Watford City Christmas Bliss Events Scheduled Throughout Nov. & Dec.

This year, Watford City has a lot of holiday events to offer during the months of November and December. There will be the annual Parade of Lights, Light Up Watford City event for homes and businesses to participate in, Parade of Lights, and the 2nd Annual Candy Cane Lane event.

The Parade of Lights is scheduled for Friday, Nov. 27, downtown Watford City. The parade floats will line up at the Badlands Elementary School parking lot at 5:30 p.m. At 6:30 p.m., the parade will start heading north up the hill to Park Ave., turn right onto 4th Ave., and end at McKenzie County Fairgrounds.

This year's Parade of Lights float winners will receive a traveling trophy and \$250. There will be a prize for the overall outstanding entry that presents and illustrates the parade theme "Christmas Bliss" and a prize for the overall outstanding entry presenting the best use of lights; no registration is necessary.

The Light Up Watford City event is a decorating contest where community members can decorate their homes with lights and register for a chance to win prizes. The Watford City Area Chamber of Commerce encourages everyone to light up their homes, set out lawn ornaments, wreaths, and any

other holiday decorations that you may have. There will be \$250 cash prizes awarded for the three separate themes: Chamber Choice, Simply Christmas, and Clark Griswold.

To enter the contest, you must register your decorated home by Sunday, Dec. 6. To register, email your name, phone number, and address to wcchamber@restel.com; judging will take place Dec. 8-10.

In addition to this, there will also be a Light Up Watford City event for businesses to participate in. Businesses and organizations located within five miles of Watford City are encouraged to decorate their storefronts, windows, buildings, and parking lots. The top three winners will receive a one-year free chamber membership or a one-tier membership upgrade for one year (for existing members). Judging will be based on the use of decorations, lighting, and the overall

On Saturday, Dec. 5, the Watford City Rough Rider Center will be hosting its annual Christmas Fest. This event will start at 11 a.m. and wrap up around 4 p.m. There will be a vendor show, pictures with Santa, letters to Santa, Christmas crafts, games run by McKenzie County KidStop, face painting, swimming, and ice skating. "This is a great event and right now we all need something positive and upbeat," added Shelly Hopkins, Rough Rider Center event staff member.

The cost of entry is \$5, and attendees will receive a ticket for a hoverboard giveaway with the cost of admission. There will be a food drive going on during the event, and participants who bring in a food shelf item will receive another ticket to enter into the drawing.

In addition to these fun activities, they will also be having a Christmas tree auction. This silent auction is a community donation fundraiser, where businesses or individuals can donate a decorated tree to display at the Rough Rider Center. The trees will have silent auction bidding sheets so that they can be bid on during the week preceding the Christmas Festival. "We will move the trees to the event venue downstairs to display and have the final opportunity to get more bids and 50% of the money raised will be donated to a charitable community organization. This is looking like it will be in conjunction with the toy drive going on, but no specific group has been named yet," stated Hopkins.

Due to COVID-19, this event will have social distancing elements implemented and facemasks will be required. "Precautions are being taken during this time so we can continue to have these types of events. Masks on staff, extra cleaning, and social distancing (even with Santa) will be implemented, "said Hopkins.

This year Sidney's Small-Town Christmas events will include Parade of Lights, Social Distancing with Santa, 18th Annual Parade of Trees, Winter Light Up contest, Christmas Cash, and the Big Bucks Program.

Sidney's annual Parade of Lights event will start 6:30 p.m., Friday, Nov. 27, at the south parking lot of Western Choice Cooperative and Lucky Lil's Casino. "There will be some great local entertainment including the Sidney Rockettes! Santa Claus will make a pit stop at Reese and Rays IGA after the parade for cookies and cocoa (or cider) with the kids," stated Kali Godfrey, Sidney Area Chamber of Commerce executive director. This year the traditional "Breakfast with Santa" event hosted by the Boys and Girls Club, will temporarily be replaced with Social Distancing with Santa. This event will be 9-11 a.m., Friday, Nov. 27. There will be donuts, letters to Santa, and photos with Santa at the LYREC Lower Yard (2900 W. Holly St.) The cost is \$5 or a free-will donation to the Boys and Girls Club.

