NDRA Championship Finals Rodeo In Watford City Sept. 23 & 24

The NDRA Championship Finals Rodeo will take place at the McKenzie County fairgrounds located in Watford City on Friday, Sept. 23 and Saturday, Sept. 24. The rodeo will start at 7 p.m. CT on Friday and 6 p.m. CT on Saturday. The event will have concessions and beer gardens, lots of vendors, and Junior Wild Pony Race (with buckle & prize money awarded to the champion).

The Finals Rodeo will feature the top contestants in each standard event and pit them against the top stock in the state. Events that will be at the finals rodeo is bareback and saddle bronc riding, lady's breakaway and barrels, men's breakaway and bull riding, team roping, steer wrestling, and tie-down roping.

The NDRA is one of North Dakota's largest rodeo entities; it was formed in

1953 and is made up of over 500 members that compete in rodeos across the state of North Dakota and puts on 15-25 rodeos a year. The NDRA rodeos bring in cowboys and cowgirls from Montana, North Dakota, South Dakota, Wyoming, Nebraska, and Minnesota.

The NDRA averages about 200 contestants per rodeo.

Everyone is welcome to come out and watch rodeo finalists compete for the 2022 NDRA Championship state titles!

Drive-Thru Flu Clinic Scheduled Sept. 29

The Richland County Health Department's annual Mass Flu Shot Clinic continues as a drive-thru format, scheduled for Thursday, Sept. 29, from 10 a.m.-6 p.m. at the Richland County Fire Hall in Sidney.

The Drive-Thru Clinic will serve adults only, and offers both regular and high-dose flu shots. No other shots will be given during the clinic. No appointment is needed. Flu shots cannot be given to those who have animals in their vehicles. Children may be in the vehicle, but may not receive flu shots. Follow traffic signs to enter the Fire Hall from the North side.

There are no COVID-19 vaccines available at the clinic,

and the flu shot does not contain COVID-19 vaccine.

The Health Department carries quadrivalent, pre-filled syringes that contain no preservative. The price of flu vaccine will vary from \$40 to \$80, depending on the individual's age and the type of vaccine used. Medicaid, Medicare and private insurance may be billed for those who bring their cards. For self-pay clients, only cash or check can be accepted.

Flu clinic paperwork may be printed from www.richland.org/rchd, on the Richland County Health Department Facebook page, or obtained the day of the drive-thru clinic.

DO NOT attend the clinic if you are not feeling well. DO NOT attend if you are waiting for test results from a COVID-19 test. DO NOT attend if you have an active COVID-19 infection or have been exposed to COVID-19 in the last 14 days.

Flu shots, as well as other vaccines, for children and families will be available during regular clinic hours, on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, 10 a.m.-4:30 p.m. by appointment. Additional clinic hours are the second Wednesday until 6 p.m., and the third Thursday of the month, from 1-4 p.m. by appointment.

Gunshots Fired At Inn At Hunters Run Hotel, Watford City, Sept. 17

On Sept. 17 at approximately 11 p.m., the Watford City Police Department responded to multiple 911 calls of gunfire at the Inn at Hunters Run Hotel, 3617 6th Ave. NE, Watford City.

Officers arrived on scene and located a single individual with two gunshot wounds to the leg. At the time law enforcement arrived on the scene, the suspect had fled the area.

The Watford City Police Department, MCSO, NDHP, searched the area for the suspect. Canines were utilized to search for the suspect along with aerial surveillance operations.

During the investigation, it was determined that Andre Deshawn Morris, 30 year-old -male, Enid, OK was asked to leave a social gathering in the parking lot of the hotel after trying to steal some alcohol.

Morris left the party and returned a short time later with a handgun. Morris then allegedly shot six rounds from a handgun towards the group of individuals at the party. Morris had struck the victim twice with the rounds discharged from the pistol. The victim was transported by McKenzie County Ambulance for medical treatment.

After following up on numerous leads from the community, Morris was located on Sept. 19 at 3 a.m. at an apartment complex not far from the crime scene. Morris was taken into custody without incident. Officers were able to locate the handgun used in the shooting earlier in the evening based on a tip from a local citizen.







Since 2004, the Richland County unit of the Boys & Girls Club of the MonDak has been a safe and fun place for kids in Richland County to spend their time after school and on Fridays. Through the gifts of time and money from those in the community they have been able to have several changes to make the program better for the kids. Now, another gift will be changing their program for the better.

