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Help Sought Finding Sherry Arnold

The FBI is asking land owners in North Dakota and Montana to help find the body of missing Sidney teacher Sherry Arnold.

Williston Police Chief Jim Lokken, along with Sidney Police Chief Frank DiFonzo and Williams County Sheriff Scott Busching, held a press conference Monday at the Williams County Law Enforcement Center, Williston.

Chief Lokken began with thanking the public in the efforts to find Sherry Arnold.

"They have been, from the beginning, a very important component to this investigation." said Lokken, "of not only Sidney residents but those of Williston and all of the surrounding area."

Chief Lokken read the following letter released Sunday night by FBI regarding developments in the investigation

into the disappearance of Sidney resident Sherry Arnold:

"The FBI, the Sidney Montana Police Department, the Williams County Sheriff's Office, and the Williston, North Dakota Police Department are requesting assistance from North Dakota and northeastern Montana property owners in the case of missing Montana school teacher Sherry Arnold. Based on investigative evidence gathered over the last few days, it is believed that Ms. Arnold may be deceased; her body has not been recovered.

Law enforcement is requesting North Dakota property owners in Williams County, McKenzie County, Mountrail County, and extreme northeastern Montana check shelter belts and vacant farmsteads on their land for disturbed soil. The surrounding grassy area may also appear to be matted. A shelter belt is a line of trees that protects soil from the wind. Ms. Arnold's body may be buried in a shelter belt that contains mature or rotted trees.

It is important to note, law enforcement is only requesting help from property owners and is not requesting volunteers to come search. Property owners are advised not to put themselves at risk. Property owners who discover something unusual are asked not to disturb the site and immediately contact the Williams County Law Enforcement Center at 701-774-9191

Chief DiFonzo also thanked the public for their efforts in the investigation.

"Our concern is to get Sherry back to her family," stated DiFonzo, "They are doing as well as can be expected. Thank you to all involved."

The 43-year-old wife and mother went missing Saturday, Jan. 7, at approximately 6:30 a.m., while on her morning run on the truck route in Sidney.

Sidney school officials posted a statement online Friday saying they learned of Arnold's death that day. The statement provided no details.

On Friday, authorities announced they had one man in custody in North Dakota and that another was being questioned in South Dakota. The next day, Sidney Police Chief Frank DiFonzo stated that two men were being held in Williams County, on suspicion of aggravated kidnapping.

Authorities say the two men in custody in connection with the investigation are 47-year-old Lester Vann Waters, Jr. and 22-year-old Michael Keith Spell, both of Parachute, CO. They are in the Williams County Correctional Center in Williston, awaiting extradition to Montana.

It is not clear why these men were in the Sidney area.
Until Sunday, authorities did not confirm if they had recovered Arnold's body but did say after the arrests that there was an ongoing search.

"Based on investigative evidence gathered over the last few days, it is believed that Ms. Arnold may be deceased; her body has not been recovered," the FBI said in a statement Sunday. In the days after Arnold disappeared, hundreds of vol-

unteers, as well as law enforcement authorities and National Guard members combed the town and surrounding countryside without success.

The only clue that has been publicly released was that

one of Arnold's running shoes was found along her running

route.

The FBI joined the investigation mid-week and a few days later, an anonymous tip led investigators to the two men. Officials have not, however, said how or exactly when

and where they were arrested.

A prayer vigil to remember Arnold was held at the Sidney High School Friday evening. Nearly 200 community members, including staff and students, gathered at the high school gum to show their support.

Arnold and her husband, Gary Arnold, have five children combined from prior marriages. Two live at home and attend the same school system where Sherry Arnold worked for the past 18 years.


The Fairview Chamber of Commerce hosted its annual Recognition Dinner Monday evening at St. Catherine's Church. Members of the community were



The disappearance of Sherry Arnold, the Sidney math teacher who went missing on Jan. 7 has devastated the communities in the area surrounding Sidney, but hasn't changed the community spirit of helping your neighbor.

Reflections Of Sherry

The events of the past week point out a few things about our community. "Life in Sidney," several people have told me, "will never be the same." The worst possible thing has happened. One of our favorite citizens (teacher, daughter, sister, wife and mother) has been missing - and has reportedly been abducted and murdered. We mourn her loss. and commiserate with her family for what they are going through.

Everyone knows we are in the middle of a major upheaval in our economy. Sidney and surrounding areas have had oil booms in the past, but those booms pale in comparison to what has been happening recently. This has given many people an opportunity to profit from our natural resources, and workers from all over the country have flocked to this area to find good jobs with good pay. The national media (CNBC and others) has been extolling the virtues of our economy.

When Sherry went missing there was an unprecedented amount of public concern for her welfare. Over 1,000 people participated in search activity to find her. And virtually everyone participated in one form of praver or another to support her husband and family. Every church in town prayed for her welfare. Every gathering discussed "the latest news" about Sherry, and wondered what - if anything - could be done to help her.

Sherry is loved. We hoped the best for her, but now fear the worst. We hear that two men have admitted to abducting and killing her. Rumors have been flying, however, so we haven't known what to believe. Sherry has not been found. Law enforcement agencies from around the area and nation are working together to find Sherry, and once again the public has been asked to "keep their eyes open" to assist in locating Sherry's murdered body.

Sidney has been in the national news in a way it would never have imagined. Most of the nation, I believe, has identified with our plight – and has sympathized with the family for what they have had to go through. Many parts of our nation have had to deal with similar problems in the past. They have had to accept the fact that violent crime is a part of life on this planet.

Although Sherry is reportedly dead, we know that she is alive in the hearts and minds of everyone who knows her. The public reaction to her disappearance is proof of her existence. She was, as they say, one of the best teachers in our community. And that is saying a lot in a community that greatly values its educational system. My three sons describe her as being "their favorite teacher of all time."

