Landowners Offered New Wolf Management Tool

The Montana Fish & Wildlife Commission recently adopted rules and an annual wolf quota completing the process necessary to allow private landowners to take a limited number of wolves per year that potentially threaten livestock, domestic dogs or human safety.

The rule was adopted to comply with Senate Bill 200, a new state law passed by the Montana Legislature last year.

The annual quota allows landowners or their agents to take up to 100 wolves a year without a hunting license. The statewide quota for this effort will be examined in four 25-wolf increments. Each time the number of wolves taken nears 25, 50, and 75, the commission must approve the next increment toward the 100-wolf quota.

"This approach offers another tool landowners can use if it's needed," said Jeff Hagener, director of Montana Fish, Wildlife & Parks in Helena. "One of our top priorities is to minimize livestock losses and we're continuing to make a positive impact there."

Montana's verified wolf population remained stable last year at minimum of 627 wolves, compared to 625 in 2012.

The rule, which doesn't apply to public lands, comes as confirmed wolf depredations on livestock took a significant drop in 2013 and follows a trend of fewer overall agency control actions.

Confirmed livestock depredations due to wolves in 2013 were down 27 percent from 2012 loses. Cattle losses were the lowest recorded in the past seven years and reflect a general decline in wolf depredations that began in 2009.

A variety of nonlethal predation deterrents are also employed in Montana in cooperation with landowners to reduce the risk of wolf attacks. FWP collaborates with landowner communities on range-rider projects and with individual landowners to provide fladry—a century's old technique of attaching colorful flags or fabric on fence lines to flap in the breeze to keep wolves at bay—and advice on keeping wolves out of livestock areas.

In all, 75 wolves were removed via lethal control in 2013, down from 108 in 2012. Of the 75 wolves removed for livestock depredations, eight were taken by private citizens with permits to take offending wolves or under Montana's defense of property laws.

Landowners also have the right to take wolves in the act of attacking livestock without affecting the 100-animal quota.

September, 2014. Late, unsigned or incomplete applications will not be considered.

Only one (1) Lottery Application will be accepted per person for this area. A "Person" as defined in the Administrative Rules of Montana is any individual, firm, partnership, limited liability company, corporation or association. When applying for a "floater" license you may only apply for one area per year.

If a lottery is necessary, the drawing will take place in Helena to determine who has the opportunity to apply for this license. Applicants will be notified of the date, time and place where the drawing will take place. Applicants do not need to be present to be chosen.

Those successful in the lottery drawing will be required to send a License Application within 30 days. The License Application needs to have identical ownership information as to what was provided on the Lottery Application.

All new licensees are required to meet the legal criteria of a license as outlined in the Montana Alcoholic Beverage Code and the Administrative Rules of Montana.

The license cannot be used to conduct any gaming or gambling activity on the premises.



Sidney Coaches Honored at Montana Coaches Association Meeting





Montana Highway Patrol Promotes Seat Belt Safety

In partnership with the Montana Highway Patrol the Richland County Injury Prevention Team brought the "Seat Belt Convincer" to the Fairview Festival this past weekend to bring awareness and educate on seat belt usage. The event was part of the Partnership for Promise activities for youth. The "Seat Belt Convincer" gave the opportunity for individuals to feel what it is like to crash at a low speed. Trooper Nyle Obergfell spoke with adults and youth about the importance of wearing seat belts and proper placement of the seat belt.

There were brochures provided by the Montanan Department of Transportation available for all ages which provided the following information:

If you are in a crash, a seat belt will increase your chances of survival by at least 50%. When a vehicle suddenly stops, your

body continues moving forward at the original rate of speed. In a collision at only 30-mph, an unbelted adult of 160 lbs. will strike an object with a force equivalent to 2.4 tons. A child weighing 60 pound traveling in the rear seat would exert a force of approximately 1,800 lb. into the front seat in a head



on crash at 30-mph. The impact of a crash at 30-mph is like falling from a 3rd story window.

