# USDA Expands Partnerships Writing a Will

# For Conservation Through Its Conservation Reserve **Enhancement Program**

Washington - Dec. 20 - The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) is leveraging its authorities under the Conservation Reserve Enhancement Program (CREP) to bring in new types of partners and ultimately expand opportunities in voluntary conservation for the Nation's agricultural producers and private landowners. In direct response to feedback from state agencies, Tribes, non-profits and other groups, USDA has updated CREP's rule regarding matching fund requirements, and invested

in additional staff to work

directly with partners for

streamlined, partner-driven

conservation efforts. CREP is part of the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) and enables USDA's Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC), through Farm Service Agency (FSA), and partners to co-invest in partner-led projects. CREP also plays an important role in USDA's broader climate change strategy, bringing together producers, landowners and partners for climate-smart land management.

"CREP is one of the most flexible tools we have for locally-driven, partner-led efforts to reward producers and drive important environmental and climate outcomes, said FSAAdministrator Zach Ducheneaux. "We look forward to working with new, diverse partners who can shape CRP to address priorities most important to them and to local communities, from water quality and conservation to wildlife habitat and climate outcomes. The CREP changes in this rule will remove barriers and provide partners with increased flexibility to participate in this powerful program."

#### **Matching Funds**

A Dec. 6, 2019, rule required that 50% of matching funds from partners be in the form of direct payments, which made it more difficult for diverse types of groups to participate as partners in CREP. With this rule change, partners can now provide their negotiated level of matching funds in the form of cash, in-kind contributions, or technical assistance. This change allows for greater flexibility and opportunity for additional partners to participate in the program.

This change was enacted through a Dec. 13, 2021 rule in the Federal Register.

The rule also updated policy to now provide a full annual rental rate to producers who are impacted by state, Tribal or local laws, ordinances and regulations that require a resource conserving or environmental protection measure. The previous rule reduced the rental payment made to producers who were covered by such laws.

#### **Additional Capacity to Support Partners and Producers**

In order to implement these changes, FSA has hired three new CREP staff members, using a regional approach to work closely with potential and existing partners and expand program availability. The team members include:

· Evelyn Whitesides, focusing on Alabama, Connecticut, Delaware, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky Maine, Maryland, Massachusetts, Mississippi, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York, North Carolina, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, South Carolina, Tennessee, Vermont, Virginia, West Virginia and Caribbean Region (Puerto Rico and Virgin

ing on Arkansas, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Louisiana, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, Nebraska, North Dakota, Oklahoma, South Dakota, Texas and Wisconsin.

· Patrick Lewis, focusing on Alaska, Arizona, California, Colorado, Hawaii, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, New Mexico, Oregon, Pacific Basin, Utah, Washington and Wyoming.

"We want to build capacity so that we can better reach partners, including those who we may not have worked with before," Ducheneaux said. "We're taking action to reduce barriers to access and opportunity for historically underserved producers and landowners, and by engaging more partners, we're working with groups that provide a direct link to these communities."

These investments in CREP staffing build on other recent outreach and education efforts by FSA, including a \$4.7 million investment announced this year to establish partnerships with organizations to provide outreach and technical assistance to historically underserved farmers and ranchers on a variety of CCC and FSA programs, including conservation programs.

Currently, all CREP partners are states; however, FSA is strongly encouraging tribes and non-governmental organizations to consider partnerships. This program is a great vehicle for their conservation-focused efforts.

Happy New Year! We have made it to 2022 and have experienced many changes over the past couple of years. As the year 2021 draws to a close, many people might be thinking about some New Year's Resolutions for 2022. Carrie Krug, MSU Extension Richland County FCS Agent, has a suggestion for a new resolution for you: How about writing a will or making sure your current will is up to date? Did you know that seven out of ten Americans do not have a written will says Marsha Goetting, MSU Extension Family Economics

A will is a document explaining how an individual wants their property distributed after death. It is the guide the district court will use to distribute the estate. Making a will allows the individual power to decide who receives their property,

how much people receive, when they shall receive ownership of it, and what they can do with it. Plus. a will does not go into effect while the person is alive; it can only be validated upon a person's death.

