

Final "E-rase Your E-waste" Event For 2013 This Weekend

Last chance this year to clear out all those outdated and obsolete electronic items cluttering your closets. This weekend, the Richland County "Erase your E-waste" program is hosting its regular fall weekend collection event on Friday and Saturday, Sept 6 and 7th and once again it's FREE for all area participants!

This event will be held at the Richland County Shop, 2140 W. Holly, across from the fairgrounds in Sidney from 3 pm to 7 pm on Friday and 9 am to 3 pm on Saturday. (Please note, the county shop is available for drop offs during event times ONLY, when e-cycler employees and local volunteers will also be available to help with loading and unloading.)

As a convenience, a list of acceptable items and a collection form that can be filled out ahead of time are also available online for download at the Sidney ARS website at http://www.ars.usda.gov/npa/nparl/ewaste. In general, acceptable items include: computers and their components, printers, cell phones, TVs, fax machines, copiers, VCRs, stereos, gaming units and more. Local businesses, agencies and organizations with large amounts to e-cycle are asked to make an appointment to drop off their items by calling Jackie Couture at 406-433-9422. Please leave a message.

This year the "E-rase your E-waste" committee has added a new e-cycler, Yellowstone E-waste Solutions, out of Billings, MT. Like the previous e-cycler, Yellowstone is providing their services for FREE.

This annual collection effort is coordinated by the Richland County Local Emergency Planning Committee, Richland Opportunities, Inc., the Sidney Agricultural Research Lab, and volunteers with the Retired Seniors Volunteer Program. Additional support is provided by the city of Sidney and Richland County, along with several local businesses, including Sidney Health Center and Sidney Sugars, Couture said. The Montana Department of Environmental Quality has also committed funds for advertising the 2013 event.

Aaron Tippin: Growing up on a 110 acre farm in South Carolina, raising Black Angus, hogs, corn and soy beans, Tippin grew up with a work ethic not often seen today. He was an active 4-H member and raised two champion show hogs. He's always had a love for music. In the late 1970s he began performing in local honky tonks. His big break came in 1985 when he competed on the TNN's "You Can Be A Star" TV talent contest, landed a songwriter's contract and moved to Music City.

In the beginning, times were tough: Tippin worked the midnight shift in a factory, wrote songs for music row during the day and lifted weights in the late afternoons. He began competing and winning body building competitions and in 1990 he performed at his first Nashville night club. These performances landed him a recording contract with RCA records in which he stayed until he signed with Lyric Street Records in 1998. In 2004 Tippin released his own record label, NIPPIT Records (Tippin spelled backwards).

Many people know Tippin for his baritone voice and his performances of "There Ain't Nothin Wrong With The Radio", "You've Got To Stand For Something", "Kiss This", and "Working Man's PH.D".

He has released nine studio albums and two compilations, one of which is "In Overdrive"

Tippin stated, "This album is a tribute to truckers." Tippin currently holds a CDL and has a great deal of respect for all of the men and women running hard every day. "America's truckers are out there, busier than ever and keeping America rolling. I love truckin' music and they do too. Their job is much harder than most people realize," stated Tippin.

"In Overdrive" consists of some of the popular songs most truckers know and love, such as: "East Bound and Down", "Six Days on the Road", 'Prisoner of the Highway", "Roll On" and many others.

Tippins talents are not just limited to music and body building; he's also a farmer, a winemaker, a pilot, a welder and a certified airframe and power plant mechanic. He currently resides on a 500 acre farm in Tennessee with his wife and two sons, where he grows food plots and loves to hunt whitetail deer and turkey.

Master Gardener Program Offered in Watford City

Local individuals interested in an in-depth look at gardening are encouraged to enroll in the Master Gardener Program to be held weekly for eight Friday mornings starting September 27 and ending November 15. Sessions will be offered over the Interactive Video Network System (IVN) from 8:30 AM CT to 12:30 PM CT at the Courthouse in Watford City. Registration deadline to enroll in the course is Friday, Sept 13.

This program is offered by the North Dakota State University Extension Service and classroom training will be provided by professionals in their respective fields. Upon completion of the Master Gardener Program, participants will be well schooled in the basics of plant and soil science, perennial and annual flowers, plant pathology, entomology, and weed control, vegetable and fruit production and more.

Cost to participate in this program is \$150 with the contribution of 48 volunteer hours of sharing of the individual's expertise in the community or \$300 without the volunteer hour contributions.

Pertussis Cases in Richland Co.

Richland County health officials are reporting a positive case of pertussis, also known as whooping cough. This makes a total of three confirmed cases in Richland County in 2013.

