Sidney Health Center Earns ACR Accreditation

Sidney - Sidney Health Center has been awarded a three-year term of accreditation in breast magnetic resonance imaging (MRI) as the result of a recent review by the American College of Radiology (ACR). MRI of the breast offers valuable information about many breast conditions that may not be obtained by other imaging modalities, such as mammography or ultrasound.

The ACR gold seal of accreditation represents the highest level of image quality and patient safety. It is awarded only to facilities meeting ACR Practice Parameters and Technical Standards after a peer-review evaluation by board-certified physicians and medical physicists who are experts in the field. Image quality, personnel qualifications, adequacy of facility equipment, quality control procedures and quality assurance programs are assessed. The findings are reported to the ACR Committee on Accreditation, which subsequently provides the practice with a comprehensive report that can be used for continuous practice improvement.

"Being awarded ACR accreditation for breast MRI is very exciting for Sidney Health Center," stated Dr. Jennifer J. Adams, Sidney Health Center Radiologist. "ACR accreditation vali-

dates that we achieve the gold standard for breast MRI imaging. Breast MRI completes the spectrum of breast imaging including screening and diagnostic mammography with tomosynthesis, diagnostic ultrasound, stereotactic breast biopsy, ultrasound guided breast biopsy and MRI guided breast biopsy offered at Sidney Health Center. I am thankful for the hard work of the members of the department of radiology who helped make this possible."

In 2019, Sidney Health Center implemented the use of MRI Breast Coil imaging for breast health in addition to offering mammography imaging. Some women, who have dense breasts or have a higher than average lifetime risk for breast cancer, may be referred to have MRI of the breast, which captures multiple images to create detailed pictures. A breast MRI is used with a mammogram or other breast-imaging test not as a replacement for a mammogram.

Sidney Health Center follows the American College of Radiology recommendation that starting at age 40, women should have annual screening mammograms and a yearly checkup by a doctor that includes a breast exam, or follow a plan in coordination with their personal healthcare

Sidney Health Center is now ACR accredited in both breast MRI imaging and mammography imaging. Individuals, 40 years or older, can schedule a screening mammogram without a referral notice by calling the Sidney Health Center outpatient coordinator at 406-488-2195.

The ACR, founded in 1924, is a professional medical society dedicated to serving patients and society by empowering radiology professionals to advance the practice, science and professions of radiological care. The College serves more than 37,000 diagnostic/interventional radiologists, radiation oncologists, nuclear medicine physicians, and medical physicists with programs focusing on the practice of medical imaging and radiation oncology and the delivery of comprehensive health care services.

Richland County Health Department to Pilot Walk-In Janssen (Johnson & Johnson) COVID Clinic

The Richland County Health Department will be piloting a walk-in Janssen (Johnson & Johnson) COVID-19 vaccine clinic on Wednesday, May 5 from 1-3 p.m.

The FDA recently lifted the pause on the administration of the Janssen (Johnson & Johnson) COVID-19 vaccine and issued an updated Emergency Use Authorization that includes warnings about rare side effects.

The Health Department will be offering the 1-dose Janssen COVID-19 vaccine without an appointment on May 5 from 1-3 p.m. MST at the Health Department building, 1201 West Holly, Sidney. Those seeking the vaccine must be 18 years or age or older; and must not have received any other vaccines in the two weeks prior to the appointment (between April 21 and May 5). Those attending should bring their insurance card; and should expect to spend about 30 minutes at the Health Department. Because the clinic is a pilot, the Health Department expects there may be additional unforeseen wait times.

Fairview School Raising Funds For New Playground Equipment & Surfacing

Fairview School is raising funds to provide their students with a safe, productive place to exercise and play.

The funds raised will provide safer, ADA compliant playground surfacing and inclusion playground equipment for all ages and

"For many students, recess is the best part of their day. I am excited at the prospect of our children having equipment that improves their physical and mental well-being. It will also increase their sense of self-worth knowing that the community considered them

important enough to generously donate funds to this project," said Janine Danielson, first grade teacher at Fairview elementary school.

According to a statement from Fairview Schools, their Elementary School serves 114 students, where 40% of them qualify for free and/or reduced lunch and 10% of them live in poverty. Many of those students do not have access to a yard or safe playground equipment at their homes, therefore Fairview School wants to help those students experience a safe place to play, by providing better playground equipment.

"Our playground is in dire need of upgrading. The surfacing now consists of gravel, which is considered the least safe of all acceptable materials," said Danielson.

Currently Fairview Schools has pea gravel and large gravel as their playground surface. This type of surfacing does not meet the daily-required sensory input. The school is planning on replacing this surfacing with tamarack wood chips and replacing the dirt underneath the surface with proper soil to promote the growth of

This area would provide

a place where students can develop physical fitness and enjoy free play.

