Beginning Monday, May 2. COVID vaccines will be available by appointment during regularly scheduled vaccine clinic hours at the Richland County Health Department.

Regular clinic hours are Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday from 10 a.m.-4:30 p.m. MST.

Routine child and adult vaccines are available at regular clinic hours. COVID vaccine offerings include the 2-dose Pfizer series for those 12 and older, and Moderna series for 18 and older, as well as first and second boosters. Pediatric Pfizer is available for those 5 and older. A limited stock of Janssen (Johnson & Johnson) 1-dose vaccine is available.

Brewer Pleads Not Guilty in Wetzstein Homicide

Lyndsee Colette Brewer, 51, was arrested on Tuesday, April 26 in Miles City, MT in connection with the homicide of Christopher Arthur Wetzstein. On Jan. 28, 2022, officers with the Sidney Police Department were dispatched to an apartment building on the 900 block of 3rd St. NW after receiving a request for a welfare check for an individual who had failed to show up at work. The responding officers subsequently located a male subject, Christopher A. Wetzstein, 50, deceased in his bed with an apparent gunshot wound to his head.

An autopsy determined the manner of death to be a homicide with the cause shot wound. Brewer, who was identified early in the investigation as a person of interest, was a long-time friend and business associate of Wetzstein's, who also matched the general

description of a suspicious person seen on surveillance video from Wetzstein's apartment building. Investigators from the Sidnev Police Department and the Montana Division of Criminal Investigation executed numerous search warrants during this investigation, including at Brewer's Forsyth, MT home. During the search of Brewer's home. a 9mm handgun was found that the state crime lab later determined fired the fatal bullet recovered at the scene of Wetzstein's death. Brewer is currently being held at the Richland County Detention Facility in Sidney, with bail set at \$500,000.

During a bond hearing Hailey Forcella, requested a cash bond of \$15,000. They argued that Brewer and her family could not afford the amount and she would not get adequate medical treatment in the Richland County



Jail. Brewer is suffering from several ailments as a result of a medical incident on Jan. 29 where she was found unresponsive.

District Court Judge Katherine Bidegaray kept the bond at \$500,000 after hearing testimony from Brewer's sister Andrea Schlinder, Sidney Police Department Lt. Gabriel Zeiler and Detention Officer Leslie Watts. Previous deliber-

ate homicide defendants in Richland County have been held on \$2 million bail.

On May 2, Brewer entered a plea of not guilty. The trial is scheduled for December.

Montana Public Service Commission Holds Listening Session on MDU's 2021 Biennial Electric Integrated Resource Plan

The Montana Public Service Commission held a public listening session on Montana Dakota Utilities Co.'s 2021 Biennial Electric Integrated Resource Plan in Sidney April 18. Montana Public Service Commissioners Randy Pinocchi and Tony O'Donnell were instrumental in scheduling a session for the public with MDU to get information on the their plans for biennium.

Darcy Neigum, MDU Systems Operations and Planning director, opened the session explaining MDU's 2020-2021 Integrated Resource Planning (IRP), every odd year which was filed with the PSC on Sept. 25, 2021.

The least-cost modeling approach to determine future electric resource additions considering: forecasted customer energy and peak demand requirements; customer demand response and interruptible energy efficiency programs; existing generation fleet; new generation options, new resources, markets or resources requested by others for proposals; future sensitivity studies for risk and robustness.

Existing Generation Resources include: Coal fired:Big Stone Station, Big Stone City, SD; Coyote Station, Beulah, ND. Renewables include: Diamond Willow, Baker, MT: Cedar Hills, Ray, ND; Thunder Spirit, Hettinger, ND and Glen Ullin Recovery Plant, Glen Ullin. ND.

Natural Gas Combustion Turbines include: Glendive 1 and 2; Miles City; Heskett 3, Mandan, ND. Reciprocating Engines: Lewis and Clark 2, in Sidney and another in Poplar; plus mobile generators.

Thunder Spirit Wind was constructed in two phases. Phase 1 included 43 turbines for 107.5 megawatts and went online in 2015. Phase 2 included 16 turbines for 48 megawatts and went on in late 2018. Combined, the site is 155.5 megawatts and can produce enough energy to serve about 50,000 homes.

New Generation Alternatives suggested are: !. Simple cycle combustion turbine; 2. Combined cycle combustion turbine; 3. Reciprocating engine; 4. Coal with carbon capture; 5. Coal without carbon capture; 6. Solar with storage; 7. Wind; 8. Biomass; 9. Response to Request for Proposal (RFP); Market purchases.

Continue to evaluate the accuracy of its demand and energy forecasts and make improvements where

needed.

Continue to implement existing, and evaluate new, cost-effective energy efficiency and demand response programs to meet the company's future requirements.

