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The Long X Visitor Center Brings Art & Culture To Christmas Season

On Dec. 2, from 10 a.m-4 p.m, Pioneer Gifts and Books. located at the Long X Visitor Center, Watford City, will host "Making it Merry," a cozy holiday event inviting the community to shop and enjoy samplings of their North Dakota made products. Most will be from their Pride of the Dakotas line, with Jan Dodge, Long X Visitor Center and Pioneer Books & Gifts manager, planning on having a soup mix and bread mix to share with visitors, jellies and candies to sample, traditional Scandinavian food, and hot coffee from Dakota Dirt and Wild Calf coffee companies. The store offers a wide variety of North Dakota based goods for holiday shoppers to peruse, and between now and Dec. 31, is host to Trish Stevenson and Doug Engberg's artwork, also for sale for those looking for something extremely special.

Part of the North Dakota Art Gallery Association and Art in Businesses pop-up shows, the Long X Art Gallery has two artists in house through the end of the year.

Trish Stevenson is known for her paintings of the West and has been featured in magazines and museums throughout United States.

Doug Engberg's journey into the art world is younger and was cut short with his passing on Oct. 10 of this year. His work, however, is one of a kind and has a lifetime of experimentation and love of art built into it. Doug was born and raised in Williston, spent 30 years of his life working in the oilfield on drilling rigs, and his passion for drawing lifelong. As

a child, he used brown paper bags, and in third grade the school had him build the background for the Christmas play out of cardboard and crayons. Though Doug experimented with wood burning, watercolor, oil paint, pencil, chalk, and other mediums, he found his niche in combining leather as a canvas with a wood-burning tool. Leather lacked any grain to argue with, unlike wood, and though he initially found it hard to stretch well to create a canvas, gluing it to wood proved to be an

effective replacement. Later he added acrylic paint to help his creations come to

The North Dakota wildlife and landscapes Doug brought to life on leather were often inspired by photographs from the internet and magazines, juxtaposed to create an original vision. When Doug decided to offer some to the public, he reached out to Linda Beard, Castle Framing, Williston. Linda was so impressed by Doug's work; she encouraged him to go on tour with

the North Dakota Art Gallery Association. Without Linda, Doug wouldn't have pursued the venture. Unfortunately. Linda passed away Dec. 18. 2022 and Doug chose to dedicate his continued works to her. Each of his paintings has an inscription honoring Linda and their mutual love for each other. With Doug and Linda both passed, the North Dakota Art Gallery Association and the Long X Art Gallery are working with Doug's family to continue his legacy of art, and this will be his first show

post-humous.

One more addition to the Long X Visitors Center's "Making It Merry" event is an art class taught by Jess Newman. Participants will be glazing a vintage Christmas tree, complete with lighting kit, in their choice of color and design, and the center will fire the pieces to finish. Beane Charged Murder-**AA Felony**

On Sept. 12, the McKenzie County Sheriff's Office responded to a residence south of Watford City, ND, for a report of a fire at a residence. Upon arrival of law enforcement, a deceased female was located inside of the residence with injuries sustained from the fire. The main entry into the residence was locked at which time law enforcement made entry and located Scott Beane, Watford City, inside a bathroom. Beane was detained without incident and later charged with N.D.C.C. 62.1-02-01-Possession of Firearm by

Convicted Felon. McKenzie County Sheriff's Office Investigations Division conducted the primary investigation into the death of the female. It was determined the decedent was the mother of Beane. The remains of the victim were sent to the North Dakota Medical Examiner's Office where an autopsy was conducted. The autopsy ruled the victim's manner of death a homicide due to acute thermal and inhalational injuries. Further investigation with assistance from the North Dakota Bureau of Criminal Investigation and the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms, and Explosives determined the fire was not accidental in nature and deemed to be a set fire. This was determined to be an isolated event and there is currently no imminent threat to the public at

As of Nov. 16, Beane has been charged in Northwest Judicial Court for N.D.C.C. 12.1-16-01- Murder-AA Felony. On Nov. 17, Beane was given a bond of \$5,000,000. Beane is presumed innocent until proven guilty. There is no further information to be released at this time.


Fairview Warriors 2023 8-Player State Champions

The Fairview Warriors are the 2023 Class C 8-Player State Champions. The championship game was played at Belt on a beautiful Saturday afternoon pitting the top two teams against each other. Fairview struck first on a one-yard run by Jeff Tjelde. The Warrior defense was tough in the first quarter causing two Belt turnovers, a fumble forced by Gavin Serafini and recovered by Tjelde and a Tjelde interception in the end zone. The Belt offense got rolling in the second quarter, scoring twice to take a 14-7 lead with only 49 seconds left before halftime. Brock Schlothauer broke off a quick 11-yard burst, Tjelde hit Tyler Loan for 22 yards, Jaxon Vitt for 9 yards, and Serafini for 12 yards setting up the Warriors at the 9-yard line with 12 seconds left. Tjelde dropped back to pass one last time, instead finding a seam up the middle and bulling his way over two defenders for a tying touchdown going into

Shirley was very blessed to have so many people in her life that loved her! Summer, her great niece, and Marie Heller and Kimmee were so amazing taking care of her.