The Sidney Kiwanis Club was organized in 1924 and is a local club of Kiwanis International. They do community service and try to make a global impact. They also often sponsor local youth organizations like the Boys & Girls Clubs. Every year the members of the Sidney Kiwanis Foundation vote on something special to do for the community. On January 2022 it was decided they needed to get playground equipment for the kids to be

put on the Boys & Girls Club grounds. In May, the kids attending the Boys & Girls Club after-school program were able to contribute to picking which playset to get. The staff picked out six different playset models from those six the kids voted on one. The Cabana Bay playset is a 34' x 46', 75' tall set with two slides, a climbing wall, monkey bars, a tunnel, bongo drums, and much more. It is for kids five to seven years old and will be all blue, including blue rubber mulch. There will be a fence around it but the fence is to remain open year-round so that kids throughout the community can also use it, not just Boys & Girls Club members.

Previously, when kids attending the after-school program were to play on playground equipment they had to be escorted across the street to the Central Elementary School playground. It required a lot of staff co-

operation, communication, and participation. While after-school club members will be supervised on the equipment during Boys & Girls Club hours, it is more convenient for the staff, closer to the bathrooms, and safer for the kids than going to the school's playground. They took out some trees on the Boys & Girls Club lawn to make room for the playground equipment on September 9, the equipment was delivered to the club on Sept. 12, and some generous volunteers broke ground for the playset on Sept. 16. On Sept. 24 Glen Wheeler, Kiwanis International, will proudly be joining local volunteers to help put together the playset. The playset will be located on the lawn just south of the Boys & Girls Club of the MonDak, Richland County unit.

Does Back To School Mean Back To Vaping?

It's hard to believe the kids are back in school and fall is just around the corner. Parents, grandparents, and many other friends and family will be busy attending the students varies activities such as sports, concerts and other exciting school events. The start of each school year is an exciting fresh start new start to reunite with old friends and a time to make new ones.

Guess who else pays a lot of attention to our youth? Big Tobacco. They spend approximately \$9.2 billion dollars a year at what is called "Point of Sale Marketing". This is where they market their products where they are sold. They are mostly sold at convenience stores. The next time you are in a convenience store, pay extra close attention to the packaging tobacco products displayed behind the counter and the candy displayed in the front of the counter. You will notice a lot of similarities and flavors. As far as any form of vape is concerned, the FDA is not regulating how or where they are sold, so they show up on line, in social media, TV ads and anywhere else they can find to pitch their product. Thirteen-hundred people die every day in the U.S. due to a tobacco related illness and our youth are targets as their tobacco user replacements.


As the youth vaping epidemic continues with the Richland County Youth Risk Behavior Survey showing that 55% of high school students and 26% of middle school students are currently vaping, a new type of nicotine flavored product is gaining popularity and raising health concerns. Oral nicotine pouches are a new category in tobacco product that includes brands such as Zyn, On! and Velo. The use of flavoring in tobacco products has been more than proven to appeal to youth and sales data show that nicotine pouches are increasing in popularity. According to a Nielsen data report, Zyn nicotine pouch dollar sales in convenience stores increased 470% in the first half of 2020.

The dangers of using any form of nicotine or tobacco product have been known for many years but it is especially dangerous to the youth because of the damage it can do to the development of their brain. The frontal lobe of the human brain is not fully developed until the age of around 25-26 years of age. Nicotine is not only additive, it damages the brain and shortens the life of the user. Our youth deserve better than to be the target of Big Tobacco's get rich tobacco marketing, building appeal with candy flavored products.

Talk to your kids about the dangers of tobacco use, the way Big Tobacco uses them to make money, and that you love them and want them to have a long, healthy life.





It is a collaborative effort between the Community Development Division and the Montana Office of Tourism at the Montana Department of Commerce. The program provides services and assistance to communities wanting to enhance economic vitality

while maintaining local historic integrity. The program offers technical assistance and expertise to member communities and awards competitive grant funding to communities actively working on downtown revitalization, economic development and historic preservation. They also help facilitate project tracking to gauge project success which can be compared against other projects in communities throughout the state. A few of the towns participating in the program with projects completed or in the works include Roundup, Great Falls, Lewistown, Kalispell, Glasgow, Glendive, Baker and Ekalaka. Fort Peck Fall Release Reductions Delayed

By Missouri River Water **Management Division**

Planned release reductions from Fort Peck Dam will be delayed until the end of September, due to the ongoing drought and recent extremely dry weather in eastern Montana.

Farmers in the area will be able to continue irrigating crops until harvest begins later in September.

"We have assessed the potential impacts of this action and determined that this would have minimal impacts in the upper basin, and no impacts on the Missouri River Mainstem Reservoir System's overall ability to meet its authorized purposes given the change

will not impact total system storage, said John Remus. Missouri River Basin Water Management Division Chief.

"The primary impacts to be expected include slightly less power generation capacity through the upcoming winter and a slightly lower Fort Peck Lake pool at the beginning of the 2023 runoff season."