Most fatal crashes in Montana involve only one vehicle and a rollover. These are the crashes most likely to result in ejection. If you are unbuckled you will have impact with the interior of the vehicle or other passengers. Could be thrown through the windshield, have impact with the ground or another object and possible be crushed by the vehicle. If you are only partially ejected, you sustain injuries upon impact with both the vehicle and other surfaces as it continues to travel. Ejected passengers are not likely to survive. You are 4-times more likely to receive fatal injuries compared to occupants who remain inside their vehicle in a crash.

Unbelted passengers pose an enormous threat to belted passengers. The chance of injury to a belted person increases 90% if there is an unbelted occupant in the vehicle at the time of a crash. A crash can happen to anyone at any time. With the increase in traffic in our area even low speed crashes can be fatal. Please be a role model and help ensure the safety of everyone in your vehicle.

Liquor License Availabilities for Billings, Sidney, Dillon, Plains and Broadwater and Jefferson Counties

The Montana Department of Revenue announces the availability of additional liquor licenses in six Montana communities and is now accepting applications for them.

After reviewing this year's population estimates from the U.S. Bureau of Census and state area quotas, we have added two all-beverages floaters licenses and one beer license to Billings, one beer license to Sidney, one city beer license to

Dillon, one city beer license to Plains, two all-beverages floater licenses to Broadwater County and four all-beverages floater licenses to Jefferson County.

Every year at this time, we adjust the number of licenses available in each quota area based on population estimates.

"The availability of liquor licenses is significant to a community, because it usually means that a community may be getting a new business," says Shauna Helfert, Liquor Control Division Administrator. "This can only be good for the Main Streets in these communities."

The initial applications for the license are due by 5 p.m., September 2, 2014. Once we receive the application, we will review it to determine if the applicant is eligible for the license. If there is more than one eligible applicant for any of the licenses, we will hold a lottery drawing in Helena in mid-October for the license. Once the drawing is complete, we will notify the successful and unsuccessful applicants.

Lottery applications can be downloaded by visiting: revenue.mt.gov/home/liquor/liquor_lottery and clicking on "Forms."

An All-Beverages license allows an establishment to sell liquor, beer and table wine at retail for on- or off-premises consumption. A floater license allows the successful applicant to purchase a license from a license quota area over the quota limit and use that license in a town or county where the quota has been raised -- Billings, Broadwater County, and Jefferson County in this year's case. Montana law requires that the gambling allowance tied to an All-Beverages license be removed when it floats into another county. A floater All-Beverages license also can't be mortgaged, nor can it be transferred to another owner for five years.

There are currently 1453 All-Beverages licenses in Montana, 106 of which are currently in Billings, four in Broadwater County and 12 in Jefferson County.

The available beer licenses allow establishments to sell beer for on- or off- premises consumption. Licensees may add a wine amendment, allowing them to sell wine. There are currently 436 beer licenses in Montana, 55 of which are in Billings, six in Sidney, five in Dillon and one in Plains.

-Take advantage of opportunities of open houses to visit the school so the child knows their new environment.

-Be realistic and optimistic about your expectations for your child during the next school year.

-Start "practicing" the school year schedule by discussing it, planning and then implementing the hours a few weeks before school to ensure no one is tired the first few stressful days of school.

-Encourage your child to participate in a sport or extracurricular activities based on their interests, not your own.

-Help build your child's self-esteem by praising and encouraging and letting them know they are loved, valued and safe and that they matter. -When it comes to drugs, tobacco and alcohol, remind your child they are their own person and they make their own decisions and that you want them to make the best decision for themselves, not because others do it. This time of year is when your kids meet new friends and reconnect with old friends and peer pressure can be overwhelming.

