Ahead For Sidney Trial

Severson is being planned. Richland County Attor-

ney Charity McLarty says a scheduling conference is set for 2 p.m. on May 13. McLarty will serve as prosecutor in the case. District Judge Olivia Rieger has set Severson's bond at \$1 million in the case.

Severson remains in prison for tampering. He has served about five years after being sentenced for eight years on that charge. A parole hearing is anticipated to occur soon.

The new trial for Severson is planned in Richland County. "As of right now it will be unless if they request a change of venue," McLarty

The Montana Supreme Court ruled on April 9 that the "cumulative effect" of errors during the 2020 trial of Severson for homicide entitled him to a new trial.

Severson was convicted of mitigated deliberate homicide in the 2019 shooting of Tyler Hayden and sentenced to 40 years in prison.

Severson's attorneys claimed that the State violated his rights to due process by failing to disclose favorable evidence as required under Brady v. Maryland and Montana law. The evidence included investigative reports of a burglary of Severson's home and the contents of Dalton Watson's cell phone.

According to court documents when Severson's girlfriend, Karina Orozco, returned home on the night of the shooting, she discovered their home had been burglarized. In the ensuing investigation, police identified Keaston Johns, Logan Krauser and Immanuel Brown as the primary suspects of the burglary. Johns was Hayden's girlfriend at the time of the shooting.

The Montana Supreme Court notes that Brady evidence need not itself be admissible to trigger due process protections; it need have only the "potential to lead directly to admissible exculpatory evidence."

The court wrote, "The favorability of the investigative reports should have been obvious to the State as early as Aug. 7, 2019. On that date, Watson admitted to receiving items stolen from Karina. The information contained in the reports connected the burglary directly to Watson and Hayden. Watson received proceeds from the burglary-from Hayden's girlfriend-on the night of the shooting. The information connecting the burglary to the shooting had the potential to lead directly to the discovery of other exculpatory evidence, namely the contents of Watson's cell phone."

In attendance were about 20 Cloverbuds, who are between the ages of 5-8. The youngsters are introduced to 4-H before taking part in competitive projects in future years.

Evenson said the day included teaching the children the 4-H pledge through different fun activities. Part of the time featured the kids painting the 4-H clover.

Other projects included making coasters and a fake fish aquarium.

The children also helped with preparing dessert for their pizza lunch. Evenson said that segment included lessons about germs and hand washing.

She added that such a day camp is held each year to get the young children excited about 4-H.

Northeastern Montana residents Miles Knudsen and Valerie Moore are the two Republican candidates seeking the Montana House District 29 seat. The district includes most of Culbertson along with the communities of Froid, Plentywood and

Primary election date is June 4. The two candidates answered the following questions. No Democrats are seeking the position.

Why did you decide to enter the race?

Knudsen: To continue the strong representation that eastern Montana has and needs. With redistricting, eastern Montana loses representation. This makes the experience I have helping your two former legislators Austin Knudsen and Rhonda Knudsen valuable for this area.

How do you feel that legislators can better represent Montanans?


Moore: I feel the best and only way to represent Montanans, particularly northeastern Montanans, is to listen to their issues, needs, and struggles and make yourself assessable to them. Savage School Holds Career Exploration For Students

Savage students learned more about the energy field during a career exploration titled, "The Oil Industry and Its Impact," on April 23.

The afternoon featured presentations from Cross Petroleum, Continental Resources, Valley Garage Welding and Fabrication along with Skills USA.

Information shared from Richland Economic Development included that Richland County is the top oil production county in Montana. The county features 26 oil related companies with a total of 530 employees. Average starting pay is \$35 an hour.

Owen Nelson, Valley Garage Welding and Fabrication, told students that after graduating from Savage High School, he studied welding for two years. He went on to study machinery and then worked for Sidney Sugars for more than two years. Nelson then decided to try his current field.

Valley Garage Welding and Fabrication features up to date plasma tables. Items that Nelson has worked on have included windbreaks, recycled stands, shelves, walkover steps and pump stands.