In addition to these changes, the school would also like to add a piece of playground equipment that would contribute to muscle development of the upper and lower body, while increasing agility and strength.

Danielson said, "It is important that we add equipment that has embedded fitness components to develop large muscle groups, agility, and balance. Thirty-five percent of Richland County adults are considered obese. We need to stop the trend in elementary school

by providing an engaging, safe place for our kids to play.'

With the new equipment, the school is expecting to see an improvement in the student behavior. They also expect improved academic performance because their students will be able to focus longer and fidget less.

The school is hoping to receive funding soon so that they can receive and install the new products before the start of the school year, fall 2021. The total estimated cost of replacing and installing new equipment and

surfacing is \$84,700. The school has its own

webpage (www.fschool.org) and Facebook page where they will be spotlighting the incoming donations.

"One thing that I love about the people of Richland County is their commitment to important causes. They are generous and supportive of our children. I am grateful to live in such a giving community," added Danielson

Department of Revenue Warns of Tax Season Scams

The Montana Department of Revenue warns all Montanans to be aware of numerous scams and frauds related to their tax information and refunds.

Some common tax season scams include:

· Paying for a refund: If a caller says they have your tax refund, but you'll have to pay a "fee" to receive it, it's a scam. The Department of Revenue will never demand money before giving you your refund.

· Threatening arrest, or seizure of your property: Taxpayers have received letters saying they owe taxes to Montana, and that the state will seize their property, or even file a warrant for their arrest.

· Unclaimed Property, for a fee: The Department of Revenue returns unclaimed assets, such as insurance payouts, mineral royalties or old bank balances, to thousands of Montanans each year. You do not have to pay a fee to collect your own unclaimed property if you submit a claim directly with the department. Search at https://tap. dor.mt.gov to see if you have property with the department.

· Phishing for data: Don't click links on unsolicited emails. These links could infect your computer with malware that can jeopardize the security of your personal data such as your Social Security Number or banking information.

The Department of Revenue may contact individual taxpayers or businesses by phone, but in nearly all cases we will call only after sending at least one letter by U.S. mail. Such calls may come from our Collections Unit to discuss past-due taxes or a payment plan, or to verify information. For more information on our Identity Verification letters, visit MTRevenue.gov/fraud.

Do not provide personal information if you are not sure who you are talking to. To verify a call or a letter you received is from the Department of Revenue, call our Call Center at 406- 444-6900.





Ranking Member Rosendale On The Digital Divide In Healthcare

Washington, DC - Representative Rosendale, ranking member of the House Veterans' Affairs Subcommittee on Technology Modernization, participated in a roundtable discussion with veteran advocates. local and tribal organizations about the digital divide and veterans' access to technology and telehealth services. The priority of the roundtable was to understand the perspectives from local and underserved veteran com-

Representative Rosendale invited Thomas Parker, board member and veterans' service liaison of Impact Montana, and Ryan Beston, director of veterans' affairs from the Fort Peck Tribal Community to join this roundtable. Rosendale's questions to the participants focused on their personal experiences with telehealth services and how these services can improve as a resource for their communities and rural Montana as a whole.

One-in-four rural Americans can't connect to highspeed internet at home, and on rural tribal lands, that figure jumps to nearly seven out of ten. For Montanans, the digital divide is a persistent issue. The roundtable participants emphasized the basic technology infrastructure problems they face in communities as well as the

importance of local decision-making and solutions that take into account the particular needs of individual communities.

"The federal government is allocating an unprecedented amount of money toward solving this problem, and I believe to fill in the gaps effectively we need to leverage private, federal, and state partnerships. Perhaps most importantly, local governments need to be involved in the decision-making." Representative Rosendale said.

Rosendale's remarks as prepared:

Good morning. I appreciate everyone joining us for our second conversation about veterans and the digital divide.

I represent the great state of Montana where one in ten of my constituents are veterans or service members, and I am grateful for their service to our nation.

One in four rural Americans can't connect to highspeed internet at home. On rural tribal lands, that figure jumps to nearly seven out of ten. For Montanans, the digital divide is a persistent

Lack of internet access is not just a problem at our homes. According to the FCC, tribal lands are nearly four-and-a-half times more likely to lack any terrestrial broadband internet access

is unacceptable.

VA hospitals and clinics are almost universally connected to high-speed internet, no matter where they are located. Unfortunately, that is not always the case for smaller community health care providers, where about one-third of veterans get care.

The federal government is allocating an unprecedented amount of money toward solving this problem, and I believe to fill in the gaps effectively we need to leverage private, federal, and state partnerships. Perhaps most importantly, local governments need to be involved in the decision-making.

I am eager to hear from all of you about your perspectives and the situations in your communities.

I am especially thankful to Ryan Beston from the Fort Peck tribal community and Tommy Parker from Impact Montana for joining us today.

