# Threatening Emails, Phone Calls Hit Area Schools Sidney

The third week of January 2024 was a little scary for parents, school staff, and students of eastern Montana and western North Dakota. Threats were emailed and called into many different schools on more than one day, but they all seemed to be pranks, but law enforcement still responded.

According to a post on their Facebook page, at about 6:30 a.m. on Wednesday, Jan. 17, Savage School, along with several other school districts across Montana, received an email stating that bombs had been placed in school locations throughout the state. The school was thoroughly searched by law enforcement and cleared.

In a post on the Fairview Schools Districts 13 & 3 Facebook page, they were assured that the Fairview schools were not the target.

In a post on Sidney Public School District's Facebook page, a letter by Brent Sukut, Sidney Public Schools superintendent, said when they received

the threatening emails, they were immediately reported. It was determined that the emails were essentially spam and there was no threat.

In North Dakota, according to a press release on the Watford City Police Department Facebook page, Thursday, Jan. 18 at about 1:17 p.m. they received a call from a staff member of Badlands Elementary that they had gotten a call that there was an unknown individual standing outside of the school building with a

firearm. The police and sheriff departments sent officers to the school. All McKenzie County School buildings were put in lockdown almost immediately after the call. While the officers were still in the process of securing the building they received a call from North Dakota State Radio that multiple schools across the state of North Dakota had received the same call. After a little more investigation, it was found that the call was a hoax and all schools were released

from lockdown. According

to Alexander Public School Facebook page they had not received a call.

Making threats to schools is against the law. In the state of Montana, according to the state legal code website, leg.mt.gov, it could land a prankster in the state prison for up to 10 years or with a hefty fine of up to \$50K. In North Dakota, according to the state's legal code website, www.ndlegis. gov, the prankster could be imprisoned for up to five years or fined up to \$10K.

# Sidney Tendokan Taekwondo Has Been Teaching Martial Arts In Sidney For 40 Yrs.

February 2024 marks Sidney Tendokan Taekwondo's 40th Anniversary. Back in 1984, some instructors came from Williston to Sidney to teach the martial arts and the school has been here ever since.

Over its 40 years of existence, Sidney Tendokan Taekwondo has been blessed to have various attentive instructors. Paul Speck and Patsy Harlan were the first two. They came to bring the martial art to eastern Montana. Mike Berg, Sidney Tendokan Taekwondo's current owner, joined the school in 1984. He had started to learn Taekwondo in 1977 under Moo Yung Yun, while living in Fargo. He moved to Sidney in 1981 before he attained a black belt. In 1986, he finally earned it. Now, Berg is a 7th Dan.

Jerrold Baxter, a 3rd Dan instructor who has been helping Berg at the school since 2013, started learning taekwondo in 1986 at the age of eight, while in 3rd grade. Baxter was not able to earn one before graduating high school. He had earned a high brown before he finished college and returned to Sidney where he earned his black belt in 2014. Both Berg and Baxter have successfully competed for years before beginning to teach at Sidney Tendokan and have gone to numerous nationals. Gary Tescher was a 5th Dan who helped Berg and Baxtor for several years with testing, judging, and tournaments. For the past two years he has not been able to attend for medical reasons.

During its 40 years, the instructors have graduated at least 1,200 students to yellow belt, the second belt in the student program, and over 100 different students to black belt. The black belt, or 1st Dan, is the highest belt color a student can achieve but they can continue on to higher degrees of black belt. Berg used to teach Judo as a separate class but it is a very physical technique and he had to stop because of the toll it was taking on his body. He has not stopped completely and mixes some of the techniques in with the taekwondo. Sidney Tendo continues to be successful on the national scene, medaling students at the national level in four out of the last five years and even having

# Controlling Lice On Livestock

Lice are most abundant in livestock during the cold months of the winter and early spring. They typically infest animals that are stressed due to cold weather, inadequate nutrition, suppressed immune system, or that are impacted with internal parasites. These issues compounded by moderate to heavy infestations of lice can cause lower weigh gains, lower milk production, reduced feed efficiency, a slower recovery time from disease, anemia, and general unthriftiness. Livestock infested with lice can become very agitated and will relentlessly rub, scratch, and lick to try and find relief. Other signs that livestock are impacted by lice included rubbed off or blood-stained hair and faces with a bluish/gray appearance.

There are four predominant species of lice in Montana, three sucking lice species, long-nosed, little blue, and shortnosed, and one biting lice species that is the most common of all species in the state. Lice spend their entire life on the host, and their life cycle is three to four weeks long. They cement nits to the animal's hairs and are spread by direct contact. The long-nosed lice typically infests calves and are located on the shoulders, back, neck, and dewlap. The little blue lice are typically found on the face. The short-nosed species is usually found on the neck, dewlap, and brisket. The biting lice are found on the back, withers, poll, and tail head and feed on the skin and hair.

