MDT Proposes Installing a Roundabout to MT 16 South of Sidney - Richland County

The Montana Department of Transportation (MDT) would like to notify the public and seek comments on a proposal to install a roundabout on MT 16 at its intersection with MT 200 and MT 23 south of Sidney, MT at reference post 50.0. The project limits will be established based on the geometry necessary for the development of the roadway transitions for each approach leg of the roundabout intersection.

Proposed work includes reconstructing the intersection to include a concrete roundabout to improve safety and promote positive traffic flow, curb and gutter, storm drain, intersection lighting, plant mix surfacing and a seal & cover (chip seal) on each of the 4 legs approaching the roundabout, upgraded pavement markings and signage. The roundabout will be designed to adequately accommodate trucks.

New right-of-way and relocation of utilities may be required. If new right-of-way and/or relocation of utilities are necessary, MDT staff will contact all affected landowners prior to doing survey work on their land. Staff will again contact landowners prior to construction regarding property acquisition and temporary construction permits.



The 2014 candidate debate forum was held Thursday October 23 at 6pm at the Richland County Extension Office. State candidates are incumbent Katherine M. Bidegaray and Janet Christoffersen running for District Court Judge and Rob Knotts (Democrat) and Scott Staffanson (Republican) running for State Representative District 35. Richland County candidates include Gail Staffanson (Republican) running unopposed for County Superintendent of Schools, Gregory P. Mohr running unopposed for Justice of Peace, John K. Dynneson (Republican) and Joe Renders (Democrat) running for Richland County Sherriff, Loren Young (Republican) running unopposed for County Commissioner, Margaret Gist (Republican) running unopposed for County Coroner, Mike Weber (Democrat) running unopposed for County Attorney, Stephanie Verhasselt (Republican) running unopposed for Clerk and Recorder and Sandra L. Christensen running unopposed for County Treasurer/Assessor.

The hour and a half long debate welcomed written questions from the attending community providing an opportunity for voters to get to know the candidates and have specific concerns addressed. A common theme throughout the debate was how the oilfield and the population increase directly and indirectly affected different aspects of the county including an increased need for officers, an increased workload in the judicial system, funding for the county, infrastructure and education.

Some of the topics covered were law enforcement being understaffed to which both Dynneson and Renders agreed there is a need for temporary housing to draw officers and their families to the area; a continued need for cost-effective officer training was also discussed.

Corn Advisory Committee to Hold Corn Check-Off Meeting

The newly formed Corn Advisory Committee will hold their first meeting on Wednesday, November 12, 2014 from 8:30 a.m. until 12:00 p.m. at the Billings Hotel and Convention Center in the Parlor Room 1010. The advisory committee, comprised of six members se-

lected by the director of Montana's Department of Agriculture, was formed at the request of state corn growers to assist the industry. Corn production value topped \$38 million in 2013 according to USDA National Agriculture Statics Service. *Corn Advisory Committee Members: Don Steinbeisser – Sidney, Don Fast - Glasgow, Jason Brewer - Forsyth, Kim Nile - Terry, Glenn Rohde – Glasgow. The committee will be electing a chair and vice chair in

addition to reviewing production numbers and ratifying corn rules. The meeting is open to the public and there will be a public comment period.

The Montana Department of Agriculture's mission is to protect producers and consumers, and to enhance and develop agriculture and allied industries.

The divvying up of school funds was addressed by Gail Staffanson and she explained that the needs of each school varied and so varied how they determined to spend allocated funds. For instance Lambert used funding to build housing for their teachers while Sidney doesn't have readily available access to land to do the same. The Common Core Curriculum was also brought up and Gail Staffanson clarified that this curriculum was only being used in math and reading in local schools and test scores in Montana are some of the best in the nation.


Kenneys are very family oriented and extend that to their employees. "I believe that if you take care of people, people will take care of you. They (the employees) are the reason we're going to be

and kinesiology.


This show is the most recent ongoing result of a large circle of friendship and caring for earth, for neighbors, and for saying what has been collected by experience over time.

2010-2014 Deer Population Information

Every five years, North Dakota Game and Fish Department biologists establish a benchmark for deer licenses in the state – a number that will guide management decisions for several years.

The five-year goal is an effort that involves biological information from deer surveys and hunter-harvest figures, plus observations and input from game wardens, hunters, landowners and others who have a stake in North Dakota deer management. For this 2010 five-year plan, Game and Fish presented draft goals at the spring advisory meetings, and made numerous changes based on public input received.

The new five-year goal is for a statewide deer population that would provide 124,800 deer gun licenses. Within this total, outlined in the information that follows, are license objectives for each of the 38 hunting units.