Cases of pertussis have been reported in over 28 counties in Montana. Local and state public health officials are concerned that the number of reported cases will continue to increase unless people recognize symptoms & take action to protect themselves and others.

What is whooping cough?

Whooping cough or pertussis is a very serious respiratory (in the lungs and breathing tubes) infection caused by bacteria. It causes violent coughing you can't stop. Whooping cough is most harmful for young babies and can be deadly. The DTaP & Tdap vaccines protect against whooping cough.

What are the symptoms of whooping cough?

Whooping cough starts with the following symptoms: resembles an ordinary cold

Runny or stuffed-up nose

Sneezing

Mild cough

A pause in breathing in infants (apnea)

After 1 to 2 weeks, coughing, which can be severe, starts.

Children and babies can cough very hard, over and over.

When children gash for breath after a coughing fit they

When children gasp for breath after a coughing fit, they make a "whooping" sound. Babies may not make this sound & this is not commonly heard in adults.

Coughing fits make it hard to breathe, eat, drink, or sleep. Coughing fits happen more at night.

Babies and young children may turn blue while coughing from lack of oxygen.

Coughing fits can last for 10 weeks, and sometimes recur with the next respiratory illness.

Pertussis can turn more serious, particularly in unvaccinated infants and persons with other severe diseases. So if you have been coughing for longer than 2 weeks without getting better after using regular cold meds you should speak to your provider for follow up and consider testing.

Most people are not aware that a Tdap booster is recommended for all adults. Children are vaccinated for pertussis if they are up to date with the recommended vaccinations. Please check with the health department or your provider if you have any questions regarding your vaccinations. People who are vaccinated are unlikely to become ill or as ill after an exposure or spread the illness to others.

The staff at Richland County Health Department (RCHD) is working hard to control the spread of the disease. Close environments such as schools and daycares are ideal for easily spreading pertussis and present challenges to health officials. We encourage parents to not send children who are ill to schools and daycares because pertussis spreads quickly in these settings.

Richland County Health Department has notified those who have been identified as close contacts who may have been exposed. Exposure is defined as being an arm's length away or closer for one hour of time together. If you have not been contacted by the Health Department, but are experiencing symptoms or are concerned about exposure, please contact the Health Department at 406-433-2207 or your provider.

Participants may start at any home on the tour. Most of the homes have stairs and are not handicap accessible. Shoes and bare feet are not allowed. Booties will be available at each location.


The main contractors from each home hope to be on site, as well as representatives from Dura Supreme, Life Span



MT Depart. of Justice **Announces Grants to Fund Wishes of Montana's** Seriously III Children

Sale of Special Motorcycle License Plate Makes **Funds Available**

Today, the Montana Department of Justice announced the availability of \$67,730 in Chrome for Kids Wish Fund grants. These funds are made available through a special Chrome for Kids motorcycle license plate that is used to fund efforts by Montana-based nonprofit corporations which grant wishes to chronically or critically ill Montana children.

"Thanks to the generosity of Montana's motorcycle owners, the wish of a chronically or critically ill child can now come true," said Attorney General Tim Fox. "Families who are dealing with a seriously ill child often struggle simultaneously with the financial aspect of their loved one's diagnosis, leaving little for a dream vacation or activity. The Chrome for Kids Wish Fund grants offer a way for Montana's non-profits to help improve the lives of ill children in ways that are meaningful to them and their families."

Grant applications will be accepted by the Motor Vehicle Division at the Montana Department of Justice through October 30, 2013. Grants will be awarded by November 30, 2013. Funds awarded through these grants must be used within two years of the award.

Grant criteria are:

- (1) Only Montana-based nonprofit public or private corporations which have received IRS 501 (c)(3) tax-exempt designation and whose purpose includes assistance to chronically or critically ill Montana children may apply for a Chrome for Kids Wish Fund grant.
- (2) Funds must be used to provide a chronically or critically ill Montana child a special wish. No more than 10% of awarded grant funds can be used for program administration by the applicant.

(3) Children's wishes shall be determined by the parents or legal guardians of minor children in consultation with the child and an attending healthcare provider and may be of the following type: (a) a visit to a special place such as a children's theme park or a city or metropolitan area to experience unique or different food, arts, education, entertainment, and culture; (b) a trip to participate in or observe a special activity such as a rodeo, baseball game, surfing, or other physical/sports activity; (c) financial assistance to provide improvement in the quality of life for the critically or chronically ill child as determined by the attending physician and parents/legal guardian; or (d) a special activity such as a birthday party or celebration of the child's life as determined by parents/legal guardian.

