# Alliance of Oil Companies Donates \$10,000 to Froid Fire Department

Also invited to report on local issues is Sidney Mayor Bret Smelser, and the Richland County Commissioners. The public is encouraged to attend and learn what is happening in Montana government during the 2013 session.

Savage, Brockway, Bloomfield, Brusett, Cohagen, Lindsay, Sand Springs and Vida; the water districts of Highland Park, Forrest Park, Spring Grove and Whispering Trees; and the rural users in the service area. Where not defined by county boundaries, the service area is bound on the North by the Missouri River, on the West by Fort Peck Lake and the Musselshell River, on the South by arbitrary East and West alignment and on the East by the Yellowstone River and the Montana-North Dakota bor-

The majority of the users do not have access to a quality of water needed for a healthy existence. The treatment of water is costly and sometimes complicated depending on what is in the water. A regional rural water system like Dry-Redwater Regional Water Authority will allow rural users to have access to a reliable, safe, high quality water supply.

Dry-Redwater Regional Water Authority (DRWA) has been working toward Federal Authorization. Unfortunately the process is extremely slow and cumbersome.

DRWA is a part of the first rural water projects to be included in the Rural Water Act of 2006 (enacted in 2010). The Bureau of Reclamation recently informed DRWA of their expectation for a final design to be drawn up prior to approving our project for construction. As a result, we need to have our final design completed to move forward with the process.

If you are interested in becoming a part of DRWA please contact us immediately. We need you to complete the necessary forms and submit your good-intention fee to be included in our final design. If water lines in our preliminary design do not have enough users those lines may be omitted from the final design.

Any users wishing to be a part of DRWA must have this completed before February 28, 2013. If we do not have enrollment forms and a good intention fee from you by then you will not be considered a part of the initial project construction.



# Seed Source Impact On Seed Performance Focus Of Brownbagger

Does where the seeds you buy are grown affect how well they will grow for you? That's a question Sidney Agricultural Research Service scientist Erin Espeland will answer during BrownBagger presentation this Friday, Mar.1, from noon to 1 pm at the USDA-ARS Northern Plains Agricultural Laboratory Research (NPARL) in Sidney.

"In animals, we know that maternal nutrition affects how their progeny grow: in other words the maternal environment affects the characteristics of offspring." Espeland, a plant ecologist with NPARL studying reclamation issues in disturbed lands, said. "This is true in plants as well. In some species, plants grown under drought conditions produce seeds that do better in drought compared to seeds from plants grown in wellwatered conditions."

Consequently, it may well matter where the seeds you bought for planting were originally grown, she noted. "For example, you can buy seeds of the same Pryor slender wheatgrass grown in Washington state, in Saskatchewan, or here in Montana," Espeland said. "Does the production environment affect the performance of your seeds?"

Espeland will discuss her findings Friday in a presentation entitled "Production farm location affects subsequent seed performance in Sandberg's bluegrass," during which she will compare results from Montana, Oregon, and Washington production gardens on the growth and competitive ability of Sandberg's bluegrass. Her talk is open to the public and will be held in the lab's Technology Transfer Room. We hope you will join us for this very interesting presentation.





# Private Pesticide Applicator Certification Sessions Offered

If not previously certified, it is not required to attend this meeting. If previously certified, attending meeting within 3 years of certifying will renew certification. No testing is required.

# Winter Anglers Reminded to Clean Up Ice

The North Dakota Game and Fish Department reminds winter anglers to clean up the ice after fishing. This not only applies to trash, but fish as well.

It is not only unsightly, but it is illegal to leave fish behind on the ice. According to the fishing proclamation, when a fish is caught anglers must either immediately release the fish back into the water unharmed, or reduce them to their daily possession.

"It is common practice for some anglers to fillet fish on the ice," said Robert Timian, law enforcement chief. "Clean up after yourself. Don't leave the entrails and sides of filleted fish on the ice. Put the carcass in a trash bag and properly dispose of it when you get home."





Former wetlands in the Watershed #12 - Lower Missouri River basin associated with the Big Muddy, Little Muddy, Redwater and Poplar River drainages in Northeastern Montana that could potentially be restored to wetlands are being sought by the Montana Department of Transportation (MDT). If you own drained or partially drained wetlands and would be willing to sell or provide a perpetual conservation easement, a representative would like to hear from you by March 8, 2013. Aaron Krauter, State Executive Director of North Dakota's USDA Farm Service Agency reminds producers to purchase FSA's Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program coverage for noninsurable crops. "Crop insurance is an important risk management tool for farmers, but it's not available for all crops. That's why NAP is so important," said Krauter.

