Recreational Vehicles (RVs) are no longer for recreational living in Big Sky Country and the Bakken. The homes on wheels are no longer just for the lake or camping by the river. What originally was intended to be temporary housing is becoming more permanent homes due to housing shortages since the increase of oilfield activity in the area.

National media coverage recently has many people coming from all over the country to secure a job in the oil industry. Many are warned of the housing shortage and the harsh winters but the hope of employment is stronger than the warnings. They are coming to the area in an RV either owned by them or rented or purchased when they get here.

RV Parks have sprung up on the landscapes and neighborhood corners in all communities from eastern Montana to central North Dakota. Signage advertising for RV lots for rent are plenty. Local property owners are renting a lot on their property, as well as RV Parks, from \$500-\$1,000 per month.

The snow and cold temperatures recently have those that heed the warnings of harsh winters taking action to winterize their RVs. Local building supply businesses have seen a significant sales increase for "blue board" and plywood.

Blue board is a styrofoam insulation board being used as skirting around the RVs. Adding skirting to the RV is essential to reduce heat loss. Insulating the skirting with rigid insulation helps keep the area under the RV warmer, which will keep the floor warm and the area under the RV from freezina.

Area officials have stressed the increased concern for safety while living in an RV this winter. The area has already had one fatality this season. A 49-year-old woman died in Trenton earlier this month from carbon monoxide poisoning using a generator to power a trailer she was living in with



insufficient ventilation during a power outage.

Richland County Fire Department Fire Marshall Robert Gilbert, Jr. stresses the importance of safety when living in an RV during the winter.

"The most important things are fire and carbon monoxide detectors," said Gilbert, "Carbon monoxide is odorless and invisible and it kills."

Carbon monoxide is an odorless and invisible gas that can slowly fill a space and cause suffocation.

Gilbert also warns that when skirting trailers make sure to not cover any vents. When using alternative heat sources do not have any combustibles near the heat source and do not use ovens in the trailer as a heat source. When using generators and portable heaters be sure to ensure proper ventilation.

#### **Occupy Wall Street**

For the last two months the Occupy Wall Street (OWS) movement has dominated the national spotlight. I find the goals of the movement to be somewhat nebulous, however. Some say they are hoping to make America a more equitable place to live, others say they are protesting just for the sake of protesting.

The OWS phenomenon is interesting. I agree that our society has become fragmented. Some pundits say that President Obama created this "class warfare" dissension. He repeatedly says that one percent of Americans are rich, and the other 99 percent are not. And many of "the 99 percent" are hurting. The rich, they say, are getting richer; while the poor are getting poorer. The demonstrators say that Big Business (BB) is the major cause of this discrepancy – and the human suffering that goes with it.

The OWS demonstrators say that business executives make too much money; corporate greed is excessive; corruption is prevalent; the unemployment rate is too high; our standard of living is declining; and the "Common Man" no longer has a chance to get ahead in life. The American Dream, they say, is dead.

It is a known fact that many large companies are sitting on large amounts of cash. They could and should be reinvesting that money. While private industry does account for 75% of the jobs in this country, they could be doing more. They should start hiring again. Those who side with BB say that these companies aren't hiring because of government policies. They don't want to pay for expensive mandates (like National Health Care) or be burdened with excess regulations. Some experts say that BB is waiting for a change in government. They want the next president to be a conservative. They want the current "unfriendly business climate" to come to an end.

The OWS movement brings up some important points. BB should be doing more to help the Common Man. I think that the demonstrators are voicing their concerns in the wrong way, however. Vandalizing our public parks and committing

violent crimes is not a good way to get the general public to agree with your viewpoint. The demonstrators should be voicing their opinion in a more peaceful manner. Freedom of speech should not be taken for granted. It is also ironic that these people are demonstrating in parks and public venues that have been paid for by taxes, most of which have been collected from BB and the "rich" people that they criticize. While the Common Man does face obstacles in times of economic hardship, America still has more personal success stories than any other country in the world. "Rags to riches" stories do occur, but only in people who make the most of their opportunities.

The OWS versus BB debate is probably a good thing. Like other contentious debates in our history, America's position on these issues will be clarified, and our management of these problems will almost certainly improve.

