
Senator John Walsh today called the Department of Justice's announcement of Office of Violence Against Women grants an important step in preventing and prosecuting crimes of domestic and sexual violence: "These grants are an important and overdue step to help local communities in the Bakken region prosecute crimes of violence against women and educate the public about sexual assault prevention, making our state safer

By taking this important first step, we are strengthening our judicial institutions and creating a more effective framework to address future abuse for the Fort Peck Tribes."

While traveling across the state, Walsh has repeatedly heard from Montanans about the importance of funding Violence Against Women programs.

The Justice Department grants will go to the Fort Peck Assiniboine Tribes and Sioux in Poplar and the Montana Coalition Against Domestic and Sexual Violence in Helena as well as other organizations and communities in North Dakota.

'E-rase your E-waste' Fall Collection is Sept 5-6

Over the past 10 years the "E-rase your E-waste" program has collected more than 164 TONS of outdated electronics for recycling, preserving space in the local landfill as well as protecting the environment and human health through the proper disposal of hazardous materials contained in those electronics. Organizers are hoping to push that total over 175 tons during their upcoming fall weekend collection event set for Friday and Saturday Sept. 5-6, in

"We'd love to celebrate our 10th year by topping the 175-ton mark," E-rase your E-waste Committee Chair Jackie Couture said. "That's only another 11 tons which is definitely doable. We've had annual totals ranging from 20 tons to 27.5 tons of e-waste for five of the past six years."

This year's fall collection event will once again be held at the Richland County Shop at 2140 W. Holly in Sidney, next to the Fairgrounds. Signs will be posted. Now's the time to clear those closets as this is the final collection event for 2014, according to Couture. Times are 3-7 pm Friday, Sept. 5, and 9am-3 pm Saturday, Sept. 6. Please note, the county shop is available for drop offs during event times ONLY, when employees with Yellowstone E-waste Solutions of Billings, our e-cycler, and local volunteers will be available to help with loading and unloading.

Yellowstone E-waste Solutions is providing e-cycling services for FREE, with two small exceptions. Participants wanting their hard drives removed from their computers will need to pay a small fee of \$5 for removal. In addition, those needing documentation certifying that their hard drive has been destroyed will also be charged a \$5 fee.

Note, too, that anyone in the MonDak region, or even outside it, is welcome to bring their electronic items to the Sidney event during the scheduled hours. You do not need to be a Richland County resident to participate.

What Can I Bring?

For those new to the event, nearly all electronic devices are accepted, Couture said, including computers and their components (printers, scanners, keyboards, etc.), cell phones, cameras, TVs, VCRs, cable TV boxes, fax machines, copiers, stereos, game boys and even specialized electronic equipment used in businesses such as hospitals. law enforcement and manufacturing and even the oil fields.

However, NO consumer white goods, light bulbs, CFLs, mercury thermometers, alkaline batteries, or items containing refrigerants (including dehumidifiers), oils, or acids will be accepted. If you are unsure whether your item qualifies you can check out the handy "What to Bring..." handout posted on the USDA-ARS Northern Plains


Agricultural Research Lab's e-waste website at www.ars. usda.gov/npa/nparl/ewaste or call Jackie Couture at 406-433-9422. In addition, a handy "Items List" recycling form is also available at the website to further speed processing time for participants bringing both large and small amounts.

Local businesses, agencies and organizations with large amounts to e-cycle are asked to make an appointment to drop off their items by calling Jackie Couture at 406-433-9422. Please leave a message.

Where possible larger recyclers are also encouraged to palletize their own items, or send extra staff to help get it done. Details on acceptable items and how to palletize them can be found in the "What to Bring..." handout posted to the USDA-ARS Northern Plains Agricultural Research Lab's e-waste website noted above.

The "E-rase your E-waste" effort in Sidney is coordinated by members of the Richland County Local Emergency Planning Committee (LEPC), Richland Opportunities Inc., and volunteers with other community organizations including the RSVP program. The Montana Department of Environmental Quality has also committed funds for advertising the 2014 event and the Richland County Public Works Department makes their facilities available for the collection event in Sidney.

Deadline for Growth Through Agriculture **Grants & Loans** Approaching **Submit Proposal**

by Monday, September 15, 2014

The Agriculture Development Council is requesting grant and loan applications for the Growth Through Agriculture (GTA) program to help strengthen and diversify Montana's agricultural industry through new agricultural products and processes. Over \$330,000 was awarded last application cycle.