Grant applicants must submit the following materials with each grant application: The legal title of the nonprofit organization and the address of its principal office; a list of the organization's board members and their occupations; a copy of the organization's IRS tax-exempt designation; the name of the proposed grant, the amount of funding requested, the general purpose of the proposed grant, a specific description of how any awarded grant funds would be used; and any evidence of public support for the proposed grant. Successful grant applicants will be required to provide the Montana Department of Justice Motor Vehicle Division with a report, once grant funds are exhausted, that details specifically how the grant funds were used.

Wings of Freedom III This Weekend

The Wings Of Freedom III Air Show will roar into the Sidney Richland Airport, Sidney, MT Saturday and Sunday, September 7 and 8. Showtimes are 1-4 pm each day. Pre sale tickets are on sale now at the Sidney Chamber of Commerce and Sidney financial institutions. Adult tickets are \$15, students \$10, ages 5 and under free. Cost at the gate will be \$20 for adults and \$15 for students.

Headlined by Team Aeroshell, the event promises thrills and chills to last a lifetime. The southern based pilots fly AT Texan planes which were built from 1938 into the 1950s and were used as training planes for US Airmen in WWII. "Team Aeroshell is loud and in-your-face, performing right in front of the crowd. People will be thrilled," said air show committee member Alan Seigfreid.

Making its debut at the Sidney Air Show is the Shockwave Jet Truck. This is a full jet truck which will hit over 300 mph on the runway. "It's his first time in Sidney and we're excited to have him. He puts on a heck of a show," Seigfreid said.

Crowds from the last Wings of Freedom Air Show will enjoy returning crowd pleasers Jim Peitz with his aerobatic Bonanza, John Mohr with his Stearman, Phil Petrik with his T28 and Kent Pietsch with his Jelly Belly Interstate Cadet which he will land on a pickup in front of the crowd. Also returning for a thrilling performance are Gene Soucy flying his Grumman Ag Cat and wing walker Teresa Stokes.

New performers include Jeff Boerboon in his Extra 300 and Skip Stewart flying his Pitts Special. "All these performers are fantastic," Seigfried said. "This will be a great show!"

Saturday morning starts off with a fly-in breakfast hosted by the Sidney Lions Club from 7-11 a.m. The breakfast is open to the public and air show tickets are not necessary to attend. However, those without tickets will be asked to leave before the air show starts.

The Air Show committee is delighted to have the "Sky Talker" Danny Clisham as the announcer for the show. "He makes the show go," Seigfreid stated. Clisham announces air shows all over the U.S. and knows all the performers. "He's at the top of his game," Seigfreid added. Clisham is also a pilot and has won multiple awards.

Professional air boss Ralph Royce will be in charge when the show starts, after briefing the pilots and necessary staff on weather conditions, obstacles, etc. "He is the air traffic controller for the show," Seigfreid explained.

Parking will be at the Richland County Fairgrounds, just a short walk from the airport. Limited transportation will be available for those who need it. Please bring your lawn chairs, sunglasses, umbrellas and comfortable shoes. There will be concessions on the grounds as well as restroom facilities.



Back to School: Now's The Time to Update Your Child's Vaccines

Department of Public Health and Human Services officials say that with another school year set to begin, now is the time to make sure children are up to date on their vaccines.

Officials say that getting all of the recommended vaccines is one of the most important things parents can do to protect their children's health.

With back to school rapidly approaching and a continued increase in the number of pertussis, or "whooping cough" cases throughout the state, DPHHS Director Richard Opper says "parents are encouraged to check with their health care provider or local health department to ensure that their children are up to date on all recommended immunizations."

Schools are highly susceptible to outbreaks of infectious diseases. When children are not vaccinated, they are at increased risk for disease and can spread disease to others in their classroom and further into the community endangering babies who are too young to be fully vaccinated, and people

with weakened immune systems due to cancer and other health conditions.

A flu vaccine is recommended every year for all children 6 months and older. Children age 4 to 6 are due for boosters of four vaccines:

diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis

chickenpox

MMR (measles, mumps, rubella)

Older children – like pre-teens and teens – need:

Tdap (tetanus, diphtheria, pertussis)

MCV (meningococcal conjugate virus)

HPV

DPHHS urges parents to talk with their doctor, nurse, or local health department about the recommended vaccines. Parents can find out more about the recommended immunization schedule at www.immunization.mt.gov.