Thanksgiving is just a few days away. Most people are grateful for their blessings. It is equally important, I think, to give thanks for our difficulties. As the Bible says, we should rejoice in our sufferings because suffering produces perseverance; perseverance builds character; and character brings hope. This hope doesn't disappoint us; it leads to an outpouring of God's love for us. (Paraphrased from Romans 5:3-5) And thank God we live in a country that has provided so many people with so many blessings – and also gives those who are not happy the right to complain.

# ABATE Participates In Toy Drive



#### Polar Plunge Fundraiser Part Of Christmas Stroll

The Polar Plunge, a national event that supports the Special Olympics, and endorsed by Sidney Law Enforcement along with other interested individuals and businesses, will be part of this year's Christmas Stroll activi-

The Polar Plunge, scheduled for 3 p.m. on Friday, Nov. 25 in the parking lot at the corner of 2nd Ave. & 3rd St. SE, involves a dip into icy water in the great outdoors. People with a screwy sense of fun, or else who have a deep commitment to the Special Olympics program, obtain pledges from the public and then voluntarily jump into a tank of frigid water sitting outside in a parking lot in order to collect the pledge money.

"This is the first year we've done this," says Bob Burnison with the Sidney Police Department. "This is a fund raiser for the Special Olympics, a program endorsed by law enforcement and that is our No. 1 fundraising program. Seventy per cent of all proceeds stay in Richland County and the remaining 30% go to the state Special Olympics. All money helps train athletes and to send them to competitions."

He adds, "The Polar Plunge is a national event. Some places have lakes and use them for the plunge, but since we don't have a lake, we'll use a 5x12 tank filled with water. We also are considering selling ice at the event so spectators can add the ice to the water to make it even colder for the participants."

Volunteers from law enforcement around the area, participants from education, and one member of the bar association are part of the roster of individuals willing to brave cold water and cold weather in order to raise money for this worthwhile cause.

> Participants must pre-register with Burnison or Gabe Zeiler, and then obtain pledges from the community prior to the Plunge. "Par-

ticipants must preregister by calling the Sidney Police Department at 433-2210 and ask for either me, Bob Burnison, or Gabe Zeiler," Burnison remarks. "We want people to join us to jump into the water. It may not sound like fun, but it will be, and it will help raise money for an excellent cause. Special Olympics mean a lot to the athletes. It is uplifting to see

these athletes participate in the games."

He concludes, "Come watch crazy people jump into cold water. This event supports a very good cause, so we hope to have a lot of participants who have raised pledges, and we hope to have spectators come watch the fun."


The newest service at the Marketplace is Spencers Arts. His unique artwork pops up everywhere ... on walls, canvases and even bodies.

prizes.



#### **How To Deter Identity Thieves During The Holidays**

(ARA) - Like the song says, little things mean a lot, especially during the holidays. A greeting card with a heartfelt, handwritten note, a tin of homemade cookies - these simple gestures speak of the holiday spirit.

During the holidays, the little things you do - or don't do - can also mean a lot when it comes to protecting yourself from identity theft. The holiday season is rife with opportunity for identity thieves, as shoppers swarm malls, stores and websites looking for the perfect gift. Unfortunately, holiday shopping and identity theft go together like holly and evergreen.

It may be hard to keep minutiae in mind when you're

in the middle of the holiday hustle and bustle, but small steps can help ensure identity thieves don't enjoy the season at your expense. This season, ProtectMyID, Experian's identity theft detection, protection and resolution service, offers a few tips for protecting your personal information while you shop:

#### At the mall or retail store

\* Only carry in your wallet what you absolutely need. Take only the credit cards you will use and leave your Social Security card, library card and other potentially identifying personal information at home.

\* Never leave your purse or wallet in the car and always conceal packages in the trunk. Avoid leaving anything in sight inside your vehicle that might tempt someone to break into it.

\*When you hand over your credit card for a purchase, be aware of who's around you. Check over your shoulder, because identity thieves can stand behind you and snap a picture of your credit card - with your name and account number on it - using a cell phone.

\* Likewise, make sure the sales clerk doesn't leave your sight with your credit card. Criminals have been known to make copies of cards.