The 18th Annual Parade of Trees will be Monday, Nov. 23-Friday, Nov. 27. The public will have the opportunity to view holiday trees, wreaths, ornaments, and centerpieces through the windows of the Yellowstone Marketplace building. The public will have the option to bid virtually on these pieces from Nov. 23-27. If interested in bidding you can text BGCtrees20 to 76278.

The Winter Light Up contest is a brand-new event that will take place throughout December. This is a Christmas lights contest divided into three categories: Residential, Business, and Nonprofit/School. Each category has a first prize of \$300, second prize of \$200, and third prize of \$100. There will also be a People's Choice Award of \$100. People can vote for their favorite participant on the Sidney Herald's Facebook or Website. Participants must be entered into this contest by Saturday, Dec. 5 to be put on the local Winter Light Up map. Godfrey said, "This event is a cool addition to our normal Christmas Stroll that's very "COVID friendly" and adds to the holiday spirit."

The Christmas Cash program started at the beginning of November and is scheduled to wrap up Thursday, Dec. 3. For every \$20 spent at participating businesses, a customer will receive an entry into a drawing to win up to \$3,000 in Chamber Bucks. The drawing for Chamber Bucks will be held Saturday, Dec. 5 at 1 p.m. People can tune in on 95.1 or Facebook Live on the Sidney Chamber of Commerce Facebook page to see if they have the matching ticket(s). Winners will have 5 minutes to come into the Chamber or call the Chamber at 406-433-1916 to claim their prize. "I can't wait to greet the winners of some Christmas Cash! I will be living vicariously through those winners on Dec. 5," added Godfrey.

The Big Bucks is a unique loan program, in which successful applicants can receive a loan of up to \$1,000 to purchase their holiday season needs. The loan is paid out in "Big Bucks" which are dollars to be exclusively used at participating Chamber businesses.

To make sure that everyone can safely participate in this holiday fun, the Sidney Area Chamber of Commerce has incorporated CDC recommended precautions. Godfrey stated, "Fortunately, COVID-19 does not get to cancel Christmas or any holiday for that matter. It also doesn't get to cancel family, friends, or tradition. The livelihood and wellbeing of our community is dependent on some sense of normalcy, and we can achieve that with holiday events while respecting the guidance we receive from public health." 



Edward Wallace Hall was born June 17, 1924 near Ancho, NM. He was the firstborn child of Lorena Hall (Mount) and joined LP Hall's four older children, Louise, Virgil, Edith, and Leonard. His brother, Donald, and sister, Martha Lou were born on the ranch in NM. His youth was spent on his father's ranch where he had many adventures and enjoyed life with his siblings. He was a bright student, but illnesses and ranching obligations prevented him from completing

Wallace initially thought to attend Asbury College, but God had another plan. He attended God's Bible School in Ohio to complete his high school credits. Here, he met "the best thing that ever happened in my life", Glenna Lynn Green. He married her in West Virginia on Aug. 15, 1947. They moved to Kentucky where Wallace continued his studies in religion in preparation for the ministry.

The young couple moved back to New Mexico to assist in moving LP's ranching operation to western North Dakota. After helping the family, Wallace attended college at Eastern New Mexico University. Wallace received the gift of his firstborn son, William Parker, in 1950. After graduating with a degree in history and religious studies, Wallace began preaching as a Methodist minister. Over the next two years he served among four communities in eastern New Mexico as a circuit preacher.

Wallace and Glenna visited Trotters, ND to celebrate Donald's marriage to Joan in 1953. While there, Wallace told LP he did not feel called to be a minister, so LP invited Wallace to ranch with the family. Wallace and Donald partnered well together on the ranch and ran a successful operation.

Wallace and Glenna had Katrinka Ann in 1954. The couple began to teach school in eastern Montana in 1956 and returned to the ranch on weekends and each spring. When there were enough students in the Trotters community to open a school, Wallace moved the family back to the ranch. The years spent on Beaver Creek were filled with joy and sorrow, abundance and loss, and memories to fill the storyteller's soul.

Wallace and Glenna adopted their son Keltz Fletcher in the winter of 1967. They adopted their son Karsten Jess in the spring of 1969. Wallace enjoyed being a father and loved his children with a forgiving and enduring love.

Even though Wallace was a career rancher, he remained active in the work of the church. He taught many Sunday school classes, joined the Gideon's, and served as a church elder. His love for God's word and thankfulness for God's grace defined his life. He performed weddings and preached when the need arose. He considered it a privilege to visit the elderly and the sick and had the ability to grieve with those in sorrow. He was compassionate to those he thought the 'underdog'.

