

American Red Cross Urges Citizens to Get Serious About Home Fire Prevention

The biggest disaster threat to American families isn't floods, hurricanes or tornadoes; it's fire. The American Red Cross responds to a disaster every eight minutes and nearly all of these are home fires.

"Home fires are a common and deadly threat because they happen so quickly," said Rod Kop, CEO of Montana Red Cross. "We urge everyone to become aware of what they should do to prevent a fire in their home."

According to the U.S. Fire Administration (USFA), there are almost 365,000 residential fires reported in the U.S. every year. These fires cause more than \$6 billion in property loss. While the frequency of fire deaths has steadily decreased over the past ten years due to increased awareness and safety measures, more than 2,400 Americans still die every year in home fires.

"Here in Montana, the Red Cross responds to all kinds of disasters, says Kopp. "But our most common response, bar none, is house fires. The truth is that most home fires can be prevented." Homeowners should check for items that can be hazardous such as candles and space heaters – common items that can turn dangerous very quickly.

TO HELP AVOID A FIRE IN THE HOME, TAKE THESE PRECAUTIONS:

- Keep items that can catch on fire at least three feet away from anything that gets hot, such as sources of heat or stoves.
 - Never smoke in bed.
- Turn portable heaters off when leaving the room or going to sleep.

SMOKE ALARMS SAVE LIVES

- Install smoke alarms on every level of the home and outside each sleeping area. Put a smoke alarm inside every bedroom. Because smoke rises, put the alarms on the ceiling or high on the wall.
- Test the smoke alarms regularly. Install new batteries every year.
 - Get new smoke alarms every ten years.
 MAKE A PLAN

The Red Cross recommends that households develop a fire escape plan and practice it at least twice a year with everyone who lives in the home. People should know two ways to escape from every room and designate a safe place to meet outside the home in case of a fire.

OTHER SAFETY TIPS

- Follow the escape plan in case of fire. Get out, stay out, and call 9-1-1 or the local emergency number.
- Install smoke alarms on every level of the house and inside bedrooms.
- Replace batteries in smoke alarms at least once a year. Test each alarm monthly by pushing the test button.

• Download the Red Cross First Aid App to get access to life-saving information on what to do for common, everyday first aid emergencies including burns. The app is available in the Apple App Store and on Google Play for Android.

Montana Cancer Control Programs begins month-long Breast Cancer Awareness Campaign

October is Breast Cancer Awareness Month. In Montana, more than 700 women develop breast cancer every year. Treatment for breast cancer is most effective if the cancer is caught at an early stage, so it is important for women to talk to their doctors about breast cancer screenings.

To ensure Montana women have every tool available, the Montana Cancer Control Programs (MCCP) will spend the month of October educating women about getting regular breast cancer screenings, the current national recommendations for breast cancer screening, and about making healthy lifestyle choices to help lower the likelihood of breast cancer. Throughout the month, local cancer control programs across Montana will conduct community education and outreach activities focused on breast cancer.

"Getting screened is one of the best ways for women to beat breast cancer," said DPHHS Director Richard Opper. "Furthermore, engaging in healthy activities, like not using

Public Meeting On Proposed Ordinance Revisions

Williston to Develop Unified Development Code (UDC)

The Williston City Planning Department will host a public meeting on Tuesday, October 15, 2013 from 6:30 p.m. to 8:30 p.m. in the Williston Public Library meeting room to discuss proposed revisions to the city's zoning and subdivision ordinances.

The revisions of the zoning and subdivision ordinances are proposed to address changes in planning and development practices since those ordinances were originally adopted in the 1980s. The format of the ordinances will also be updated. The revised zoning and subdivision ordinances will be combined into a single document known as the Unified Development Code, or UDC.

