McKenzie & Williams Counties To Meet With Sugar Beet Growers This Month

Sugar beet growers across the region are finding themselves having to make some tough decisions. Approximately 32,000 acres throughout McKenzie, Williams, Roosevelt and Richland counties have been previously dedicated to sugar beet production, and the recent announcement of Sidney Sugars' closing will impact all of them. The next closest sugar beet factories are located in Billings or Hillsboro, ND, however federal sugar allotment is tied to the factories themselves, making switching crops growers' only option.

"Shutting down the factory was the avenue Crystal Sugars needed to complete to shift the allotment from our region into their other growing regions in the United States. Our region's farmers will be relying heavily on area agronomists and researchers to determine what will be the best fit agronom-

ically for their farms," stated Williams County Commissioner Beau Anderson. "Their (growers) concerns are centered around what to grow on those acres in the short term as the acres were prepped last fall for sugar beets. The big concern is the value of the specialized equipment that growers have. A sharp decrease in the value of this equipment is a tough blow to the farms' financial position."

"My concerns are what their beet equipment is worth, and the cost of new equipment for other crops," stated McKenzie County Commissioner Clint Wold. "Sugar beets have been a large crop in the valley for many years, but the farmers will adapt like they always do to survive."

Devan Leo, NDSU Agriculture and Natural Resources McKenzie Countv extension agent, said that she has had McKenzie County growers reach out to her and that corn and soybeans are the most popular crops they are thinking of switching to, though there are definitely concerns about limited elevator storage.

"We will talk about a few other options for some of them; I always try to advise choosing the route with the least amount of added input costs. If they do not currently own equipment to put in certain crops or do not have grain bins to store seed in. then those are added costs they were not prepared for and would likely cause high stress to them," she said. "As producers in the county and neighboring counties, I am most concerned about their well-being and I want this transition period to go as smoothly as possible for

Leo is working to set up a meeting with producers in Fairview sometime between March 20 and 24. The Williams County Extension Office will meet with sugar beet producers in Fairview March 23.

"There will be far reaching impacts from the closure as the factory is shuddered. There is no way to totally measure how far a facility this large will impact a region like where we operate.

However, the Sidney factory has provided support financially as a thriving member of our region for a long time. This will be a community member that we will dearly miss," added Williams County Commissioner Anderson.

Economic Outlook Seminar Held in Sidney March 14

The 2023 Montana Economic Outlook Seminar was held in Sidney at the Richland County MSU Extension Office on Tuesday, March 14.

It was presented by Patrick Barkey, University of Montana Bureau of Business and Economic Research director. The theme was about the recent in-migration of citizens moving into Montana.

"Demand for Montana has surged since the pandemic (and since the TV show "Yellowstone"). At historical prices, more people want to live/spend time in Montana, partly because of the pop-culture effects from the TV series "Yellowstone" starring Kevin Costner.

How demand increases change Montana depends on whether/how Montanans choose to increase supply," said Barkey. He explained that if Montana chooses to expand supply, Montana will have more people. Montana will enjoy the benefits/suffer

the consequences of size (e.g. more people leads to more opportunities but also increases congestion/scarcity, particularly for things where it is hard/impossible to increase supply). If Montana limits supply growth, Montana will become expensive. The number of people will stay the same, and Montana will suffer more of the consequences of cost (e.g. the types of economic opportunity available and the set of people who can live in/ visit Montana will change to favor those who can afford it). While these changes are not new (Montana has dealt with them for decades), more demand means more tradeoffs. Navigating these tradeoffs will be the defining feature of Montana's future.

"Montana's net migration rate from July 1, 2020-July 1, 2022 was 3.3 times higher than the 2000-2019 average," explained Barkey. Different people moved to Montana. The share with a college degree increased. The share of in-migrants working from home increased by 12%. Montana's net migration rate since the pandemic ranks in the 98th percentile (or 21st) among 1,173 2-year-state periods since 1999, roughly comparable to Florida during 2016-2017, North Dakota during 2013-2014, and Arizona 2003-2004. Montana's 32% increase in inflation-adjusted home values between 2019-2022 ranks in the 96th percentile of all states 3-year growth rates since 1999. Montana's inflation-adjusted home values increased by 11% more than U.S. inflation-adjust home values over this period. These ranks 88th percentile of all state-3-year periods.