NAP is a federally funded program that provides coverage to producers for non-insurable crops when low yields, loss of inventory or prevented planting occurs due to natural disasters. Crops eligible for NAP coverage are those for which crop insurance is not available, including fruits and vegetables, aquaculture, turf grass and forage crops.

"Producers must apply for coverage before a disaster strikes," continued Krauter. "Like regular crop insurance, once an application period closes, the opportunity to obtain coverage is passed." The application closing date for spring planted crops is March 15, 2013. In order to enroll, producers need to contact the local FSA Office where they farm.

Through the Department's construction program, wetlands are sometimes impacted and Federal regulations require that unavoidable wetland impacts must be mitigated at a minimum ratio of one acre of impact to one acre of restored wetland. Once restored for mitigation credit, Federal regulations require that these wetlands be protected from

further degradation such as draining, filling and leveling through a perpetual Aquatic Resource Conservation easement with the Department.

Wetlands affected by the Department's construction program receive special attention under federal law. In instances where impacts to wetlands are unavoidable, the law allows that the loss can be offset by restoring other wetlands within the same drainage. It is for this purpose that potential restoration sites are being sought.

Landowners need to meet the following qualifications in order to participate in this program:

regulations require that these wetlands be protected from be willing to either sell the

land at fair market value (based on current land use) or provide MDT with a Perpetual Protective Agreement.

Land Parcels must be capable of generating a minimum of ten acres of restored wetlands.

Land that is or has been a part of a Federal or State Conservation program (EQUIP, WRP, etc.) is not eligible for this program.

# MDT Proposes A Chip Seal Project For Montana Highway 16 Near CulbertsonRoosevelt County

The Montana Department of Transportation (MDT) would like to notify the public and seek comments on a proposal to chip seal about 7.3 miles of Highway 16, north of Culbertson. The project begins at the intersection with U.S. 2, at reference marker 88.62 and extends north for 7.3 miles ending near the intersection of County Road 2051-5 (reference marker 81.35).

Proposed work includes a seal & cover (chip seal), repairing severe dips in the roadway, improving truck turning radii at the intersection with U.S. 2, upgrading pavement marking, and signing as necessary. Construction is tentatively planned for 2014 depending on completion of design and availability of funds. New right-of-way and relocation of utilities may be required at the intersection with U.S. 2. MDT staff will contact all affected landowners prior to doing survey work on their land. 



# D Corn Acres On Fast Track

A few weeks ago I wrote about corn being one of the most profitable crops for northwest North Dakota according to the recently released 2013 crop budget of North Dakota State University. Then Rick Bieber of Trail City, South Dakota spoke during the Wheat Show explaining how corn and the crops worked so well in his no-till cropping system. He gave corn a lot of credit for his farm's profitability. Also, about this time, I received research reports of Williston and Minot and found two-year dryland yields to average 70 and 113 bushels per acre respectively. Last year, the dryland grain yields at Williston ranged from 75 to 100 bushels per acre.

Corn grain production is growing very fast in North Dakota. Last year the area planted to corn was 3.6 million acres, of which 3.39 million acres were harvested. This is the largest area ever planted to corn and up by more than 1.3 million acres from last year. The average yield for the state in 2012 was 120 bushels per acre, up from the yield of 105 bushels per acre recording in 2011.

The 2012 growing season started out dry, which allowed for early planting, with more than 50 percent of the average planted by May 6. Conditions tended to be dry after planting, so some emergence issues were noted in some regions of the state. Growing degree day accumulations were above normal so the crop finished early, with nearly all the corn being harvested before the end of October. As we know very well, conditions were very dry during July and August, causing drought stress, which resulted in yields below the trend. However, yields were better than expected because the drought was not as damaging in North Dakota as in other regions of the United States. It is likely some of the corn was planted on ground too wet for any crop the previous year.


search continues to develop corn varieties which have the ability to mature during our short growing season and low rainfall conditions. The NDSU budget used an 80 bushel yield and \$6 per bushel to calculate gross revenue. Both yield and price can change. For instance, last week cash corn was trading at 6.50 to 7.00 across North Dakota. Exactly two years ago the market was paying North Dakota farmers

Early projections by people "in-the-know" indicate U.S. farmers will dedicate a record number of acres to corn in 2013 - 99.3 million. Although the U.S. drought has eased in much of the major U.S. corn producing areas, there still is a bit of uneasiness about the success of the 2013 crop.

