Katie Paulson And Dori Sparby, McKenzie County **Recorder Candidates**

McKenzie County has two options on the November ballot for County Recorder. Katie Paulson and Dori Sparby are both competing for the office, and The Roundup was able to speak with both candidates about their bid for McKenzie County Re-

The Recorder's Office is capable of keeping all permanent land records in the county and indexing them so they can be researched by others. It also is responsible for recording marriage licenses, and it also keeps the discharge papers of those who've served in the military.

Dori Sparby told The Roundup, "I have lived in McKenzie County for a little over seven years. I own Saddle Up Western Wear. I'm married with three beautiful daughters and a great son-in-law. Before moving to McKenzie County, I grew up in Iowa and then lived in Northern Minnesota."

Sparby explained her previous experience, noting, "I worked for McKenzie County at the Recorder's Office from May of 2011 through July of 2014 during the height of the oil boom. I've also worked as a paralegal for seven or eight years. I do feel like I have a firm grasp on the job."

Sparby asserts that the current county clerk is paid too much, and there might be financial waste in other departments as well. She said, "I truly feel that we need to start making our department heads be a little more accountable. Right now our recorder, in my opinion, makes way too much money at shy of just 125 thousand dollars. I've not found a county recorder anywhere in the state that makes more than her. I would not take a salary that high."

Sparby also claimed that the Tax Director's Office, which is currently managed by her opponent, Katie Paulson, should be separated from the Recorder's Office.

"When I left in 2014, they put the Tax Director's Office in with Recorder's Office and they should be separate for the purpose of accountability. That should be fixed as well. I think we need to start looking at what's best for our county and not the pocketbook of those in charge."

Katie Paulson, who was appointed Tax Director by the McKenzie County commissioners in 2013, highlighted her experience and training, as well as her positive work relationship with the current Recorder's Office.

Paulson said, "I have lived in Watford City for 13 years and have worked in the McKenzie County Recorder's Office for thirteen years. I'm married with three kids. I care deeply about my work in McKenzie County and the people who need access to our land records because it has become a passion of mine."

"For me," Paulson continued, "it comes down to the people. I'm very well trained for the work we do, but my favorite part of the job is when somebody comes in for help and we get to serve those people. It's a very rewarding feeling."

Paulson explained that the salary of the recorder is set by the commissioners and the current recorder's salary reflects decades of service and compounded longevity bonuses that the incoming recorder would not receive.

Paulson said, "You want someone who has the experience and training to continue serving our public with the best service possible. I believe I am that person. I've been trained by the current recorder who has served for over 30 years. She has trained me well in that office to take over."

Bilateral Amputee and Hodge Trophy Winner Nick Ackerman to Speak At **Sidney Wrestling Club Casino Night**

enjoy delicious parmesan chicken and chicken fried steak, music, prizes, bingo, poker, and other fun things as one would expect but this year the special guest is inspirational speaker, bilateral amputee, and Hodge Trophy Winner Nick Ackerman.

According to Bob Dotson in a 2011 segment of Today's American Story Nick Ackerman, an Iowa native, had to have both of his legs amputated below the knee when he contracted meningitis at 18 months. That did not stop him from competing in various sports such as football and wrestling. He continued to

wrestle while attending college at Simpson College in Indianola, Iowa where he made it to the 2001 NCWA Championships and beat a wrestler who had been undefeated. He was given the Hodge Trophy that year for being the outstanding wrestler of the year. He shared the honor with repeat winner, Cael Sanderson. He had wanted to become a park ranger but chose another path in the end. Nick ended up taking classes to learn how to make prosthetics like the ones he had worn most of his life. According to their website, www.apoinc.com, Nick now works for American Prosthetics & Orthotics. Nick Ackerman, CP, LP, is APO's Director of Prosthetics. An ABC-certified prosthetist, he is C-Leg® and RHEO KNEE® certified and sees patients in the Des Moines office. Nick, who has been an APO patient since childhood, joined the staff in 2001. He is a graduate of Simpson College, Indianola, Iowa, as well as the prosthetics program at Northwestern University. In addition to seeing patients, Nick is responsible for educating staff on new developments in prosthetics, establishing company-wide prosthetics practices and protocols, supervising prosthetic residents, and developing curriculum for training.