"An average, or medium home in Bozeman right now is selling for \$950,000, said Barkey. Effects are not uniform across the state. Glacier, SW, Yellowstone, plus Billings experienced strong net migration for decades. Montana has been through booms and busts before; however, variance

average increased). The Montana Ag situation and outlook was also discussed. "Output prices look good, but as always the story is complicated," explained Barkey. The war in Russia has had some impact on our ag economy. Beef exports were strong in 2022. The Montana drought is better, but not good. Nationally, drought has become less intense but more widespread.


Barkey also discussed the recession. "Will Montana avoid the recession? Predictions are hard to make, but maybe there won't be a recession? Perhaps in-migration will soften a downturn. We know inflation and interest rates won't avoid Montana. Weakening consumer spending and slowing global growth will be felt here".

Roy E. Kallevig was born on Oct. 28, 1928, in Fairview, MT to Julia L. and John J. Kallevig. Roy had a lot of nicknames from family, including Roy Boy (from his wife Gloria), Pops, Papa Roy, and Gramps. He went to school in Fairview and Sidney through 8th grade. His mother passed away when he was 13, which is when he started his working career helping his dad collecting city garbage, mowing (with horses) the Sidney golf course fairways and roughs, and digging graves in Sidney and surrounding communities. At age 18, he worked for Lalonde Construction building roads west of Circle, and from there he went to work for "Kallevig Brothers Excavating", which was owned by his two older brothers, Cliff and Chet. He operated a Gradahl backhoe, digging basements and installing septic tanks and drain fields, and installing water and sewer for smaller communities like Froid and Medicine Lake.

Pops met his soon-to-be bride of 68 years while installing a new septic/sewer system on a farm south of Westby in 1949, Gloria Nielsen. They were married Dec. 5, 1950 in Sidney and shortly thereafter moved to the San Diego naval base. Pops served in the Navy during the Korean Conflict for three years and was aboard four different aircraft carriers as an airplane hydraulics mechanic. During their stay in San Diego, Garth was born in 1952. Upon their return to Sidney in 1954, Jamie was born, followed by Brent in 1956 and Valeri in 1959. The house they moved in to in 1954 is the house Pops still lived in until his passing.

Pops working career continued with Kallevig Brothers Excavating in the spring, summer and fall months and then he worked campaigns at Holly Sugar in the winter months when the ground was too frozen to excavate. Pops went to work full time as a master mechanic for Holly Sugar in 1965, and then in 1979 bought a used HopTo Backhoe and joined the ranks of the self-employed, digging basements, cleaning out irrigation laterals, and installing septic systems. When things slowed down in the excavating business, he sold the HopTo and went to work full time for the road and bridge crew of Richland County as an equipment operator.

Pops and Gloria spent 10 late "honeymoon years" in their little bungalow in Arizona during the winters from 1994 to 2004 and made a ton of friends and memories.

Pops retired from the county in 1994 and continued working mowing county road right of ways in the fall until 2008, when Gloria needed 24-7 care at home. Gloria passed away in 2009.

Pops had a few special words in his vocabulary: if things were all in order, he used the word "copecetic". Around family, if things weren't in order, he used the word "shucks". When we said goodbye to Pops he would say "we'll see ya when I see ya." That last line changed to "we'll see you in heaven" this past week at St. Vincent Health Care, Billings, where he spent his final days with all four of his children. Pops had a strong faith. He taught all of us by example great work ethic, positive "can do" attitudes, and the importance of prayer and faithful worship.

Praise the Lord for 94 years for our dad, Pops, Gramps, apa Roy, and Roy Boy, from all his childre daughters-in-law, grandchildren, great grandchildren, nieces, nephews, and friends.

Roy passed away on Wednesday, March 15, 2023, at St. Vincent's Healthcare, Billings, MT.

