Williston **Injury** Crash **June 21**

On June 21 at approximately 9:22 p.m. there was a vehicle crash on the intersection of Hwy 2 and 34th St W (Hwy 2 near mile marker 21) in the city of Williston.

A 2020 GMC Sierra was traveling northbound on Highway 2 near mile marker 21. A 2006 Dodge Durango was traveling east along 34th St. W. The Dodge entered the intersection of Highway 2 and 34th St. W, traveling east across Highway 2. The Dodge failed to yield the right of way to the GMC. The Dodge struck the GMC on the driver side causing the GMC to roll. The GMC came to rest in the east ditch on its wheels. The Durango came to rest in the intersection of the northbound lanes of Hwy 2 and 34th St. W.

The driver of the GMC was ejected from the vehicle and was transported by ambulance to CHI St. Alexius, Williston. He was a 43-yearold male, Rapid City, SD, and had serious injuries. The driver and the passenger of the Dodge were also transported by ambulance to CHI St. Alexius. The driver of the Dodge a 20-year-old male had non-life threatening Injuries and the passenger a 19-year-old female had minor injuries. 
Plant Society Get Together An Interesting Educational Opportunity

On the summer solstice, June 21, Maka Flora, the eastern Montana chapter of the Montana Native Plant Society had their second plant hike for June. It was a family-friendly get together of eastern Montana native plant enthusiasts in the great outdoors.

It started with a BBQ at 6 p.m. MT at Sather Lake. Fraser Watson, Maka Flora chapter president, mingled with his fellow members, their family, and friends. Between 20 and 30 different people showed from all across eastern Montana, as far as Sheridan WY, and even Canada. After some food and reconnecting, the group went on the plant hike. During the walk, they observed and documented the plant communities around Sather Lake in the little Missouri National Grasslands. They mostly used the iNaturalist citizen science app, inaturalist.org. Maka Flora tries to do a plant hike twice a month while the plants are alive and active. The first meeting for June was held at Medicine Rocks state park south of Baker and the next one is scheduled for July 16 at 10 a.m. in Medicine Lake. Frasier does not insist that those wishing to attend the chapter's plant hikes be members of the society. The Montana Native Plant Society is a volunteer non-profit organization chartered in 1987. Today, they have more than 800 members. According to their flyer, the goals of the Montana Native Plant Society are to preserve, conserve, and study the native plants and plant communities of Montana, as well as inform the public about the value of native flora. Flooding Creates Potential Human Health & Recreational Risks In Rivers Across MT

State Agencies Advise Recreators to Avoid Flood Events

Helena -River recreators should avoid contact with water during and for at least two weeks after flood events. Floodwaters have already impacted communities in the Yellowstone River basin, and more flooding is anticipated elsewhere

in the state, such as in the Flathead River basin and Missoula County. Floodwaters can carry potentially dangerous debris and may contain chemicals and bacteria from damaged or overwhelmed wastewater treatment facilities and flooded homes, businesses, and agricultural fields.

Montana Fish, Wildlife

and Parks has issued closures for Fishing Access Sites along the Stillwater, Yellowstone, Madison, and Gallatin Rivers due to safety hazards related to collapsing banks, debris jams, and exposed or submerged infrastructure (mvfwp.mt.gov/ fwpPub/allRestrictions). Sites are being reopened

site conditions and safety concerns allow.

"It's likely more floating and boating hazards will emerge as waters recede," said Hope Stockwell, Parks and Outdoor Recreation Division Administrator. "We're opening sites as quickly as possible, but boaters and other recreators should still use an abundance of caution when on the water."

Recreationists should also be aware that rivers and creeks could be contaminated with harmful bacteria. This is especially true downstream of communities where widespread flooding occurred because water treatment systems may take time to return to normal operation even after floodwaters recede.