Lisa said that since they were going to honor and acknowl-

Nick was coming to Montana to hunt this year and they asked him to stop by and share with the Poker Night attendees. Lisa Gorder, one of the many organizers of the Sidney Wrestling Club's Casino Night, told me she believes that anyone who comes to listen will benefit from listening to Nick. Her husband and fellow organizer, Shane Gorder said, "Any community member facing a challenge would benefit from listening to Nick speak."







When we lived a mile apart, our sister trips took us in any direction we wanted. Now that we live nine hours apart, we investigate locations approximately equidistant between our respective residences. This way neither one of us has a long travel time to reach our chosen vacation spot.

This year, we decided to meet in Wallace, Idaho, midway between my home in Virginia City and my sister's home near Dayton, Washington. Wallace resembles Virginia City in that Wallace is an old mining town with plenty of interesting history. It offers a lot of attractions that we figured would keep two older ladies interested. So, the last week in September, my sister and I met in Wallace for a few days of visiting, hiking, perusing the town and area attractions, and enjoying good food and good wine.

We hiked the Pulaski Tunnel Trail, we walked on some of the 72-mile-long Coeur d'Alene bicycle and hiking path, we investigated museums, browsed in several of the shops, and we took a mine tour. We trudged up the many flights of steps to nowhere that allow pedestrians to climb the hillside from one street to the next, and we meandered all around Wallace. Good grief, after all the comments I made about the tourists we encountered this summer in Virginia City, here I was, a tourist myself, complete with camera, wandering the streets of an unfamiliar town.

Wallace allowed prostitution well into the 1980s, so of course we had to visit the Oasis Bordello museum. The upstairs of this building, where the girls plied their trade, remains unchanged from the night in 1988 when the girls packed their bags and left town, forewarned that the FBI intended to raid their establishment. The main floor of the museum has a lot of interesting little gems to view as well as offering unique and hilarious gift items. Naturally I had to again play tourist and purchase some humorous gifts for a few select people. I figured my offerings would bring a smile to the recipients' faces, if not outright laughter.

As much as we enjoyed all the touring and hiking, the initial attraction that caught both my and my sister's attention way back months ago when we first discussed meeting places, and which became an object of mutual interest and discussion, was the Silver Streak Zip Line. Before we ever left home for our little trip together, both of us talked about the possibility of trying the zip line. My sister admitted to me that trying a zip line happened to be one of the items on her bucket list. What better time than the present to cross something off one's bucket list?

So, on our last afternoon in Wallace, we bought a zip line package. With several options to choose from, and without any idea how we would like this little adventure, we both purchased the (appropriately enough) bucket list package which gave us two chance to zoom down that little cable. For an additional charge, we could elect to add the Big Daddy run as well, but we opted not to take that. People in Wallace had mentioned the Big Daddy run to us and explained that a zip liner could see out across the entire valley when riding that line. Unfortunately, "too soon old, too late smart" won the day so neither of us had the sense to add that Big Daddy choice to our package.

Our guides got us harnessed, gave us gloves and hard hats, and off we went to the zip line course. We arrived at our first cable line, the guides gave us our instructions, checked our harnesses, and it was time to fly.

My sister went first. I watched her rocket along the wire and reach the other side safely. I sat in my harness staring at the thick cable heading downwards across the gorge and my legs felt bolted to the platform. All I had to do was lift both feet, and I would be plummeting along a cable stretched what looked like a very long distance across a very deep canyon. I took a deep breath, wondered why I thought I had wanted to do this in the first place, raised both feet off the platform, and I was off like the proverbial bat out of the nether regions.

