the proposed location is in the Marley Crossing area, near Trenton. Savage Industries Transload facility in that location would aid in transport, making the plant's success even more likely.

Seed crushing comes with a rich by-product, a meal that is high in fat and perfect for feeding out cattle and pigs. In an area rich in cattle producers, the plant would serve a dual purpose, both purchasing and providing product. Soybeans have already replaced sugar beets in many fields, and canola would be a strong contender with a crushing plant nearby. As Erickson said, "Farmers are pretty adaptable folk," and he feels the plant would make a strong positive impact on local growers and provide new employment positions. The feasibility study is due to be finished by Thanksgiving, and so far, response to the project has been favorable.

Jack was born to Jake and Doris (Baumann) Lorenz on Jan. 29, 1944, in Portland, OR. Jack joined his older brother Gilbert and sister Patsy. His brothers Jim, Ken, and Jess, along with sisters Linda and Judy soon joined the family. He spent his childhood years in the Buford and Fairview area.

Jack joined the army in July, 1961. After completing his basic training, he was stationed in South Korea. Jack was a combat engineer during his tour in Korea. He talked a lot about his time in Seoul, South Korea, and the many times they blew up bridges and other structures. Jack received an honorable discharge and returned home after serving four years in the army.

In October, 1966, Jack married Ruth Deming in Fairview, MT. Jack and Ruth were blessed with three children, John, Rosa, and Char. After a tragic car accident took the lives of his sisters Patsy and Judy, Jack and Ruth took in Jack's nephew, Louis Tornabeni. Mid-Rivers To Offer Scholarships Totaling Over \$100K To Area Students

Communications Director Mid-Rivers Communications is offering \$108,000 in scholarship funds for Eastern and Central Montana students

The Mid-Rivers Fund for Education, funded by unclaimed capital credits from members, has awarded over \$670,000 in scholarships to area students. In 2024, Mid-Rivers will award 36 competitive and 15 drawing scholarships.

Scholarship categories reflect the mission and values of the Cooperative and its members. This year's scholarship program has three categories:

Dawson Community College/Miles Community College Scholarship - In support of local educational institutions, up to six (6) \$3,000 scholarships will be awarded to students attending Dawson Community College (DCC) or Miles Community College (MCC).

Mid-Rivers Higher Education Scholarship - Thirty (30) \$2,500 scholarships will be awarded to students pursuing or continuing their higher education at any other institution in technical, undergraduate, or graduate programs.

• Mid-Rivers Annual Meeting Drawing - Fifteen (15) \$1,000 scholarships will be awarded through a drawing of eligible students in attendance at the 2024 Mid-Rivers Annual Meeting. The date and location for the 2024 Annual Meeting are to be determined and will be announced in early 2024.

Competitive scholarships will be awarded based on how well each student's application addresses the following priority areas:

· Demonstration of specific plans and an authentic desire to live and work in the Mid-Rivers Service Area in the future.

• Work experience and school and community activities during high school and/ or college.

· Unique, inspiring, and innovative Personal Statement.

· Grade point average and ACT/SAT test scores.

· Ability to communicate.

Eligible applicants for all categories include graduating high school seniors entering freshman year at a college, university or technical school; and current college, university and technical school students planning to continue studies in the fall. All applicants must be

enrolled as full-time students for the fall of 2024. Previous scholarship winners (competitive or drawing, and in any year) are ineligible. Applicants must have a parent or guardian who is a member of Mid-Rivers Telephone Cooperative, Inc. with active telephone or Internet service and a completed and approved membership application (customers with active service are not automatically members). Applicants unsure of membership status should contact Mid-Rivers bv Jan. 5, 2024, at 1-800-452-2288 to verify eligibility.

Competitive applications must be completed online and are now available at www.midrivers.com/ scholarships/. Applicants unsuccessful in the competitive scholarships are eligible and encouraged to enter the drawing for scholarships at the annual meeting.

tle Drive program seeks steer donations from ranchers and businesses across the state. Donated animals are transported to Yellowstone Cattle Feeders in Shepherd, MT, where they are put into the program and fed to ideal market weight. When each steer is at optimum weight, the process to match the donor's steer with a restaurant or retailer in the region in which the steer had originated starts. Working with Blue Creek Marbled Meat Company the steer is harvested. Over 85% of the total steers donated in last year's Cattle Drive were sold to local Montana retailers and restaurants through this Montanans Feeding Montana Initiative.

"I have always had a deep appreciation for where the food is coming from, what it's eating, where it's been, who's handled it. To be able to come out to Yellowstone Cattle Feeders, from day one, and be able to see that and be handson in the process, it's been an incredible experience," shared Andy Glynn, Billing's High Horse Saloon and Eaterv executive chef. "Anyone can go to the grocery store and pick up beef and take it home, put it on the grill and have dinner. But I want it to be more than dinner. I want it to be a meal. I want it to be a memory."

Feddes Family Meats in Amsterdam, Little Belt Cattle Company in Bozeman, High Horse Saloon and Eatery, the Northern Hotel in Billings, and the Black Iron Grill Rotisserie in Miles City, all participated in this year's program. Additionally, Bret and Kim Lesh purchased beef through this program.

On Friday, MSF released a short film promoting the "Montanans Feeding Montana" initiative and highlighting one of the unique partnerships Montana Stockgrowers has created through this program. The film focuses on how the program works and the benefits to every sector in the pasture to plate experience. 
