The Department of Environmental Quality monitors water quality across the state and will conduct additional floodwater monitoring in areas where monitoring projects are already ongoing, such as the Yellowstone River basins. While this may help identify contamination, sampling will not determine the source of contaminants - whether it is from overwhelmed water treatment facilities or general runoff from other dispersed sources.

"Even during moderate rain events, it's common to find high levels of E. coli bacteria in rivers and creeks," said Darrin Kron, DEQ Water Quality Monitoring and Assessment Section Supervisor. "With historic rain and flood events occurring in parts of Montana, people should take extra precautions and avoid drinking, fishing, and swimming in rivers after flooding."

Where public drinking water supplies are of concern, DEQ works with municipalities and certified operators to inform residents of boil orders and advisories and to ensure the safety of

water systems when they return to service. Public water systems that experience or anticipate issues related to flooding should contact DEQ for support and guidance. The public can find additional flood-related resources on the DEQ Flooding Resources web page.

"Our technical assistance staff are proactively communicating with wastewater treatment operators." said Jon Kenning, DEQ Water Protection Bureau Chief. "Most facilities are currently operating as normal, though the main issue is poor treatment capabilities where facilities are dealing with high inflows."

According to the Montana Department of Public Health and Human Services (DPHHS), ingesting floodwater that contains even small amounts of bacteria (such as E. coli) can lead to diarrhea, abdominal cramps, and sometimes vomiting or

"Residents should only use water from a safe source for drinking and washing or preparing food," said Magdelena Scott, DPHHS Communicable Disease and Epidemiology Section. "Additionally, exposure to contaminated floodwater can cause wound infections, skin rash, or tetanus. The best way to protect yourself is to stay out of floodwater. If you do come into contact with potentially contaminated water, wash the area with soap and water as soon as possible, take care of wounds and seek medical attention if necessary. Wash contaminated clothes with hot water and detergent before wearing them again."

The DPHHS Environmental Laboratory is available to conduct water testing for communities as needed. For more information, contact the laboratory at 800-821-7284.

DPHHS has also created a Flood Cleanup Health Tips brochure. The document provides information related to disinfecting water, food safety, health and hygiene, and mosquito and vector control.

DPHHS encourages Montanans to utilize local county and Tribal health department officials as a resource for health questions specific each jurisdiction.

Keeping Your Finances In Check mation and resources on estate By Carrie Krug,

Managing our money and keeping our finances in check might feel overwhelming at times. Keeping track of your finances is an important part of reaching your financial goals. The Harvard Medical School has identified a key factor in people's success in reaching their goals by shifting their thinking to a more positive approach. An example of this is mentioned by Melanie Dabb, Utah State University Extension Assistant Professor, in the article Tips for Sticking to Your Financial Goals and Budget (2022); instead of saying I have no money to save, start saving I will save a little here and there.

Another tip, is setting a self-motivating goal. When you take the time to identify why you create your budget and the goals you are trying to reach, it will help you stick to your plan and keep you working towards your important financial goals.

Try writing your goals out MART goals. When writing SMART goals keep them Specific, Measurable, Achievable, Relevant, and Time-Bound (SMART). Dabb has provided some more information on how to write a SMART goal:

· Specific: set goals that are specific. Instead of saying I want to save money, say I will set aside \$20 from every paycheck for savings.

 Measurable: you need to be able to measure your goal to evaluate if you are meeting your goal or not. An example of this could be I want to get \$2000 built up in my savings account, and you can measure this by the amount you have saved in your savings account.

 Achievable: this step is important because, in order to achieve your goals, it needs to be something you can realisti-

 Relevant: your goal has to be important to you and your well-being to help you achieve your goal.

 Time-Bound: by putting a time frame on our goals, we are more likely to achieve our goals; remember to make your time frame realistic for you and something you can manage.

· SMART Goal Example: I will set up an automatic withdrawal to have \$50 from every paycheck put into my savings account before my next paycheck.

