The Maah Daah Hey Race Here to Stay Aug. 3

The 9th annual Maah Daah Hey race takes place on Saturday, Aug. 3 on one of world's most majestic singletrack trails and it is right here in our own backyard.

Racers from all over the United States have been eagerly awaiting this competitive race. There will be five races plus a kid's race: 13-mile, 25-mile, 50-mile, 75-mile, and 100-mile (which is 106-miles.) Each race will have a maximum of 200 riders except for the 100-mile race, which allows for 300 riders. Each race will have a different starting point and have staggered starts but will all cross the same finish line in Medora.

The words Maah Daah Hey comes from the language of the local Mandan and Hidatsa tribes meaning "something that has been or will be around for a long time." This breathtaking terrain takes riders through the Badlands and consists of flat prairie grasslands, jagged peaks and valleys, intertwining rivers and has multiple climbs and descents.

Each course will be marked with turtle signs. The turtle is a sign of longevity and according to www.turtleknowledge.com, in "Native American cultures, the turtle represents Mother Earth, and the Turtle symbol signifies good health and long life." We have all heard the phrase "Slow-n-Steady Winds the Race."

Three Aid Stations will be set up every 25 miles, giving racers the opportunity



to refuel. These stations will be staffed with volunteers who will be ready to help riders with dehydrating liquids, power bars, and various refreshments. Aid Stations will also have porta potties, chairs, shaded tents, and volunteer bike mechanics.

In addition to the three Aid Stations, there will be nine check points where the Maah Daah Hey Trail intersects the "major" back roads. If you are planning on racing, these checkpoints are your only "bailout" options. Each checkpoint will have porta potties and water.

Richland County COVID-19, 8 Active Cases, 44 Total July 27

The Richland County Health Department is announcing additional active cases of COVID-19 in Richland County residents, and the release of five cases from isolation. This brings the total case count to 44. At this time, 36 of the total cases are recovered, and 8 are active. Active case updates are as follows:

Case 44: A male between the ages of 10 and 19 who is not hospitalized and is isolating at home. The investigation is ongoing and contact tracing has begun. The individual was symptomatic.

Case 43: A male in his 80's who is not hospitalized and is isolating at home. The individual is a named contact to a positive case from another state. The investigation is ongoing and contact tracing has begun. The individual became symptomatic during quarantine.

Case 42: A female in her 80's who is not hospitalized and is isolating at home. The individual is a named contact to a positive case from another state. The investigation is ongoing and contact tracing has begun. The individual became symptomatic during quarantine.

Case 41: A female in her 20's who is not hospitalized and is isolating at home. The individual is a household contact to a positive case and became symptomatic during quarantine.

Case 40: A female in her 40's who is not hospitalized and is isolating at home. The investigation is ongoing and contact tracing has begun. The individual is a household contact to a positive case and is symptomatic.

Case 39: A female in her 80's who is not hospitalized and is isolating at her residence. The investigation is ongoing and contact tracing has begun. The individual is a named contact to a positive case and is not symptomatic.

Case 38: A female in her 60's who is not hospitalized and is isolating at home. The investigation is ongoing and contact tracing has begun. The individual is a named contact to a positive case and became symptomatic while under quarantine.

Case 37: A female in her 50's who is not hospitalized and is isolating at home. The investigation is ongoing and contact tracing has begun. The individual is a named contact to a positive case and is symptomatic.

The Health Department continues to monitor more than 25 close contacts daily. The Health Department's investigations show that residents could be doing more to follow COVID-19 preventative recommendations, particularly in regard to not going out when sick, staying home after being tested, and avoiding large gatherings.

It is imperative that Richland County residents follow instructions from the Health Department and healthcare providers. The following are important reminders:

• If you are not feeling well, particularly including symptoms of a dry cough, fever, shortness of breath, headache, and other cold-like symptoms, stay home until you feel better. This means that you do not go to work, do not attend regular activities, and cancel or postpone appointments.

• If you have been tested for COVID-19 for any reason, including preoperative testing, you must stay home until test results are received. This means that you do not go to work, do not attend regular activities, and cancel or postpone appointments.

• All residents should be practicing social distancing, including limiting the number of close contacts. This means avoiding large gatherings where social distancing is difficult. Wear a mask as required and when social distancing is difficult.

Together we can slow the spread of COVID-19 in our community. Please do your part so Richland County can recover socially and economically from this pandemic.

"I just wanted to focus on my presentation and doing my best," she noted.

"It was easy to keep a smile when I watched those two," Annika said.





Over the last 40 years Larry has put in a lot of hours at





Montana State Agriculture To Offer Virtual Field Days

Bozeman - The Montana State University College of Agriculture and Montana Agriculture Experiment Station will host a series of virtual field day events to replace in-person field days for 2020.

The usual field days, hosted by MSU's seven research centers and campus facilities, were canceled due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Instead, superintendents and scientists across the state will present both recorded and live content online, available and free to access.



Montana FWP "Kids To Fish" Program Allows **Anglers To Borrow Gear & Tackle For Free**

A popular Montana Fish, Wildlife & Parks program that allows kids and their friends or families to check out free fishing rods and tackle is in full swing again this year.

FWP staff restocked and maintained over 400 fishing rods in nearly 43 different locations across Montana's Hi-Line. The "Kids to Fish" program lets anglers check out fishing rods and reels equipped with basic tackle, such as hooks, bobbers, and sinkers. Typically, eight rods are at each location, and usually a well-stocked tackle box is available to borrow and use.

