During Breast Cancer Awareness Month, Sidney Health Center kicked off a new program for all cancer patients in honor of Theresa Livers, who was a breast cancer survivor and healthcare leader. Theresa's Sunshine Care Packages feature a large tote with personal care items that will be given to new patients receiving chemotherapy, radiation therapy or both at Sidney Health Center's Cancer Care.

Theresa embodied the spirit of community, generosity, and leadership. During her healthcare career of more than 35 years, Theresa worked in both North Dakota and Montana ranging from hospitals and nursing homes to community health and academic settings, either in direct care or management positions. She held executive positions at Sidney Health Center for over 25 years, most recently serving at the interim Chief Executive Officer.

Theresa passed away in May 2018 after a valiant fight with cancer for more than 20 years; however, it never defined her. In fact, she became an inspiration to many and lived every day to the fullest. As a community leader, caretaker and mentor, Theresa had the innate ability to help people realize their potential and make the best of any situation.

"Theresa made it her personal mission to serve others not

only in her role as a healthcare leader but in the community as well," noted Jen Doty, Sidney Health Center CEO. "The care packages are one way we can keep Theresa's legacy alive. She understood the importance of hope, faith and looking for the good in every day." Inspired by years of nature's beauty, Theresa's final request to friends, family and co-workers was to "Live More, Love More."

The Sunshine Care Packages are made possible through a designated fund at the Foundation for Community Care in hopes of bringing comfort and peace to those who are diagnosed with cancer and treated at Sidney Health Center. Within the last year. cancer care treatments have increased more than 150% with the addition of full-time medical oncologist, Dr. Chad Pedersen and radiation oncologist, Dr. Ralf Kiehl.

Here's your opportunity! Scientists from the MonDak area's three ag research centers in Sidney, MT and Williston, ND are hosting the second annual MonDak Ag Research Summit at the Richland County Event Center in Sidney on Wednesday Nov. 14, from 9 am to 3 pm (MT) and they want to hear from you!

Researchers from the

MSU Eastern Ag Research Center (EARC) in Sidney, MT; the NDSU Williston Research Extension Center (WREC) in Williston, ND, and the USDA Agricultural Research Service (ARS) facility, also in Sidney, will provide updates on research relevant to local operations. In addition, more than two dozen posters outlining additional research from the three labs will also be on display, with the researchers present to answer questions during a morning poster session. Also participating in the poster session will be Sidney Sugars representatives to discuss that entity's lime giveaway program.

The entire event is free, and participants are eligible for 3 Montana pesticide applicator points, along with 2.5 Certified Crop Advisor CEU's.

The day begins with special guest, Dr. Brian Jenks, a longtime NDSU weed scientist with the North Central Research Extension Center in Minot, ND, who will discuss and take questions on weed management issues surrounding horseweed, narrowleaf hawksbeard, kochia, Russian thistle and others. Woman's Day Health **Expo to Include Stop** The Bleed Classes

On Saturday, November 10th, the McKenzie County Health Systems will be



offering Free Stop the Bleed Classes. The courses will be taking place during Women's Day Health Expo at the Rough Rider Center in Watford City, North Dakota. Starting at 9:00 a.m. the Keynote Speaker, Dr. Mary Aaland, a surgeon with over 20 years of experience from Fargo, ND, will be discussing the Stop The

Dr. Aaland will be instructing the Stop The Bleed courses. She is motivated to teach participants that they can save a life if provided with the proper tools and education. She will be teaching Stop the Bleed certification courses at 10:35, 11:10, 11:45 a.m., and 12:20 p.m.

During the course, participants will learn how to act as an immediate responder in the case of a life-threatening bleed; the course includes how to apply pressure correctly, dress a wound, and apply a tourniquet. Participants will be trained to identify nearby tools such as a publicly placed bleeding control kit or everyday items that can be used to control bleeding, use their hands to apply direct pressure at the site of a wound to stop bleeding, pack a deep wound with cloth or gauze to control bleeding, correctly apply a tourniquet to an injured limb to stop bleeding, keep a victim calm until help arrives.

Stop The Bleed Classes are beneficial for everyone to attend. No matter how guick the arrival of professional emergency responders, bystanders will always be first on the scene. A person who is bleeding can die from blood loss within five minutes; therefore it is essential to stop the blood loss immediately. Those closest to a person with life-threatening injuries are best positioned to provide immediate care.

