Farm Credit Services Offers College Scholarships



The SECGC is the only state-sponsored charitable fund-raising campaign



Dining With Diabetes - North Dakota Style Coming In November



If you or a family member is living with diabetes, pre-diabetes, or are the caregiver or other support person of someone with diabetes, you are encouraged to attend "Dining With Diabetes" in November. This series of four classes, held on Tuesday afternoons - Nov. 8, 15, 22 and 29 - at the McKenzie County Courthouse meeting room, Watford City, will help you promote self-management of diabetes through healthy food choices and meal plan-

Classes will start at 1 p.m. CT and conclude by 4 p.m. CT. They will be delivered through an interactive video network and will also include food demonstrations, hands-on food preparation, and tasting healthy foods. Participants will learn how to plan and prepare balanced and flavorful meals. Discussions and time to answer questions and network with each other will be included.

Offered in 30 states, this tested program follows established clinical practice guidelines that reduce the risk of diabetes and complications. Classes are taught by diabetes health professionals such as registered dietitians, certified diabetes educators, and extension

Cost to attend is \$25, which includes food and all class materials. Registration deadline is Oct. 31, 2011. Registrations are taken at the McKenzie County Extension Office in the courthouse, 201 W. 5th St., Watford City, or registrations may also be taken by calling the extension office at 701-444-3451 or emailing extension agent Marcia Hellandsaas at marcia.hellandsaas@ndsu.edu.





Paper & Plastics' Recycling Drives Continue Quarterly

Trashy Tuesday drive will be held this coming Tuesday. Oct. 18 from 3-7 p.m. at Richland County Public Works, located at 2140 W. Holly Street by the fairgrounds. At the last Trashy Tuesday, the community recycled 410 lbs. of office paper, and 200 lbs. of plastics. The drives are being sponsored by the Recycling Advisory Committee. The committee consists of area citizens who would like to ensure that the community has an opportunity to recycle material that cannot be recycled using the current resources. Their goal is to create a more comprehensive and sustainable recycling program in the county. Committee members include Kent Simonis, George Biebl, Russ Huotari, Jackie Couture, Linette and Greg Miller, Jeff Hintz, Cindy Eleson, Darci Haraldson, Randy Olson and Gary Schaff.

On Trashy Tuesday, the materials that will be accepted are plastic bottles, office paper and plastic grocery bags. Examples of plastic bottles include milk jugs, and laundry detergent, dish soap and hair product bottles. As long as the container has a threaded neck which is smaller than the base, it can be taken to the drive. The committee asks that all jugs and bottles be washed out and the lids removed. Catalogs and telephone books cannot be accepted. Plastic grocery bags will be collected, and these will not be recycled but reused. For that reason, the bags must be free of holes. Community members who bring items will sort their plastics, office paper and grocery bags at this event.

Trashy Tuesdays are scheduled the 3rd Tuesday of every 3rd month of the year from 3-7 p.m. and a full year of recycling drives are planned in Sidney. Start collecting today for Trashy Tuesday for the coming drive on the 18th and continue collecting! Jan. 17, April 17, July 19 and Oct. 16, 2012 are the additional Trashy Tuesday collection dates.

Two-Day Youth Deer Hunt

Montana Fish, Wildlife & Parks reminds parents of young hunters that a special two-day deer hunt for youth ages 12-15 is set this year for Oct. 20-21.

The two-day deer hunt for resident and nonresident youngsters is a great opportunity for our youth," said Ron Aasheim. "The FWP Commission approved the hunt to encourage young people to participate in deer hunting with a parent or hunting mentor."

Aasheim said young hunters ages 11-15 may hunt deer statewide with a general or deer B license. They are eligible to take the deer species and sex otherwise available on that general or deer B license in the specific hunting district the young person hunts in.

A non-hunting adult at least 18 years of age must accompany the young hunter in the field. The shooting hours, hunter safety requirements and all other regulations that apply in a regular deer firearm season apply during the special two-day youth deer season.

Mass Influenza (Flu) Shot Clinic To Be Held In Sidney

Richland County Health Department (RCHD) will hold a mass flu shot clinic at the Community Services Building on Wednesday, Oct. 12, from 10 a.m.-6:30 p.m. Medicaid, Medicare & CHIPS can be billed for those who bring their cards.

