Sidney Health Center Successfully Recruits Additional General Surgeon



Youth Grant Application Deadline

Wildlife, shooting, fraternal and nonprofit civil organizations are urged to submit an application for the Encouraging Tomorrow's Hunters program, a State Game and Fish Department grant program developed to assist recruitment of the next generation of hunters and shooters. The maximum grant allowed is \$3,000. The program currently helps fund approximately 40 club and organizational events and projects, with an average grant of \$1,550. Grant funds help cover event expenses, including promotional printing; event memorabilia such as shirts, caps or vests; ammunition and targets, and eye and ear protection. Past funding has enabled several groups to conduct youth pheasant and waterfowl hunts, while others have sponsored trap and other shooting events, including archery and rifle shooting. Any club or organization interested in conducting a youth hunting or shooting event can get more information, including a grant application, from the Game and Fish Department website, gf.nd.gov, or by contacting outreach biologist Pat Lothspeich at 701-328-6332. Montana Credit Unions Support Hardworking Families

The recent economic recession had an enormous impact on Montanans, and even though there is a noticeable upswing for businesses, the economic recovery is slow. Credit unions across our state provide affordable financial services to thousands of individuals and families working hard each day to make ends meet.

Montana has over 27,000 families who maintain employment, but are below the poverty line. In addition to the struggles of working families trying to make ends meet, this is one of only five states to impose income taxes on the working poor. For example, Montana begins taxing a two-parent family with four children at a lower annual income than any other state, \$12,500 in annual income, which is well below poverty.

Of all the ideas presented this legislative session to alleviate poverty, we believe one of the most promising opportunities to support working Montanans and boost our economy at the same time is a state Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC).

EITC was created by Congress in 1975 to provide a tax credit to those earning low incomes, but requiring employment. President Ronald Reagan called the EITC "the best anti-poverty, the best pro-family, the best job creation measure to come out of Congress." Since that statement, studies have shown that most access the credit for just a couple years.

EITC is not only good for families, it is great for our economy. In 2013, more than 80,000 Montanans received the federal EITC and pumped \$151 million into Montana's economy. We hope the Treasure state joins twenty-two other states in this successful program by creating a similar credit on a state-level to provide an additional boost for low-income families to help make ends meet.

Montana had the opportunity right now to pass a state EITC that would work similar to how the federal EITC works. The proposal was modest; the maximum benefit to families would be about \$300. However, for those 80,000 Montanans, it could mean their ability to pay rent, fix their car, buy groceries, or pay a doctor bill.


The bottom line is these families and fellow residents will spend these dollars in our local communities, contributing an additional \$17 million into Montana communities in the next two years. The federal EITC program has been the most effective anti-poverty program in history, and a state-level credit could provide the same benefits to Montana families. Please contact your legislator at 444.4800 and encourage him or her to join us in supporting a state EITC.

She said that, although her focus could change, she plans to become an emergency room physician. "I've never imagined myself doing anything else. I like the fast pace of the ER and the fact that every situation is so unique and challenging. I feel I will be able to set myself to the task at hand and work through the



pressure of those chaotic and critical situations," she said.

This summer she plans to join the ambulance services in Bozeman and work at a healthcare facility while beginning her studies.

During Bawden's high school career she has been a member of the National Honor Society, speech and drama, band and choir. She has also served as a math tutor and volunteered as a judge for the science fair her junior and senior years.

Every year she has competed at the Science Olympiad held in Bozeman, and received second-place her senior year in Disease Detectives and sixth-place in Anatomy and Physiology. She also competed annually at the Academic Olympics.

She worked as a nurse's aide during the summer of 2013 at RMC, learning some of the basics of direct patient care.

Bawden cites her parents as her inspiration for wanting to pursue a career in the medical field. Her mother, Elaine has been a nurse for 34 years

and her dad, Bob, worked as a medical corpsman for the United States Navy aboard the Dwight David Eisenhower carrier ship and as a surgical technician in Billings.

"Hannah has wanted to be a doctor of some kind for as long as I can remember. In her elementary school years she wrote an essay about wanting to be a doctor and how she wanted to cure diseases like cancer. It has truly always been her passion," said Elaine Bawden.

The scholarship funds will be given directly to the university in two \$500 installments during the first and second semesters of her freshman year. With this scholarship included, RMHF has given \$4,000 in scholarship funds for students pursuing a career in healthcare.

"I am so grateful to be given this opportunity. I have enjoyed every moment and experience I have had in health-care and I look forward to advancing my education with the ultimate aspiration of becoming a physician," Hannah Bawden said.