In Montana, you can make your own will. The will must all be in your own handwriting (also called a holographic will). However, holographic wills can increase cost and trouble for heirs. Sometimes words used throughout the will are not interpreted by the district court as the individual had intended.

One question some individuals often asked about wills: what is the cost? Attorney fees vary depending on the complexity of the will and size of an estate. Do not be afraid to ask attorneys for an estimate for their services in preparing a will (preferably at their first meeting).

For those of you who already have a will, keep in mind it's important to review your will as changes can occur in families (birth in the family, death of a family

member, moving, buying/ selling property, etc.). If an individual remains competent, they can change or revoke their will. One-way to do this is to revoke their will entirely and create a new one. Second, a will can be changed by making a codicil (supplement) and must be executed (signed and witnessed).

So, as we begin a new year, try a New Year's resolution by checking your will and making sure it is up to date for your current situation. If you do not currently have a will, make your resolution to write a will.


He married Adell Mjelstad on June 2, 1969 in Alexander at Trinity Lutheran Church. Ron "Ronnie"



# Farmers Should Make ARC-PLC Election Decisions by March 15

NDSU Extension has developed an online tool to aid producers in making this decision.

Farmers can elect coverage and enroll in cropby-crop Agricultural Risk Coverage-County (ARC-CO) or Price Loss Coverage (PLC) programs within each Farm Service Agency (FSA) farm unit, or ARC-Individual for the entire farm, for the 2022 crop year, says Ron Haugen, North Dakota State University (NDSU) Extension farm management specialist.

Although election changes for 2022 are optional, enrollment by signed contract is required for each year of the program.

This is an annual decision that farmers need to make, Haugen says.

If an election is not submitted by the deadline of March 15, the election defaults to the current election for crops on the farm from the prior crop year.

ARC provides income support payments on historical base acres when actual crop revenue declines below a specified guaranteed level. PLC provides income support payments on historical base acres when the national marketing year average price for a covered commodity falls below its effective reference price.

Covered commodities include barley, canola, large and small chickpeas, corn, crambe, flaxseed, grain sorghum, lentils, mustard seed, oats, peanuts, dry peas, rapeseed, long grain rice, medium and short grain rice, safflower seed, seed cotton, sesame, soybeans, sunflower seed and wheat.

# Sidney Mayor Sends Letter To Senator Tester

Dear Senator Tester,

While we may not have mountains on this side of the Continental Divide, eastern Montana is home to expansive plains and extensive history. Our area is also rich in natural resources, including an abundance of oil and gas provided by the Bakken Oil Field, which has provided us with energy and millions in revenue for the past few yeas and the next generations to

Our economy has boomed since the discovery of the Bakken formation, which is the largest oil discovery in U.S. history. Eastern Montana's stores, schools, and communities have grown and developed alongside the edges of the formation, leading to economic prosperity across the state. Now, even without the Bakken formation, eastern Montana's communities continue to grow and prosper. But all of that could change should certain lawmakers have their way.

In a bid to help fund President Biden's Build Back Better plan; some policymakers hope to raise corporate income taxes on American businesses. While the proponents of this legislative push

might think that only large, wealthy corporations would pay these tax increases, they would in fact impact businesses of all sizes. Seeing as how many of our state's small businesses are contending with pandemic-induced challenges like labor shortages and supply chain issues, a higher tax burden could spell the end for some of eastern Montana's Main Street en-

One tax increase under consideration would apply to the Global Intangible Low Tax Income (GILTI) rate, which applies a fee to the earnings made abroad by American companies. Currently, we are

the only nation to apply such a fee to domestic businesses, and it already puts them at a competitive disadvantage. If we are to increase this fee, it would only add to the obstacles that many businesses face in utilizing supply chains and sourcing products from abroad. Given that many of eastern Montana's businesses are involved in global supply chains, they would be unduly impacted by this tax hike.

Other countries are considering their own version of GILTI through a global minimum tax, which would go into effect in 2023, but it will not be until at least 2024

whether we know if this fee has actually been enacted, and on what scale. In the meantime, if we proactively raise GILTI before this other global tax plays out, we risk putting U.S. businesses at a further competitive disadvantage than they already are, allowing China and other rivals to take advantage.

I hope that you will say NO to tax increases like GILTI that would harm eastern Montana's businesses and American competitiveness at large.