Continue with the design and development for a new 88 MW simple cycle combustion turbine at Heskett Station, Mandan, ND, to be online in early 2023.

Issue a new request for (RFP) of supply side resources prior to the next IRP.

Continue to study the need to install local generation projects, including community solar, throughout its service area to support load growth, mitigate transmission constraints and provide customer requested programs.

Continue to monitor the availability and price of energy and short-term capacity in the MISO market or through bilateral arrangements and will purchase additional capacity as needed to meet customer demand when economic to do so or necessary to fill short-term needs.

Continue to monitor the development of and impacts to the Coyote Station associated with changing economics in the MISO market and the next round of regional haze reductions and other

changes of environmen-

tal rules for all generation sources and influence the outcomes where possible.

Continue to monitor new regional transmission organization (RTO) resource adequacy requirements associated with changing fleet fuel mix including seasonal variation and reserve margins. Included in the multi-season resource adequacy requirements may be the need to evaluate the conversion of Heskett 3 and 4 to dual fuel combustion.

Continue to evaluate solar and battery storage technologies and their potential for implementation within Montana-Dakota's system as generation and transmission devices.

Continue to monitor the impacts and benefits of its RTO transmission arrangements with MISO and SPP to ensure safe, reliable and economic transmission system for its customers.

Maintain the IRP Public Advisory Group to provide input to and review the company's future resource plans.

Richland County Commissioners Duane Mitchell and Shane Gorder spoke on the impact of losing the Lewis and Clark Station has had on the community, Sidney Sugars Incorporated, Westmoreland and the Savage School.



Shawn Conradsen, Savage Public School Board president, spoke about the huge loss in tax revenue due to closure of the Westmoreland Mine and the Lewis and Clark MDU Station.

Savage Public School Board Chairman Shawn Conradsen informed the audience, "Savage lost \$125,000 in tax base that we will not get back."

PSC Commissioner Pinocchi related several complaints and questions to the audience that he has received from the public concerning MDU's anticipated demand growth and the best path forward to set that demand.

Potential For Grass Tetany

Marley Manoukian, MSU Richland County Extension Agent

As grass begins to grow following the much-needed moisture, there is a potential for grass tetany to occur. Grass tetany is a serious metabolic disorder in cattle that is a result of two issues occurring simultaneously: 1) lactating animals have high magnesium requirements, and 2) lush, green grass is low in magnesium and unable to meet such requirements.

Grass tetany is caused by low levels of magnesium in the blood and affects lactating cows grazing lush, green grass. Magnesium requirements are high in lactating animals and increase as their milk production increases. Peak lactation in beef cattle occurs 60-80 days postpartum. Additionally, animals have a limited amount of magnesium reserves in their bodies and require a consistent intake from their diet to maintain proper blood magnesium levels, especially during these times of increased requirements.

Rapidly growing grass is low in magnesium. This problem is further complicated as the high potassium and crude protein content of the growing grass interferes with the absorption of magnesium in an animal's rumen. Older forage is higher in magnesium content compared to new growth. Grass tetany is more prevalent when grazing areas with minimal old forage leftover

Onset of grass tetany can be rapid and often times the first sign may be finding animals dead with evidence of struggle. Symptoms of live animals include convulsions. weakness, disorientation, or aggression. Consult a veterinarian if you observe symptoms. Prevention of grass tetany is key. Provide a consistent supply of magnesium, which could include a salt and mineral mix or lick tubs which all are available in "high-mag" formulations.

Business Administration. These loans offset economic losses because of reduced revenues caused by drought in the following primary counties that began April 15, 2022.

Primary North Dakota counties: Billings, Divide, Golden Valley, McKenzie and Williams;

Neighboring North Dakota counties: Burke, Dunn, Mountrail, Slope and Stark;

Neighboring Montana counties: Fallon, Richland, Roosevelt, Sheridan and Wibaux.

"SBA eligibility covers both the economic impacts on businesses dependent on farmers and ranchers that have suffered agricultural production losses caused by the disaster and businesses directly impacted by the disaster," Tanya Garfield US Director SBA Field Operations Center West said.

Small nonfarm businesses, small agricultural cooperatives, small businesses engaged in aquaculture and most private nonprofit organizations of any size may qualify for Economic Injury Disaster Loans of up to \$2 million to help meet financial obligations and operating expenses that could have been met had the disaster not occurred.

Businesses primarily engaged in farming or ranching are not eligible for SBA disaster assistance. Agricultural enterprises should contact the Farm Services Agency about the U.S. Department of Agriculture assistance made available by the Secretary's declaration. However, nurseries are eligible for SBA disaster assis-

tance in drought disasters.