These tips will help you keep the lines of communication open with your children and reassure them that they are not going to school without support and they have someone they can trust to talk to about their fears and anxiety. As with most things, planning, preparing and being able to discuss fears help people make good decisions and be more successful. (KNOW!, 2012)

Charley Jenkins Headlining Act for Roosevelt County Fair


Submitted by Angela Miller Charley Jenkins will perform at the Roosevelt County Fair Friday, Aug. 8 at 8 pm.

Menards to Build Large Home Improvement Store in Williston

A popular home improvement store has unveiled plans for a new store in Williston.

Menards officials submitted building plans for a new 209,630 square foot retail store on Tuesday, July 29, 2014.

"We literally just got the plans by UPS an hour ago," said Kelly Aberle, City of Williston Building Department, at 2:30 p.m. Menards will be located at the Sand Creek Town Centre, a regional shopping district located in west Williston. Sand Creek is being developed by the Granite Peak Development Company.

"This is a huge step for retail development in Williston," said Terry Metzler, Granite Peak Development. "We have had a lot of retailers waiting for Menards to pull the trigger and now we expect many of them to begin construction in the very near term." City officials said they were pleased with the progress that was being made by Menards.

"This is kind of like our field of dreams. If you build it they will come," said Williston Mayor Howard Klug. "Now we need

to support it."

Plans indicate the home improvement store will be approximately 209,630 square feet with an additional 72,596 square feet for a lumber yard and cold storage. The site will also include parking space for about 420 vehicles.

"I am just glad that retail in that area is developing," said Klug. "Construction on 32nd Avenue will be completed soon and that will provide good connectivity between the residential and retail developments in west Williston."

Aberle said it typically takes 4 to 6 weeks to process the building plans and permit application. In the meantime, she believes Menards has applied for a site grading permit and could begin moving dirt this summer.

"It's important that producers take a few minutes to cross check the information they receive with their own farm records. If the information is correct, no further action is needed at this time. But if our letter is incomplete or incorrect, producers need to contact their local FSA county office as soon as possible."

Verifying the accuracy of data on a farm's acreage history is an important step for producers enrolling in the upcoming Agriculture Risk Coverage (ARC) program and the Price Loss Coverage (PLC) program. Later this summer, farmers and ranchers will have an opportunity to update their crop yield information and reallocate base acres.

"We're working hard to prepare and educate farmers on the new programs created by the 2014 Farm Bill," added Garcia. "I encourage producers to bring their USDA notice to any scheduled appointments with the local FSA county office. This will help ensure they have the information they need with them to discuss the available program options."

By mid-winter all producers on a farm will be required to make a one-time, unanimous and irrevocable election between price protection and county revenue protection or individual revenue protection for 2014-2018 crop years. Producers can expect to sign contracts for ARC or PLC for the 2014 and 2015 crop years in early 2015.

Covered commodities include barley, canola, large and small chickpeas, corn, crambe, flaxseed, grain sorghum, lentils, mustard seed, oats, peanuts, dry peas, rapeseed, long grain rice, medium grain rice (includes short grain rice and temperate japonica rice), safflower seed, sesame, soybeans, sunflower seed, and wheat. Upland cotton is no longer a covered commodity.

Wolf Hunting Licenses Available

Montana's wolf hunting licenses will be available beginning Aug. 4 for the state's 2014-15 regulated wolf hunting season.

For the 2014-15 wolf seasons, hunters will have the opportunity to pursue wolves throughout Montana beginning Sept. 6 for archery hunting, Sept. 15 for the general rifle season and Dec. 15 for trapping.

Licenses will be valid within 18 specifically defined wolf management units. Hunters must obtain permission to hunt on private lands.

Wolf licenses will be available for purchase online at fwp.mt.gov, or from any FWP license provider. Hunters must have, or also purchase, a valid 2014 conservation license. Wolf hunting licenses are \$19 for residents and \$50 for nonresidents.

Hunters can purchase up to five wolf licenses. A trapping license, and the successful completion of a wolf trapping certification course, is needed to trap wolves in Montana.