Everyone is encouraged to reduce their risk by getting a yearly flu vaccination which is the best way to prevent influenza and its severe complications. The Richland County Health Department will have plenty of vaccine available for ages six months old through adult (99+years) at the mass clinic. No appointment is needed during the clinic.

Influenza vaccinations will be available throughout the fall and winter months since influenza activity can circulate anytime from November through April. RCHD would like to encourage all employers to send their employees to be vaccinated. Having illness from the flu

can lead to lost work time for businesses. Groups may be billed—make arrangements ahead of time by calling the health department.

The flu is caused by influenza viruses; the flu is a contagious respiratory illness with sudden onset of cough, chest discomfort, fever, chills and body aches; not the "stomach flu", which is characterized by vomiting and diarrhea. Influenza can cause mild to severe illness, and at times can lead to death. Influenza can lead to pneumonia and other complications depending on your current health and medical status. Along with getting a flu vaccination, please practice good hand washing, covering your cough, and staying home when feeling

Flu vaccination shot will not give you the flu, because the vaccine does not contain live virus; it is "inactivated", containing only killed virus. It may cause soreness at the site of the shot area or a slight fever but these symptoms will not last long. Before anyone receives a flu shot, they will be screened about their health status to determine whether there is any medical reason that would make vaccination not recommended. The forms can be found on the Richland County web site (richland.org/health) and may be filled out in advance for the clinic.

RCHD is planning to move patrons through quickly and efficiently. Last year they vaccinated almost 800, with a time from entrance to shot average of 12 minutes per person. This year's clinic will be staffed again by many volunteers and staff. Believe it or not the best time to come is over your lunch time! There will be plenty of parking available. Get your flu shot!

CDC Report Shows About 112 Million Annual Incidents Of People Drinking & Driving

Adults drank too much and got behind the wheel about 112 million times in 2010—that is almost 300,000 incidents of drinking and driving each day—according to a CDC Vital Signs study released today by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

"The four million adults who drink and drive each year put everyone on the road at risk," said CDC Director Thomas R. Frieden, M.D., M.P.H. "In fact, nearly 11,000 people are killed every year in crashes that involve an alcohol-impaired driver."

For the study, CDC analyzed data from the 2010 Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System Survey.

The study also found that:

Men were responsible for 81% of drinking and driving in 2010.

Young men, ages 21-34, made up only 11% of the U.S. population in 2010, yet were responsible for 32% of all episodes of drinking and driving.

Eighty-five percent of drinking and driving episodes were reported by people who also reported binge drinking. Binge drinking means five or more drinks for men or four or more drinks for women during a short period of time.

"Drunk driving is a public health problem with far-reaching effects," said Linda C. Degutis, Dr.P.H., M.S.N., CDC's National Center for Injury Prevention and Control director. "Drunk drivers, who have delayed reaction times and reflexes, put even the most responsible drivers and pedestrians in harm's way. Public support to prevent drunk driving is strong. Thankfully, there are proven ways to protect everyone on the road."

Proven, effective strategies to prevent alcohol-impaired driving include:

Sobriety checkpoints: At sobriety checkpoints drivers are stopped to assess their level of alcohol impairment. Accord-

ing to the Transportation Research Board, more widespread, frequent use of these checkpoints could save about 1,500 to 3,000 lives on the road each year.

Minimum legal drinking age laws: These laws prohibit selling alcohol to people under age 21 in all 50 states and the District of Columbia. Keeping 21 as the minimum legal drinking age helps keep young, inexperienced drivers from drinking and driving.

Ignition interlocks: These devices prevent drivers who were convicted of alcohol-impaired driving from operating their vehicles if they have been drinking. Interlocks are effective in reducing re-arrest rates from drinking and driving by about two-thirds while the device is on the vehicle.







Richland County Commissioners Clarification On Dry-Redwater Regional Water Authority Project

This article is to clarify the Richland County Commissioners position in regards to the Dry-Redwater Regional Water Authority (DRWA). The decision we made was to table this project at this time, not to reject it. We have several questions that need to be answered before we go ahead with this project.