The UDC project is being managed by the Williston City Planning Department, working with its consultants, RDG Planning and Design. The October 15 public meeting is to provide more detailed information about the UDC process and proposed revisions as well as to provide an opportunity for community recommendations or comments regarding the zoning and subdivision ordinances. The October 15 public meeting is the first of three scheduled public meetings in the approximately 14-month

long time period scheduled to complete the UDC. Future public meetings are planned for February and August, 2014. The UDC is scheduled to begin the public hearing process in September, 2014

and be completed later in the fall of 2014.

Natural Gas & Oil = Wealth For The Economy



Farmer's Market Season 2013 Closed




Corn Maze Tons of Fun



"I probably wouldn't go every weekend if my dog didn't make me," Hill said laughing. Doug has a pointing dog named Sonny, who is a Brittany breed and is his buddy. In fact, one of Doug's greatest experiences hunting was taking his dog

out for the very first time and having him retrieve a bird from 200-300 yards away. "It was exciting to see it happen," Hill said grinning, "but I wish it would happen all the time."

This year is especially exciting for Hill as his daughter, Tessa, has recently passed her hunter's safety course and will for sure be joining him on some hunts. For Hill, the best part of hunting is just being in the outdoors watching his dog work. Therefore, after being inside his office all week, he will look forward to just getting out and spending some quality time with his daughter and his dog.

Hill uses a 12 gauge, double barrel, over and under shotgun and prefers to hunt out in the hills around the Sidney area. "I like to stay off the river bottoms," Hill says. "You can't always see your dog on the river bottoms and you lose track of where they're at." Hill added, "When they go on point and you can't see them, you need a beeper collar." Beeper collars are location devices some bird hunters use to find their dogs while they are hunting.

Doug is very hopeful that this is going to be a great year for pheasant hunting. "It's difficult to tell until you get out there," he says. Regardless of whether He shoots a lot of birds or not, he is just looking forward to getting out there.

Anyone purchasing a Montana hunting license will now have an opportunity to also make an on-the-spot donation to Hunters Against Hunger.

"A new Montana law allows individuals to make a contribution that will help nonprofit groups process donated wild game for free distribution by Montana food

banks to help feed people in need," said Ron Aasheim, spokesman for Montana Fish, Wildlife & Parks in Helena.

When one purchases or applies for a deer, elk, antelope, or bison license or permit the license provider will ask if he or she wishes to donate to Hunters Against Hunger, Aasheim said. FWP will begin to dispense the

contributions next year to authorized nonprofit groups, like food banks, to help pay for butchering and distribution of processed game.

The minimum donation is \$1. Donations can also be made along with online hunting licenses purchases. Visit FWP on line at fwp.mt.gov. Click "Buy a License."

Most Activities on BLM-Montana/Dakotas Managed Lands to be Suspended due to Federal Government Shutdown

As a result of the Federal government shutdown, essentially all services provided by the Bureau of Land Management will be suspended, with the exception of law enforcement and emergency response functions. Approximately 4,000 recreation facilities, including visitor centers, facilities, campgrounds, boat ramps and other recreation sites will be closed.

With an estimated \$4.8 billion in revenues in 2012, the BLM nationally returns more than four dollars for every budget dollar it receives. The BLM manages 245 million acres - more than any of the nation's major natural resource agencies, with the smallest budget, the fewest employees, and the lowest

While the BLM will maintain the minimum staffing levels required to ensure continued safe management of the nation's energy resources, issuing new oil and gas leases and permits will cease. Limited work will continue to ensure safe operations of domestic energy supplies, including very limited inspection activities and emergency response for more than 5,730 oil and gas wells for federal and Indian Trust minerals in Montana, North Dakota, and South Dakota.

Recreation activities on BLM-managed lands will be similarly impacted. Public lands receive more than 57 million visitors every year, contributing more than \$7 billion to local economies. In FY2012, the Montana/Dakotas organization received more than 4.3 million visitors contributing more than \$317.5 million total funds to local economies.

In the Montana/Dakotas, BLM closures include the Garnet Ghost Town visitors' center. Shepherd Ah Nei Recreation Area, and the Chain-of-Lakes Complex. All BLM facilities are either closed or will not be maintained for the duration of the shutdown.