Stop the Bleed is a national awareness campaign. The American College of Surgeons Committee on Trauma is promoting Stop The Bleed Classes in an effort to save lives by teaching and informing the civilian population how to stop uncontrolled bleeding in emergency situations. Studies have shown that help given by an immediate responder can often make the difference between life and death, even before medical professionals arrive.

Those small group discussions will run concurrently with additional afternoon research talks, including:

Kyla Splichal, WREC horticulture specialist, will present on high tunnel use and construction.

Brett Allen, USDAARS, will discuss cover crops as replace-

ment for fallow in semi-arid durum cropping systems.

Yesuf Mohammed, EARC, will discuss pulse crop variety selection and performance.

Justin Jacobs, WREC, will discuss spring wheat and durum irrigated varieties.

Participants will be able to move freely between discus-







JUUL, among other e-cigarettes, is addicting a whole new generation of Montana youth to nicotine.

State health officials are sending an urgent message about the dangers of JUUL, a type of e-cigarette, and especially its impact to Montana's youth.

Department of Public Health and Human Services Director Sheila Hogan said a 2018 study published in the Tobacco Control journal found that most JUUL users (63%) are unaware that the product contains nicotine.

She said one JUUL pod is equivalent to a pack of cigarettes, or 200 cigarette puffs.

"Youth use of nicotine in any form is unsafe because it harms brain development and increases the likelihood of addiction to other drugs in the future," Hogan said. "Because e-cigarettes contain nicotine, these products are highly addictive and are hooking a whole new generation to tobacco.'

A 2017 meta-analysis found that youth and young adults who use e-cigarettes are four times more likely to smoke cigarettes in the future than youth and young adults who do not use e-cigarettes. JUUL is a type of e-cigarette, although teens tend to put it in a separate category and call using the product, "JUULing." JUUL hit the market in 2015 and has already amassed 73% of the e-cigarette market share.

JUUL e-cigarette sales increased by 641% in just one year, according to a research letter by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention published in JAMA. The letter states that, "many of the sales likely reflect products obtained directly or indirectly by youth."

JUULs appeal to youth because they come in sweet flavors like mango, fruit medley and crème brulee, look like a USB flash drive and can be easily concealed. In a survey conducted by the Montana Office of Public Instruction in April 2018, Montana high school principals from AA through class C reported JUUL use during school hours both inside and outside their school

The most common way youth obtain JUUL is through physical retail locations, according to a survey conducted in April 2018 by the Truth Initiative. Nearly three out of four youth said that they got their JUUL from a store or retail outlet.

In Montana, e-cigarettes are now the most commonly used tobacco product among youth. The most recent Montana Youth Risk Behavior Survey showed nearly a quarter of Montana high school students use e-cigarettes and almost half have tried them. E-cigarettes are devices that come in many shapes and sizes and heat a liquid into an aerosol that the user inhales. The liquid and aerosol contains nicotine, flavorings, ultrafine particles, heavy metals, and chemicals that have been known to cause cancer.

All JUUL pods (the e-liquid cartridges) contain nicotine, and not just any nicotine. JUUL uses nicotine salts, rather than the freebase nicotine used in most other e-cigarettes and tobacco products. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, nicotine salts "...allow high levels of nicotine to be inhaled more easily and with less irritation."

Localities across the nation have taken action to prevent youth initiation of e-cigarette and other tobacco products by increasing the price, prohibiting the sale of flavored tobacco and requiring all tobacco products to be placed behind the counter in retail settings.

"Everyone can do their part to reduce youth initiation of tobacco in Montana," Hogan said.

Pediatric healthcare providers can help deter use by asking about e-cigarette and JUUL use during visits with patients. Educators can do their part by implementing and enforcing comprehensive tobacco-free school policies. Parents are encouraged to learn about the different types of e-cigarettes and talk to their kids about the risks associated with e-cigarette use.

Waterfowl Hunters Can Help Prevent Spread Of AIS

Montana Fish, Wildlife & Parks reminds waterfowl hunters that they can help prevent aquatic invasive species from infesting Montanas wetlands, rivers and lakes.

The three steps of*Clean, Drain, Dry*greatly minimize the risk of spreading invasive species. Waterfowl hunters use gear that should be inspected before hunting in a new area. Waterfowl hunters should:

- Clean aquatic plants, animals, and mud from boat, trailer, waders, boots, decoys, decoy lines, and push poles.
 - Drain water from decoys, boats, motors, and other hunting quipment.
 - Brush hunting dogs and rinse off muddy paws.
- Never move plants from one body of water to another.