"Of course, it takes time and effort to replace, maintain, and travel around to all the loaner locations. But it's well worth it if it gets someone out fishing who wouldn't otherwise have the opportunity," said Marc Kloker, FWP's Information and Education Program Manager in Glasgow, who runs the program.

"Just because someone doesn't have a fishing rod doesn't mean they shouldn't be able to go fishing," added Kloker. "Whether it's a cousin in town that wants to go along and needs a rod, or an extra pole is needed for catfishing on the Milk River, we want as many kids as possible to go out and fish and enjoy themselves outdoors.

FWP appreciates the businesses and other locations that display a rack of "They're helping a lot of kids have fun on the water this summer."

The sturdy loaner rods come already rigged with bobbers, split-shot sinkers and hooks. Please keep in mind these rods are likely not cleaned or sanitized after each use. However, anglers are expected to sign out the equipment at the site and return it in good working order, if possible. Kloker reminds folks that these rods are to be brought back to the loaner location, even if damaged.

"The next kid that comes along should also have a chance to fish," he said.

If poles are continually lost or stolen, the ability to continue offering this great opportunity suffers. In addition, FWP tries to match supply with demand as some sites see more interest and participation than others.

These fishing rods are available to be checked out from the outlets by individuals, families, organizations, youth groups and schools. If anyone is looking to check out a large number of rods (more than 20) for a particular event, please contact either the Glasgow or Havre FWP offices and they will get you set up. If there are any questions about the program or if you are interested in having poles available at other locations in your community, please contact Kloker at 406-228-3704.

Record Lakes Stocked with Walleye Fingerlings

North Dakota Game and Fish Department fisheries personnel are finishing stocking a record 180 lakes across the state with nearly 12 million walleye fingerlings. Fisheries production and development supervisor Jerry

Weigel said the number of lakes bested the previous high by "There is record water across the state, so timing of

a near record walleye production could not have come at a better time," Weigel said. "Valley City and Garrison Dam national fish hatcheries contributed to make this happen. Both hatcheries have been outstanding in helping address our demand for walleye fingerlings."

Garrison Dam National Fish Hatchery set a record for the most pounds shipped of these 1- to 1.5-inch fingerlings, with more than 8,400 total pounds.

Given the record walleye production, coupled with a record number of lakes stocked resulted in a lot of driving time for fish haulers.

"Just in the first seven days of this year's walleye production, haulers traveled more than 8,200 miles and stocked over 150 lakes with 7.6 million fish," Weigel said.

Crews had near perfect conditions with most lakes at or near record water levels, with flooded vegetation for the young fish to hide and plenty of food for them to eat, which bodes well for future fishing opportunities. "One of the biggest challenges this year was access

to some lakes," Weigel said. "As a result of last fall's record rains, a lot of local roads in central and eastern North Dakota remained flooded and often closed, thus making navigating some roads more challenging."

Later this fall, fisheries personal will sample walleye lakes to assess success of this year's walleye stocking, as well as what Mother Nature provided.

One common observation fish haulers noted while traveling across the state, Weigel said, was the high amount of fishing taking place, both from shore and from boats.

"It's a great time to fish for walleye," he added. "Statewide, there are a lot of opportunities, and a good chance of success. This is especially true if you live in rural North Dakota where a lot of varied fishing opportunities exist."



















2020 Richland County 4-H Only Fair, Aug. 3-7

The Richland County Fair is an event where youth and their families gather to showcase educational project work, learn through evaluation and make lifelong connection with others. Richland County 4-H members look forward to the fair every year. It is a time to celebrate their accomplishments for the year.

This year we will still be celebrating the many accomplishments of the youth, but it will be a lot different. Due to COVID-19, the public Richland County Fair and Rodeo was cancelled, however, it was decided that 4-H could continue. Richland County 4-H members, parents, volunteers and staff are very appreciative of this opportunity to continue the hands-on education that 4-H and the fair provides to its youth members. We too, will miss the normal fair experience and the camaraderie that comes with it.

In April, Richland County 4-H started developing a plan for this exact circumstance, with so many unknowns this year, it was felt that we should plan for anything and everything. Richland County 4-H partnered with the Richland County Fair Board, the Richland County Health Department, Montana State University Extension and the Montana 4-H Center for Youth Development to ensure that a detailed and safe plan could be implemented, if need be. The plan that was developed

will be implemented Aug. 3-7 as 4-H holds a 4-H only fair.

The plan follows the most up to date guidelines provided from the Montana Governor's Office, including the mask mandate, which allows 4-H to keep involved safe. Class sizes will be limited to maintain a safe distance between all participants. Also, on Monday, all members have a scheduled time to drop off their indoor or static projects. Each club has a designated time to drop off projects to limit person to person contact. The projects will be judged by a limited number of judges on Tuesday



The livestock sale for Richland County members



Although the Fair was cancelled, the 4-H portion is being held in a non-public format. The livestock sale will take place online on Friday, Aug. 7, at 3 p.m. The Schiebers noted that 4-H families are very thankful with how much work that Extension agent Josie Evenson has done to make the

livestock sale and judging possible.

"It's going to be very different," Marett said of the Fair.

Marett, who is a member of the Richland Aces' 4-H Club, is also active in swimming, volleyball and hockey. Her other 4-H activities include sewing and veterinary science.