Control options for lice include back rubbers and dust bags, but they will only provide control and not eradication. These options work best when placed where cattle will use them daily. There are ear tag options for control of biting lice and must be applied in the fall. There are two pour-on options including pyrethroids and avermectins. Pyrethroids do not kill eggs, and therefore, require two applications 14 days apart to ensure optimal lice control. This second application will kill the newly hatched nymphs. Common pyrethroids include cypermethrin, permethrin, and cyfluthrin. Avermectins including ivermectin, doramectin, abamectin, and eprinomectin, control both sucking and biting lice and require only one application. There are injectable avermectins but they are only registered for use on beef cattle and are only affective for sucking lice, which may require an additional application for biting lice.

No matter the control method you choose, it is always important to read and follow the label directions. Pour-ons and injectable doses will be determined by weight and will also have withdrawal times/days to slaughter. These will vary by product, making it important to consult the label before applying. Reading the label to note the active ingredient and mode of action of the active ingredient is important. Rotating modes of action every season is the key to managing resistance.


The book offers a new approach for elementary age children, showing them



# **Holden Visited** Sidney On Jan. 15

**By Jaymi Mozeak** Ric Holden, 2024 congressional candidate, visited Sidney, Monday, Jan 15, to speak with area leaders and news outlets. He was eager to engage in friendly conversation to discover the issues area voters have with events that have happened around the nation

Holden is no stranger to service. The Glendive rancher and insurance adjuster served in the U.S. Air Force Reserve Officer Training Corps for 2 1/2 years, the Montana Senate, representing eastern Montana, for eight years, and in several committees. In 2002, he took a step back from politics so he could take part in his kids' childhoods and attend their high school sports events. Upon settling into his life outside of politics, he found he does not like what he

sees on the national news, especially in the last three years. Holden is running on three main issues, the border, the economy, and agriculture representation. Holden said, "The border is wide open and that needs to stop." He supports the military helping border patrol on the southern border. Holden mentioned our northern border, as well. He said, "3,000 illegal immigrants walked through the forests into Maine last fall."

As far as the economy goes, Holden claims the best way to fix it is through energy production. He recalled how Montana is vastly rich in oil and coal yet, as soon as Biden came into office, he signed an executive order to shut down several coal mines then pushed incentives to build wind farms. Holden said, "Those wind turbines don't do well in this cold. The oil freezes up in them and they can't turn. Then the ice and snow catches in the curved lip on the edge of the blades, making them brittle and prone to snapping off."

According to Holden, agriculture is Montana's largest industry. He claims that there are no representatives in Washington, DC, that sit on any agriculture committees. Holden intends to continue to serve on such committees if elected. He warns that with no elected officials regularly engaged in agriculture, other special interest groups will move in. Holden called to mind the extended shutdowns on the east and west coasts. Even though Montana ranchers were only under lockdown for a few short months their clientele were stuck for much longer. No one was eating steaks at restaurants. No one was going into work at the wool mills. There was nowhere to send product.

America's elected officials have handicapped the nation and Holden is running to help turn it back in the right direction.

# **Eastern MT & Western ND 5th Graders To Experience Fun Educational Opportunity At 2024 Hard Spring Show Bread Fair**

Through the months of February and March, thanks to the generosity of Northern Lights Honey, North Dakota Mills, and LaSaffre Corporation, and the producer of Red Star Platinum Yeast, the 41st Annual Wheat Show Bread Fair committee will be going into middle schools across the MonDak region to enter 5th graders who want to learn to make bread from scratch.

Until 2020, the Annual Bread Fair was part of the National Hard Spring Wheat Show. Since then the National Hard Spring Wheat Show Board continues to be integral in the decision making process of the bread fair, but the activity has evolved into a new format. In 2021, Extension agents decided to take the show on the road and travelled to the different schools that wished to participate. In the following years, school staff expressed a desire to continue the fair in this new format. This year, over 1,500 5th graders from over 14 counties in North Dakota and Montana will be able to make a loaf of bread at their schools from a portion of the 2,000 lbs. of white flour, 2,000 packets of yeast, 150 lbs. of

McKenzie County produced honey, and canola oil donated by the sponsoring companies.

North Dakota is the #1 producer of three of the main ingredients of the bread: canola, hard red spring wheat, and honey. In North Dakota, Williams, Divide, Dunn, Lewis & Clark, McKenzie, Mountrail counties, Powers Lake, and White Shield schools will be participating. In Montana, Grant, Daniels, Dawson, McCone, Richland, Roosevelt, and Sheridan county schools will be participating.

At the end of January the extension agents from each of the counties of the participating school systems will be gathering at the NDSU Extension in Williston to assemble the bread kits for this educational and fun activity.

Valerie Valentino had an idea to start a cold-pressed juice business in 2023, which quickly exploded into the healthy and delicious addition to Williston in eight months