Dabb also has some last tips for helping you stick to your budget, identifying your triggers and barriers that lead to spending more money than your budget allows, and keeps you from reaching your goals. Doing this will make it easier for you when you are tempted to throw your budget and goals out the window. By creating your own financial SMART goals, you are one step on the road to helping you on your financial well-being journey. 

Food that may be sold at the market includes, but is not limited to, baked goods including breads, pastries, cookies, and pies, cereals, trail mixes, granola, snack mixes, dried and freezedried products, jams, jellies, fruit butters, canned fruits and vegetables, dried herbs, seasonings, honey, whole shell eggs, and others. Items that are prohibited at the market include meat products, alcohol infused products, and any products containing marijuana, THC, or CBD. Individuals selling food products must fill out an application that is then

reviewed by the Richland County Sanitarian. If you are interested in becoming a vendor at the market or if you have any questions pertaining to the market, please reach out to the MSU Richland County Extension Office at 406-433-1206.

Cost Of July 4th Cookout 17% Higher Compared To Year Ago

Washington, D.C. – U.S. consumers will pay \$69.68 for their favorite Independence Day cookout foods, including cheeseburgers, pork chops, chicken breasts, homemade potato salad, strawberries and ice cream, based on a new American Farm Bureau Federation marketbasket survey.

The average cost of a summer cookout for 10 people is \$69.68, which breaks down to less than \$7 per person. The overall cost for the cookout is up 17% or about \$10 from last year, a result of ongoing supply chain disruptions, inflation and the war in Ukraine.

Farmers are feeling the price-point pain too, like the people they grow food for, according to AFBF Chief Economist Roger Cryan.

"Despite higher food prices, the supply chain disruptions and inflation have made farm supplies more expensive; like consumers, farmers are price-takers not price-makers," Cryan said. He added, "Bottom line, in many cases the higher prices farmers are being paid aren't covering the increase in their farm expenses. The cost of fuel is up and fertilizer prices have tripled."

Cryan also pointed to the cascading effects of the war in Ukraine, as that country's contributions to global food security are cut off, Russian and Belarusian fertilizer exports are constrained, and some other countries pull back exports to protect their domestic supplies.

The marketbasket survey shows the largest yearto-year price increase was for ground beef. Survey results showed the retail price for 2 lbs. of ground beef at \$11.12, up 36% from last year. Meanwhile, the Agriculture Department's Producer Price Index indicates that compared to a year ago, farm-level cattle prices are up 17.5%, but wholesale beef prices are down 14%. This serves to highlight the differences between farm-level, wholesale and retail beef prices and how the events of the last few years have had significant impacts on the beef production and cattle pricing cycles, making them all hard to predict.

Several other foods in the survey, including chicken breasts, pork chops, homemade potato salad, freshsqueezed lemonade, pork & beans, hamburger buns and cookies, also increased in price.

One bright spot for consumers is the average retail price for strawberries, which declined by 86¢ compared to a year ago. Sliced cheese and potato chips also dropped in price, 48¢ and 22¢, respectively. Better weather conditions in some fruit-growing regions and

greater retailer pricing flexibility for processed products are the likely drivers behind the modest price declines for these items.

The year-to-year direction of the marketbasket survey tracks with the federal government's Consumer Price Index report for food at home and general inflation across the economy. Both the index and the marketbasket show increases of more than 10% compared to year-ago levels.

"According to the Agriculture Department's revised Food Dollar Series, farmers currently receive approximately 8% of every food marketing dollar," Cryan said. "The farmers' share of the retail food dollar is as low as 2% to 4% for highly processed foods such as bread and cereal, and can be 35% or more for some fresh products."

Commenting on big picture concerns related to food security, AFBF President Zippy Duvall said: "The increased cost of food and supplies is a very real concern in our country and across the globe. U.S. food assistance programs and food banks help those who struggle to make ends meet here at home, but the story is much different around the globe as food insecurity skyrockets. The big impact of a single event in Ukraine shows how dependent the world is on stable, productive agriculture.