What are valid protest grounds? The protest may be based on the applicant's qualifications listed in 16-4-401. MCA, or the grounds for denial of an application in 16-4-405, MCA. Examples of valid protest grounds include: (1) the applicant is unlikely to operate the establishment in compliance with the law; (2) the proposed location cannot be properly policed by local authorities; and (3) the welfare of the people in the vicinity of the proposed location will be adversely and seriously affected.

How are protests submitted? Protests must be postmarked to the Department of Revenue, Office of Dispute Resolution, P.O. Box 5805, Helena, Montana 59604-5805 on or before April 22, 2023.

What happens if the transfer

is protested? Depending on the number of protests and the protest grounds, a public hearing will be held in Helena or Poplar. All valid protestors will be notified of the hearing's time, date and location. Hearings typically are scheduled within 90 days. A protester's hearing testimony is limited to the grounds in the protester's letter. Following the hearing, the Department of Revenue will notify the public whether the license transfer is approved or denied.


Rathert grew up in North Dakota, not far from the site of Mondak. She currently resides in Longmont, CO, where she is a writer and copy editor.

Each year in March, Montana Council of Teachers of Mathematics sponsors 12 Regional Math Contests across the state of Montana. This year on March 14, Sidney High hosted the 2023 math contest for our region. There were 11 schools from 253 schools registered. Students from each grade level from 7-12 compete in three individual tests appropriate to their level. Students in each region compete in the same tests. On an individual basis, awards are presented to the top student on each test.

Also the top 15% receive a Superior rating and the next 20% receive an Honorable Mention rating. The scores for these tests are then forwarded to the state level, where students compete for statewide awards.

Studies Underscore Oil & Gas Industry's Significant Impact On North Dakota's Economy, Communities

Bismarck, ND - The oil and gas industry in North Dakota remains a power-house for the state's economy, accounting for more than \$42.6 billion in gross business volume, nearly 50,000 jobs and \$3.8 billion in state and local tax revenues in 2021, according to two studies highlighted by Gov. Doug Burgum, researchers from North Dakota State University and industry officials

sity and industry officials.

"The oil and natural gas industry continues to be a game-changer for North Dakota," Burgum said. "Taxes and royalties paid by the industry support our state's significant investments in infrastructure, schools, communities, tax relief and the Legacy Fund, among other

areas. The industry's resiliency in the face of challenges such as the pandemic, extreme weather, volatile prices and misguided federal policies, demonstrates that it will continue to play a critically important role in North Dakota's economy for generations to come."

North Dakota State University researchers Dean Bangsund and Nancy Hodur studied the economic contribution of oil and gas exploration, extraction, transportation, processing and capital investments to the state in 2021, the most recent data available. Similar studies have been conducted every two years since 2005.

Their findings show North Dakota's oil and gas

industry directly employed 14,200 people in 2021, while economic activity from the indirect and induced effects of the industry supported an additional 35,185 jobs, for a total of 49,385 jobs attributed to the industry. Employment compensation, which includes wages, salaries and employee benefits, was estimated at \$3.9 billion.

Total gross business volume, which includes direct sales in the oil and gas industry and business generated from indirect and induced economic activity throughout North Dakota, was estimated at \$42.58 billion – an increase of \$2.38 billion over 2019 and over 30% of the state's overall gross business volume.

Bangsund said that while the pandemic made the last few years challenging, the oil and gas industry has learned how to maintain production through efficiencies and most of the industry's key economic metrics are at or near pre-COVID levels.

"The North Dakota oil and natural gas industry's economic contribution to our state has been very stable even through challenges, and it remains incredibly resilient," said Bangsund, NDSU research scientist in agribusiness and applied economics.

