MonDak Region Sunrise Art Festival Celebrates to be Held July 7-8 July 4th

If the 4th of July means parades, concerts, barebeques and fireworks, the MonDak region has all of those bases covered this year! From Lambert to Bainville, from Arnegard to Medora, this 4th of July has something for everyone! Many traditional events, like the Pepsi ball drop in Lambert and the parade in Arnegard, take place this year, as well as many new events.

Lambert

Lambert's annual 4th of July celebration starts, as always, with the street dance from 7PM to 2AM, with music by Vernon DJ and Karaoke Services, on July 3rd. The 4th kicks off with a 5AM wake-up call and Pilates in the park at 6:30AM. At 9AM, join people of all faiths for Praise and Prayer at the Fox Lake Senior Center, or take part in the Run for Freedom, beginning at the park. The 9AM run is a 5k, or start a 1-mile walk or run at 9:30. Registration is required, and fees are \$20 for adults, and \$10 for kids. Children 5 and under are free, and all registrants receive a free t-shirt. Funds go to support the Lambert Volunteer Fire Department.

Registration and lineup for the parade begins at 10:15 at the Nortana parking lot. Prizes will be awarded for the best decorated kids bikes. The parade kicks off at 11:00.

Enjoy pulled pork or beef sandwiches for a free-will donation to benefit the Fire Department, or have burgers, brats, ice cream and pie at the Senior Center. Throughout the day, visit the quilt exhibit at the Senior Center as well, and a music jamboree at 1.

Finally, Bryan Prevost and Blue Rock will drop balls for children to collect to receive a free Pepsi. At dusk, the Fire Department will light the sky with fireworks. The public is welcome to light fireworks as well.

Bainville

Bainville's 4th of July theme this year is "Heritage America! Family-Farm-Friends". On Saturday, July 1st, shop local food, craft and direct seller vendors near Main Street from 11:00 to 4:00, and a parade featuring antique cars and tractors, as well as local business floats beginning at 11:00. Family entertainment, including bouncy houses, games, bed races, prairie golf, farmhand Olympics, a dunk tank, and face painting, runs from 1:00 to 5:00. Close out the night with a pig roast hosted by the Bainville Community Foundation, at 6:00, a free concert in the park by Tigirlily at 7:00, and fireworks beginning at 9:45. Remember to bring your lawn chair!

On Sunday, July 2, community church begins at 10:00 at the fire hall. A community-wide potluck begins at noon, with the main dish furnished by the local churches. Remember your lawn chair and a salad or dessert to share! Tours of the school will begin at 1:00. The 27th Annual Sunrise Festival of the Arts will be held July 7 and 8, and with it will come a whole host of opportunities to the public for involvement and entertainment. Held at Veterans Memorial Park in Sidney, hundreds of attendees and many vendors will converge to celebrate the arts, crafts and entertainment.

Madina McGlothern, the communications manager for the Sidney Chamber of Commerce since February, spoke to the Roundup about the upcoming events, and explained that they are expecting new vendors, new events, and fresh entertainment

McGlothern stated, "We try to continue to keep the event new and interesting every year, so even though the basis of the event stays the same, which is to celebrate the arts, there's always something new from last year. There are new people, new visitors, new vendors, new art, new entertainment and new opportunities."

When asked what kind of entertainment will be new this year, McGlothern said, "Vendors always change, so the art is always new. Additionally, this year we have the concert in the park the night before, with TigirLily. They'll be performing at 7pm on Friday and that's free to the public."

TigirLily is a duo musical act of two sisters from North Dakota, Kendra and Krista. They have 4.9 million views on YouTube, and have opened for acts like Big and Rich, Justin Taylor and more. Combining pop, country and folk music, the pair has debuted an album that reached the top 20 for country music on iTunes and the top 10 on the Country Heatseekers Chart. They

have also performed at gubernatorial inaugurations, popular venues like the House of Blues, the PBR rodeo, World of Outlaws Racing and other sporting events. TigirLily also received the 2016 breakout artist award at the North Dakota Music Awards.

Children will also have their own entertainment at "Kids Korner," which is sponsored by Montana Dakota Utilities.