# Cookin

As temperatures are dropping, it can be nice to come home to a home cooked meal that you put little effort into. This is where a slow cooker comes to the rescue. From dinners, desserts, breakfast, and more, the slow cooker can help you create delicious dishes that save you time to do other things throughout the day. Plus, some of your favorite recipes you bake in the oven or simmer on the stove might be able to be cooked in a

slow cooker. According to Siew Guan Lee, Susan Ettesvold, and Cammie Jayo, University of Idaho Extension in their article, "Slow Cooking from Start to Finish" (2020), they have suggested time conversions for these recipes. Such as if the recipe takes 15-30 minutes in the oven or on the stovetop, it might take 4-6 hours on a low setting or 1.5-2 hours on a high setting for your slow cooker. For 35-45 minutes in the oven or on the stovetop. it might take 6-10 hours on a low setting or 3-4 hours on

a high setting. Then for 50 minutes-3 hours in the oven or on the stovetop, it might take 8-16 hours on low or 4-6 hours on high. As noted by Guan Lee, Ettesvold, and Jayo (2020), these are estimated times and will vary depending on the brand of your slow cooker.

Another thing to note is if you are taking one of your favorite recipes and trying to make it in your slow cooker; according to Julie Garden-Robinson, and Kendra Otto for North Dakota State University Extension in Slow Cooker Meals! (2021): when slow cooking, recipes do not boil away, and for most cases, you can reduce liquids by a third to half, then for soups, this will not matter. Another suggestion from Garden-Robinson and Otto (2021), is when a recipe calls for pasta, add it near the end of the cooking process to help keep it from becoming mushy or cook it separately and add it just before you are ready to serve. Garden-Robinson and Otto (2021) also suggest waiting to add milk, cheese, and cream till an hour before you are ready to serve. One last suggestion from Guan Lee, Ettesvold, and Jayo (2020) is if your original non-slow

cooker recipe does not have a liquid or sauce is to add half a cup of water to help create steam for the cooking process.

The slow cooker is more of a convenient, timesaving kitchen tool that is found in some households. However, even if you do not have a slow cooker at home, you can still use your other appliances to make the same dishes. So next time you are short on time and want to make one of your favorite recipes or try something new, reach for your slow cooker to help you save some time while making dinner.

# Select Energy Services To Acquire **Nuverra Environmental Solutions**

Closes On The Acquisition Of The U.S. Onshore Assets Of HB Rentals

HOUSTON, Dec. 13, 2021 /PRNewswire/ -- Select Energy Services, Inc. (NYSE: WTTR) ("Select" or "the Company"), a leading provider of sustainable full life cycle water and chemical solutions to the U.S. unconventional oil and gas industry, has announced that it has entered into an agreement to acquire Nuverra Environmental Solutions, Inc. (NYSE American: NES) ("Nuverra") for total consideration of approximately \$45 million, including the assumption of approximately \$20 million of long-term debt, net of cash. Under the terms of the agreement, Nuverra stockholders will receive approximately 4.2 million shares of Select Class A common stock in exchange for all outstanding shares of Nuverra.

The transaction was unanimously approved by each of Select's and Nuverra's board of directors and is expected to close in the first quarter of 2022, subject to customary closing conditions and the approval of Nuverra's stockholders. Additionally, Select has entered into a support agreement with holders of Nuverra stock who collectively represent approximately 85% of the outstanding voting shares of Nuverra

to approve the transaction.

Nuverra is an energy-focused environmental solutions company, providing comprehensive, full-cycle environmental solutions, including the removal, treatment, recycling, transportation and disposal of restricted solids, fluids and hydrocarbons for exploration and production companies operating across the United States, including in the Bakken, Haynesville, Marcellus and Utica Shales.

Additionally, Select announced that on Dec. 3, 2021, it closed on the acquisition of the U.S. onshore rentals and accommodations operations of HB Rentals, L.C. ("HB"), a subsidiary of Superior Energy Services, Inc. ("Superior"). In consideration for this acquisition, Select issued 1.2 million shares of Class A common stock and paid \$1.5 million in cash, subject to standard post-closing adjustments, to Superior to close the transaction. With current operations in the Permian, Haynesville, MidContinent, Northeast and Rockies regions, HB operates as a leading rentals and accommodations company with a footprint across the United States. Going forward, the Company expects to operate the

HB assets within its Peak rentals and accommodations business within the Water Services segment.