Sherry was more than a great teacher and a great citizen. She was also more than a great wife, mother, sister, daughter and friend. She was



a child of God. Her pain and suffering has come to an end. And her oppressors, we have been assured, will be held accountable.

The town of Sidney will spend months and years analyzing why this happened to our small town. Big city violence has entered into our consciousness. We will never leave our houses unlocked again. We will never again be able to go out into the darkness without wondering what evil is lurking in the bushes. We will forever be worried about the safety of our wives and children.

It is ironic that in the very week that Sherry was abducted by strangers the town of Sidney was initiating an effort to feed "newcomers" in town. Daily meals have been offered (and continue to be offered) at our local churches. Sidney is the kind of town that does things like that. It is my hope, moreover, that we don't lose our innocence, our sense of charity, and our willingness to reach out to our neighbors. We should try not to harden our hearts. This experience could destroy us. It would be a far better testimonial to Sherry, however, if we follow her example . . .

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

Recent Burglaries Have Community Members Rethinking Safety

The dynamics of Sidney are changing. What was once a sleepy, small community is evolving into a busy town with a population that is swelling by the day. With an increase of people, also comes an increase in crime. Following a number of recent businesses break ins, local business owners may be starting to rethink the steps they need to take to ensure their assets are secure.

Of recent several Sidney businesses have all been targets of burglary attempts as well as private homes.

While many locals have prided themselves on living in a town where more often than not, people leave their front doors and vehicles unlocked, the recent escalation in crime has everyone rethinking the need for taking safety precautions to help keep their homes and businesses safe.

If your building is locked up and unauthorized entry is difficult, time consuming, noisy and visible, chances are the burglary will be avoided.

Here are some tips for securing not only your business, but yourself.

Locks on all outside entrances should be double cylinder deadbolts with moveable collars. They should also have an inch of throw containing a hardened steel insert and protected by a latch guard.

Padlocks should be made of steel, mounted on bolted hasps and always locked. It's a good idea to file off the serial numbers so that duplicate keys can't be made.

Incorporate doors made from solid construction, (not hollow) metal lined and secured with heavy metal crossbars. Door jams should also be solid and exposed hinges should be pinned to prevent removal.

Windows should lock and have burglar resistant glass treatments.

Lighting should not be used sparingly and building entrances should be well lit as well as the perimeter of the building. It is also a good idea to leave a light on inside the building, preferably near the cash register or safe.

It is a good idea to keep the cash register in a visible place where it can be seen from the outside and monitored by local police passing by. It should also be left empty and

way that creates places for people to be concealed from sight or that provide access to the roof.

Also, do not put I.D. tags on your keys. This will reduce the possibility that anyone finding the keys will also find the locks that they will open.

Taking precautions to protect you should also be a top priority. If you are working late hours, have someone watch you walk to your vehicle when you leave if possible. If you need to use an ATM machine, try to do it during daylight hours or have someone else with you. Inspect the ATM area before you approach it.

When walking around town, avoid areas with little light. Walk out in the open where people can see you.

Before entering your car you should always pay attention to your surroundings and any activity near your vehicle. When leaving a store or home, always have your key ready so you don't have to fumble around for it while walking to your car. Always check the back seat and even under your vehicle before entering.

Don't leave valuable or personal items unattended in your vehicle. If you do not take them with you, store them in the trunk so they can't be seen.

When parking your vehicle, park in well lit areas if possible. After exiting, make sure all of the windows are rolled up and the doors are locked.

When traveling locally, pick out safe spots such as 24hour gas stations, convenience stores, police and fire stations. If trouble should arise or you think you are being followed, drive straight to one of these locations.

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





The Richland County Ambulance Service (RCAS) will be holding a First Responder course starting in February for individuals interested in helping their community through the ambulance service.

As Eastern Montana continues to grow and change, it is critical for emergency medical services to be available at all times, in all locations. Richland County is fortunate to have ambulance services spread throughout the county and a dedicated volunteer team, but additional volunteers are always needed.

"The First Responder program has given more individuals an opportunity to be involved with the Richland County Ambulance Service and has brought some much needed relief to each of our

services around the county," stated Josh King, RCAS director. "We hope that this course will continue to have a good turn out and add additional reinforcement to our volunteer service while still providing Richland County with the best care possible."

The First Responder course is designed to be a shorter time commitment than the EMT Basic class while retaining much of the crucial training involved, allowing them to become valuable assets on the ambulance. The course will cover a broad range of emergency medical subject matter, and will provide individuals with the knowledge to assist on the ambulance. Aside from classroom lessons, the course also focuses on hands-on skills stations that work to develop teamwork

skills and prepare students for real life emergency situations.

People of all ages and backgrounds are encouraged to sign up for the upcoming course. Classes will be held for three hours at a time, two days a week. The course will offer interested individuals the chance to learn the skills of emergency medicine through a more conducive time schedule. Becoming a first responder will require 54 hours of training, spanning about 8 weeks. Upon completion first responders will have the option to take a course that transitions them into the EMT Basic level.

Ray is well known for his "boom and bust" grazing strategies that call for heavy grazing in pastures over short periods followed by longer

sures that the cattle eat all the forage in the pasture and not just select plants, eliminating the competitive advantage of those less palatable plants. The long rest period also ensures sufficient recovery time for stressed soils and plants and the end result has been abundant plant cover even in drought periods, all with lower input costs.

To be successful, however, the system requires modifying livestock behavior to achieve grazing management goals. Ray will share his experience in doing just that on Friday as well. Ultimately, he says, to be successful any grazing management strategy must be robust enough to allow ranchers to adapt to changing conditions. "You need to have a system that adapts to change," he says, "because that's what you're going to get."