Aside from musical entertainment, patrons and visitors to the Sunrise Festival of the Arts will be able to become hands-on in their art experience, with opportunities provided for art classes. Five total classes will be offered, and for a small supplies fee, visitors can learn how to create their own art and will be able to take home their artistic creation.

"We'll have art classes throughout the day," McGlothern told the Roundup, "and that information is available on the website." Along with art classes, door prizes will be given away and those who purchase buttons will receive discounts at local business partners of the Chamber of Commerce.

"Our corporate sponsor is XTO, which infuses us with additional resources to help with our advertising and putting on a quality festival," McGlothern said.

She continued, saying "The most important thing for us to get across to people is that there's still room for vendors and visitors. We want people to participate and display their art and interact, and people to come and visit and take part."

McGlothern estimates five or six hundred people take part in the festival annually, and hopes that the upcoming festival in 2017 will see as many – or more – people take the time to enjoy the opportunities offered.

"Find Your Happy" At the McKenzie County Fair

This year's McKenzie County Fair has many opportunities for you to "find your happy", the 2017 fair theme. The fair begins on Thursday, July 6th, and runs through Saturday, July 8th, at the McKenzie County Fairgrounds, in Watford City.

The Fair officially begins with the Fair parade down Main Street in Watford City at 4:00 on Thursday, July 6th. Join the community for a free beef barbeque at the multi-purpose building at 5:30, served by the cattlewomen. Be sure to wear your fair button!

A staple of all county fairs, the 4-H livestock shows will be going on beginning at 9:00 on Thursday in the Livestock Show Arena. The shows include swine, goat, sheep, beef breeding, market beef, and round robin showmanship. The livestock sale will take place at 2:00 on Friday in the Show Arena.

At 6:30 on Thursday, the annual Olaf Leiseth Jr. Memorial Draft Horse Competition will take place in the rodeo arena. In this competition, named after a member of the Long X Wagon Team, draft horses will complete a timed obstacle course. Registration for the event closes at 5:30.

If you've got an old vehicle in the back forty, register for the Demolition Derby at 2:00 on Friday at the North Entrance to the fairgrounds. Registration closes at 5:15, and inspections close at 5:30. Beginning at 6:00, all approved vehicles will enter the Rodeo Arena to smash into opponents, until only one running vehicle remains. Adult tickets are \$10, youth tickets, for ages 6-13, are \$5, and ages 6 and under are free.

Saturday is the day for all things rodeo! The 27th Annual Youth Rodeo begins at 9:00 at the Indoor Arena. Young cowboys and cowgirls from ages 8 to 15 will participate in barrel racing, pole bending, breakaway roping, goat tying, a flag race and steer riding, dressed in full western attire. For the younger crowd, ages three to five years, the Lil' Buckaroo Rodeo will take place at 2:00 in the Livestock Show Arena. Lil' Buckaroo's will compete for prizes in stick horse barrel racing, steer roping a dummy steer, and goat tail untying. The professionals begin at 6:00 in the Rodeo Arena at the North Dakota Rodeo Association annual rodeo. Adult tickets are \$10, youth tickets, for ages 6-13, are \$5, and ages 6 and under are free.

On both Friday and Saturday, wrap up your evening with music by Jeremiah James and the Prairie Drifters, a country band based out of Bismarck.

Visit the North Star Amusements carnival to test your luck at the midway games, grab some carnival grub, and take a ride



LYIP to Work on Graphic Representation of **New Weir Design**

The Lower Yellowstone Irrigation Project is looking for a graphic artist to render a drawing of the proposed new weir design at Intake. Three government agencies, LYIP and the community are currently awaiting a decision from Judge Brian Morris on a Motion of Preliminary Injunction filed by environmental activist groups trying to halt the construction of the new weir and fish passage channel that was slated for construction next month.

The new drawing will be used to better illustrate the improvements the new weir will have and show the various features that will enable more fish to pass over the structure as compared to the current weir.

Most of the discussion thus far has focused on the fish passage. Although there is data that supports the passage has a likelihood of working, opponents to the project claim there is a lack of sufficient data.

