Old Timer buttons can be purchased at these area businesses in Fairview, Neu's Supervalu, Merchants





Each Kids Craft activity is free, open to the public, and accessible to all age levels. Activities will take approximately one hour to complete. Consistent with CDC recommendations, people who are not fully vaccinated must continue to wear masks indoors and in crowded outdoor spaces. 2021 Schedule:

Leather Arrowheads -July 10, 11 a.m.-2 p.m. CT: Learn how to create designs on leather. The arrowhead is an important symbol of the National Park Service. The elements of the emblem symbolize the major facets of the national park system. The Sequoia tree and bison represent vegetation and wildlife, the mountains and water represent scenic and recreational values, and the arrowhead represents historical and cultural values. Visit Fort Union and design your personal arrowhead with symbols that are important safe clay. to you.

Coopering (Barrel Making) - July 17, 11 a.m.-2 p.m. CT: Coopering, or barrel making, was one of many professions needed at Fort Union for its daily operations. Indian Arts Showcase Aug. 7: There will not be an individual craft today because it is our Indian Arts Showcase. Please come out to enjoy the traditional Indian arts and crafts Aug. 7-8.

Flint & Steel and Candlemaking - Aug. 14, 11 a.m.-2 p.m. CT: For our last craft of the season, we invite you to see flint & steel and candle-making demonstrations. The use of flint and steel was an important skill at Fort Union, as this was how employees started their fires for cooking and warmth. In fact, at one point, there was so few fire steels available at Fort Union that they were considered a precious item. We know that candles were being made on site due to several entrees in invoices of goods being delivered to Fort Union, which included candle molds. These candles would provide light in the dim rooms as evening wore on. During this process, you can try your hand at making sparks with the flint and steel and make-and-take your very own hand-dipped candle.





## Center Of North America Controversy Highlighted By Local Historian

Clay Jenkinson to Hold Book Signing During Williston's Crazy Days at Books on Broadway

Bismarck - North Dakota humanities scholar Clay Jenkinson was featured on CBS Sunday Morning on May 30 in a feature on the search for the geographic center of North America.

CBS producer Stephen Dustin asked Jenkinson to appear for an interview after learning of Jenkinson's forthcoming book on North Dakota, 'The Language of Cottonwoods: Essays on the Future of North Dakota'.

Jenkinson provided wry commentary on the controversy over the geographic center of North Dakota that now includes three claim-

ants: Rugby, which has held that title since the 1930s, Hanson's Bar in Robinson, which established its own claim in 2016, and Center in Oliver County, which appears to be the best scientifically-determined sit.

"I'm a Rugbyite," Jenkinson says, "but once I began to study the issue I realized that attempting to make a determination of the geographic center raises more problems than it solves." Jenkinson explains that you have to begin with a definition of North America (opinions vary), then figure out a way to overcome the

curvature of the earth, and also account for the offshore islands, peninsulae, and Arctic ice sheets. "Not to mention lands emerging because of global climate change and the movement of the world's continents thanks to plate tectonics."

In the CBS segment, Jenkinson made fun of the whole controversy. "It's essentially the same as deciding what midwestern town has the world's largest ball of twine," he says.

Jenkinson's book, to be released at the end of June, has a chapter on the controversy, "The Heart of Everything That Is". "I spent a couple of months doing research on the controversy and discovered that even Rugby is not the right spot for what used to be regarded as the Center of North America. The actual former location was near Balta, more than a dozen miles from Rugby. The cairn was put in Rugby merely because it was the largest community nearby!"

'The Language of Cottonwoods' features chapters on the Little Missouri River, the Bakken Oil Boom, the 150 ICBM nuclear-tipped missiles in northwestern North Dakota, the roadside effigies that dot the landscape (like Salem Sue and the World's Largest Sandhill Crane), spirit of place on the Great Plains, the search for the sacred, and relations between the white and Native American communities in North Dakota.

Koehler Press, Norfolk, VA, is publishing 'The

Language of Cottonwoods'. It is the culmination of Jenkinson's lifelong fascination with North Dakota. "I wanted to try to get to the heart of the North Dakota identity at a time when we don't any longer really know who we are," Jenkinson says. The book is a love song to North Dakota, an analysis of the state of the state in 2021, and a series of musings on possible futures for the last visited and least visited state.

Jenkinson plans a series of book events around North Dakota through the










## Bitcoin Fracking Turns Waste Gas To Digital Gold In Bakken Oil Fiel

Natural Gas Produced As A Byproduct In Bakken Oil Production Is Often Flared As Waste. Near Sidney, MT, One Company Is Converting It To Cryptocurrency Instead.

SIDNEY - On a sunbaked oil pad not too far from the North Dakota border, the iconic infrastructure of the Bakken oil field towers over pink gravel, pumpjacks pulling energy-packed hydrocarbons from thousands of feet deep beneath the eastern Montana prairie.