John Schmitz, Select's chairman, president and CEO, stated, "We are excited to further expand Select's world-class sustainable water services and infrastructure tootprint through yet another attractive set of consolidation opportunities. These acquisitions represent a continuation of our strategic effort to improve and bolster our base business, advance our technology and diversification efforts, and execute on strategic consolidation opportunities. The Nuverra acquisition will strengthen our geographic footprint with a unique set of water logistics and infrastructure assets, particularly in the Bakken, Haynesville and Northeast, while continuing to expand our production related revenues. Additionally, the acquisition of HB's onshore operations will add significant asset and regional breadth to our market leading rentals and accommodations business unit within our Water Services segment.

"With the Nuverra transaction, we will be adding more than 300,000 barrels per day of permitted daily disposal capacity in Texas, Louisiana, North Dakota, Montana and Ohio. When combined with our existing assets and other recent acquisitions, this brings our company-wide permitted daily disposal capacity to approximately 2.5 million barrels per day. Nuverra also owns and operates a 60-mile underground twin pipeline network in the Havnesville Shale in Texas and Louisiana for the collection of produced water for transport to interconnected disposal wells and the delivery or re-delivery of water from water sources to operator locations for use in well completion activities. More than 60% of Nuverra's disposal volumes in the Haynesville are currently delivered via the pipeline network, with the ability to handle disposal volumes of more than 100,000 barrels per day. Additionally, Nuverra operates a landfill facility in North Dakota located on a 50-acre site. The facility provides a unique opportunity for Select to expand its capabilities into a new service offering. With current remaining available permitted capacity of approximately 1.3 million cubic yards, we believe the facility has the potential to be expanded up

to a total of 5.8 million cubic

yards of available capacity

with additional permitting. "Importantly, the Nuverra acquisition continues to build upon our recent M&A strategy, as seen with the acquisitions of Complete and Agua Libre, of consolidating sizable existing infrastructure portfolios that provide us with a significant footprint of recurring produced water volumes and meaningful optionality for incremental gathering and recycling infrastructure development across larger networked systems. Supported by our strong technology platform and our market leading position in sustainable full life cycle water and chemicals solutions, our FluidMatch™ capabilities provide a holistic approach to produced water sourcing, treatment and recycling, chemistry and logistical delivery. We believe there remains significant opportunity to further commercialize and transition these legacy infrastructure assets towards new sustainable strategies revolving around our water recycling and FluidMatch™ expertise in order to both limit waste and decrease freshwater demand in the industry, while simultaneously improving economic and production results for our customers. As we all know, water is vital to the health, economic, and social well-being of the communities we all live in and work in and our goal is to develop sustainable water solutions with a shared commitment to conservation. Ultimately, we view this captive supply of produced water as an alternative, sustainable water source and will continue

to invest in the technology

and infrastructure needed to provide these solutions to our customers.

"We continue to ex-

perience a strong recovery in activity and financial performance in the fourth quarter, buoyed by a robust commodity price environment and our recent acquisitions, and we remain excited about the opportunities that lie ahead in 2022. In total, upon completion of the Nuverra acquisition, we will have added an estimated nearly \$300 million of incremental annualized run-rate revenue through M&A since the beginning of the third quarter of 2021. Consistent with our belief that consolidation in the oilfield service markets is a critical avenue to advance profitability in the industry, we also believe there are meaningful cost synergy opportunities to be gained from these acquisitions, including resolving the duplication of public company cost structures with Nuverra. We believe the acquisitions of Nuverra and HB, in conjunction with our other recent acquisitions of Complete, Agua Libre and UltRecovery, position us to see meaningful revenue and earnings growth in the year ahead. Even with this recent activity, we still maintain a strong balance sheet with a meaningful net cash position, backed by incremental revenue and gross profit. Ultimately, we look forward to realizing the benefits of these acquisitions across our scalable platform, and further developing and building upon this diversified portfolio of assets for our shareholders, customers, employees and other partners," concluded
