Make Plans To Meet In Watford City For Wild West Weekend!

The McKenzie County Cowboy Association is hosting the 2023 North Dakota Rodeo Association Finals on Friday, Sept. 22 and Saturday, Sept. 23 indoors at the new McKenzie County Ag Expo, Watford City, ND. With three rounds of rodeo, a western art and vendor show, a Cowboy Poetry Gathering, Kids Cowboy Bootcamp, mechanical bull riding and two nights of rodeo dancing, there will be fun for the entire family to enjoy!

The Western Art and Vendor show kicks off the weekend on Friday, Sept. 22 from 6-8 p.m. in the Ag Expo Exhibit Hall. Shop over 20 western artists and vendors specializing in western themes and gear from across the region. Explore large and small scale paintings, glass, leather, woodworking, hats, ropes, boots, boutique clothing, jewelry and more.

Right across the hall the first round of the NDRA Rodeo kicks off at 7 p.m. featuring the state's best cowboys and cowgirls competing in bronc and bareback riding, steer wrestling, team roping, breakaway roping, calf roping, barrel racing, bull riding and more. The High School Cowboys Wild Horse Race in memory of Coy Hepper is

a must see at all three rodeos. Make sure you bring the kids for the boot race!

After the rodeo, Western Montana's retro classic country band, "Sam Platts and the Plainsmen," will be set up at the dance floor in the exhibit hall both Friday and Saturday night. The band has been regular performers at the National Cowboy Poetry Gathering in Elko, NV, and specialize in familiar western dance music and country standards. Sit and listen, take a swing around the dance floor or try your skills on the mechanical bull. A cash bar and concessions will be available both evenings.

On Saturday grab your breakfast at the Ag Expo at the Flannels and Flapjack Cowboy Breakfast benefitting a local charity. Contestants will be available at the breakfast for meet and greet and autograph signing.

The Western Art and Vendor show continues in the exhibition hall on Saturday from 11 a.m.-8 p.m. with art demonstrations and classes scheduled throughout the day. Bring your kiddos to the Cowboy Bootcamp and Canteen where they can learn how to dress like a cowboy, saddle a horse, ride the bucking bull, rope and shop for cowboy essentials throughout the day. Then gear up for the next round of rodeo action



at 1 p.m.

The Long X Arts Foundation will be offering a free cowboy kid craft throughout the day and hosts the Cowboy Poetry Gathering at 2 p.m. on the stage in the exhibit hall. Featured entertainers include North Dakota Poet Laureate, Denise Lajimodiere and four National Cowboy Poetry Gathering regulars: singer/songwriter, Sam Platts, Montana based troubadour DW

Groethe, Medora cowboy poet Jonathan Odermann and local musician, Jessie Veeder. The event, which will wrap up with area powwow dancers, will feature stories, music and poetry that captures the life, humor and tribulations of working cowboys and cowgirls in the region.

The final round of rodeo will kick off at 7 p.m. in the indoor arena where the champion cowboys and cowgirls will be determined with the rodeo dance and mechanical bull riding to follow

Tickets to the rodeo are \$20 for adults and can be purchased at the door. Kids 11 and under are free. The Western Art and Vendor Show and Cowboy Poetry Gathering are free thanks in part to a grant from the North Dakota Council on the Arts and the Long X Arts Foundation.

Protecting The Unborn

With the Dobbs opinion from the US Supreme Court the abortion debate has been returned to the individual states. While there are many different viewpoints on abortion, one view is held by a supermajority of the public, that abortion should not be wide-open up until or after birth. (news.gallup. com July 7,2023) Throughout the 2023 Legislative session, your Montana House Republicans used common sense and biologically sound principles to protect the lives of the most vulnerable among us, unborn babies. Building on the historic progress from the 2021 session, Republicans continue to advance pro-life legislation that will make a lasting difference in Montana.