Maintaining the higher releases from Fort Peck Dam through the end of the month will not impact System releases from Gavins Point dam through the remainder of 2022, and will not impact the forecast operations in 2023.

The USACE understands the important role of the Missouri River in providing water for irrigation, municipal, and industrial uses throughout the basin. Operating the System to meet all the water supply needs of the basin to the extent reasonably possible is the USACE goal. However, the USACE does not provide and cannot guarantee access to the water. Maintaining access to the water is the individual facility owner/





Sidney-Richland County Library Holds Meeting to Discuss Funding Needs

The Sidney-Richland County Library held an event dubbed "Montana Libraries: Unprecedented Times, Unprecedented Opportunities" on Sept 12 in the library basement. Representatives from the Montana Library Association and the Montana Trust for Libraries met with Richland County leaders and library board members to discuss the importance of renewing and expanding state aid for Montana libraries. State aid helps to fund downloadable ebooks and audiobooks; online access to Montana historical and cultural materials; and the statewide catalog used by 249 libraries to access 3.5 million shareable titles to be exchanged among participating library locations.

Montana Library Association and the Montana Trust for Libraries will be asking the 2023 Montana legislature for \$5.4 million. This would increase direct state aid to public and tribal libraries from \$.40 to \$.50 per capita (\$542,113). Approximately \$1,090,00 would go to improving cooperative statewide library services to bring more convenient and cost effective library services to citizens across the state. Roughly \$480,000 would be set aside to continue bringing the internet to under-connected Montanans through the Montana State Library Hotspot Program. The majority of the funds (\$3,280,000) will be used to expand the scope and depth of online eBooks. audiobooks and databases.

All of these services are currently in use in the Sidney-Richland County Library. For instance, the hotspot program has served many residents, especially since the pandemic hit. There are currently nine hot spots in Sidney and at least 25 are needed. The hotspots are used by students, cancer

patients and business travelers in need of a reliable internet connection. "It wasn't unusual for me to come by the library in the middle of the winter and there would be a family in a car with someone doing homework,' said Sidney-Richland County Library Director Kelly Reisig. "That's not how we

want our kids to have to do their homework but that is how they were doing it." The library keeps its wifi open for the public to use. The hotspots enable patrons to access the internet in a more convenient location.

Another service that could be expanded in our area would be the cooperative statewide library services, the Montana Shared Catalog and statewide courier. Having consistent funding for this service would greatly expand the ability for the Sidney-Richland County Library to gain access to a wider range of books for library users and reduce the delivery time it would take

to receive the books from other libraries. "We have a courier that works pretty well for some of the libraries that are linked close together in the west. But not so much here or on the high line," stated Bruce Newell, Montana Trust for Libraries. "We don't have enough money to pay for a service to do that. It hasn't worked for a long time." Currently the Richland County library spends \$5 per book to return them from the borrowing library. Under the courier service it is \$5 per crate of books.

Application Deadline
For Noninsured Crop
Disaster Assistance
Program (NAP)

Includes perennial forage, grazing and other crops for 2023 coverage

Bozeman, MT, Sept. 15 - USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) in Montana reminds producers of approaching application deadlines for purchasing risk coverage for some crops through the Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP).

NAP covers losses from natural disasters on crops for which no permanent federal crop insurance program is available, including forage and grazing crops, fruits, vegetables, floriculture, ornamental nursery, aquaculture, turf grass, and more. Coverage varies by county and by crop, so interested producers contact their county FSA office for more information.

Upcoming application deadlines for NAP coverage for the 2023 production season in Montana include:

- Sept. 30: Annual Fall-Seeded Crops, Perennial Forage and Grazing, Mixed Forage Crops (including spring seeded annual types of mixed forage), Rye, Speltz, Triticale, Wheat and Garlic
 - Dec. 31: Honey
- March 15, 2023: all Spring Crops except Spring-Seeded Canola, Rye, Speltz, Triticale, Wheat and Mixed Forage

"Natural disasters that are considered eligible causes of loss for NAP include floods, drought, freeze, hail, and excessive moisture, among others," said State Executive Director Maureen Wicks. "Given the variability of weather in Montana, we want to remind producers of the availability of NAP as a potential risk management tool in 2023."

All producers who receive Emergency Relief Program (ERP) phase one payments are statutorily required to purchase crop insurance, or NAP coverage where crop insurance is not available, for the next two available crop years, as determined by the Secretary.


Coverage requirements will be determined from the date a producer receives an ERP payment and may vary depending on the timing and availability of crop insurance or NAP for a producer's particular crops. The final crop year to purchase crop insurance or NAP coverage to meet the second year of coverage for this requirement is the 2026 crop year.