The DRWA presented a funding request to the Commissioners in the amount of \$450,000 to be used for the preparation of a formal Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) between DRWA and the City of Sidney to provide water to the DRWA; that the funds will be utilized to complete the design, pipeline routing, environmental clearances permitting and easement descriptions for the water line from Sidney to Lambert area: prepare an estimate of construction cost to complete this phase of the project and submit it to the Richland County Commissioners. The Commissioners at that time can decide to fund any, all or none of the proposed construction.

At that time the projected estimate to complete the project in Richland County was approximately \$31 million to be phased in over a six-year period. Not all of Richland County would have had access to this water project at the \$31 million in-

vestment. It would have been interesting to see a projected cost to serve the entire county, but \$450,000 is a huge investment if we were to go no further with the project. The total estimated cost of this project in the four-county areas is approximately \$120 million. That is at today's cost, but with the estimated completion date in 2026, the costs will be considerably higher in our opinion. This does not complete the project for the entire county, only about 50-60%. This creates an issue of not all residents of Richland County getting a benefit they think they will be receiving. Everyone should be checking the proposed mapped areas to help make an informed decision.

an informed decision.

The project would begin in Sidney, using water from Sidney's water treatment facility and build out towards Lambert, Savage and Fairview and out into the rural areas as funding allowed. The DRWA would continue to pursue funding to complete the entire project, including any portions of Richland County that could not be funded through oil revenues.

This is where the commissioners have started to question the feasibility of our commitment to this project. We, as commissioners, need some guarantees that the Federal Government and the

State of Montana will indeed have available resources to fund this project to completion. The State of Montana DOES NOT seem to be interested in helping Richland County or Eastern Montana develop any of our resources, as was demonstrated Governor Schweitzer's line item veto of the Richland County Soil Conservation's request for funding. The legislature only seems to be interested in taking away our revenues and shifting them west. We need some quarantees from the State of Montana before we commit to this amount of funding for the DRWA project. Especially a guarantee they will leave our existing oil revenues intact. Next comes the commitment from the Federal Government, We are not getting positive feedback from Senator Baucus, Senator Tester or Representative Rehberg. Any guarantees for funding approval for a new water project, no matter how needed, in their opinion, will be very hard to get. Total funding of this project with our existing political climate and existing national debt will be a daunting task to say the least. The money just isn't there to start a new project and it will be very difficult to find to fund and finish already approved and started projects. The projects already started will be a prior-

ity.

Over the last six years, we have been working with our Richland County Public Works Director Russ Huotari, to create a long range capitol improvement plan for Richland County. We have been projecting revenues and fitting in our needs for oil revenues to back-fill the county's budgets, complete our building project, continue our road improvement projects, maintain reserves and set money aside for any unanticipated problems that may arise.

We only have one building project on going now which is the courthouse remodel. The money needed to back fill our budgets is a priority to maintain our county's tax levy and reserves at the existing level (NO TAX IN-CREASE). At this time, if we were to commit the necessary funds to complete this water project in Richland County, the first part of our Capitol Improvement Plan that would be impacted would be our road projects.

This is what we have used to base our decision to not fund the DRWA project at this time. The DRWA project does address a very important need in our region and is one we will continue to

support as it was initially designed. If we begin to see some commitment from the State of Montana and the Federal Government, it would have a huge influence on our action to reconsider our decision.

There are other areas of

this county that are also hinting at needing revenue assistance for the county funds, such as infrastructure needs for sewer lines, sewer lagoons and water main upgrades and new installations in Sidney and Savage. Also, there is the possibility that Sidney may need the water targeted for this project for their own growth through the sale of water to the oil industry, new housing subdivisions and hotel complexes being added. These possibilities have all presented themselves since the discussion and commitment from the City of Sidney was made to this project.

Our decision was based on prioritizing our needs and our priority has become the roads of Richland County. Even though we objected, we watched as the last Legislative Session took oil revenues away from our school districts to put into the General Fund to re-distribute around the state. We are well

aware that in the next session or sessions our county's oil revenues could be the next easy target. As we stated before, until we get some hard guarantees from the State of Montana that our revenues will remain intact, WE need to work on OUR road system to get as many miles in the best possible condition in case the Legislature decides to reduce our share of funding. Our roads are a very important part of our infrastructure and their maintenance and improvement are necessary for the growth of our region.