Fort Peck is home to over 12,000 tribal members. The Fort Peck Reservation is located in northeastern Montana, an exceptionally

Paddlefish Season Opened May 1 On Upper Missouri River

Helena - This year's Montana paddlefish seasons kicked off on May 1 with the opening of the Upper Missouri River section from Fort Benton downstream to Fort Peck Dam. Paddlefish anglers must have a white harvest tag, which is issued through a lottery system, to participate in catching and keeping a paddlefish from this section of the river. FWP mails these tags to successful applicants.

Unsuccessful paddlefish lottery applicants will be issued a snag-and-release only license for the Upper Missouri River. Others may also purchase snag-andrelease tags for this fishery at FWP offices or online, even if they are not part of the lottery.

Montana has three unique paddlefish seasons, and anglers may select only one area to fish for paddle-

· Upper Missouri River from Fort Peck Dam to Fort Benton (white harvest

 Yellowstone River and Missouri River downstream of Fort Peck Dam (yellow harvest tag)

 Fort Peck Dredge Cut archery-only season (blue harvest tag)

The paddlefish season on the Missouri River below Fort Peck Dam and in the Yellowstone River below the mouth of the Bighorn River opens May 15, and requires a yellow harvest tag. The archery-fishing season for paddlefish in the Fort Peck Dredge Cuts below Fort Peck Dam opens July 1, and requires a blue harvest tag. As in the past, anglers may only select one area to fish for paddlefish in Montana. For more detailed information please refer to the 2021 Paddlefish Regulations.

All harvested paddlefish must be immediately tagged and reported within 48 hours. Reporting options include: on-site where fish were harvested (at check points like Intake Fishing Access Site or roving creel staff along the Missouri), on the phone hotline at 1-877-FWP-WILD (877-397-9453) or 406-444-0356, or online at MyFWP at fwp. mt.aov.

Parks Board Moves Forward With Two-Year Lease For Hell Creek State Park

The Montana Parks and Recreation Board approved a two-year lease with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers for the continued operations of Hell Creek State Park.

The lease will give Montana Fish, Wildlife & Parks time to work on transitioning park operations to the Little Shell Tribe, which has expressed continued interest in taking over management of the recreation area. The decision also will ensure park operations continue for recreationists to access south side of Fort Peck Reservoir. The current lease expired

Hell Creek State Park is a nearly 400-acre park on the south side of Fort Peck Reservoir, north of Jordan. The lease approved by the Parks and Recreation Board is the result of months of negotiation between the state of Montana, Little Shell Tribe and the US Army Corps of Engineers. The lease has the option of two, one-year extensions to ensure a smooth transition to the Little Shell Tribe.



MSU Extension To Host "Communicating For The Farm" Webinar Series

Bozeman — Montana State University Extension in Pondera County and Purdue Extension-Bartholomew County will offer a webinar series this month to help improve agricultural storytelling and communication skills. Adriane Good, MSU Extension agent in Pondera County, and Cora Carter, Purdue Extension educator in Bartholomew County, coordinated the series.

"We noticed that many agricultural producers want to engage with the public and share their story but have difficulties doing so. This series aims to help producers with skills to communicate effectively and present themselves professionally online when engaging with a non-agricultural-based public," said

The five-week series will take place at 5 p.m. on Thursdays, beginning May 13. The first webinar, led by Purdue scientific communication professors Beth Forbes and Linda Pfeiffer, will focus on media literacv and critical thinking to teach participants how to find credible sources and verify information.

The second session. with Forbes and Pfeiffer on May 20, will define how to effectively communicate and engage with the audience. The presenters are part of the leadership team of a College of Agriculture course at Purdue that helps students learn how to engage with the public on controversial issues.

On May 27, participants will get a chance to practice communicating in small groups and discuss common

controversial practices in agriculture, while remaining civil and professional.

The June 3 webinar will feature Carrie Mess, a Wisconsin dairy farmer with a large social media following. Mess has been using social media to connect with consumers for over 10 years and will help participants learn how to craft their social media stories.

On June 10, Sara Hollenbeck, High Five Meats, which is based in Molt, will discuss how to present yourself online and what to share on social media to remain professional while still being authentic.

The final session on June 17 will be another skills practice session, with participants in small groups. Extension educators from Purdue and MSU will evaluate and participate in the

discussions.



Chairman Fox's Declaration To U.S. District Court Explains Extreme Impacts Of DAPL Shutdown

Financial Losses Estimated to Exceed \$250 Million Over Two Years

NEW TOWN, N.D., April 28, 2021 /PRNewswire/ --Last week, Chairman Fox of the Mandan, Hidatsa and Arikara Nation (MHA Nation) filed a sworn declaration in the United States District Court for the District of Columbia, outlining the multiple ways that the nearly 17,000 members of the MHA Nation will be adversely impacted and economically devastated with any shutdown of the Dakota Access Pipeline (DAPL). The filing comes as the pipeline's future remains uncertain.