It is important to understand that unit and statewide goals will not necessarily match the number of licenses Game and Fish will issue each year. The goal is an ideal number given consistent winter weather and habitat conditions. As the variables change, however, the number of licenses will likely go up or down every year, based on whether harvest needs to increase or decrease to move toward the goal the following year.

For instance, the 2010 deer gun license allocation was about 116,000, with a major reduction in antlerless licenses from the previous year in most units, which will promote deer population growth in those units, at least until the number of licenses can increase to match unit goals. If the population gets too high, Game and Fish may have to greatly increase the number of licenses in order to move deer numbers back down toward the goal.

The new five-year goal is about a 25 percent increase over the goal established in 2005 of 100,000 licenses. Since that plan was developed, through input from hunters, landowners and others, Game and Fish wildlife managers determined that a somewhat higher deer population could still strike a balance between hunter interest, landowner tolerance and public acceptance.

Game and Fish welcomes input on this five-year plan, as preparations for the next plan in 2015 are already beginning. Verify Deer License

The North Dakota Game and Fish Department urges deer hunters to find their license and check it for accuracy.

Every year the Game and Fish Department's licensing section receives last-minute inquiries from hunters who can't find their license. When that happens, it's difficult to try to get a replacement license in time for the season opener.

Another reason to check the license now is to make sure the unit and species is what was intended.

Deer hunters in need of a replacement license can print out a duplicate (replacement) license application from the Game and Fish website, gf.nd.gov, or can call 701-328-6300 to have an application mailed or faxed.

The form must be completely filled out and notarized, and sent back in to the department with a fee.

Hunting from Duck Boats Requires Safety

Waterfowlers hunting from boats are encouraged to wear properly-fitted life jackets while on the water.

North Dakota Game and Fish Department boat and water safety coordinator Nancy Boldt said there are hunting jackets available with life jackets already built in.

"There are no excuses, they are light and comfortable to wear," Boldt said.

Eight people have drowned in state waters since 1998 while hunting from a boat, and none were wearing life jackets. Boldt wants to make sure a duck hunter doesn't become another statistic.

"Capsizing and falling overboard from small boats are the most common types of fatal boating accidents for hunters," Boldt added. "With all the gear in the boat, including dogs, it can quickly become unbalanced."

In addition, wearing a life jacket will not only keep the overboard hunter afloat, but also slow the loss of critical body heat caused by exposure to cold water. Motorists are reminded to watch for deer along roadways, especially this time of year, because juvenile animals are dispersing from their home ranges.

October through early December is the peak period for deer-vehicle accidents. Motorists are advised to slow down and exercise caution after dark to reduce the likelihood of encounters with deer along roadways. Most deer-vehicle accidents occur primarily at dawn and dusk when deer are most often moving around.

Motorists should be aware of warning signs signaling deer are in the area. When you see one deer cross the road, look for a second or third deer to follow. Also, pay attention on roadways posted with Deer Crossing Area caution signs.

Deer-vehicle accidents are at times unavoidable. If an accident does happen, motorists are reminded that a law passed by the 2013 state legislature eliminates the need for the driver involved in an accident to notify law enforcement authorities, if only the vehicle is damaged. Deer-vehicle accidents that involve injury or other property damage still must be reported.

In addition, a permit is still required to take parts or the whole carcass of a road-killed deer. Permits are free and available from game wardens and local law enforcement offices.

A few precautions can minimize chances of injury or property damage in a deer-vehicle crash.

Always wear your seat belt.

Don't swerve or take the ditch to avoid hitting a deer. Try to brake as much as possible and stay on the roadway. Don't lose control of your vehicle or slam into something else to miss the deer. You risk less injury by hitting the deer.

If you spot deer ahead, slow down immediately and honk your horn.


The deadline is months away, but now is the time to frame the perfect photograph for a contest that will determine the cover of the 2015 Private Land Open To Sportsmen guide.

Influenza Update – 2014

Now that Ebola is on everybody's mind, influenza seems like a boring topic. When I was at a "Harvard Hospital Medicine" review course a few weeks ago, the speaker commented that it is too bad that one person in this country has died from Ebola, but it is important that we deal with the continuing threat we face every year from influenza. About 50,000 people in the US (and ½ million worldwide) die from influenza every year. Influenza is not "just the flu." It is a big deal, I tell my patients, and it is something that is largely preventable. Influenza and Pneumonia are, in fact, officially listed as the 5th leading cause of death in our country.

The CDC recommends that everyone aged 6 months and older have a yearly flu vaccine. One change for this year is the recommendation to use the intranasal vaccine for healthy children aged 2 to 8 years of age. It works better for this age group, but the shot still works for these children – and in some cases the intranasal vaccine is not recommended. Consult your child's health care provider for details.