A new graphical representation of the weir design would show the increased flow of water over the structure as well as eliminating the need to place rocks yearly to raise the water level. Not only will this help fish navigate more easily upstream but will also reduce the risk of larvae being injured or killed as they drift downstream. The new design also incorporates a fish notch that is at a lower grade than the rest of the weir that will allow fish searching for a way upriver in front of the structure a route to pass through.

Red Dye Study Will Examine Water Flow In Yellowstone River Near Glendive

U.S. Geological Survey scientists will inject a harmless, bright red fluorescent dve into the Yellowstone River during the week of June 26, 2017, weather permitting. The study is being done in cooperation with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and the Bureau of Reclamation.

The goal of the dye study is to understand how larval fish drift in the complex waters of the Missouri and Yellowstone Rivers. Such information is used by federal, state and local agencies to help manage aquatic habitat and water resources

The red dye-known as Rhodamine WT-will detect flow patterns in the Yellowstone River downstream from Glendive, Montana, during high flows in June. Rhodamine WT, which has been used in hydrologic studies for decades, is approved for use as a water tracer by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency

and is harmless to people, fish, and plants at the concentration being used for this study. After releasing the dye into the river at a central location near river mile 91 (downstream from Interstate bridge at Glendive), strategically placed instruments will track travel times and dispersion of dye downstream.

The start date will be determined based on local weather and flow conditions, and the study is expected to last four to six days. For a few hours after the start of the study, several miles of the river will appear reddish in color because of the dye. The red color will dissipate rapidly and will disappear after it travels several miles downstream. During the study, USGS will deploy multiple boats on the river to monitor the dye transport. The event will be closely monitored by USGS scientists to ensure dye concentrations do not exceed the EPA approved threshold of 10 parts per billion in the vicinity of water intakes.

This assessment of the Yellowstone follows a successful dye trace on the Missouri River in summer 2016 downstream from Fort Peck Dam. (https://www2.usgs. gov/blogs/csrp/2016/06/28/ missouri-river-dye-trace-experiment-to-support-understandingof-larval-drift/).



Making the Most of Cherry Season

Cherry jam, cherry juice, cherry pie, oh my! Summer is finally here, and that means sweet cherries are in season. In the Sidney area, we are lucky to have a range of cherry variety available at local grocers throughout the season, as well as regular visits from the Jacobs Fruit Company Truck.

For the past five years, Levi Jacobs, owner and operator of Jacobs Fruit Company, had made regular stops in Glendive, Sidney, and in Eastern North Dakota, with his refrigerated truck filled with cherries. Jacobs' cherries are sourced from growers in the Washington area as well as the Flathead Valley of Montana. Jacobs typically offers sweet, dark cherries, and yellow Ranier cherries, which are picked only a few days before sale.

Cherries can be eaten raw, baked into pies and tarts, preserved as pickled cherries, jam or jelly, made into syrup, dried, or added to salads or other dishes for added flavor. Sweet cherries are high in fiber, antioxidants and Vitamin C.

Cherry season runs from May to August, so stock up while you can. Cherries can easily be frozen by placing washed, pitted cherries on a baking sheet and placing it into the freezer. Frozen cherries can be stored in sealed plastic bags, and can be used in any recipe calling for fresh cherries. There is no need to thaw them first.

To dry cherries, cut pitted cherries in half and place on a baking sheet or in a food dehydrator. Cherries should be dried for about ten hours at 150 degrees, and should feel dry to the touch but still leathery and pliable when finished.

The Jacobs Fruit Truck should be rolling into town about every three weeks this summer with fresh batches of cherries. Visit www.jacobsfruit.com to sign up for sales dates.

National Campaign Focuses on Boating Under the Influence

The North Dakota Game and Fish Department will again participate in Operation Dry Water as part of a nationally coordinated effort to increase knowledge about the dangers of boating under the influence. The goal is to reduce the number of accidents and deaths associated with alcohol and drug use on our waterways.

Operation Dry Water weekend, June 30-July 2, is the national weekend of heightened enforcement effort directed at boating under the influence laws and recreational boater outreach.