The first ten yards, I thought "Oh crap, what have I done??" but almost immediately, the fear drained away, replaced by exhilaration and euphoria. I reached the end of the run feeling exultant and eager to tackle the next ride.

The second run consisted of two cables strung side by side, several yards apart, so two people could ride the wires together. Our guide told us people would use this particular stretch to race each other to the end of the line. My sister and I weren't interested in racing, we just wanted to soar again. At the count of three, we leaned back into our harnesses, slipped off the platform with a mighty YEEHAAAAAAAAAAAsissuing from both our throats as we streaked across the canyon.

It ended too soon. Both of us loved the zip line, but I came away with three regrets. The rides didn't last long enough, I should have bought the Big Daddy option as well, and I have no pictures of us streaking in Wallace. That is the sort of picture I like to drop into Christmas cards. It seems to add a little bit of flavor to annual greetings.

We did have a great trip this year, one that still brings a smile to my face, particularly when I recall the zip line experience. I have no idea where we will go for next year's sister trip, but if one of the options includes a nearby zip line, I have a sneaky hunch that is the destination we will choose.



2nd Annual MonDak Ag Research Summit Set for Nov. 14

The North Dakota State University Williston Research Extension Center (WREC), Montana State University Eastern Agricultural Research Center (EARC) and U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Northern Plains Agricultural Research Lab in Sidney are partnering once again to showcase agricultural research underway in eastern Montana and western North Dakota.

The 2nd annual MonDak Ag Research Summit will be held on Nov. 14 from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Mountain Time at the Richland County Event Center in Sidney.

The summit was established last year and is a collaborative effort among the three research stations to encourage interaction between farmers and researchers. It features scientists from all three facilities reporting on current research projects of interest to farmers, ranchers and residents of the MonDak.

In addition to the research talks, the event allows for oneon-one and small group discussions with scientists, providing producers the opportunity to share their questions and research needs and ideas directly with the scientists. The summit is free and lunch is provided courtesy of the Northern Pulse Growers Association. Other sponsors for the event include the City of Williston, Sidney Sugars, Inc., Montana-Dakota Beet Growers Association, Agri-Industries, Dawson County Implement, Cargill and Tri-County Implement. More than 120 people participated in this event in 2017.

This year's program schedule is as follows and begins with a special guest speaker addressing emerging and persistent weed issues in this region.

Morning topics and speakers:

*Weed control of horseweed, narrowleaf hawksbeard, kochia, Russian thistle and others - Guest Speaker Brian Jenks, NCREC, Minot, ND

*Rangeland and aquatic weed update - John Gaskin, **USDA ARS** *Integrating biocontrol into your weed management plan –

Natalie West, USDA ARS

*A fungus bait formulation for grasshopper, Mormon cricket control - Stefan Jaronski, USDA ARS *The effect of tillage and rotation on rhizoctonia root and

crown rot - Audrey Kalil, WREC A morning poster session will also give attendees time to

browse more than twenty additional research projects and speak with the scientists doing the work. After the poster session, the morning program will continue with the following presentations:

*Effect of tillage, irrigation, and nitrogen on sugarbeet yield and sugar content - Chengci Chen, EARC

*Tillage vs no-till effect on corn, soybean, barley and sugarbeet yield (Nesson) and water use efficiency under irrigated conditions - Bart Stevens, USDA ARS

*Economics and soil health of sustainable cropping systems Don Tanaka, WREC

*Dryland pea production and water use affected by tillage, crop rotation, and cultural practice - Upendra Sainju, USDAARS

A free lunch sponsored by the Northern Pulse Growers Association will be served at the conclusion of the morning session. Brian Gion, Marketing Director of NPGA is our guest lunch speaker.

The afternoon program will feature small-group discussions where attendees can meet with scientists by subject area to

discuss current industry topics. The discussion groups will run concurrently with another series of research talks of interest to area producers. Attendees will be able to move back and forth between the afternoon talks and discussion

group tables as desired. The afternoon talks include:

For those interested in horticulture, Kyla Splichal, WREC horticulture specialist, will present on high tunnel use and construction.