NAP basic coverage is available at 55% of the average market price for crop losses that exceed 50% of expected production. Buy-up coverage is available in some cases. NAP can protect against losses associated with lower yields, destroyed crops or prevented planting. The 2018 Farm Bill allows for buy-up levels of NAP coverage from 50-65% of expected production in 5% increments, at 100% of the average market price. Buy-up coverage is not available for crops intended for grazing.

For all coverage levels, the NAP service fee is the lesser of \$325 per crop or \$825 per producer per county, not to exceed a total of \$1,950 for a producer with farming interests in multiple counties. Premiums apply for buy-up coverage.

Producers qualifying as beginning, underserved, or limited resource farmers or those who can meet eligibility requirements as a military veteran are eligible for the basic level of NAP coverage at no cost and have the potential for reduction in the cost of buy-up premiums.



I can't think of a better person to serve as a representative from Montana as an NFU Next Generation board member," Bangs said.

Degn will provide valuable perspective to the national board, MFU President Walter Schweitzer said.

"Half of our farmers are

women. All farm organizations will benefit with more women involved in leadership," Schweitzer said. "Sarah brings her experience as young beginning farmer to the board as well as young woman. I am looking forward to continuing to work with Sarah on issues that are important to agriculture and rural America.

Already, Degn is jumping into the advisory role and will attend NFU's board meeting ahead of NFU's Fly-in event in Washington, D.C., this coming week.

Involvement at the national level is nothing new to Degn, who served on and chaired NFU's policy committee. She also participated in the Beginning Farmer Institute and has lobbied at the state level in support of issues such as Right to Repair and increases transparency in the cattle market.

In her new role, Degn said, she will continue to learn from others while voicing what Montana producers are experiencing, including access to land, capital and an informational support system.

Learning from others is another exciting opportunity the advisory position provides.

"I always laugh because I think of the old farmers sitting around during coffee hour and this is just a broader version of sharing vour ideas; what's working, what's not working and getting to hear from other states about policy and programs that they're trying and just all the different ideas going

Myths... **Busted!** Submitted by **Environmental Health**

There are so many myths about the flu and the flu shot all over the internet, so in preparation for the Drive Thru Mass Flu Shot Clinic at the Richland County Fire Hall on Thursday, Sept. 29, we've busted a few myths wide open.

Many people claim they avoid the flu shot because it makes them sick. However, flu shot vaccine does not contain any live virus, so it actually can't make you sick with the flu. The vaccine contains inactivated virus. which means that once it's in your body, your immune system can learn to respond to components of the virus, so that if you do come across the real flu virus, your body will be prepared. Because vaccines are designed to evoke an immune response, it is common to have injection site soreness or a slight fever, but these symptoms shouldn't last long. The Vaccine Information Sheet, offered during your vaccination clinic visit, explains potential risks and reactions.

Some others say they don't bother with the flu shot because it's not effective. Though the vaccine isn't 100% effective in avoiding the flu, it will help to avoid hospitalization should you contract influenza. Of the 68 cases of the flu last season in Richland County, 7 people were hospitalized for influenza. Getting the annual flu shot can help you minimize the risk of hospitalization and death.

If you're considering skipping the flu shot this year because you exercise and eat healthy, reconsider your decision. The flu virus doesn't discriminate, and even healthy people can become infected. The flu virus can be spread when a sick person sneezes, coughs or talks, or spread by surfaces shared by both sick and healthy people, like doorknobs in public, bathroom faucet handles, and shopping carts. You may lose income due to days off from work, or may face more serious consequences of the flu, such as hospitalization

or death. There are many reasons to get your flu shot this flu season. If you have questions or need help with the decision to get you and your family vaccinated again the flu, contact the Health De-

partment at 406-433-2207. The Richland County Health Department will be holding its annual drive-thru mass flu shot clinic at the Richland County Fire Hall in Sidney on Thursday, Sept. 29, from 10 a.m.-6 p.m. The Drive-Thru Clinic will serve adults only, and offers both regular and high-dose flu shots. No other shots will be given during the clinic. No COVID-19 vaccine will be given. No appointment is needed. Flu shots cannot be given to those who have animals in their vehicles. Children may be in the vehicle, but may not receive flu shots. Private insurance, Medicare and Medicaid will be billed for those who bring their insurance cards. Follow traffic signs to enter the Fire Hall from the north side.

Flu shots are available for those 6 months and older at the Richland County Health Department during normal clinic hours by appointment, from 10 a.m.-4:30 p.m. Monday-Wednesday. Additional clinic hours are the second Wednesday until 6 p.m., and the third Thursday of the month, from 1-4 p.m. by appointment. Check the Department Facebook page at www.facebook.com/ RichlandCountyHealthDepartment for changes to regular clinic hours.