While informing and educating boaters about the hazards and negative outcomes associated with boating while under the influence of alcohol or drugs is a year-round effort, on ODW weekend the Game and Fish Department's game wardens will be focused on the water informing boaters about safe boating practices, and removing impaired operators from the water.

"Alcohol impairs judgment and reaction time on the water just as it does when driving a car, even more so because of the added stressors of sun, heat, wind, noise and the vibrations of the boat," said Jackie Lundstrom, the Game and Fish Department's enforcement division operations supervisor. "Everyone wants to have a great summer on the water, and to do that you've got to stay safe and stay sober while underway."

Tips to staying safe on the water:

Boat sober. Alcohol use is the leading contributing factor in recreational boater deaths. Alcohol and drug use impair a boater's judgment, balance, vision and reaction time.

Wear your life jacket. 85 percent of drowning victims nationwide were not wearing a life jacket.

Take a boating safety education course. 71 percent of deaths nationwide occurred on boats where the operator had

Manners Matter - How to Share the River

Montana's welcoming summer waters annually draw anglers, hikers, wildlife viewers, campers, floaters and boaters into the outdoors because it's still easy to have a great summer experience on Montana's rivers.

The key is river etiquette, a mix of common sense, courtesy, and respect to minimize one party's impact on another party's good time. Here are some examples of basic river etiquette.

- Respect People's Space and Privacy—The point at which someone feels crowded is subjective, but every outdoor activity requires space. On the river, maintain a reasonable space between you and other river users, and initiate friendly communication when encounters are unavoidable. When pulling ashore, select unoccupied beaches and swimming areas whenever possible. Don't assume because it is a public space that strangers will welcome company. When passing people fishing on shore or from a boat, be quiet, and if safety permits, move to the opposite side of the river. Avoid floating through an area where anglers are fishing.
- where anglers are fishing.

 Respect Other People's Time—Always be prepared to launch your boat before you get to the boat ramp. That may sound obvious, but who hasn't found themselves waiting to launch behind someone who is loading gear into their boat while occupying the boat ramp? Have your gear organized and boats loaded and rigged—and once in the water, clear the launch area as quickly as possible.
- Keep It Down—Excitement is what river recreation is about, so a few hoots and hollers are to be expected. But excessive whoops are in the same category as loud music and noisy generators in camp. Keep noise-levels down when others are nearby and when floating past residential areas.
- Respect Private Property Rights—Respect the property rights of private landowners. Know your rights and responsibilities under the Montana Stream Access Law and stay below the ordinary high-water mark. Keep dogs under control, respect ranchers' fencing and learn how to properly negotiate float gates

Stand-up Paddleboards have Safety Equipment Requirements

Montana Fish, Wildlife and Parks wants to remind persons using stand-up paddleboard (SUPs) that a life jacket is required to be on board. The use of SUPs has exploded in Montana over the past few years. The vessels are fun, easy-to-use and have equipment requirements, not unlike other vessels.

All SUPs need to have a U.S. Coast Guard approved life jacket on board, children under 12 years of age must wear a life jacket

With this increase in popularity more people than ever are participating in this recreational activity. In 2008 the U.S. Coast Guard determined that stand-up paddleboards are considered to be a vessel when used outside a marked swimming area, and that state law applies for safety equipment.

"If we can impress on young people the value of wearing a life jacket, we're helping to protect them and others who may go boating with them in the future."

FWP wardens expect to hand out hundreds of coupons throughout the summer. The coupons are good at all McDonald's restaurants and Super 1 Foods stores.

Fireworks Prohibited on Wildlife Management Areas

The North Dakota Game and Fish Department reminds citizens that possession or use of fireworks on state wildlife management areas is prohibited.

The primary objective of a wildlife management area is to enhance wildlife production, provide hunting and fishing opportunities, and offer other outdoor recreational and educational uses. Only activities that would not disrupt the intentions of how these areas are managed are encouraged, and a fireworks display is not compatible.

Excessive noise and commotion that come with fireworks disturbs wildlife, and their explosive nature is a potential source of wildfires. Chances of a wildfire developing are greatly enhanced when explosives, such as fireworks, come in contact with tall grasses in rural areas.