#### Shopping online

\* Know who you're buying from. Conduct a Web search of the name of the vendor you're thinking of buying from and see what others have to say about the company. Check the Better Business Bureau to find out whether the company has any complaints against it.

\* Keep a record of basic information for every website you buy from. Be suspicious if you can't find information like a physical address, phone number or email address. When you make a purchase, take a screenshot of the order page and save it for your records.

\* Only do business with websites that have put security measures in place to protect customers from hacking and other types of Internet fraud. Look for the lock symbol on the bottom of the page and "https" in the url of the checkout page.

\* When typing a Web address into your browser, double and triple check to ensure you've typed it correctly. Identity thieves have been known to create fake sites for commonly mistaken Web addresses to scam consumers into thinking they're placing an order with their favorite website.

\* Use a credit card, rather than a debit card, for online purchases. Debit cards link directly to your bank account. Credit cards come with an extra layer of protection.

#### After the holidays and all year round

When the holidays are over, it's no time to let your guard down. Continue to check your bank and credit card statements every month. Consider enrolling in an identity protection product.

After you've checked your statements and paid your

bills, shred them before throwing them away. "Dumpster diving" - going through your trash to look for personal identifying information - is a prime method of operation for identity thieves.

Finally, review your credit report regularly, not just once a year when it's free. By monitoring your credit report, you'll be better able to detect unauthorized activity.







#### Strategies For Winter Driving

Winter driving is here! After a long and pleasant autumn, winter arrived overnight and we need to learn to drive on ice and snow all over again.

Every year, that first jaunt into the icy winter wonderland makes us curl our toes a little. According to the "Montana Take Along Winter Survival Handbook", 20-40% of all Montana crashes involve icy conditions. Most fatal crashes involve single vehicles that leave the road and overturn or crash into something. By taking a few precautions, our winter driving season can be a safe one.

Here are some tips from the National Safety Council for driving safely on icy roads:

Decrease your speed and leave yourself plenty of room to stop. You should allow at least three times more space than usual between you and the car in front of you.

Brake gently to avoid skidding. If your wheels start to lock up, ease off the brake.

Don't use cruise control or overdrive on icy roads.

Be especially careful on bridges, overpasses and infrequently traveled roads, which will freeze first. Even at temperatures above freezing, if the conditions are wet, you might encounter ice in shady areas or on exposed roadways like bridges.

Don't pass snow plows and sanding trucks. The drivers have limited visibility, and you're likely to find the road in front of them worse than the road behind.

Turn on your lights to increase your visibility to other motorists.

Keep your lights and windshield clean.

Use low gears to keep traction, especially on hills.

Don't assume your vehicle can handle all conditions. Even four-wheel and front-wheel drive vehicles can encounter trouble on winter roads.

Allow extra time to arrive at your destination.

If your rear wheels skid...

Take your foot off the accelerator.

Steer in the direction you want the front wheels to go. If your rear wheels are sliding left, steer left. If they're sliding right, steer right.

If your rear wheels start sliding the other way as you recover, ease the steering wheel toward that side. You might have to steer left and right a few times to get your vehicle completely under control.

If you have standard brakes, pump them gently.

If you have anti-lock brakes (ABS), do not pump the brakes. Apply steady pressure to the brakes. You will feel the brakes pulse — this is normal.

If your front wheels skid...

Take your foot off the gas and shift to neutral, but don't try to steer immediately.

As the wheels skid sideways, they will slow the vehicle and traction will return. As it does, steer in the direction you want to go. Then put the transmission in "drive" or release the clutch, and accelerate gently.

Season-Appropriate clothing

Whistle to signal for help

Basic tool kit, knife & shovel Tow chains or straps

Flares

Kitty litter or sand

Booster cables

Non-perishable, high energy food

Tell someone where you are going, exact route and when you will arrive.....never leave your vehicle

Drive defensively...remember there are drivers who may not be familiar with winter driving. Don't drive distracted and always wear your seat belt.

# Highway Patrol Dept. Conducting Commercial Motor Vehicle Inspections

The Montana and North Dakota Highway Patrol Departments are conducting a commercial motor vehicle safety inspection saturation effort this week.