Sportsmen Call On Montana Legislature To Restore Vital Funding

MISSOULA, Mont.—The Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation, Montana Wild Sheep Foundation, Ducks Unlimited and other Montana hunters and anglers call on the Montana Legislature to restore the spending authority of Montana Fish, Wildlife and Parks (FWP).

"This does not make sense," said David Allen, RMEF president and CEO. "In essence, the Legislature is both jeopardizing crucial access and habitat funding while also turning its collective back on Montana's sportsmen who have long fought for better access to public lands and improved wildlife conservation and management. It is sportsmen and women who funded these programs for the betterment of wildlife in the state."

At issue are the cuts to some of Montana's most productive and heavily-supported wildlife programs. On March 25, 2015, the House Appropriations Committee removed FWP's spending authority for the following programs from HB 403, and the Montana House subsequently passed the measure: Eliminated the Habitat Montana program appropriation of \$10,668,000 · Eliminated the Upland Game Bird program appropriation of \$849,000 Eliminated the Big Horn Sheep Habitat program appropriation of \$460,000 • Eliminated the Fishing Access Site program appropriation of \$345,000 • Reduced the state special revenue appropriation for the Migratory Bird Program by \$210,000 and restricted the use of the balance to prevent land acquisition

deer and sheep winter range and migration corridors. It also expands and improves wildlife management areas," said Allen.

"These are sportsmen's dollars, not tax dollars, and cannot be used for any purpose other than habitat improvement and recreational access," said Bob Sanders of Ducks Unlimited. "The Legislature should be looking for ways to improve these programs, not eliminate them. It's very baffling."

The amendments resulted in a reduction of more than \$12.5 million to FWP habitat and access programs. The money will still accrue in accounts, but since lawmakers stripped FWP of its spending authority, it would remain in a stagnant situation.

"The Bighorn Sheep Habitat Program is funded through the sale of the Governor's Bighorn Sheep License. This funding is vital in terms of enhancing failing bighorn sheep populations across Montana." said Brian Solan, president of the Montana Wild Sheep Foundation. "With Montana bighorns facing unprecedented pressures from disease, loss of habitat and poaching,

the last thing they need is political interference."

The funding in question is generated by the sale of hunting and fishing licenses and equipment. By law, it is earmarked solely for conservation efforts. No general fund dollars or tax dollars are at issue. Sportsmen remain concerned that politics take precedent over the stated wishes of the people who provide the funding for these critical programs.

"Access and quality habitat for wildlife are the top issues for sportsmen across Montana. We're counting on the Senate to restore this funding in order to maintain our hunting heritage," added Allen



FWP Releases Minimum Wolf Count For 2014

Montana's verified wolf population declined by 73, 12 percent, last year while livestock depredations by wolves continued to decline, dropping about 46 percent from 2013.

The minimum number of wolves counted by FWP at the end of 2014 was 554 compared to a minimum of 627 wolves counted at the end of 2013 according to Montana Fish Wildlife & Park's annual wolf conservation and management report released Monday. Montana's minimum wolf packs were counted at 134, compared to 152 last year, while breeding pairs increased to 33 from 28 counted last year. The minimum wolf count is the number of wolves actually verified by FWP wolf specialists. The actual number of wolves is estimated to be 27 percent to 37 percent higher than the minimum count. FWP's complete report is available online at fwp.mt.gov.

Overall, FWP Director Jeff Hagener said Montana's wolf population continues to be very healthy and far above federal recovery goals.

"Among the best news is that confirmed wolf depredations on livestock again took a significant drop in 2014," said Hagener.

Confirmed livestock depredations due to wolves included 35 cattle, 6 sheep and one horse in 2014, down 46 percent from 2013 loses of 50 cattle, 24 sheep, three horses and one goat. Cattle losses in 2014 were the lowest recorded in the past eight years.

The decline in wolf depredations continues a general downward trend that began in 2009. "For FWP, and we hope for others, it reinforces the fact that we not only have

more tools for managing wolf populations, but that we're applying them effectively," Hagener said. "One of our top priorities is to minimize livestock losses, and we think we're continuing to make a positive impact there."