Wallace and Donald sold their ranch in 2006 but Wallace bought another ranch near Richey, MT and continued ranching. He found great joy on the back of a good horse and never gave up his passion of caring for cattle. In fact, he rode at his branding this spring. A great way to describe Wallace - a cattleman with an affinity and weakness for horses.

Wallace was a praying man. As his eyesight failed and he could no longer read the Bible, he spent even more time in prayer. He prayed daily for the nation, for the leaders, for his children, for his grandchildren, and he prayed for his great-grandchildren by name.

Wallace went to be with his Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, Nov. 16, 2020. He was welcomed by Glenna, his wife of 69 years. And after 54 years, he was also reunited with his son, Parker. Wallace had numerous friends and relatives whom he longed to see again. He is survived by his daughter, Katrinka (David); sons, Keltz (Cindy) and Karsten; ten grandchildren, and thirteen great-grandchildren.



Sidney Health Center reportedly ended the fiscal year (July 2019 – June 2020) very strong financially with a 5.3% operating margin. Federal provider relief and paycheck protection program funding provided through the CARES act allowed our margin to stay intact despite the COVID-19 shutdown of many clinic visits, surgical procedures, and outpatient services for most of the last quarter. This

remarkable success can be attributed to the hard work and efforts to streamline the revenue cycle, the continued growth and expansion of services and departments meeting and in some cases exceeding their budget, turnover, employee engagement and finance goals.

Annual employee turnover results reported a record-low of 15% for fiscal year 2020, compared to the national healthcare average of 20%. These results have continued to decline since hitting an all-time high in fiscal year 2015 of 37%. Since fiscal year 2017, the annual employee turnover rate has hovered around 18% indicating a stable workforce. Sidney Health Center is one of the largest employers in Richland County with over 500 employees amounting to salary and benefits in excess of \$36.6 million.

With COVID-19 precautions in place, the Annual Membership Meeting looked a little different compared to previous years. The location changed to the Fair Event Center to allow for social distancing as chairs were spaced 6 feet apart, facemask use was required and no meal was served.

Other highlights that were reported included the impacts of COVID-19 to the operations of the hospital, clinic and long-term care facilities including surge-capacity planning, stocking

up on personal protective equipment, COVID testing, increased communication efforts and workforce chal-

lenges. "Adjusting to the new normal has been a phrase repeated continuously since March and it is easier said than done," stated Doty during her presentation. "We have all been tasked with trying to respond to an ever-changing situation where the 'new normal' is uncertainty with no clear end date and information is rapidly chang-

Since April, almost 200 employees have been exposed, quarantined or tested positive for COVID-19. Of those 200, 62 employees have tested positive with COVID-19. One of the main concerns has always been the health and well-being of the workforce. To meet the

needs of the community, staff have cross-trained to assist in short-handed departments, worked overtime, and hired traveling clinical workers including nurses, lab techs, and physicians to cover shifts.

In closing, Doty paid tribute to leaders, medical staff and front-line workers across the organization, stating, "Our employees have been tasked with what seems like the impossible and risen to the challenge. They show up to serve and have been innovative in providing safe, high-quality care despite being exhausted and overwhelmed at times."

Sidney Health Center is a membership organization. To become a member of Sidney Health Center, individuals and businesses pay a one-time membership fee of \$100. In the last year,

10 new members joined the organization, totaling 248 individual members and 61 business memberships. 


Rau Elementary School Student Of The Quarter



The Watford City community has always helped one another in dire times of need and now it is time to come together to help Dan & LeeAnn as they have for others in the past.

Farm Bureau Survey: Thanksgiving **Dinner Cost Down 4%**

Thanksgiving celebrations will look different for many Americans this year due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Gatherings are likely to be fewer and farther between, with social distancing and perhaps even remote family get-togethers. One tradition that continues this year is the American Farm Bureau Federation's annual cost survey of classic items found on the Thanksgiving Day dinner table.

Farm Bureau's 35th annual survey indicates the average cost of this year's Thanksgiving feast for 10 remains affordable at \$46.90 or less than \$5 per person. This is a \$2.01 decrease from last year's average of \$48.91.