"The grants and loans the Agriculture Development Council approve through the

GTA program have helped dozens of businesses get the capital they need to grow and create jobs while adding value to our agriculture sector," said Governor Steve Bullock. "With a new round of applications, comes opportunity to start, grow, and expand the agricultural businesses in our state."

The goal of the Governor's Main Street Montana Project is to create a dynamic private-public partnership and build and implement a business plan for Montana by Montanans. One objective is to promote Montana agricultural products by adding value to what we grow and produce.

"This program has aided in the success of many agriculture businesses. The Council is targeting proposals that focus on irrigation projects that serve multiple users, malting production, and/or businesses transitioning beyond direct sales. Businesses that meet these criteria will be eligible for zero interest rate loans in addition to grants," explained Director Ron de Yong. "Businesses should get their applications in as soon as possible."

Eligible projects can be awarded up to \$50,000 in grant funding or receive up to a \$100,000 low interest loan.

Some projects that were funded during the 2014 fiscal year include a grant of \$24,500 to Powder River Meat Company in Terry, Mont. to purchase meat processing equipment and assist with construction costs. Root Cellar Foods out of Bozeman purchased a commercial food washer with a grant of \$38,550. And, finally, Tom Britz with Britz Ranch received \$42,000 to purchase and install a commercial hops harvester on his hops farm near Kalispell.

To submit an application and view a list of eligible activities, businesses should visit the Growth Through Agriculture website and follow the application instructions or call (406) 444-0511. The Council strongly encourages applicants to contact their local economic development organization for assistance with their application or, as needed, with business and marketing plans. The next application deadline will be January 30, 2015.



More Than a Quarter-Million Youth Who had Never Smoked a Cigarette Used E-cigarettes in 2013

Study finds youth who have used e-cigarettes are almost twice as likely to intend to smoke conventional cigarettes

More than a quarter of a million youth who had never smoked a cigarette used electronic cigarettes in 2013, according to a CDC study published in the journal Nicotine and Tobacco Research. This number reflects a three-fold increase, from about 79,000 in 2011, to more than 263,000 in 2013.

The data, which comes from the 2011, 2012, and 2013 National Youth Tobacco surveys of middle and high school students, show that youth who had never smoked conventional cigarettes but who used e-cigarettes were almost twice as likely to intend to smoke conventional cigarettes as those who had never used e-cigarettes.

Among non-smoking youth who had ever used e-cigarettes, 43.9 percent said they intended to smoke conventional cigarettes within the next year, compared with 21.5 percent of those who had never used e-cigarettes.

"We are very concerned about nicotine use among our youth, regardless of whether it comes from conventional cigarettes, e-cigarettes or other tobacco products. Not only is nicotine highly addictive, it can harm adolescent brain development." said Tim McAfee, M.D., M.P.H., Director of CDC's Office on Smoking and Health.


There is evidence that nicotine's adverse effects on adolescent brain development could result in lasting deficits in cognitive function. Nicotine is highly addictive. About three out of every four teen smokers become adult smokers, even if they intend to quit in a few years.

"The increasing number of young people who use e-cigarettes should be a concern for parents and the public health community, especially since youth e-cigarette users were nearly twice as likely to have intentions to smoke conventional cigarettes compared with youth who had never tried e-cigarettes." said Rebecca Bunnell, Sc.D., M.Ed., Associate Director for Science in CDC's Office on Smoking and Health and the lead author of the study.

The analysis also looked at the association between tobacco advertisements and smoking intentions among middle and high school students. Students were asked about whether they had seen tobacco ads on the internet, in magazines and newspapers, in retail stores, and in television programs and movies. Consistent with previous studies, this study found that youth who reported exposure to tobacco ads had higher rates of intention to smoke than those who weren't exposed to such ads.

uch ads. The researchers also found the greater the number of advertising sources to which young people were exposed, the greater their rate of intention to smoke cigarettes. Thirteen percent of students who said they had no exposures to such ads had intentions to smoke, compared to 20.4 percent among those who reported exposures from one to two ad sources and 25.6 percent among those who reported exposures from three to four of the sources. More than 50 years since

the landmark Surgeon General's Report linking cigarette smoking to lung cancer, smoking remains the leading cause of preventable death and disease in the United States. Smoking kills nearly half a million Americans every year. More than 16 million Americans live with a smoking-related disease. Smoking-related diseases cost Americans \$132 billion a year in direct health care expenses, much of which comes in taxpayer-supported payments. Each day, more than 3,200 American youth smoke their first cigarette. The Surgeon General has concluded that unless the smoking rate is rapidly reduced, 5.6 million American children alive today - about one in every 13—will die prematurely from a smoking-related disease.