The BLM-Montana/Dakotas will furlough 712 of its approximate 730 employees during the funding lapse. After the initial shutdown procedures are completed, the BLM-Montana/ Dakotas will maintain a total of 18 excepted employees with

an additional 80 employees on call.

Suspended activities and services will include:

- non-emergency Abandoned Mine Land and hazardous-materials mitigation
 - processing of oil and gas drilling permits
- processing of lease sales, permits and other non-emergency authorizations of onshore oil

and gas, coal and other minerals

- permits and approvals for renewable energy and other rights-of -way issuances
 - Endangered Species Act and cultural clearances
 - range management restoration
 - wild horse and burro adoptions
 - sand and gravel permits
 - timber sales
- work on resource management plans, including those driven by court deadlines

Suspended activities will resume once Congress approves a budget for Fiscal Year 2014.

Because the BLM website will not be maintained for the duration of the shutdown, the BLM will be re-directing to Interior's site, where additional information will be available at www.DOI.gov/shutdown as well as at OPM.gov.

The BLM manages more than 245 million acres of public land, the most of any Federal agency. This land, known as the National System of Public Lands, is primarily located in 12 Western states, including Alaska. The BLM also administers 700 million acres of sub-surface mineral estate throughout the nation. The BLM's multiple-use mission is to sustain the health, diversity, and productivity of the public lands for the use and enjoyment of present and future generations. In Fiscal Year 2012, activities on public lands generated \$4.6 billion in revenue, much of which was shared with the States where the activities occurred. In addition, public lands contributed more than \$112 billion to the U.S. economy and helped support more than 500,000 jobs.

Pheasant Release Applications For 2014 Available

It's not too soon for landowners to submit an application for 2014 pheasant releases through Montana's Upland Game Bird Enhancement Program.

Under Montana Fish, Wildlife & Parks' pheasant release program, landowners who attempt to establish pheasant populations in suitable habitat can be reimbursed for raising and releasing ring-necked pheasants.

Landowners interested in raising and releasing pheasants have until Jan. 15, 2014 to submit an application. Landowners can apply annually for up to five consecutive years to establish pheasants.

Projects must comprise at least 100 contiguous acres of land and contain a combination of habitat components that include the types of cover and food upland game birds need to survive. Lands enrolled in the pheasant release program must allow free public access to hunt upland game birds during the season the releases take place.

Applications need to be mailed to FWP in Helena no later than Jan.15, 2014. Pheasants will be scheduled for release between Aug. 1 and Sept. 15, 2014.

Hunting preserves, lands that host a commercial hunting enterprise, and lands where hunting rights are leased or paid for are not eligible.

Deer Hunting Outlook

This season deer hunters in Montana will find another mix of hunting opportunities across the state when the general season opens Oct. 26.

On the upside, FWP wildlife biologists are reporting better fawn production and survival in many areas. Like other big game hunting, a nice cold front with plenty of snow should lead to some good hunting this season. On the downside, reports of another spotty outbreak of epizootic hemorrhagic disease, a fatal virus in deer that's caused by biting insects, are coming in from across Montana.

Antelope Hunting Outlook

Even as populations begin a slow rebound, hunters in Montana will have to work hard to bag an antelope again this season in many areas.

Montana's antelope archery season will close Oct. 11 and the general rifle season for antelope will run Oct. 12-Nov. 10.

Motorists Warned to Watch for Deer

Motorists are reminded to watch for deer along roadways, especially this time of year, because juvenile animals are dispersing from their home ranges.

October through early December is the peak period for deer-vehicle accidents. Motorists are advised to slow down and exercise caution after dark to reduce the likelihood of encounters with deer along roadways. Most deer-vehicle accidents occur primarily at dawn and dusk when deer are most often moving around.

Motorists should be aware of warning signs signaling deer are in the area. When you see one deer cross the road, look for a second or third deer to follow. Also, pay attention on roadways posted with Deer Crossing Area caution signs.