Vaccination is especially important for people aged 65 years or older because they are at increased risk for complications from flu. Regardless of your age or state of health, though, you should get a yearly flu shot. Of course we don't want you to get sick, but if you do get the flu, you could pass this deadly disease to your aging mother or asthmatic neighbor – which is a big reason why everyone should get vaccinated.

For people aged 65 years or older, there are now two flu injections to choose from: a "regular dose" flu shot and a new "high dose" flu shot. This shot ("Fluzone High Dose") contains four times the amount of antigen contained in regular flu injections, and confers better immunity than the standard dose vaccine. In the absence of widespread availability of this more expensive agent, the CDC has not made strong recommendations for this vaccine over the standard dose

There is also a new quadrivalent influenza vaccine, which contains antigenic components of two "A" strains and

two "B" strains. Epidemics of influenza B occur every 2 to 4 years in all age groups, and is a common cause of influenza problems in children. The most important thing is not which flu shot you get - but that you get one! And this is the ideal time to get your yearly influenza vaccine. Many people tell me that the flu is "no big deal," and they "only get the flu" when they get the flu

shot. These are just a few of the many misconceptions that surround this disease. Influenza, for example, is far different from the "common cold." Colds come on gradually, are usually mild, cause a scratchy throat, may be associated with a runny nose, and resolve in 3-4 days without any treatment. Influenza, on the other hand, usually has an abrupt onset, sore throat, cough, wheezing, has a high fever, severe headache, and is accompanied by diffuse aches and pains. Vomiting and diarrhea is not a part of true

The flu shot is 70-90% effective in building up your body's antibody level to prevent influenza infection. It is your body's ability to mount an immune response that can cause mild pain at the injection site and a low-grade fever. You can also get a runny nose and mild "flu like" illness. That is a lot better than having a 106 degree fever and influenza-related pneumonia! And concerns about Guillain Barré syndrome from flu vaccines are grossly distorted. Flu vaccine related Guillain Barré syndrome (ascending paralysis, generally reversible) affects about 1 out of a million vaccine recipients, compared to 17 out of a million influenza-infected patients.

If you forget to get the flu shot, or if you think you have the flu despite being vaccinated, then you should



notify your health care provider. A reasonably accurate diagnosis can usually be made over the telephone. Most of the time the best thing to do is to stay at home, get plenty of rest, drink lots of fluids, and avoid spreading the infection to others in your school or workplace. Sometimes your health care provider may order a rapid influenza test. Although the reliability of these tests is not perfect, they can help tell us what is going through the community. There are antiviral drugs (Tamiflu and Relenza) that can lessen the severity and duration of an influenza infection. These medications are most effective if started within 48 hours of the onset of symptoms. If you are "really sick" with influenza related disease (pneumonia, dehydration, delirium, etc.) you should be hospitalized for intravenous fluids, antibiotics, and breathing treatments.

This has been a brief summary of "recent updates" for the 2014-2015 influenza season. Contact your health care provider for more information. The disease has been around for a long time. It may not be as exciting as Ebola, MERS, SARS, and some of the other things we have been hearing about lately – but it is still a killer. And it is something we can prevent! So head down to your local clinic, health department, workplace, or pharmacy to get your yearly flueshot



The Montana Department of Transportation (MDT) would like to notify the public and seek comments on a proposal to add a left-turn lane to the intersection of MT 16 and Marshall Street in Crane, MT. at reference post 41.8. The project limits will be established based on the geometry necessary for the development of the left-turn lane.

Proposed work includes roadway widening for the leftturn lane, milling the existing surface, applying a new overlay, installing rumble strips and finishing with a seal & cover (chip seal), upgraded pavement markings and signage.

The project will be scheduled for construction on completion of all project development activities and availability of funding.

New right-of-way and relocation of utilities may be required. If new right-of-way and/or relocation of utilities are necessary, MDT staff will contact all affected landowners prior to doing survey work on their land. Staff will again contact landowners prior to construction regarding property acquisition and temporary construction permits.

Hunters Reminded to Have Horses Inspected

The Montana Department of Livestock is reminding hunters that horses are required to have a brand inspection before crossing county lines.

According to Montana Code 81-3-211 (2), it is "unlawful to remove or cause to be removed...any livestock... unless the livestock have been inspected for brands by a state stock inspector or deputy state stock inspector and a certificate of the inspection has been issued...for the purpose of the transportation."

"It's a pretty common violation during hunting season," said John Grainger, Brands Enforcement Division administrator for the Montana Department of Livestock. "Producers move livestock all the time and are generally familiar with transportation requirements, but sometimes hunters just don't know."

The fine for not having a proper inspection is \$135, he said.

Grainger recommends that hunters get their horses inspected in advance of their planned departure.

"The inspection is good for a year of movement, or you can get a lifetime, so there's no good reason to wait until the last minute," he said. "If you hunt on horses, just add getting a brand inspection to your check list."