There are a number of factors which are or can play into this year's corn market. The high prices of recent times have driven farmers of other countries to learn how to grow corn. While they may not have the lowest costs of production, their crop is the lowest priced in the world market. Thus, U.S. exports of corn have dwindled to the lowest level since the 1971-72 crop year. USDA recently lowered its projection for corn exports by 50 million bushels to 900 million.

USDA has raised 2012-13 world corn productions to approximately 940 million tons, with increases in Brazil, Mexico, India and Ukraine while it reduced Argentina's expected production by 1.1 million tons to 29.7 million due to persistent dryness that is threatening yield prospects, particularly for late planted.

Jerry Gulke, President of the Gulke Group, recently suggested a 2013 corn market as low as \$3.40 per bushel if the national corn yield average reaches 160 bushels per acre and a high of \$7.30 if the national corn yield averages 125 bushels per acre. These numbers certainly indicate there is risk in raising corn. A price drop of \$2 from the \$6 used by NDSU would wipe out the significant return to labor and management listed in the NDSU budget. However, because corn has multiple uses and is used by people around the world, it seems like the corn market should have more high-

# BLM Montana/Dakotas Oil & Gas Lease Sale Nets Nearly \$11.5 Million

# State to share nearly half of sale revenues

As part of President Obama's all-of-the-above strategy to continue to expand safe and responsible domestic energy production, a Bureau of Land Management (BLM) oil and gas lease auction today netted \$11,433,090 in revenues from the sale of 25 Federal leases, totaling 2,831.38 acres, in North Dakota. The quarterly sale took place at the BLM's Montana State Office in Billings.

The highest single-parcel bid was \$1,596,000 submitted by Slawson Exploration Company, Inc. of Wichita, Kan., for an 80-acre parcel located in Mountrail county. This same bid also garnered the highest per-acre bid at \$19,500 per acre.

BLM oil and gas leases are awarded for a period of 10 years and for as long thereafter as there is production in paying quantities. The revenue from the sale of Federal leases, as well as the 12.5 percent royalties collected from the production of

tween the Federal Government and the states. The state of North Dakota will receive 48 percent of the sales revenue resulting from today's auction and royalties paid on oil and gas production from those leases, and fifty-two percent of the revenue generated goes to the Federal Government. North Dakota will receive nearly \$5.5 million from today's sale. Total rovalties collected in North Dakota in fiscal year 2012 for oil, gas, coal, and natural gas liquids was \$138,890,069 Federal and \$257,400,980 Indian minerals.[1] Since the Bakken Play began in 2009, the total payout in royalties on Indian minerals is \$801,253,522.[2]

The Mineral Leasing Act of 1920 and the 1987 Federal Onshore Oil and Gas Leasing Reform Act authorize leasing of Federal oil and gas resources. The 1987 law requires each BLM state office to conduct oil and gas lease sales on at least a quarterly basis. BLM lease sales are competitive and conducted by oral bidding.

Today's auction was the second of 33 oil and gas lease sales the BLM is scheduled to hold in 2013 and builds on the 31 onshore oil and gas lease sales held last year, which generated \$233 million for American taxpayers. The 2012 sales offered more than 1.4 million acres of public land in 1,707 parcels and reflected a continued increase in the average price paid per acre. The price drillers are willing to pay for onshore parcels has more than tripled in the past three years, compared to the last 25 years. Since 1988, the average price paid per acre was \$55, while over the past three years, the average was

Under President Obama's leadership, domestic oil and gas production has grown each year he has been in office, with domestic oil production in 2011 higher than any time in nearly a decade and natural gas production at its highest level ever. Foreign oil imports now account for less than 50 percent of the oil consumed in America - the lowest level since 1995. Revenues from domestic oil and gas production on public lands and federal offshore areas, totaling more than \$15 billion this year, are shared among federal, state and tribal governments and represent one of the largest nontax sources of U.S. government funds.

Potential environmental effects that could result from exploration and development are analyzed before any leases are offered for sale. All leases come with conditions on oil and gas activities to protect the environment that can include limits on when drilling can occur or restrictions on surface occupancy. Once an operator proposes exploration or development on a BLM-issued lease, further environmental analysis under the National Environmental Policy Act is conducted to determine the site-specific need for various

types of impact-limiting or mitigation measures. In addition, many operators routinely use Best Management Practices such as remote monitoring of producing wells and multiple wells per pad to minimize surface im-