Deer-vehicle accidents are at times unavoidable. If an accident does happen, a new law passed by the 2013 state legislature eliminates the need for the driver involved in an accident to notify law enforcement authorities, if only the vehicle is damaged. Deer-vehicle accidents that involve injury or other property damage still must be reported.

In addition, a permit is still required to take parts or the whole carcass of a road-killed deer. Permits are free and available from game wardens and local law enforcement offices.

A few precautions can minimize chances of injury or property damage in a deer-vehicle crash.

Always wear your seat belt.

Don't swerve or take the ditch to avoid hitting a deer. Try to brake as much as possible and stay on the roadway. Don't lose control of your vehicle or slam into something else to miss the deer. You risk less injury by hitting the deer.

If you spot deer ahead, slow down immediately and honk your horn.








Hunters: Know Your WMA Rules!

Montana's Wildlife Management Areas (WMAs) provide for the protection of wildlife habitat and great opportunities for hunting this time of year. In order to manage for these goals, the Fish and Wildlife Commission has implemented important rules for public use on WMAs ranging from seasonal closures, to food storage orders, camping stay limits and more.

While hunters and other recreationists are required to abide by all the rules for public use, here are some of the key rules to remember (starting with the newest):

- 1. (*NEW) Food Storage Bear resistant food storage is required on the following WMAs: Mount Haggin, Bear Creek, Canyon Creek, Wall Creek, Blacktail, Robb-Ledford, Gallatin, Fleecer Mountain, and Dome Mountain.
- 2. (*NEW) Camping Stays are limited to 16 days in any 30 day period.
- 3. Winter Closures Most Region 3 WMAs are closed from Dec. 2 to May 15 at noon each year (exceptions include Canyon Ferry, Lake Helena, Silver Gate, and a portion of Mount Haggin).
- 4. Hunting & Trapping Hunting and trapping are allowed unless the WMA is closed for the winter or the season is closed

as per Hunting or Trapping Regulations. Trappers must also receive written permission by FWP to trap on WMAs.

- 5. Vehicle Use –Vehicles are allowed only on designated open roads. Off road travel with a motorized vehicle is prohibited. Snowmobiles are allowed on established roads (except for portions of Mount Haggin which allow cross country snowmobile use).
- 6. Weed Free Feed Only pelletized or certified weed free feed can be used on WMAs.
- 7. Firewood Cutting down trees and shrubs is prohibited unless specifically authorized by FWP (i.e. Mount Haggin often allows the cutting of standing dead trees by permit when the WMA is open to the public). Downed trees may be used onsite only.
- 8. Animal Carcasses Dumping of animal carcasses is prohibited (not including boned-out big game animal remains legally taken on site.
- 9. Littering Littering is prohibited (including dumping of sewage waste from trailers, etc.).

Youth-Only Deer Hunt Comes Week Early · Oct. 17-18

Montana's annual youth-only deer hunt—set for Oct 17-18—will come a week earlier this year.

The two-day special season is open to youngsters ages 12 to 15 who've passed a hunter safety course. Additionally, 11-year-olds who passed hunter safety may hunt if they'll be 12 by Jan. 16, 2014.

"There's been some confusion this year due to the scheduling of the statewide teachers' convention," said Ron Aasheim, Montana Fish, Wildlife & Parks spokesman in Helena.

The youth hunt is always scheduled during the public schools' two-day vacation in October, which is scheduled for Oct. 17-18 this year.

"The teachers' convention usually falls on the Thursday

and Friday just before the general season opener, but this year it's a full week before the big game season opens on Oct. 26," Aasheim said.

That also puts youth rifle hunters in the field during the final days of Montana's archery season.

"Archers and our young hunters need to be aware of the overlapping seasons and plan accordingly," Aasheim said.

Young hunters must wear hunter orange and follow all hunting district regulations, which may limit them to certain species or require a special permit.