"It's impressive to see in this survey that food, and especially the traditional Thanksgiving dinner, is still very affordable." noted Montana Farm Bureau President Hans McPherson. "Our farmers and ranchers have continued to produce the safest, most economical food in the history of the world during a pandemic. We know Thanksgiving is going to look different this year with restrictions on large gatherings, but we hope everyone can still celebrate in a safe manner and be thankful for the food on their table."

"The average cost of this year's Thanksgiving dinner is the lowest since 2010," said AFBF Chief Economist Dr. John Newton. "Pricing whole turkeys as 'loss leaders' to entice shoppers and move product is a strategy we're seeing retailers use that's increasingly common the closer we get to the holiday," he explained.

The centerpiece on most Thanksgiving tables - the turkey - costs less than last year, at \$19.39 for a 16-lb. bird. That's roughly \$1.21 per pound, down 7% from last year. The survey results show that retail turkey prices are the lowest since 2010.

The shopping list for Farm Bureau's informal survey includes turkey, stuffing, sweet potatoes, rolls with butter, peas, cranberries, a veggie tray, pumpkin pie with whipped cream, and coffee and milk, all in quantities sufficient to serve a family of 10 with plenty for leftovers.

In addition to turkey, foods that showed slight price declines include whipping cream and sweet potatoes. Foods showing modest increases this year included dinner rolls, cubed bread stuffing and pumpkin pie mix. After adjusting for inflation, the cost of this year's Thanksgiving dinner is \$18.01, down slightly from last year.

Plymouth Rock and Relatives

The Pilgrims who landed at Plymouth Rock in 1620 traded newfound religious freedom for harsh living conditions, being unprepared for the bitter winters of New England. The Plymouth historical organization reports that two or three people died each day during their first two months on land, and only 52 people survived the first year.

Even so, today there are an estimated 10 million Americans (and 35 million people worldwide) who descend from those original passengers according to the General Society of Mayflower Descendants. This means three out of 100 people in the United States may claim descendancy from these early pilgrims. Are you one of them?

Find out by signing up for a free account with www. familysearch.org and then go to the Activities tab or section. (FamilySearch.org is the largest collection of free family history, family tree, and genealogy records in the world.) FamilySearch also allows users to connect themselves with famous people - movie stars, presidents, royalty and, yes, even passengers on the Mayflower. You can also identify relationships with athletes, renowned scientists, signers of the Declaration of Independence and others!

Need help signing up or identifying relationships? Sisters Kropf and Campbell, local missionaries for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints are ready and willing to help. As part of their mission they travel across eastern Montana and North Dakota teaching others how to access this genealogical information.

According to them, this site can help you, not only find out who your famous relatives are, but FamilySearch can also link you to ancestors you never knew existed.

"After researching all of my great and great, great and so on grandparents through these free resources, I am so excited to meet them one day," Sister Kropf said.

This Thanksgiving do yourself a favor. Connect with your past. Learn more about your family and call these volunteer family history missionaries at 701-333-8037 for more help. They can also meet with you online. You will be thankful you did.

In recognition of changes in Thanksgiving dinner traditions, the Farm Bureau price survey also includes ham, potatoes and frozen green beans. Adding these foods to the classic Thanksgiving menu increased the overall cost by \$13.21, to \$60.11. This updated basket of foods also declined slightly in price (4%) compared to 2019.

Although it's difficult to predict if panic purchasing will again become a concern due to the pandemic, "Turkeys and other staples of the traditional Thanksgiving meal - are currently in ample supply at grocery stores in most areas of the country," Newton said.

Farmers' perseverance in continuing to produce food throughout the pandemic despite the challenges of volatile markets has been recognized by the public, according to recent AFBF public opinion research. Nearly nine in 10 adults (88%) trust farmers, a 4% increase from AFBF's June

2020 polling. Further, the #StillFarming campaign tells the stories of farmers and ranchers still hard at work during the pandemic - and the challenges they are overcoming to feed America and the world.

This year's national average cost was calculated using more than 230 surveys completed with pricing data from all 50 states. Farm Bureau volunteer shoppers were encouraged to check prices online using grocery store apps and websites due to the pandemic. They looked for the best possible prices without taking advantage of special promotional coupons or purchase deals.

The AFBF Thanksgiving dinner survey was first conducted in 1986. The informal survey provides a record of comparative holiday meal costs over the years. Farm Bureau's classic survey menu has remained unchanged since 1986 to allow for consistent price comparisons.