The saturation effort began Monday in northeastern Montana by the Montana Highway Patrol with a similar saturation being held in northwestern North Dakota.

Commercial vehicle operation related to oil production has increased in eastern Montana and western North Dakota during recent years. According to Shane Mintz, Montana Department of Transportation (MDOT) district administrator, District 4, Glendive, the MDOT along with Highway Patrol Departments normally have scheduled safety inspections on commercial motor vehicles and drivers in the spring and fall of the year.


The Highway Patrol Department says it has tried to address the changing transportation environment in the area through education, enforcement and partnerships with community and industry representatives. The enforcement stops will include safety inspections on commercial motor vehicles and drivers in an effort to ensure they are adhering to federal motor carrier safety standards and regulations, along with size and weight laws.

The MDOT and the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration (FMCSA) conducted enhanced enforcement stops in northeastern Montana the last part of September. Truck traffic through these areas has increased significantly since the previous enhanced enforcement this past spring.

"MDOT along with FMCSA normally conduct enhanced enforcements around the state." said Mintz. "They are very aware of the increased truck traffic with the oil activity in the eastern part of the state and see the importance of these enhanced enforcements."

With eastern Montana having weigh stations only in Wibaux, Broadus and Culbertson and limited resources in the area, the FMCSA conducts these inspection efforts with motor carrier safety officers brought in from all over the state.

Anyone living in eastern Montana or western North Dakota is also very aware of the increased truck traffic and can be reassured by the flashing blue lights and trucks on the side of the road.

#### A Little Bit Country **Black Ash Possible Substitute For Green Ash**

With the potential of the Emerald Ash Borer coming westward to North Dakota and possibly devastating our Green Ash trees, homeowners ask for alternatives. This is a very difficult question to answer as I feel there is no tree equal to the hardiness and drought resistance possessed by Green

As an alternative deciduous tree to Green Ash I have suggested Hackberry, Linden, Bur Oak and Buckeye. In doing so, I must emphasize the limitations of each. After all, none of these trees, except Bur Oak, are native to western North Dakota. Another tree which deserves some consideration is Black Ash. I have found several plantings doing quite well in the Williston area, but in each instance the trees receive supplemental water.

Black Ash is a tree of northeastern North Dakota and grows best in bottom lands and other moist areas. Although it is not as cold hardy as Green Ash, it is considered a Zone 3 tree. This zone includes the southern parts of Saskatchewan and Manitoba along with the northern parts of North Dakota and Montana.

Black Ash will grow to be 30-50 feet in height. The crown width is usually about one-half of the tree's height. I find the leaves and leaflets are a bit longer than those of Green Ash. The leaflets are dark green on the upper side and a lighter green on the bottom. I know of only one cultivated variety and that is named Fallgold. It was released by the Morden Research Centre of Manitoba.

It will do well when exposed to partial and full sun and should make a good shade tree. However, remember it will need additional water during our growing seasons.

If there is any deciduous tree substitute for Green Ash, it might be Common Hackberry. I say this because its cold hardiness is almost that of Green Ash and it does express some resistance to drought conditions, but like most other trees, it does better on moist, well-drained sites.

The leaves of Common Hackberry are bright green on the upper side and a paler color green on the bottom. As with Black and Green Ash, you can expect a yellow fall color. A Common Hackberry can grow 40-60 feet tall and have a crown width of 25-45 feet. As the tree ages I think its beauty is enhanced. It develops a bark that is grayish with distinct narrow ridges. Some describe the bark as having a stucco appearance.

A popular variety of Common Hackberry is Oahe. This was released by the USDA Research Center, Mandan. Another is Delta Hackberry which was developed in Manitoba.

Another tree deserving consideration is the American Linden, often referred to as Basswood. As it ages, its form becomes rounded which makes it a great shade tree. It has tolerance of our winters but it is not resistant to our often droughty summers but will do well in home yards with lawns which are well watered.

Suggesting a tree with no pest problems is not possible. Even our native trees such as Green Ash and Bur Oak can be harmed by an insect or disease. However, these two trees can be very forgiving when their needs for survival are ig-