Never Leave a child alone in a car, Not Even for a Minute!

The Montana Children's Trust Fund is promoting the 'Not Even for a Minute' campaign that reminds parents and caregivers to never leave children unattended in or around vehicles.

Left alone in a vehicle for even a short time, a child is in danger of heatstroke, dehydration, overheating, hyperthermia, injury, abduction and even death.

Department of Public Health and Human Services (DPH-HS) officials said no child should ever be put in that situation. "There have been deaths and several close calls over the years in Montana, so it's something we all need to be vigilant about,"

said Montana Children's Trust Fund Director Jamey Petersen. Nationally, 44 children died in 2013 from being left in a hot car and 23 have been reported so far this year.

Temperatures in cars soar quickly, said Melissa Lavinder of the DPHHS Children's Trust Fund. "Even with a window cracked, the temperature inside a car can reach very dangerous temperatures within minutes," she said. "When left in a hot vehicle, a young child's body temperature may increase three to five times as quickly as an adult. In these extreme conditions, children can die or suffer a permanent disability in a matter of minutes."

Believe it or not, routines and distractions have caused people to mistakenly leave children behind in cars. Below are further prevention tips.

Make your child as visible as possible.

Place your purse, briefcase, or whatever is to be carried from the car in the back seat with your child to serve as an additional reason to check that area.

Set a reminder on your cell phone or computer to be sure you dropped your child off at day care.

Ask your childcare provider to call you if your child hasn't arrived as scheduled.

Remember to use drive-through convenience provided by banks, restaurants, and other businesses.

Pay at the pump at gas stations. Prevent trunk entrapment and other accidents. Teach your children the dangers of a car and let them know

that it is not a toy or playground. Always lock your car, even at home, and remind your friends and neighbors to do the same. Unlocked cars pose a risk to

children who are naturally curious. Always put your keys in a safe and secure place out of children's reach. Check pools, vehicles, and car trunks immediately when a child is missing.

If you see an unattended child in a car, dial 911 immediately and follow the instructions that emergency personnel provide. Is Re-Fracking The Next Step In The Oil Boom?

First of all, what is re-fracking? We know that fracking is a method in which water-based fluid under extremely high pressure is pumped down a well to fracture the reservoir rock next to the well bore, creating pathways for natural gas to flow to the wellhead. Through new technology we've learned some wells are re-completed and fracked to enable production from a second layer or to open fractures that may have closed over time. A well may be re-fracked every one to two years of operation to stimulate production.

Re-fracking is currently sweeping the country in many shale basins due to the quick declines in oil and gas output. Several oil companies, including Canada's Encana Corp., Exco Resources Inc. and Marathon Oil Corp. are using new re-fracking techniques at older fracking wells to bring new life back into them.

Using diverting agents (minuscule plastic balls), pumped at high speeds with water into the 3 to 5 year old wells, Encana blocked some of the older fractures, or cracks. "The thought is that the diverting agent will go to the cracks with the least amount of pressure, bypassing cracks with higher pressure and boosting the pressure of the entire well so output climbs," said David Martinez, Encana's senior manager for Haynesville development as cited in an article on reuters.com.

Marathon Oil Corp. is using the latest technology of re-fracking on some of their older wells in the Bakken to increase output. Lance Robertson, Marathon Oil's vice president of North American production operations, said during an interview that when horizontal drilling was beginning to take off in the Bakken in 2007 and 2008 "(well) completion technology was quite different than it is today." Robertson went on to say that some earlier Bakken wells were readied for production by using a single frack stage, or a single section that creates multiple fissures in rock, and about half a million pounds of sand. Now companies use an average of 30 to 35 stages and as much as 6 million pounds of sand per well. So far, Marathon Oil's re-fracked wells have exceeded their expectations. Executives of Marathon Oil claim that approximately

100 of their Bakken wells are good candidates for re-frac-

Fracking has been the center of debate since its beginning. According to Ceres, a nonprofit group that tracks environmental records of publicly traded companies, the water demand for hydraulic fracturing is forecasted to double by 2015. Andrew Logan, director of the oil and gas program at Ceres states, "This has the potential to severely stress water supplies beyond even currently strained levels."

"Given projected sharp increases" in the production of oil and gas by fracking, a report from the group Ceres said, "and the intense nature of local water demands, competition and conflicts over water should be a growing concern for companies, policy makers and investors."

Zachary Cikanek, a spokesman for the American Petroleum Institute in Washington states, "Hydraulic fracturing is a safe, proven technology that has been used for over 60 years to increase production of oil and natural gas - changing America's energy trajectory from scarcity to abundance."