The continuing decrease in livestock depredations over the past four years may be a result of several factors including targeted wolf depredation responses in cooperation with USDA Wildlife Services—and the effects of wolf harvest by hunters and trappers. Two hundred and thirteen

wolves were taken by hunters and trappers in the 2014 calendar portion of the 2014-15 hunting/trapping season compared to 231 taken in the 2013 calendar portion of the 2013-14 season. The total number of

known wolf mortalities during 2014 was 308, down from 335 in 2013, with 301 of these mortalities being human-related, including 213 legal harvests, 57 control actions to further reduce livestock depredations (down from 75 in 2013), 11 vehicle strikes, 10 illegal killings, 6 killed under the newly-enacted Montana State Senate Bill 200, 2 capture related mortalities, 1 euthanized due to poor health and 1 legal tribal harvest. In addition, 1 wolf died of natural causes and 6 of unknown causes

"Montana's wolf management program seeks to manage wolves just like we do other wildlife—in balance with their habitat, with other wildlife species and with the people who live here," Hagener said.

For the purpose of reporting minimum counts to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, Montana is divided into three areas that reflect the former gray wolf federal recovery

zones. The three zones cover the entire state and include more than one FWP region. Following is a summary of the 2014 minimum counts verified for those areas:

In the "Northwest Montana" area counts showed a minimum of 338 wolves in 91 verified packs and 17 breeding pairs, compared to 412, 104, and 16, respectively, in 2013. In the Montana portion

of the "Central Idaho" area counts verified a minimum of 94 wolves in 20 packs, with six breeding pairs, compared to the 2013 counts of 123, 26, and seven respectively.

The Montana portion of the "Greater Yellowstone" counts include a minimum of 122 wolves in 23 packs, and 11 breeding pairs, compared to 92, 22, and five, respectively in 2013.

The recovery of the wolf in the northern Rockies remains one of the fastest endangered species comebacks on record. In the mid 1990s, to hasten the overall pace of wolf recovery in the Northern Rockies, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service released 66 wolves into Yellowstone National Park and central Idaho. FWP began monitoring the wolf population, and managing livestock conflicts in 2004. After several court challenges wolves were successfully delisted in 2011.

The delisting of wolves in 2011 allows Montana to manage wolves in a manner similar to how bears, mountain lions and other wildlife species are managed, which is guided by state management plans, administrative rules, and laws.



Roosevelt Medical Center Identifies Community's Top Health Concerns

By Jaimee Green

Residents living within the service area of Roosevelt Medical Center, in Culbertson, identified alcohol/substance abuse (49.2%), cancer (48.1%) and obesity (34.4%) as the top-three area health concerns in the community, following the recent compilation of the healthcare organization's community needs assessment survey.

Collectively, 49% of responders indicated they felt their community was healthy.

On March 19, a community-based steering committee meeting was held where attendees were asked to begin prioritizing the areas where the most benefits could be realistically gained for the collective community in the area of healthcare. Department managers at RMC have also begun a series of implementation meetings that will address the findings, prioritize and identify staff members to begin a plan-of-action for areas where changes can be made immediately.

"The survey results enable us to begin moving forward with positive changes that align with our strategic plan and mission of continuing to offer quality healthcare to the community. The goal throughout this entire process is ultimately to create a community where people are living happy, healthy lives with access to as many services, outreach and educational opportunities we can feasibly and financially offer," said Audrey Stromberg, Administrator for RMC

Within the community, there are a number of organizations that have resources dedicated to community health and wellness that RMC can partner with so that the community can collectively reach their common goal of wellness. "No organization, including RMC, has the human or financial resources to identify and independently implement the changes necessary to impact every area of concern. This has to be a community-wide effort," said Stromberg.

Today, healthcare organizations are being tasked with focusing on population-health in community settings rather than illness-based care, which will require partnering with other individuals and agencies with expertise in some of the areas identified as needs or concerns. "We are hopeful that the steering committee will continue with its' commitment to the work that was started and will be successful with engaging others in the work

that needs to be to done to assure a broad-base of health services in our frontier community," said Sharon Schmitz, Better Health Improvement Specialist for the Frontier Medicine Better Health Partnership

The survey found that the top-three programs community members would like to see more of in their community were geared toward weight loss, women's health and fitness; while the top three key components for a healthy community were access to healthcare and other services, affordable housing and healthy behaviors and lifestyles.

The top-rated services offered at RMC were ambulance and laboratory services and physical therapy, with an overall Quality-of-Care rating of "excellent" to "good," with 3.3 out of 4.0. The services most received by the community were influenza injections through the clinic, routine check-ups and cholesterol checks.

The survey revealed the community's desire to have local access to a dental clinic, (31%) fitness center, (16.6%) and message therapy, (14.1%). Those surveyed identified the top-three ways for improving access to quality local healthcare as adding more specialists, (38.3%), more primary care providers, (37.7%) and additional out-patient services, (30.1%).