According to another recent study conducted for the Western Dakota Energy Association (WDEA) and

North Dakota Petroleum Foundation, tax revenues paid by the oil and natural gas industry in North Dakota from fiscal years 2008 to 2022, supported \$5.9 billion for local communities and infrastructure, over \$1.8 billion for K-12 education, \$1.4 billion for water and flood control projects, over \$1 billion for property tax relief, and \$32 million for outdoor heritage projects across the state. Additionally, \$8 billion in oil and gas taxes went into the Legacy Fund, which benefits future generations. "The impact of the oil


and natural gas industry can be seen throughout the state. From education funding to property tax relief to infrastructure funding, every

county and community has and continues to benefit from this industry," WDEA Executive Director Geoff Simon said.

Ron Ness, North Dakota Petroleum Council president, noted that North Dakota's oil and natural gas industry pays more than half of all state taxes collected and provides nearly 50,000 good paying jobs in the state.

"Thanks to innovation, the tremendous resource of the Bakken, and billions of dollars invested in infrastructure by our industry, the state can count on us to continue to be a major force in the North Dakota economy for years to come," Ness said.

Guest Opinion: Legislative Report

Greetings from Helena! We had quite a bit of activity on the Senate floor this past week, with mostly House bills. One Senate bill we had this week that had appropriations in it was SB 458, which would make the sex on a birth certificate the legal sex. This is to be consistent with Montana Code. There are supposedly 81 genders and climbing so things in the code are getting confusing and there have been some lawsuits threatened, HB450 dealt with bullying in schools and self-defense.

In Judiciary committee we dealt with bills about dangerous drugs, judges, sexual abuse, and transportation of firearms. It is always an interesting committee.

In Public Health, Welfare and Safety we passed out of committee HB116 by Representative Gillette, which would promote using in state services for troubled youth. There were children being sent as far away as Texas, making it hard for their families to see them and we were trying to eliminate that. I amended the bill to allow these children to go to facilities that were close to the border, such as Home on the Range, if it is closer to their family. Other bills were heard dealing with troubled children and what role the department should have concerning parents and private agencies.

In Fish and Game committee we heard HB 131 eliminating the 24-hour waiting period on getting a wolf tag. We also heard a couple bills regarding landowner permits, HB 596 and 635. HB 596 allows a landowner, or designee, with 640 acres, or less in some cases, to receive an elk permit if he allows access to a certain number of hunters. The thought is to kick the elk off of private land onto public land. HB 635 would allow a non-resident landowner, or designee, with at least 2,500 acres in Montana, to be in a drawing to hunt or fish. He would be required to hunt or fish on his own land. Again, the idea is to push game off of his land and onto public land.

I also presented three of the bills that I sponsored in House committees this week. I presented a bill in the House Fish and Game Committee, SB 58, which raised the limit on block management. In the House Natural Resources Committee, I presented SB 42, dealing with right of ways across state land, and SB 55, which allowed DEQ to be a member of a multi-state compact dealing with mining.

We enjoyed having our granddaughter, Alysa Rapp, serving as a Page in the Senate this week. This is a great experience for high school juniors and seniors.

The 18-month leadership development program includes seven in-state seminars with experts; tours of agricultural and community businesses and three outof-state trips (Washington, D.C., and Minneapolis in 2024) to meet with agricultural, business and government leaders; and a trip to another country (destination to be determined) in 2025 to learn about international agricultural and community issues. Previous classes visited Brazil, Costa Rica, Panama, Thailand, Vietnam, Chile and Spain.

The program helps participants to enhance leadership skills, such as thinking critically and creatively, communicating effectively, self-awareness, decision making, strategic planning and managing conflict. Participants also learn about agricultural and rural policy, the agricultural economy and future trends that could affect North Dakota, finding innovative ways to fund local and regional development projects, marketing, civic engagement, the value of coalitions and partnerships, industry and community advocacy, and how to work with the state Legislature.

In addition, participants create a network of contacts and resources they can continue to tap into for ideas, answers and support long after they graduate from the

program.

Tuition for the RLND program is \$4,000 which covers most meals, hotels and travel expenses, such as buses during instate seminars and airfare to out-of-state seminars. Participants are responsible for their travel costs to in-

state seminars and points of departure for out-of-state seminars.

The deadline to apply for RLND Class X (2023-25) is May 15. Applicants must have been a North Dakota resident for at least one year and be able to attend all seminars.