The MHA Nation's energy resources, including oil and gas, are trust assets held by the federal government for the Tribes' benefit. "Over the past 12 years, the MHA Nation invested extensive resources to develop these energy resources, which have become a powerful economic engine for our Tribe." said Chairman Fox. More than 80% of the Tribes' current fiscal year budget comes from oil and gas royalties and tax revenue. "Among other things, oil and gas revenue funds our government, provides health insurance for our members, maintains our infrastructure, and constructs community

buildings, like new schools, athletic fields, cultural centers, health clinics, and emergency management

centers." A DAPL shutdown will impact individual tribal members and their families as they receive two-thirds of the royalty revenue generated on the Fort Berthold Reservation. Additionally, tribal members' businesses relying on oil and gas production will also be impacted.

DAPL transports more than 60% of the MHA Nation's daily production to market. "If DAPL is shut down, it will be extremely

difficult to move our current production to market. Future production will be sharply curtailed. The financial harm could be widespread and absolutely devastating to our reservation and our members, with estimated losses amounting to more than \$160 million over one year and more than \$250 million over two years," said Fox.

The MHA Nation suffered historical trauma from its loss of land and resources as have other Treaty Tribes. The Bakken Shale Play allowed it to rebuild its economy as an energy producing tribe. If DAPL is shut down, the MHA Nation

will be extremely impacted. "I have profound respect for Standing Rock and the other tribes that oppose DAPL. There is great respect between our two nations, and I have been a longstanding champion for water resources, water rights, and the environment."

Fox continued, "I am hopeful that we can find a way forward that will address our concerns, as well as the concerns of others, without negatively impacting our primary source of economic development."

What is one food that makes a great breakfast and is also considered an excellent source of protein? Ding, Ding, If you were thinking eggs, you were correct! According to the Egg Nutrition Center (ENC) article on Protein, a large

egg has around six grams of protein and contains all nine essential amino acids. The ENC also noted that protein is important in an overall diet and that this macronutrient can help maintain and build muscle tissue. However, about half of an egg's protein is actually located in the yolk of the egg, so to get all of the egg's protein, you would need to eat the whole egg (ENC).

In the article Healthy

Food Patterns. Where do eggs fit in? (2020), written by Kim Hoban, has provided some suggestions on ways to eat eggs while also eating more vegetables.

• Try adding your favorite veggie to an omelet.

 Sautee leafy greens and add them into scrambled eggs.

· Prep veggie egg muffins for fast and easy breakfasts during a busy week.

· Add eggs and veggies

to homemade fried rice. · Add a hard-boiled egg

to your favorite salad for some additional protein.

Another fun thing about eggs is they can also be cooked in a variety of ways. You can boil them for soft or even hard-boiled eggs. They can be fried, poached, scrambled, served sunnyside up, etc., by cooking them on the stove. They can be baked in the oven from a frittata, egg bake, or even

egg muffins. If you are in a hurry, you can even make a microwave omelet by adding some of your favorite veggies, mixing it up, and cooking in the microwave.

With eggs being packed full of protein and other nutrients, they could be an important part of your or your family's diet. Try mixing it up and add more eggs to your weekly menu as an additional protein source or try something new and making

a new recipe that features eggs as a star ingredient!

Montana **Appreciates** Lawmakers Ler & Bogner For Action On Meat Inspection

Great Falls - Montana Farmers Union appreciates the efforts of two state law makers whose work to amend HB 2, a budget bill, that will allow the state to explore more opportunities for meat processing as well as level the playing field for custom butchers.

The two bills sponsored, by Rep. Brandon Ler and Sen. Ken Bogner, proposed significant changes to state and custom exempt meat inspection for sale of meats. The USDA threatened to refuse funding for meat inspection if these bills passed in their original form. Montana Farmers Union President Walter Schweitzer appealed to Senator Bogner to include an amendment that would allow the Montana Board of Livestock to apply and implement a Cooperative Interstate Shipment (CIS) agreement with the Food Safety Inspection Service. Sen. Bogner agreed and was successful in implementing the CIS program in HB 2. Rep. Ler's bill, HB 336, explores the opportunity of an interstate cooperative meatpacking compact that has the necessary protections in place for our state inspected meat processors.

"The actions taken by Rep. Ler and Sen. Bogner will ensure that our meat inspection process is not at risk," said Schweitzer. "I have always felt that it is ridiculous that foreign countries are able to process meat and sell across the United States, and yet a state Inspected plant that meets the same standard is unable to sell across state lines. The CIS will allow for state inspected plants to sell across state lines and to export. Thank you Rep. Ler and Sen. Bogner for your support of Montana agriculture."