Partnership For Promise Has Taken On Bullying As Special Focus Area

Partnership for promise has taken on bullying as a special focus area. Kids who are bullied can struggle to concentrate in school, which can affect their mental health. Bullving that is severe, long lasting, or happens a lot can cause anxiety, depression, and other stress-related disorders in victims and bullies. In rare cases, some kids have attempted or died from suicide. One of the most dangerous forms of bullying is cyberbullying.

Sometimes cyberbullying can be easy to spot - for example, if your child shows you a text, comment, or post that is harsh. mean. or cruel. Other acts are less obvious, like posting someone's personal information, or using photos or videos that hurt or embarrass another person. Someone might make a fake account or screen name to harass and bully, so you don't know whom the bully is

Kids have almost constant access to their devices, so cyberbullying is hard to escape. Kids and teens can feel like they never get a break and feel the effects very strongly.

Cyberbullies also can be suspended or expelled from school or kicked off of sports teams. Depending on the severity of the cyberbullying, kids also might be in legal trouble.

Many kids and teens who are cyberbullied don't

want to tell a teacher, parent, or trusted adults, often because they feel ashamed or fear that their devices will be taken away at home.

Signs of cyberbullying vary, but may include being emotionally upset during or after using the Internet or the phone being very secretive or protective of one's digital life spending more time than usual in their room withdrawal from or lack of interest in family members, friends, and activities avoiding school or group gatherings slipping grades and "acting out" in anger at home changes in mood, behavior, sleep, or appetite suddenly wanting to stop using the computer or device being nervous or jumpy when getting a message, text, or email avoiding discussions about computer or phone activities.

If your child is being cyberbullied offer comfort and support. Talking about any bullying experiences you had in your childhood might help your child feel less alone. Let your child know that it's not their fault. Bullying says more about the bully than the victim. Praise your child for doing the right thing by talking to you about it. Remind your child you're in this together. Reassure your child that you'll figure out what to do. Notify the school. Tell the principal, school nurse, or a counselor or teacher about the situation. Many schools, school districts, and after-school clubs have rules for responding to cyberbullying.

These vary by district and state. But before reporting the problem, let your child know that you plan to do so, so that you can work out a plan that makes you both feel comfortable. Encourage - your child not to respond to cyberbullying. Doing so just makes the situation worse. Keep records. Keep screen shots of the threatening messages, pictures, and texts. These can be used as evidence with the bully's parents, school, employer, or even the police. Get help. If your child agrees, meeting with a therapist may help work through feelings. A counselor or mediator at school may work with your child alone or together with

What if it's your kid who's behaving badly? While that can be upsetting, it's important to deal with the problem and not expect it to go away. No matter what's causing the bullying, tell your child that it's unacceptable. Set and enforce consequences if it continues. If needed, talk with teachers, guidance counselors, and others who might be able to help.

As always, be a role model for your kids. Help them understand the benefits and dangers of the digital world. If you don't get upset and use angry words in your own posts and replies, they're less likely to. Talk about healthy ways to respond - or not - when you disagree.

Big Sky Passenger Rail Authority Festival Of Trees Awarded \$150,000 Grant

Billings - The Big Sky Passenger Rail Authority (BSPRA) has been awarded a \$150,000 grant through the Pacific Northwest Economic Region's Regional Infrastructure Accelerator (PNWER-RIA) to further high-performance rail across the region. This constitutes the largest planning grant received by BSPRA to-date.

U.S. Department of Transportation's Build America Bureau awarded the Pacific NorthWest Economic Region (PNWER) a grant to continue advancing infrastructure development through its five-state Regional Infrastructure Accelerator

(RIA) and will use the grant funding to deliver value in Alaska, Montana, Idaho, Oregon, and Washington.

Specifically, BSPRA, as a grant sub-recipient, will work with PNWER RIA on the following projects:

· Research feasibility and economic case for renewing Amtrak small parcel delivery service as an economic driver for rural and tribal communities along the Great Northern (Empire Builder) and North Coast Hiawatha (southern Montana) corridors

 Analyze track along the Amtrak Empire Builder corridor to identify small to medium track improvement projects that-if bundledwould co-benefit freight and passenger rail service. Grade separation projects and opportunities for transit-oriented development near passenger rail stations are major areas of focus.

 Analyze track from Sandpoint, ID, to Glendive, MT, along proposed Amtrak North Coast Hiawatha route to identify small to medium track improvement projects for enhanced freight and passenger rail service and identify funding opportunities that promote safety and/ or economic development opportunities for rural communities and tribal nations.

"These funds will further our work both in southern Montana and also along the Empire Builder route, to the benefit of both freight and passenger operations,' said BSPRA Chairman Dave Strohmaier. "This is a great example of how working together at a regional scale, with the sweat equity and financial support of partners, is moving this train down the tracks."

"The RIA grant will continue to allow the PNW-ER Accelerator to leverage public and private talent and financial resources to fast track key transportation projects in five states," noted Bruce Agnew, PNWER RIA Director. "We look forward to supporting the Big Sky Passenger Rail Authority."

The new Energy Transfer preferred units will be Series I Fixed Rate Perpetual Preferred Units and will trade on the NYSE under the ticker symbol "ETprl". As a result of the acquisition, Energy Transfer now owns and operates more than 125,000 miles of pipelines and related assets in all the major U.S. producing regions and markets across 41 states, further enhancing its leadership position in the midstream sector. The transaction is immediately accretive to distributable cash flow per unit for Energy Transfer, and adds significant cash flows from firm, long-term contracts and significant acreage dedications. Additionally, the combined operations of the two companies are expected to