Montana Protests BLM's Proposed Hydraulic Fracturing Rules

Attorney General Tim Fox announced today that Montana has joined four other states protesting the U.S. Bureau of Land Management's (BLM) re-proposed rule to regulate hydraulic fracturing operations on federal and Indian lands.

In a letter to U.S. Department of the Interior Secretary Sally Jewell, the Attorneys General of Alabama, Alaska, Montana, Oklahoma, and West Virginia strongly assert that the BLM cannot justify

a need for new federal regulations and requirements, which will duplicate existing state programs.

"The BLM would be hard pressed to explain why it needs to impose new 'one-size-fits-all' regulations on states where hydraulic fracturing operations are in place," said Attorney General Tim Fox. "These states, including Montana, already have well trained staff who regulate fracking operations and issue permits. This is another example of the federal government trying to compli-

cate the way states self-regulate in ways that work best for them, and could impede the development of oil and gas within their borders."

The five Attorneys General also questioned whether the BLM has the authority to regulate land and water use within the states, in light of the Supreme Court's long-standing recognition of state and local regulation powers, citing the Clean Water Act and the Safe Drinking Water Act as examples.

Before the BLM finalizes its rule, the Attorneys General asked the agency to defer to the states' regulatory programs on federal lands, as well as identify any environmental, health, or safety concerns in relation to fracking operations that have not already been addressed by state regulators.

Game and Fish Concerned About Possible Corps Land Transfer

Officials at the State Game and Fish Department are concerned that a potential transfer of U.S. Army Corps of Engineers land around Lake Sakakawea would include thousands of acres of public land managed for fish, wildlife and recreation, and would jeopardize free access to numerous boat ramps within the middle third of the reservoir.

Game and Fish Director Terry Steinwand says the Corps is apparently reconsidering a 2004 request to transfer all Corps land above 1,854 feet mean sea level within the Fort Berthold Indian Reservation, to the U.S. Bureau of Indian Affairs, to be held in trust for the Mandan, Hidatsa and Arikara Nation.

The Game and Fish Department leases from the Corps and manages for wildlife approximately 7,000 acres within the proposed area, including Van Hook and Deepwater Creek wildlife management areas. In addition, more than 29,000 acres of Corps land that is currently open to public hunting and fishing could also be transferred.

"Our major concern about this development," Steinwand said, "is the loss of public land for hunters and anglers, which is currently managed by the Game and Fish Department and the Corps of Engineers."

Over several decades since Game and Fish began leasing Corps land around Lake Sakakawea for wildlife management purposes, Steinwand said the agency has invested more than a million dollars in sportsmen's money in portions of those areas that would be included in a land transfer. While Game and Fish would retain leases and public access on

land below 1,854 msl, Steinwand added that access to those remaining areas could become more difficult.

"This is a critical issue for hunters and anglers in the state," Steinwand said. "It's important that the Corps considers further public input before making a decision on any potential land transfer."

Deer Deaths Possible Indicator of EHD

Wildlife biologists believe recent reports of white-tailed deer deaths in western North Dakota could indicate the presence of epizootic hemorrhagic disease.

Dr. Dan Grove, State Game and Fish Department wildlife veterinarian, said the reports have characteristics similar to previous EHD events, and initial necropsy results on a freshly dead deer from Burleigh County indicate the potential presence of EHD.

"Deer losses to EHD occur periodically," Grove said. "Sometimes the incidents are isolated and affect few animals, and in other cases the disease is spread over a large geographic region."

As of Aug. 28, less than 20 dead deer have been reported to the department in three counties - Bowman, Grant and Burleigh. However, the typical range where EHD is found in North Dakota is southwest of the Missouri River, and in large outbreaks most counties in this region are affected.

Game and Fish is urging bow hunters and elk hunters in the field in early September to report any observations of dead deer, Grove said, and to report locations quickly so biologists can gauge distribution and severity. "To isolate the EHD virus, the animal cannot have been dead for more than 24 hours," he added.

Information needed from each report is the species, age, sex and location. "It would be nice if we could get the legal description of the land, or a GPS coordinate, and a photograph if possible," Grove said. "At the very least, we will need the number of miles and direction from the closest town."

EHD primarily affects white-tailed deer, and is most noticeable in western North Dakota when high whitetail populations combine with a hot and humid late summer and early fall. Most deer that die from this are infected before the first hard frost, which kills the biting midges that spread the disease. Grove said.

The last time North Dakota had significant deer deaths from EHD was 2011.

EHD causes dehydration and a high body temperature. causing deer to seek water prior to death. Other clinical and behavior symptoms may include respiratory distress; swelling of head, neck, and tongue; lesions on tongue and roof of mouth; indifference to humans; and in later stages, hemorrhaging from body orifices.