A flare stack and multi-story storage containers stand along the pad's perimeter, along with a sign announcing the site's owner, Houston-based Kraken Oil & Gas. On the far side of the pad, though, a line of metal buildings set up by a Colorado startup represents a decidedly nontraditional arrangement for the oil industry. Humming generators wire electricity to a handful of squat boxes that look like a cross between shipping containers and hot dog stands. From beneath awnings, whirring fans blast streams of scorching hot air out their sides.

Inside, behind a tangle of power cords and networking cables, a full wall of each container is packed with high-tech computing equipment, powerful servers chugging away to put natural gas produced as a byproduct of the pad's oil production to use on an entirely different type of extraction: mining digital cryptocurrency.

"Instead of burning it, we try to bring something to the site so we can use it and create something beneficial," said Sidney native Bruce Larsen, Kraken's president.

Kraken has dug in here for the oil released by hydraulic fracturing, or fracking, the technology that, along with horizontal drilling, spurred the Bakken oil boom in North Dakota and this stretch of eastern Montana in the late 2000s and early 2010s. Even as the boom has cooled from its peak over the last decade, production has continued on pads like this one, where the liquid oil pulled from the earth is piped away, headed toward refineries that convert it to gasoline or plastic. On sites without a pipeline connection, producers truck liquid oil away in tanks in-



## **Smart Planning: Watford City Desires Community Input on 2040 Infrastructure Master Plan**

The City of Watford City is in the midst of developing a long-term infrastructure Master Plan. Public input is desired at this point of the planning process to ensure the plan is aligned with the appropriate priorities.

Over the last decade, communities across western North Dakota have experienced rapid population growth, primarily due to increased oil and gas activity during the recent surge in the oil and gas industry. Watford City was one of the fastest growing communities

in the state, growing from 1,800 people in 2010 to an estimated 7,000+ people today. Population growth presents many benefits and opportunities, including local economy stimulation and increased amenities in the community, but also comes with potential challenges such as strained municipal services and finances.

The City of Watford City relies heavily on gross production tax (GPT) revenues, sales tax revenues, property tax revenues, and utility (water, sewer, garbage) fees to fund new infrastructure, infrastructure renewal and replacement,

and infrastructure operations and maintenance. With the recent slowdown in western North Dakota and the world, the City wanted to better position themselves for the future and align funding sources with existing and proposed infrastructure to ensure a resilient infrastructure plan is in place.

The City made the decision to embark on a Master Planning journey last year to develop the Watford City 2040 Infrastructure Master Plan. The Master Plan will help the City plan and strategically implement operations, maintenance, and infrastructure improvements over the next 20 years.

The City has scheduled a Community Engagement Open-House on Tuesday, July 20. Details are as follows:



In the winters, Mike drove truck for many years for Transystems and Helena Chemical until retiring due to health issues. Mike married Christine "Chris" Schieffer Mocko on Feb. 14, 1998. After their marriage they lived in Sidney, MT.

Michael was not perfect, but he was a kind and honest person. He always said that he didn't have the memory to remember lies, so the truth was easier, to a fault sometimes. Michael didn't like to travel very much but when he did, it was to a hot springs, which he loved. His favorite was Bozeman Hot Springs. He also liked Yellowstone National Park.

Michael had two collections that he was passionate about. His first was his pen collection. You had to be careful if you had a pen with advertising on it. He would try to get if from you. Not steal it! Talk you out of it. Michael would not let you use it until the ink was gone because you might wear off the lettering. His second passion was coins. Although he did not know anything about collecting coins, he would see coins that he thought were pretty, unique, or special in some way and he would get them. He would sit for hours with his magnifying glass and look at them. Even when he was basically confined to his bed, he would ask to have his coins brought to him and he would enjoy looking at them. Eventually it got to the point that even with his magnifier; he had a hard time seeing them, but he would still try.

Michael suffered a stroke in March of 2019, which left him without the use of his right side and most of his ability to talk clearly. After convalescing in Sidney and Minot he came back home and was cared for by his wife and a close family friend, Ashley Jackling.

One of his favorite things to do was to go to Dairy Queen and get a Root Beer Freeze. Even after his stroke, we would go get him a small one and Cindy would always have us tell him that she made it with love. He would get the biggest smile on his face when he heard that.

He enjoyed his visits with Pastor Mike and really appreciated him bringing Holy Communion to him at home since he couldn't get to church. He liked playing his Christian music videos and CDs with him. They had a special relationship and Michael's family will remember that for a long time.

Michael loved his Savior, Jesus Christ. He would listen to the Bible (because he didn't like to read), cry sometimes listening to gospel music and would say that he wanted to go home to be with Jesus, his Savior.

He also, loved his cats: Rowley, Mitsu, Fluffy, Morris, Patches, and Susie. He enjoyed old country music, gospel music and Elvis Preslev.

His last years were very difficult for him and for those that cared for and loved him. He would try to participate in events held at the house like Christmas, Easter and such. He had difficulty sitting up for any length of time, but Chris's kids and grandkids made a point of including him and understanding his inability to speak clearly. His smile, for a hug from the little ones, was beautiful to see.