An annual inspection costs \$6, and a lifetime is \$25. A map of brand inspectors by county can be found on the department's web site; annual and lifetime inspections can also be issued at livestock markets (marked in blue on the map).

Gardeners – Know Your

As a young boy I remember Dad and Grandpa talking about how valuable manure was to plant growth. I didn't recall any of the specifics and maybe they really didn't know either. However, I do recall strips in the fields which looked better than other areas. My mother insisted that we apply manure to her garden area.

Since then I have learned that manure provides valuable nutrients such as nitrogen which enhances plant growth. It also serves to build organic matter levels of the soil which then contributes to the soil's ability to hold more water.

Although manure has been viewed as a very safe additive to the soil there is a slight possibility that modern-day manure can pose some problems for gardeners. The reason I mention this is because some farmers spray their pastures and hayland with pyridine herbicides to control broadleaf weeds. These herbicides include Crossbow, Curtail, Forefront, Grazon, Milestone, Redeem and Surmount.

Manure from livestock feeding on pyridine-treated hay or pasture grass should not be used in gardens. The reason being is that the herbicide can pass through the animal without decomposing. It is then likely these herbicides will remain in the soil and negatively react or even kill several of the vegetables such as tomatoes, potatoes, peas and beans. These are extremely sensitive to the listed herbicides. Affected plants will stretch and curl, similar to damage caused by dandelion killers that drift onto plants. Pyridine products can persist in manure for a few years. So, if you are using manure, ask the farmer if he or she has applied any of the products listed above to their

forage crops. The use of these products is not widespread so

Sweetclover Hay Alert

This summer was a good year for sweetclover. It could be found everywhere. Because it produces a lot of tonnage and can be very good winter forage for cattle, sheep and goats, it is very tempting to cut and bale it into hay. As with a lot of things in life, there are pluses and minuses. The most negative issue for sweetclover used as hay is its thick stems which require more time to dry-down before it can be safely baled. If harvested with too much moisture the hay can become moldy. The problem with sweetclover is that it contains a high level of a unique naturally reoccurring chemical known as coumarin to be converted to dicoumarol which is a potent anticoagulant. Dicoumarol also interferes with the metabolism of vitamin K which the body needs

slightest amount of mold I would urge it be tested for dicoumarol levels. This can be done by the NDSU Veterinary Diagnostic Laboratory. For information on submitting hay samples call this office at 701-577-4595. With the value of beef as it is, there is absolutely no reason to risk even one animal.

SCAM ALERT

The Montana Department of Justice Issues Two Separate Phone Scam Alerts

The Office of Consumer Protection at the Montana Department of Justice wants to alert the public to two different phone scams happening in Montana and other parts of the country: DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS ARREST WARRANT

SCAM: Citizens are receiving calls from scammers telling them that the Department of Corrections has issued an arrest warrant for them, and that they will go to jail if they don't call the number provided. Callers are telling prospective victims that they will text them payment directions and that the victims owe several hundreds of dollars. The caller goes on to threaten prospective victims with jail by the end of the business day if they do not pay. The scammers use extremely aggressive tactics, including telling prospective victims that the phone call is being recorded, as well as stating that the arrest warrants are ready to be forwarded and if they don't follow the texted directions to their phone number on how to pay, that they will go to jail.

WHAT TO DO:

If you or a family member receives one of these calls, your best bet is to hang up.

But if you do get into a conversation, don't give anyone money or credit/debit card information over the phone, and don't trust callers who use threats or insults to bully you. Don't be pressured into mailing Green Dot cards or giving out personal

IRS SCAM:

This scam has been called the largest of its kind, and has targeted taxpayers across the country. Victims have reported

What makes this scam so tricky? The scammers impersonate Internal Revenue Service (IRS) agents and demand payment for taxes owed, and often:

- Know the last four digits of the victim's Social Security
 - * Make caller ID appear as if the IRS is calling;
- * Send follow-up bogus IRS emails to support their scam Scammers often claim to be government officials from other agencies threatening arrest and attempt to scare you into releasing financial information.

WHAT TO DO:

Know that the IRS usually contacts people by mail, not by phone, about unpaid taxes.

The IRS won't ask for payment using a pre-paid debit card or wire transfer, nor will they involve law enforcement or immigration agencies. If you or a family member receives one of these calls, your best bet is to hang up. But if you do get into a conversation, don't give anyone money or credit card information over the phone and don't trust callers who use threats or insults to bully you.

NEXT STEPS:

Report the incident to the Treasury Inspector General for Tax Administration at 1-800-366-4484. You may also file a complaint with the Federal Trade Commission at www.ftc.gov<http:// www.ftc.gov>. Add "IRS Telephone Scam" to the comments in your complaint.