 When using vegetation to construct blinds or conceal duck

boats, use only what is available in the immediate hunting area.

- Hunters watercraft must be inspected if:
- You are coming into Montana from out of state.
 You are traveling west over the Continental Divide into
- western Montana (the Columbia River Basin).

 You are coming off Tiber or Canyon Ferry reservoirs.
- You are launching anywhere within the Flathead Basin and your watercraft last launched on waters outside of the Flathead Basin.

Many inspection stations are closed for the season, but FWP offers inspections at all FWP area and regional offices.



Be Prepared For School Honor Roll Upcoming Tax Changes

Changes are coming to your federal and state taxes this year, and the Montana Department of Revenue wants all Montanans to understand what's new and to find filing help if they

"No one is thrilled to file their tax returns, but taxes are how we make sure Montana has the funds for schools, roads, law enforcement, and assistance for of our neighbors who need it," said Gene Walborn, director of the Montana Department of Revenue. "It's one of the ways we keep the Montana way of life a reality for all of us.'

For most Montanans, filing the state individual income tax return is guick and easy. Filing electronically is the fastest and most secure way to file a return and receive any refund that's

The department wants Montanans to be especially aware of a few items:

Montanans 62 and older: The Elderly Homeowner/Renter Credit is worth up to \$1,000 for people age 62 and older who make less than \$45,000 in gross household income and spent at least nine months of 2018 in Montana, including six months as a renter or owner. It's available even to seniors who don't have to file a return

This year, the standalone paper form for that credit will not be available. Instead, seniors can claim it on the main form for most taxpayers, called Form 2. Those who don't have to file a return at all can claim the credit through the secure TransAction Portal on the department's website, revenue.mt.gov.

First-time Montana filers: For people filing a Montana state

first-time filers will only receive refunds on paper checks - not by direct deposit. The Post Office will not forward refund checks.

So, those filing a Montana return for the first time in 2019 - including some college and high school students, or new residents - need to update their mailing address with the department, online or just by calling 406-444-6900.

Every year, thousands of refund checks are returned to the state because people have moved without updating the department.



Memorable Hunting Trips Captured Forever

The love of hunting has taken Dr. John Herr from Australia to Zimbabwe and the proof of his success is displayed artfully in his rural Williston home. He enjoys the finding and the taking of the animal, but also feasts on the scenery whether in the United States or more exotic lands.

Herr got a little taste of hunting when he was young, enough to get him interested.

But, it wasn't until he moved to Williston that he had the opportunity and the time to explore it. He has hunted everything from grouse to bears in the U.S. including trips to Montana, Arizona, Wyoming, Alaska and Hawaii.

The trip of a lifetime took Herr and Roberta, his wife of 53 years, to Zimbabwe in 1990. It was a guided trip, as most of his hunts have been. The guides make a living with the hunts during the season, then work to catch poachers the rest of the year. Herr's favorite hunting experience took place there, with the taking of a cape buffalo. "He was capable of taking me," he said. "It was an exciting shot." In fact, Heri had stumbled on a rock and was fortunate to be able to shoot one of the world's most dangerous animals before it charged.

multiple species of antelope, from tiny to huge, as well as a warthog. A leopard adorns Herr's wall along with a klipspringer, which is the leopard's favorite food. Guides will bait a tree with more food than the leopard will eat in one day. If there is meat left, the guides know the animal will be back and set a blind for the next night, hoping the predator will be the elusive leopard.


A trip to Australia and New Zealand resulted in the taking of a bangteng, a tahr, a chamois and three deer including a red deer. Roberta had her own great adventure on that trip. They were on a remote Australian peninsula and the men had gone on the hunt while she stayed in camp reading a Tom Clancy Ops book. She was fully engrossed in the action packed story when she heard POP! BANG! and thought someone was shooting in

camp. The 'shooting' stopped, she got her heart back where it belonged, and continued reading about the battle in the book, only to be startled by more pops and bangs. When the men returned for lunch, the guides explained that the outer shell of the pandances palm nuts were exploding and landing on the corrugated roof above her. "It was a good read, with great sound effects,"

Roberta laughed. Herr's trophy hunting room is full of those exotic animals as well as many hunted closer to home, including the peccary and grey fox from Arizona, bears from Canada and Alaska, and the moose which was shot near Rugby, for a taxidermy display.

Enjoying the outdoors, and the excitement that comes from






SHS Speech, Drama & Debate Team Competes in Eastern Montana Kickoff