Ribbon & Rail's Trains To Run During Sidney's Christmas Stroll

During the Sidney Christmas Stroll, another time-honored tradition will be going on in the basement of Sidney's only in-town craft and hobby store, Ribbon N Rail. Russ Markwald, owner, and the rest of the Sugar Valley Rails model-railroading club will be running their trains on Friday, Nov. 24, to join in the Christmas Stroll.

Markwald has had the trains running for the Christmas Stroll ever since he has been running trains at Ribbon n Rail, but the tradition started a long time before that. The craft and hobby store owner said, "My father loved model trains and Dad always had something going around the Christmas tree, growing up." Time marched on and eventually, Markwald

found himself and partner, Rod Lorenz, running a handful of trains during Christmas at the Village Square Mall. The following year the train display graduated to the basements of Ben Franklin (currently Ribbon & Rail) when the owners of Ben Franklin sold out, Markwald bought the business and changed the name to Ribbon

The Sugar Valley Rails model-railroading club meets on Thursday evenings and Saturday afternoons in the basement of Ribbon & Rail to run their trains. They usually have their trains set up, running, and open to the public on Saturdays from 1-3 p.m.

In 2022, the Sidney Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture included the

store's train setup as an official part of the stroll. They did not make it in this year but they will still be running during the stroll from 1 p.m. to about the time the Parade of Lights gets to Main, usually 7 p.m. Besides their usual setup which may change, depending on the fancies of the club members, they also have a scavenger hunt.

Admission is free, al-

though Markwald and the rest of the club ask that you refrain from touching the trains, tracks, and rest of the displays. Donations are welcome to offset the cost of operating the trains. Ribbon n Rail is located at 110 E. Main St., Sidney, and their regular business hours are from 9 a.m.-5 p.m. Monday-Friday and 9 a.m.-4 p.m., Saturdays.



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
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Crate Montana Holds Ribbon Cutting



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



City Of Williston To Host Annual Tree Lighting Ceremony, Nov. 27

Williston – The community is invited to join the City of Williston in celebrating a treasured holiday tradition with the lighting of the Community Christmas Tree on Nov. 27.

The Christmas tree lighting continues the annual tradition that was re-introduced in 2014. Each year, a tree is chosen from the list of homeowners who have chosen to donate their tree.

This year's Community Christmas Tree comes from 801 24th St. E, donated by Jackie and Jason Peles.

A Colorado Spruce around 50 ft. tall and weighing about 8,000 lbs, the tree was moved on Tuesday, Nov. 14 to its holder on the corner of 26th St. W and 2nd Ave. W.

The Peles' were on hand to watch as the tree was harvested, joined by JoAnne Colebank and family, whose father originally planted the tree as a sapling in the early '80s. Before the tree came down, Colebank's adult children took one last picture in front of the tree, recreating a photo of them standing in front of it from when they were children.

"It's pretty exciting," Jason said of donating the tree. "Especially being able to meet the people that actually planted the tree. (JoAnne) actually knew my grandparents, so this has kind of brought us all together."

Colebank's husband, Wayne, said while it was bittersweet to watch the tree come down, they are honored to be able to share it with the community.

"It's really neat that everybody gets to see it and enjoy it," Wayne said. "We've got a lot of memories there, we watched that tree grow for 15 years. We were very happy when we heard."

With the tree in place, the community is invited to the 9th Annual Community Christmas Tree Lighting Ceremony on Monday, Nov. 27 at 5:30 p.m. There will be a bonfire, refreshments sponsored by Alliance Consulting, holiday music, and fireworks show sponsored by TNT Fireworks. 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
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Diamond Cutter & Jeweler Tim Ritter Retiring After 50 Years

Tim Ritter, Williston, ND, has truly enjoyed his career as a diamond cutter and jeweler but after 50 years, he has decided it's time to relax at his cabin on Pouch Point, and play music. Fortunately, the business is being passed along to his two sons, Ethan and Evan, who will continue the excellence Ritter Brothers is known for.

After pursuing a music career for a few years, Tim and his brother Steve made the decision to become diamond cutters, starting with an apprenticeship in Nevada. While there, Tim also learned the art of silver smithing and jewelry making and followed up with classes at the Gemological Institute of America in Los Angeles.