Michael "Mike" passed away early Saturday morning, June 26, 2021, at his home in Sidney, MT, just like he wanted to, with his wife, stepson Ryan, his special caregiver Ashley in attendance. He passed peacefully. He is no longer in pain, but instead rests in Paradise with his King!

### Keep Bird Feeders Clean Or Put Them Away For Summer

Helena - To prevent the spread of disease, such as salmonella, bird enthusiasts should consider either removing their bird feeders for the summer or cleaning the feeder regularly. Montana Fish, Wildlife & Parks has received several phone calls recently about dead birds around feeders and birds with crusty eyes.

Birds don't need supplementary food in the summer. They typically eat naturally occurring food, such as insects, during this time of year when they are nesting and rearing their young.

If you suspect that you are seeing sick birds, or find dead birds around your feeders, please contact your local FWP office. Bird feeders should be removed in the event illness is observed. The ground under feeders should also be cleaned, as droppings will contain the salmonella bacteria.

Even when there is no sign of disease, feeders should be cleaned and disinfected at least every other week, or even weekly. Prevent overcrowding by spreading feeders out or using feeders that only allow a few birds to visit at one time. Cleaning feeders


• Clean your feeders with warm, soapy water. Disinfect with a 10% bleach solution to kill bacteria. Rinse the feeder and allow it to dry completely before using it again. Disinfect your birdbaths as well.

• Clean your bird feeding area by washing all structures holding your feeders and raking the ground surrounding the feeders.

• If you have observed sick or dead birds, do not reinstall your feeders for a few weeks. As birds begin to migrate and cease traveling in flocks, it will be okay to put feeders back up.

If you find a dead bird, place it in a double plastic bag. Please keep the bird in a cool location (such as a cooler) until you've contacted FWP. FWP may want samples for

testing. Wear gloves and wash hands thoroughly afterwards. If you live in bear country, please consider placing feeders greater than 10 feet high, and more than 4 feet from nearby trees and bring them in at night or keep your feeders down for the active bear season. If bear activity is observed in the general vicinity of the feeder or your home, the feeder should be removed permanently.



carrying invasive mussels, making it the 35th and 36th mussel-fouled boats intercepted this year. This surpasses the total number of 35 mussel-fouled boats intercepted in 2020.

Shortly after noon on Sunday, the Wibaux station found mussels on a used inboard ballast boat that had been recently purchased in Michigan and was destined for Billings. Inspectors decontaminated the hull and locked the boat. AIS staff in Billings will flush the ballast tanks before removing the lock from the boat. The Wibaux station is operated by the Garfield County Conservation District.

Sunday evening the Hardin inspection station detected mussels on an inboard/outboard motorboat last used in the Lake of the Ozarks in Missouri. The recently purchased boat was being commercially transported to Washington State. Inspectors removed the visible mussels, locked the boat to the trailer and notified officials in Washington for further action. The Hardin station is operated by Montana Fish, Wildlife & Parks.

FWP staff reminds anyone transporting motorized or nonmotorized boats into Montana that an inspection is required before launching, and stopping at all open watercraft inspection stations is required. Failing to stop at an inspection station can result in a fine of up to \$500.

Boaters should ensure their watercraft, trailer and all equipment that is in contact with water (anchor, lines, swim ladder, etc.) is clean, drained of water and dry.



### Proposed Intersection Improvements West Of Fairview

Fairview - The Montana Department of Transportation (MDT) would like to announce and invite the public to comment on a proposal to install intersection improvements at the intersection of Highway 201 and County Road 350 about 5 miles west of Fairview.

Proposed work will include installing new signs including stop signs and stop ahead signs. Intersection lighting will also be installed. The purpose of the project is to address a crash trend that has been identified at this intersection.

Construction is tentatively planned for 2022 depending on completion of design and availability of funds. This construction will occur before the Fairview West reconstruction project that extends from just west of this intersection to the Town of Fairview. These improvements will not be affected by the Fairview West construction activities. No new right-of-way or utility relocations will be needed.

An important part of properly planning for future projects is partnering with the community. Helena - Governor Greg Gianforte has issued an executive order declaring a statewide drought emergency in Montana.

"Every region of the state faces severe to extreme drought conditions, and the situation is getting worse. These alarming drought conditions are devastating our ag producers, challenging our tourism industry, and could bring a severe wildfire season," Gianforte said. "This emergency order makes available all necessary state government resources to mitigate the impacts of this drought and protect Montanans."

Executive Order 11-2021 directs the Departments of Agriculture, Livestock, and Natural Resources and Conservation to provide maximum assistance to the U.S. Department of Agriculture on drought-related activities to secure timely economic assistance from the federal government.

It also suspends regulations for motor carriers and persons operating commercial vehicles while they provide direct drought-related support.

According to data in the Summer 2021 Montana Drought Forecast Report, the U.S. Drought Monitor indicates approximately 91% of Montana faces abnormally dry to extreme drought conditions as of June 22.

Drought conditions at this point in 2021 are substantially worse than at the same time last year when approximately 52% of the state confronted similar conditions.

The July forecast projects below-normal precipitation throughout the state and a 40-50% chance of above-normal temperatures across much of Montana.