To participate, youth hunters must be accompanied by an adult who must also wear hunter orange. The adult is not allowed to hunt during the youth-only deer hunt and should not carry a hunting rifle.

"This is the fourth year for the youth-only deer hunt," Aasheim said. "It has proven to be a good opportunity to introduce kids to hunting. This year, remember the hunt is set for Oct. 17-18 and remember that archers may also be in the area looking for deer, so be extra careful."

Hunters Reminded to Get Horses Inspected Before Traveling

The Montana Department of Livestock is reminding hunters that horses are required to have a brand inspection before crossing county lines.

According to Montana Code 81-3-211 (2), it is "unlawful to remove or cause to be removed...any livestock...unless the livestock have been inspected for brands by a state stock inspector or deputy state stock inspector and a certificate of the inspection has been issued...for the purpose of the transportation."

"It's a pretty common violation during hunting season," said Paul Johnson, Montana Department of Livestock district inspector for Cascade, Lewis & Clark and Teton counties. "Producers move livestock all the time and are generally pretty familiar with transportation requirements, but sometimes hunters just don't know."

Not knowing could cost you \$135, Johnson said, adding that he wouldn't be surprised to see MDOL inspectors at popular trailheads, check stations and other places where hunters congregate.

Johnson recommends that hunters get their horses inspected in advance of their planned departure.

"The inspection is good for a year of movement, or you can get a lifetime, so there's no good reason to wait until the last minute," he said. "If you hunt on horses, just add getting a brand inspection to your check list."

An annual inspection costs \$6, and a lifetime is \$25.

A map of brand inspectors by county can be found on the department's web site; annual and lifetime inspections can also be issued at livestock markets (marked in blue on the map). If you need an inspector but don't have access to the web, call (406) 444-9431 and we'll track one down for you.

As Insurance Exchange Launches, State's **Consumer Protection Office Offers Tips to Avoid Scams**

With the launch of Montana's health insurance exchange this week, the Office of Consumer Protection at the state Department of Justice is offering tips to help Montanans avoid identity theft scams related to medical services and health insurance products.

"Montanans need to be aware that scammers may take advantage of the insurance exchange launch and attempt to trick people into revealing confidential information or into signing up for bogus product and services," said Office of Consumer Protection Director Matt Dale. "When a large program launches or when a natural disaster strikes that increases charitable activities, we tend to see a rise in scam complaints."

"Scammers need to know we take these problems very seriously in Montana," Attorney General Tim Fox said. "One of my priorities during the 2013 Legislative Session was a bill to strengthen Montana's consumer protection laws by increasing penalties for people or organizations that scam the elderly and mentally disabled. The evidence across the country is clear that scammers tend to target these groups particularly. While this new law took effect on Tuesday, awareness and attentiveness are still our best tools for combatting scams."

The Office of Consumer Protection offers the following tips for avoiding scams:

Educate yourself. Go to www.healthcare.gov. You can learn more about protecting yourself from scams here.

Be cautious of sharing personal information such as your social security number or any bank account numbers.

Do not give your Social Security number, or any bank account or credit card information, to any company that you did not contact. Do not offer this information to companies you heard about through unsolicited adver-

Do not give out personal health history or share current health conditions or treatments you are or ever have received. No one should ask you for this.

You do not have to pay application or "sign-up" fees. The new health care exchange has trained assisters that will help you for free.

If you are on Medicare, you do not need a new card. If you are told you do, it could be a scam. Do not share your Medicare number with anyone who contacts you telling you need a new Medicare card.

If information is not being clearly explained to you, ask questions until you get a clear answer. Do not sign up for something you do not understand.

Do not respond to callers, emails, text messages, or advertisements that ask for your personal or financial information. If you get a message and are concerned about your account status, call the number on the back of your credit or debit card.

Never send or wire money to someone you do not know. It is best to do business with companies or websites that you know and trust. When buying items try to use payment options that offer protection such as credit cards. Avoid cash and wire transfer services.