For those interested in cover crops, Brett Allen, USDA ARS will discuss cover crops as replacement for fallow in semi-arid durum cropping systems.

For those interested in variety selections, Yesuf Mohammed, EARC, will discuss pulse crop variety selection and performance, and Justin Jacobs, WREC will discuss spring wheat and durum irrigated varieties.

New to our discussion groups this year is the presence of an area producer at

some of the small group tables who will discuss their experiences working with local scientists and what they've both learned in that partnership.



PSC Candidate Randy Pinocci Visits Sidney

Public Service Commission candidate, Randy Pinocci, recently visited Sidney in a campaign stop, soliciting votes and spreading his message of common sense regulation. Pinnoci, who has previously served as a representative to the state legislature for House District 19, is a Sun River native and winner of the 2018 Republican primary for PSC District One. He is challenging Democrat Doug Kaecher on the November 6 ballot.

The Public Service Commission is a five-member board that is responsible for the regulation of energy, telecommunications, water and sewer, transportation (to include taxi service), and pipeline utilities. Pinocci spoke with The Roundup while he was in Sidney about his aspirations and goals for the Public Service Commission.

Regarding his trip to Sidney, which concluded a tour through the Highline that included Ft. Benton, Chinook, and Malta, Pinocci said, "I've come to encourage the team leaders in the area. The area of District One is bigger than some states. To manage a campaign in an area of 19 counties is overwhelming. You have to have a team leader to check into these things. Let's encourage people to talk about what's relevant in the race, to talk about what people are passionate about."

Nemont, a communications service provider in Northeast Montana, was meeting in Scobey and Pinocci felt it important to attend the meeting to discover the issues that people are talking about and for which they have concerns.

"I wanted to discuss the issues of the Public Service

Commission regarding how we place our responsibilities over telecommunications with Nemont. That went very well, but then I wanted to come over to Sidney because of the invitation of Scott Staffanson, our team leader here."

Pinocci explained that a lot of people aren't aware of what the PSC does, even though they've seen his campaign signs.

Pinocci explained, "I would bet 99 percent of people don't know what the PSC does. People have seen our signs, but typically haven't seen the signs of my competitor unless they live in his hometown of Havre."

"When we talk about the Public Service Commission," Pinocci said, "people are amazed to find out we deal with railroad safety. One of the issues we're dealing with are people walking on the tracks with headphones and a train runs them over. We try to encourage safety and warn the public to stay off the tracks and help public awareness."

Pinocci continued, "The PSC also polices taxi cab services. When I was in the legislature, I helped with legislation to allow Uber to conduct business in Montana. Prior to this, Uber was illegal in Montana. The taxicab companies were furious with me because this would give them competition, but our job is to look and see how we can benefit Montana. Only one percent of Montana has taxi service, and if somebody can turn their car into a taxi and do it properly, we would have more service for a tremendous amount of Montana. Since Uber has become approved, there's been all kinds of stories about how it's made a difference, from people having heart attacks who've been able to make it to the hospital to those who were snowed in but were able to get out and get groceries."

"Our main job," Pinocci said, "is to make sure our utility companies don't just double the rates. They have a monopoly. Very rarely in Montana do you have two choices. So the Public Service Commission has to approve any rate increase to make sure companies don't take advantage of the people. We don't regulate cooperatives, which are managed by the federal government, but private utility companies.'

When asked why he believed Eastern Montana voters should cast their ballot for him, Pinocci responded, "The Democrat Party's energy platform calls for every single coal-fired facility to be closed. If we did that, your rates would probably triple. I don't mind wind and solar, but I do mind people not being told the costs."

Pinocci continued, "I'm running against a Democrat and he's not going to say that he's for a less-dependable, more expensive energy infrastructure, but that's the truth."