We as commissioners have not made this decision without careful consideration of as many variables as possible. Again, we have tabled this project not rejected it. When we feel like our questions and concerns have been addressed by the State of Montana and the Federal Government, we will reconsider our decision.

If you have any questions about this project or the commissioners' decision to wait for the project to proceed as originally proposed, call any one of us, and we will try to give you answers. Thank you.



A Little Bit Country

Grasses For tome Lawns

New home owners often ask about types of lawn grasses to plant. For those who ask this time of year I strongly suggest delaying planting until just before freeze-up or next spring. Grass planted now will likely germinate but not establish a strong enough root system to survive cold winter temperatures.

The grass species used for home lawns include many cultivars of Kentucky bluegrass, red fescue, chewings fescue, hard fescue, tall fescue and perennial ryegrass. These are grasses that are most attractive and grow vigorously during the cooler months of spring and autumn. For the home lawn, mixtures are often the best choice, with the Kentucky bluegrass cultivars making up 55-60% of the mixture, followed by a cultivar or two of red fescue (30-35%), with perennial ryegrass (10-15%) making up the smallest portion. Generally, after a year or two, perennial ryegrass is crowded out by the more aggressive Kentucky bluegrass.

Avoid the "bargain mixes" that have annual or Italian ryegrass (Lolium multiflorum) as a component. The coarse grass blades, rank growth and yellowishgreen color do not make a good mix for even temporary

Kentucky bluegrass is the most adaptable coldhardy, cool-season grass species to use for home lawns. It has excellent recuperative and competitive capacity. The rhizomatous nature of Kentucky bluegrass allows it to virtually repair itself, a quality that is lacking in most grasses. Red fescue also produces rhizomes, but it lacks the extensive recuperative potential of Kentucky bluegrass. Red fescue is sometimes referred to as creeping red fescue.

Perennial ryegrass and tall fescue are not as cold hardy as Kentucky bluegrass. Care should be taken in choosing cultivar selections of these two species. Only cultivars that have proven winter hardiness in turfgrass trials should be selected.

Buffalograss (Buchloe dactyloides), a warm-season stoloniferous species, is often used in conjunction with

blue grama grass (Bouteloua gracillis) as a xeric lawn. Seed of buffalograss is expensive and a successful planting is difficult to establish. It stays dormant until the temperatures warm consistently and goes back to dormancy when the temperatures drop to the low 40s. It is the only grass species that is dioecious (male/female plants). It establishes rather quickly from plugs when provided with supplemental irrigation and hand weeding. Blue grama is also a warmseason grass.

MT Businesses Still Being Targeted By Aggressive Companies

The Department of Labor and Industry is hearing from several small businesses that have been targeted by aggressive poster companies trying to sell Labor Law Posters.

"We are still getting reports from Montana busi-

nesses that these companies continue to send posters and demand payment, despite the fact that the business didn't order them. These companies are even suggesting that by not purchasing the poster the business is breaking the law", said Labor Commissioner Keith Kelly. "We want to remind businesses if you get something in the mail you didn't order, you are not obligated in any way to pay for it. You can write did not order, return to sender on the envelope and send it back to the company."

The Five in One posters, which are available at no cost from the Department's Job Service Division, encompass Equal Employment

Opportunity, Family and Medical Leave Act with Military Family Leave (employers with 50 or more employees), Federal Minimum Wage (Fair Labor Standards Act), and the Polygraph Protection Act. Federal regulations also require posting the Uniformed Services Employment and Reemployment Rights Act (USERRA). All posters are available at the Job Service offices.

Posters also required by Montana State Law include: Proof of Unemployment Insurance coverage (provided by the Department of Labor and Industry, Unemployment Insurance Contributions Bureau) and Proof of Workers' Compensation coverage, provided by Workers' Compensation Insurance carrier.

Businesses that have returned the posters and are still getting invoices from the poster company can contact the Better Business Bureau at 1-800-356-1007 or file a complaint online at www.bbb.org. They can also contact Montana's Office of Consumer Protection at 1-800-481-6896 or e-mail contactocp@mt.gov.