House Bill 575 bans the abortion of a viable unborn baby unless necessary to save the life of the mother. House Bill 862 prohibits taxpayer funding of elective abortions. Montana taxpayers should not be forced to fund procedures with which they morally disagree. This is currently law in 33 other states; and it is a victory for Montana to pass a law to protect the freedom of conscience of our taxpayers, in line with the majority of other states.

Also, this session Senate Bill 154 was passed and signed into law, which clarifies that the right to privacy in Montana's constitution does not include a right to an abortion. Our Montana constitution Art. II Section 10 states "the right of individual privacy is essential to the well-being of a free society" (underline added). Biology and modern medicine have made it abundantly clear that a baby in the womb has its own DNA, fingerprints, and heartbeat - therefore abortion is not an individual act. Prior to birth, babies have a right to individual privacy protection too. House Republicans this session worked to ensure all Montana kids, from unborn babies to teenagers have opportunities to safely reach their full potential.




Each school is allowed to bring five boys and five girls to compete, with one alternate.

Several streets will be shut down for vendors, food trucks, a hay maze and pumpkin patch and live music.



Do I Need High Dose Flu Vaccine?

As we age, our immune system wanes, reducing our ability to fight infection and increasing our likelihood of being hospitalized for the respiratory flu. High dose flu vaccine helps folks 65 and older fight the flu, but what does "high dose" mean, and how do I know if I should get it?

The high dose flu vaccine contains a higher dose of the component that stimulates the immune system, called the antigen, than the standard or "regular" flu vaccine. According to the Mayo Clinic, high dose flu vaccines help prevent flu-related hospitalizations and complications better than the "regular" dose vaccines in people over age 65.

The "regular" dose of flu vaccine accomplishes the same goal as the high dose, but uses less antigen. This is because the immune system in an individual from 6 months to 64 years is generally working well enough to fight the flu with less assistance from the flu shot.

The high dose flu shot is only approved for those 65 years or older, so when you visit a clinic to get your flu shot, you may (politely) be asked your age to determine which vaccine you should receive. Those who are not yet 65 cannot receive the high dose vaccine. Those who are 65 can choose to receive the "regular" vaccine, though the high dose is recommended.

The Richland County Health Department will be holding its annual drive-thru mass flu shot clinic at the Richland County Fire Hall in Sidney on Thursday, Sept 28, from 10 a.m.-6 p.m. The Drive-Thru Clinic will serve adults only, and offers both regular and high-dose flu shots. No other shots will be given during the clinic. No COVID-19 vaccine will be given. No appointment is needed. Flu shots cannot be given to those who have animals in their vehicles. Children may be in the vehicle, but may not receive flu shots. Private insurance, Medicare and Medicaid will be billed for those who bring their insurance cards. Follow traffic signs to enter the Fire Hall from the North side.

Flu shots are available for those 6 months and older at the Richland County Health Department during normal clinic hours by appointment, from 10 a.m.-4:30 p.m. Monday - Wednesday. Additional clinic hours are the second Wednesday until 6 p.m., and the third Thursday of the month, from 10 a.m.-noon and 1 p.m.-4 p.m. by appointment.  White paper: Loose is preferred vs bagged. This paper will not be shredded.



Winter Care For Your Plants

Temperatures are getting colder; soon we are likely to experience a killing frost. I generally consider that to be a cold snap below 28°F. When that happens things start to go to bed for the winter months. We often receive many inquiries this time of year with regard to specific questions on how to prepare perennial plants such as trees, shrubs, and other flowers for winter here in ND and eastern MT.

The big one we usually remind folks of is consistent water. Although some years

there is an overabundance of moisture available we must make sure that we continue to provide that as the days go on. This should occur of course on an "as needed" basis.

Often we receive a reprieve of winter temps during the months of November and December. When that happens we often do not receive any rains or snows that contribute to fall moisture and the ground can become fairly dry before or as it begins to harden for winter. This can be extremely dangerous for all perennial plants in our climate.

The reason for that danger is as follows.