Nelson encouraged students to consider a trades field. He said there's a lot of scholarships available for trade schools.

Gina Roos, Cross Petroleum, used a trivia question to point out the company's history along with energy industry information. Cross Petroleum started in 1957. Locations include Sidney, Savage, Glendive, Billings, Terry and Hysham. There are four gas stations or "c" stores" in Glendive, one in Savage and one in Hysham.

Rolly Bloesser and Ron Shanks discussed careers with Continental Resources. The variety of positions include engineers, IT technicians, field operators, chemical specialists and media relations.

Bloesser said local jobs include lease operators, superintendents, production techs and foremen.

They told the students that starting wages for lease operators are \$34 an hour with full benefits. Individuals work eight straight days and then have six days off.

Roberta Tillman, state director for Montana Skills USA, urged students not

Skills USA had a welding and fabrication contest for the first time last year. She said firefighting and crime scene investigations are also very popular contests. Skills USA offers 140 occupational areas including culinary, carpentry and me-

With the country facing a shortage of trained young professionals in the work force, it's beneficial to research what Skills USA

Each of Savage's four high school classes provided a presentation regarding the energy industry.

The senior's presentation dealt with information about oil and petroleum.

Juniors toured the Savage coal mine and reported on the mine's history.

Severson was sitting in the rear passenger seat of the vehicle. When Karina and Jessica entered the store; Severson and his daughter staved in the car. Six minutes later, Hayden and Watson arrived at the store and parked next to Karina's vehicle. Both Watson and Hayden entered the store.

After a few minutes, Watson returned to his vehicle. Karina and Jessica exited the store roughly 45 seconds later. Twenty seconds after that, Hayden exited and returned to the passenger side of Watson's vehicle.

After briefly confirming with Watson that Severson was in the back seat of Karina's car, Hayden turned and approached Severson's open window. Words were exchanged from Hayden as he came close to the vehicle. As Havden approached. Severson raised a .38 caliber handgun, shot Hayden at close range, and killed

The library board consists of three county representatives and two representives for the city of Sidney. Heather Cotter was recently appointed to take one of the city spots. Verhasselt said Nancy Verschoot is retiring from the board and needs to be replaced by a county representative.

Sidney Chamber Reaches CVB Status

The Sidney Area Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture has reached a milestone with the announcement that Sidney has regained state status as a Convention and Visitors Bureau (CVB).

The news means some additional funding for Sidney to market its large number of events throughout the year.

"It helps with our marketing," Kali Godfrey, executive director of the Sidney Chamber, said.

In order to reach CVB status, a community needs to have more than \$160,000 in annual gross lodging tax revenue.

Sidney originally reached CVB status when the gross lodging revenue was \$330,298 in 2012 and \$422,239 in 2013 at the start of the oil boom. Sidney lost its CVB status in 2020 after three consecutive years in the \$130,000 to \$148,000 range in gross lodging tax revenue. Now, Sidney has rebounded to hit over the \$160,000 mark again. Godfrey said there are several factors including ongoing business, athletic tournaments and other events.

"Our community is pretty progressive in our ability to host things," Godfrey said.

Richland County had gross lodging tax revenue of \$176,647 during 2023.

Adessa Saitta, a freshman, was the game's winning pitcher.


Sidney then fell to Miles City, 18-12, in conference action on Friday, April 26.

Rule Changes Announced For Wrestling

Based on an official announcement from the National Wrestling Federation, Montana High School's wrestling will see several changes next year.

- 1. Takedowns will now be worth three points instead of two points.
- 2. Nearfall will be awarded two points for two

seconds, three points for three seconds, and four points for four seconds instead of the traditional two points for two seconds and three points for five seconds when a wrestler has their opponent on their back.

3. Beginning next season, wrestlers will be considered in bounds if either wrestler has one point of contact inside the boundary

line. One foot or one hand from either wrestler equals one point of contact.

Girls wrestling in Montana will remain a single-class event, but will move from the current 12 weight classes to the NFHS 14 weight classes.

Boys wrestling will move from 13 weight classes to 14 weight classes.