The survey, mailed out in December to 880 random members within the community, was part of RMCs dedication to getting input from the community while meeting their obligations to maintain their non-profit status. Of the surveys returned, 58% of respondents were from Culbertson, 20% were from Froid and 9% were from Bainville. Of those, 59% were female and 38% were male, with a number of "no-responses" for the remaining percentages. The majority of the respondents were age 56-65, (26%). The remaining participants were between the ages of 46-55, (20%) and 46-55, (16%).

"It's important for the community to realize that, at the end of the day, RMC still has to make decisions that are fiscally responsible to ensure the implementation of those new things identified by the community as essential don't become a detriment to the organization's bottom line. We are a non-profit organization, so it's important for RMC and the community to find that compromise that best meets the needs of everybody," said

RMC is part of the Frontier Medicine Better Health Partnerships project, which was formed to address the unique healthcare challenges faced by frontier healthcare. Throughout the state, there is participation from 24 other healthcare organizations.

The surveys were compiled by the Montana Office of Rural Health and Area Health Education Center in Bozeman and contracted through the National Rural Health Resource Center, of Duluth, MN. The project was fully funded through the Frontier Medicine Better Health Partnership Grant.

Historically, the community needs assessment survey has served as a vital tool that has helped RMC determine parts of the population most at risk for varying healthcare issues, as well as identify the top concerns of the community. RMC then uses this data to provide care and services through community outreach programs, preventative care measures and education.

In 2010 congress enacted the Patient Protection Affordable Care Act (PPACA), which put in place comprehensive health insurance reforms with the goal of enhancing the quality of healthcare for all Americans. This Act also required non-profit hospitals to complete a community needs assessment every three years in order to maintain their non-profit status.





April – National Safe Digging Month

ment projects. Results from the survey found that nearly half (45 percent) of American homeowners who plan to dig this year for projects like landscaping, installing a fence or mailbox, or building a deck, pond or patio, will put themselves and their communities at risk by not calling 811 a few days beforehand to learn the approxi-

mate location of underground utilities. Extrapolated to the full population of U.S. homeowners, approximately 38.6 million people will dig this year without first having underground utility lines marked.

The national public opinion survey of homeowners, conducted Feb. 25-March 1, 2015, also found that 79

percent of those who plan to dig believe that something negative – such as a service interruption, bodily harm or financial ramifications – could occur if they were to dig without knowing the location of underground utilities.

An underground utility line

is damaged once every six minutes nationwide because someone decided to dig without first calling 811, according to data collected by Common Ground Alliance (CGA), the national organization dedicated to protecting underground utility lines and the safety of people who dig near them. Digging without knowing the approximate location of underground utilities can result in damage to gas, electric, communications, water and sewer lines, which can lead to service disruptions, serious injuries and costly repairs.

There are more than 20 million miles of underground utilities in the United States, according to data compiled by CGA from various industry groups. That figure equates to more than one football field's length (105 yards) of buried utilities for every man, woman and child in the U.S.

Everyone who calls Montana811 or ND One-Call at 811 a few days before digging is connected to a local one call notification center that will take the caller's information and communicate it to local utility companies. Professional locators will then visit the dig site to mark the approximate location of underground utility lines with spray paint, flags or both. Once a site has been accurately marked, it is safe to begin digging around the marked areas.

According to the survey results, the majority of American homeowners believe something negative could happen if they don't call 811 to have underground utility lines marked, and yet nearly half do not plan to make the crucial call to 811 prior to starting their projects. Making a free call to 811 reduces the likelihood of causing an incident – such as service outages or bodily harm in worst-case scenarios – to

just 1 percent.

CGA's 1,700 members, the U.S. Department of Transportation, and most governors have proclaimed April as National Safe Digging Month as a way to bring extra attention to the issue of underground utility line safety and reduce the risk of unnecessary infrastructure damage.

As part of National Safe Digging Month, homeowners are encouraged to take the following steps when planning a digging project this spring:

Always call 811 a few days before digging, regardless of the depth or familiarity with the property.

Plan ahead. Call on Monday or Tuesday for work planned for an upcoming weekend, providing ample time for the approximate location of lines to be marked.

Confirm with 811 that all lines have been marked.

Learn what the various colors of paint and flags represent at www.call811.com/faqs.

Consider moving the location of your project if it is

near utility line markings.

If a contractor has been hired, confirm that a call to 811 has been made. Don't allow work to begin if the lines aren't marked.