North Dakota Utilizes UAS Network To Assist Storm Recovery Efforts With Drones

BISMARCK, N.D. – After another round of severe weather brought blizzard conditions, heavy snow and ice to western North Dakota this past weekend, the state has enlisted unmanned aircraft systems (UAS) technologies to help restore services to residents and assist recovery efforts, Gov. Doug Burgum announced in a joint release with the Northern Plains UAS Test Site (NPUASTS).

North Dakota mobilized UAS to survey rural areas, locating and assessing damage to utility infrastructure, and to help prioritize resources for repairs and recovery.

The remote-pilot-operated drones, flown by ISight Drone Services and the NPUASTS, are able to operate beyond-visual-line-of-sight (BVLOS) flights as part of the state's creation and implementation of Vantis, North Dakota's UAS network. The UAS flights have been supported and monitored through Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) regulations and officials.

"North Dakotans are known for their innovation and resilience," Burgum said. "In difficult times like this, our citizens and neighbors come together to find

new solutions to challenging problems. We're leveraging the investment the state has made in this UAS infrastructure to help workers identify damage and repair ground-based infrastructure. Utilizing our strength in aviation will help citizens and communities on the ground."

The drones are assisting members of the North Dakota Association of Rural Electric Cooperatives, complementing efforts with manned aircraft utilized by Montana-Dakota Utilities. As crews work around the clock to restore power, it's estimated that some western and northwest parts of the state will not regain service for days or weeks. After coordinating with the FAA, flights began Tuesday, April 26.


"This is one of the primary applications we envisioned in creating this UAS network," said Trevor Woods, NPUASTS executive director. "We hope this nimble response can help the state's residents in getting life-saving power restored, and benefit areas and businesses affected by the natural disaster. For such a massive undertaking in fixing lines and infrastructure, we know that locating damage in difficult-to-travel-to areas saves time and assets that can't afford to be wasted."

The NPUASTS, one of seven FAA test sites, has been assisting UAS testing for nearly a decade, and has been a leading research facility in the United States. It has been building out Vantis, the state's BVLOS network that it administers, since the initial state investment in 2019. Vantis' primary test sites in the Williston and Watford City areas are in close proximity to the regions most heavily affected by the storms.

"We're proud to be part of a team that is helping North Dakotans in a significant and tangible way," said ISight CEO Tommy Kenville. "These flights highlight the real-world applications for drones and how critical they will be for services going forward."

ISight and NPUASTS have also offered to help livestock producers to assess fence lines, do cattle counts and provide imagery of their property in the wake of storm damage. The spring blizzards come at calving season for many ranchers, meaning an added economic vulnerability for these businesses.





Cooking for 1 or 2

When you live in a smaller household or by yourself, it can be challenging to plan healthy meals. How much should I make? How can I make something without eating it for a whole week or throwing away a bunch of food? These could be questions you have asked yourself before when cooking for yourself or a smaller household.

Alice Henneman University of Nebraska Lincoln Extension Educator, has created a checklist of some items for "Planning Healthy Meals for One or Two" (2012). One of the general tips mentioned by Henneman is to cook once and eat twice. This is done by planning two meals from the same dish, separating food out before serving, eating the extra food within 3-4 days, or freezing the leftovers. However, it is important to note that not all foods freeze well; for

example, watery foods (celery, cabbage, salad, etc.), creams/custards/milk-based sauces, and fried foods are all examples of foods that do not freeze well. So, if you are planning on freezing some of your leftovers, make sure they are a good option for freezing by checking out Purdue University Extension for some storing leftover tips: https://www.eatgathergo.org/eat/cooking/storing-leftovers/.

Henneman also has some shopping tips and things to think about while you are at the store. If you choose to buy in bulk, try repackaging meat into smaller freezer bags and making smaller portions, as this can help avoid eating the same dish multiple times. Consider individual packaging of foods that you frequently eat from individual cartons of yogurt, string cheese, etc. Try buying fruit at different stages of ripeness and eat it as it becomes ripe. Buy frozen vegetables and only add what you need into dishes. Also, canned foods are an option as the nutrition is comparable to fresh/frozen.


Maybe you have a favorite dish or recipe you enjoy making, but it makes way too much food, and you do not want to deal with all the leftovers? Do not worry; as mentioned by Henneman in "Planning Healthy Meals for One or Two", recipes can


frequently be reduced by 1/2 or 1/3. You can also reduce your pan size when reducing your recipes too. For half a recipe that normally bakes in a 9x13 pan, you can use a square 8-inch pan or a round 9-inch pan. It is also recommended to reduce the

cooking temperature by 25° if you are substituting a glass pan for a metal one.

Even though it sometimes feels challenging cooking for one or two people with some planning, it can become an easier task.