Back in Williston, the brothers started Ritter Brothers Diamond Cutters in 1976 upstairs in the back of what is now the Cooks on Main building. Their father was a dentist who practiced in the front. Tim explained that a dental lab which made its own gold crowns and bridges, and a jewelry lab were almost identical since everything was done with a lost casting process. After about a year, the brothers opened a retail shop upstairs in the former MDU building next door, with Tim running between the two to assist customers, then back to the lab. "Steve and I worked together for decades and complimented each other," Tim said. "He was the hands-on bench jeweler, a

real craftsman, and I was the in the world. The Cullinan shop guy assisting customers." Ethan as the craftsman, and Evan expertly dealing with clientele, now fill those roles. Plus, Evan inherited his father's distinctive voice.

In 1978, the opportunity arose to buy their current location, prime real estate on Main Street. A.B. and Gertrude DeGree, DeGree Jewelers, had passed away and their daughter, Ann Barbara decided to sell about a year later, after having Eva Dwver run the store. "It's a prime location, a super spot," Tim said. After a couple of years, remodeling started. "The flooring in front was blue and red lino tiles. It was pretty bad," Tim said, laughing. Then the oil boom really kicked in and business was booming. Steve left the business at that time, leaving Tim on his own, but returned once the oil boom ended.

Then the bust brought tough times for everyone, but Ritter Brothers continued to provide top quality merchandise, coupled with outstanding service, and survived. "It's been a high ever since," Tim said.

Trips to Antwerp and Amsterdam to purchase diamonds, as well as trips to Bankok to purchase the best sapphires and rubies in the world, were high points during Tim's long career. He was thrilled to meet the grandson of the man who cut the Cullinan diamond, the largest gem quality

II which is in the Imperial State Crown, is housed in the Tower of London. He was also able to see the mold that the man used to determine the cut. In all, nine diamonds were cut from that one stone. "That was exciting," he said.

"It's been a treat and a joy," Tim said of his long career. "We've served generations of the same family and it's been fun. Our trade area is Montana, North Dakota, Canada, and beyond. The sale has been an especially good time with old buddies stopping in to visit and shop. I love 'em all!"

"The customers are our backbone and we go the extra mile for them," Tim said. "Having a craftsman on hand has been the key to our success," he explained. "People from out of town don't have to wait, we can do repairs the same day. You must have an expert bench jeweler on the premises. It's a prerequisite to success."

For Tim, the past 50 years have flown by. He credits his incomparable staff for much of that. "They were the best, always, and super compatible with the clientele, both in Williston and Devils Lake. They are all part of the Ritter Brothers

"It's been a great career," he said. "I love music more but both have provided a great creative outlet. I've been able to work with the best merchandise in the

clientele. I've enjoyed it all. It's sad to see it come to an end but at 75, I'm tired and need to step back and slow down. The staff and the customers have made the whole rodeo worthwhile."

Tim is confident that his sons will continue the solid tradition of Ritter Brothers. "They're great kids, and top-notch jewelers," he said. "They are tradesmen and good craftsmen and can communicate well on any level, with any age group." Both attended New Approach Jewelers School, Franklin, TN, the best school in the country for the arts. Tim taught them everything he could with the technology he had, but technology has changed and improved dramatically and the young men have learned it all. "With the new technology, they are better jewelers than I ever was," Tim said proudly. Laser welding, which generates no heat, was a huge development, allowing

and work with any type of material including colored stones and silver. Electronic instruments to detect quality and type of stones as well as bullion have also made counterfeiting more difficult. "Counterfeiting is rampant in coins, gold bars, etc.," Tim explained. "We had to buy the new equipment."

As Ethan and Evan make the store their own in January, they plan to update some lines to reflect current trends and economics. "We'll be ordering in some more earthy lines which are popular right now, as well as keeping the classic lines," Ethan explained. "We want to cater to both our past and future clientele." Evan loves being part of the community and plans to continue the tradition of donating to virtually every cause that comes their wav.

"That new Christmas ring will be expertly sized."

Tim will continue with his first love which is music. He still plays the guitar and sings for corporate gigs, weddings and funerals, often with fiddler Amanda Johnson who has been his partner for the last decade. "She sings beautifully and our style and voices blend." Catch Tim on a Friday evening at The Eleven restaurant or maybe jamming at Books on Broadway on a Saturday afternoon mostly during the winter months.

Compared to MDU's 2023 Rate 35 cost tracking adjustment, MDU states that its proposed 2024 adjustment consists of a \$0.00014 per kilowatt hour ("kWh") increase for fuel and purchased power, a \$0.00564 per kWh increase for unreflected fuel and purchased power, and no change for the deferred Montana Consumer Counsel ("MCC") and Commission tax. In sum, MDU's proposed 2024 Rate 35 cost adjustment amounts to a net increase of \$0.00578 per kWh compared to the currently effective rate. MDU requests Commission approval of its proposed Rate 35 adjustment to become effective on a final basis for electric service provided on