Moist soil insulates against the cold whereas dry soil does not. This can cause several issues for plants but I will outline two primary problems. Firstly, when plants store their energy in their root systems, they store, at a level that seldom reaches freezing temps. When the soil is dry and the cold can move down further than normal it can become challenging for those plants. Secondly, the dry soil does not hold temperature in the way that wet soil does. This problem becomes particularly critical in the spring of the year. When we start to see warmer temps in April, the soil begins to warm up with the heat of the sun. If the soil is dry it warms up much quicker than if it were insulated and remained cold by water and ice. When this happens many plants become tricked into thinking it is time to wake up for the vear when they really should "stay in bed" for another few weeks. This can subject them to spring frosts that can be damaging to young buds or flowers. Take care to be sure that plants receive appropriate amounts of moisture up until the ground begins to freeze.

Other perennial plants such as perennial grasses, peonies, daylilies, etc., the foliage can be removed anytime after they have experienced a frost. They will not produce leaves from the leaves they grew this year. New growth will emerge from the roots in the spring. Cut the foliage down to at or near ground level.

Below I will outline some helpful tips for specific perennial plants.

Care of Roses: Remember to allow roses to experience a killing frost of around 25°F. After this occurs you can cut the leaves and stems back to between 9 inches and one foot. Roses can and should be mulched to provide a layer of protection from the cold. Do not add any mulch until the air temps are seldom above freezing during the day. The addition of mulch too early can create a warm habitat under the mulch for mold and fungus to develop which can actually be more harmful than the cold. In general, you should wait to mulch anything until temps are barely above freezing during the day.

Care of Evergreens:

Some often contact us in the fall with concerns that their evergreens are dying because they have needles that are turning brown and falling off. This is a normal process for all evergreen plants. Even though they retain their needles all year, they do go through a period of time where they shed their third year and older needles. Often these needles have just gotten old, or they are in a location on the plant that no longer receives the appropriate light for them to be useful and so the plant sheds them. Again this is normal but usually occurs on the inside of the plant. If you see needles that are browning from the tips back towards the stem, that is a different issue. Winterburn is a common problem for evergreens in our climate, and especially to plants that are fairly young in age. We often do not receive the snow we need to protect them from the cold and so we can consider other methods of protection. Some wrap these plants in breathable material such as burlap. You can also apply a natural chemical product such as Wilt Stop or Wilt Pruf. These natural pine resin products help to coat the needles of the plant and protect against the cold. Watch the weather with this chemical method as it generally requires a nice 50°F day to be effective. I like to see this applied sometime in mid to late November as it has a chance of lasting through the coldest part of the winter. These chemical applications are good for approximately four months and an application in November helps them last until the end of February, after which time most of our bitter cold has passed.



On the exterior they added white vinyl window and vertical sage green siding with a front wainscot of rock. The front entry was extended out 2 ft. to be flush with the upper floor area of the split level. They got a new front door, matching garage door, new front step, and concrete sidewalk. In the kitchen, they removed the wall between it and the living room, added white cabinets, and an island with white quartz countertops. To round it off they installed recessed lights, pendants over the island, and a small chandelier in the entry way. In the living room they installed a gas fireplace with white rock from floor to ceiling, and built-in mantle. They

opened up the entry of the split-level and widened the hallway by about a foot. Two of the ground floor bathrooms were reworked into a quest quarter bath and a master bath with heated tile floors, a walk-in shower, and a dual sink vanity. They turned one of the bedrooms into an office for Franklin to work remotely and used the closet to enlarge the master bedroom's closet. The third upstairs bedroom they turned into a laundry room and pantry. They also redid the stair railing. In the basement, they removed the door at the base of the stairs and the wall between the living room and spare room. A full bathroom with a 6' soaker tub, shower, and dual sink vanity was placed where the old laundry room was with access to one of the

two basement bedrooms. They turned the old utility room into another bedroom, cleaned up the basement entry from the garage, and even added a little nook in one of the closets for their cats