EHD is not a danger to humans. However, hunters should not shoot or consume a deer if it appears sick.

2013 North Dakota Waterfowl Regulations Set

North Dakota's 2013 waterfowl season has been set, with noteworthy changes including an increase in the daily limit of Canada and snow geese, and the possession limit for most migratory birds.

Opening day for North Dakota residents is Sept. 21 for ducks, geese, coots and mergansers. Nonresidents may begin hunting waterfowl in North Dakota Sept. 28. The season for swans opens Sept. 28 for both residents and nonresidents.

Hunters may take six ducks per day with the following restrictions: five mallards of which two may be hens, three wood ducks, three scaup, two redheads, two pintails and two canvasbacks. The daily limit of five mergansers may include no more than two hooded mergansers. For ducks and mergansers, the possession limit is three times the daily limit.

The hunting season for Canada geese in the Missouri River zone will close Dec. 27, while the remainder of the state will close Dec. 21. The season for whitefronts closes Dec. 1, while the season on light geese is open through Dec. 29. Shooting hours for all geese are one-half hour before sunrise to 1 p.m. each day through Nov. 2. Beginning Nov. 3, shooting hours are extended until 2 p.m. each dav.

Extended shooting hours for all geese are permitted from one-half hour before sunrise to sunset on Saturdays and Wednesdays through Nov. 27, and on Saturdays, Sundays and Wednesdays from Nov. 30 through the end of each season.

season is eight daily and 24 in possession, except in the Missouri River zone where the limit is five daily and 15 in possession.

The daily limit on whitefronts is two with six in possession, and light goose is 50 daily, with no possession

The special youth waterfowl hunting season is Sept. 14-15. Legally licensed residents and nonresidents 15 years of age or younger can hunt ducks, coots, mergansers and geese statewide. Youth hunters must have a general game and habitat license and a fishing, hunting and furbearer certificate. A licensed adult at least 18 years of age must accompany the youth hunter into the field.

Nonresidents have the option of buying either a statewide waterfowl license or one with zone restrictions. Nonresidents who designate zones 1 or 2 may hunt that zone for only one seven-day period during the season. Nonresident hunters who chose to hunt in zone 1 or 2 and wish to use the full 14 consecutive days allowed, must use the other seven days in zone 3. Hunters in

zone 3 can hunt that zone the entire 14 days.

In accordance with state law, nonresidents are not allowed to hunt on North Dakota Game and Fish Department wildlife management areas or conservation PLOTS (Private Land Open To Sportsmen) areas from Oct. 12-18.

All migratory bird hunters, including waterfowl, must register with the Harvest Information Program prior to hunting. Hunters purchasing a license from the Game and Fish Department can easily get a HIP number. Otherwise,

hunters must call (888) 634-4798, or log on to the Game and Fish website at gf.nd.gov, provide the registration information, and record the HIP number on their fishing, hunting and furbearer certificate. Those who HIP registered to hunt this spring's light goose season or early fall Canada goose season do not have



Lynne Jordan Artwork to be on Display at MonDak Heritage Center

This is the fourth in a series highlighting the talented Blue Buffalo artists whose work will be on display at the MonDak Heritage Center in Sidney during the month of October.

Lynne Jordan works in oils, watercolors and pastels to bring her viewers into the world of National Parks where she spent many years of her life. She has also mastered what she calls pyrographic sculpture, her state of the art technique in wood burning and light carving on three-dimensional driftwood. This art form originally began in Russia and moved to the United States in the 1700s. Jordan has advanced this art form into the 21st Century with realism in western and wildlife subject matter.

Jordan explains her subject matter this way. "I was born and reared in western National Parks where, behind the front lines of tourist gatherings, lies a world of wild and secluded life. I spent a great deal of my childhood hiking among the hidden glens where I would sit for hours watching the private life of 'wild' unfold before me.

Whether I am portraying the elusive lynx, or the people that survived the hardships of the West long ago, I look for that brief moment of deep personal awareness. I want to share with the viewer the ability to move in unobserved...to

sit beside the young pioneer girl as she reties the laces of her worn-out boots; to smell the breath of a bull elk on a crisp fall morning in the high country; or to share the flight of an eagle on his way home to feed his young."

Jordan studied art at the University of Oregon, New Mexico State University and the Lesnick Art Studio in Las Vegas, NV. Her work is represented in dozens of galleries and she continues to keep up with the customers' demand for her work. She has received numerous awards and has had many one-woman exhibitions. Jordan now resides in Bounder City, Nevada.
