

WREC Receives \$750,000 For New Seed Plant

The NDSU Williston Research Extension Center's (WREC) employees and farmers in the MonDak trade area are excited about the good news the WREC received in late April. This good news was that the WREC received \$750,000 in funding to build a brand new seed cleaning facility. This facility will benefit not only the WREC and its employees but also MonDak area growers who purchase seeds from the WREC on a regular basis.

Kyle Dragseth, Farm Manager at the WREC, explained that the funding was finally made possible by the progressiveness of Tom Wheeler, the Advisory Board President, and Jerry Bergman, the WREC Director, "They have worked long and hard to get this vision to a near reality," said Dragseth.

The research center has

been trying for many years to update its current seed cleaning facility, but with lack of funding, it just wasn't possible. The WREC's current facility was built in 1956, making it the oldest one out of all the Research Centers in the state of North Dakota.

Dragseth explained, "We are still working on fundraising and thus far have raised a little over two-thirds of the money needed to make this happen." Although the WREC still has fundraising to do, \$750,000 will go a long way toward the WREC's capital campaign

goal of \$2.25 million.

In order to obtain the funding, there were many procedures the WREC had to go through. Dragseth explained, "There have been many hoops to jump through in an attempt to raise funds for a new facility: first was to get permission from the Board of Higher Education, NDSU,

and the state legislators." Since then, a campaign has been underway to raise the necessary funds for Williston's seed-cleaning facility. One of the most significant contributors was Williston's STAR Fund donation of \$250,000.

The WREC is hoping to be done with fundraising by December 2019, and if things go as planned, construction for the new facility will possibly begin in the spring of 2020.

As WREC's Farm Manager, Dragseth conducts and oversees all farming aspects of dryland research projects, farm operations, and seed production, equipment and station care and maintenance. Dragseth has worked at the WREC for 23 years full time, and four years part-time, so he has had a lot of experience with cleaning seed at the

WREC's current facility.

Dragseth explained when cleaning seed at the current

facility, it is challenging to keep an eye on the seeds when they are on five different levels,

WREC's current seed cleaning facility only produces 35 bushels an hour, which makes it challenging to keep up with regional demand. The new facility is expected to clean seed almost six times faster than that - approximately 200 bushels an hour. The new seed cleaning plant will be all on one level so Dragseth will be able to do several projects at once.

When Dragseth was asked what part of the new facility he was most excited about, he explained, "The seed plant being equipped with an optical sorter with infrared lighting designed for the most complex color sorting." This sorter will deliver seed with the highest genetic purity of new and higher-yielding/value-added crop varieties for MonDak area growers.

Badlands Search And Rescue Poised to Save Lives in McKenzie County

In October 2018, an organization was born that could change the McKenzie County area disaster response forever. Fifteen courageous men and women banded together to create Badlands Search and Rescue, a volunteer SAR team serving Western North Dakota and Eastern Montana.

This new team is hoping to fill a large need in the area. According to former McKenzie County sheriff deputy, Travis Bateman, the nearest full-service SAR team is in Rapid City, South Dakota. Rapid City is almost 300 miles and over four hours away. There are other assets that can assist in SAR closer, such as boats, dive teams, SAR dogs, and technical teams in Williston and Dickinson but even the relatively short 50 miles between Williston and Watford City leaves plenty of space for severe weather or multiple incidents to interfere with a team's journey to a site and severely lengthen travel time to the McKenzie County area. Travis said, "The void here for a stand-alone, self-sufficient SAR team is apparent as the population grows, more back country activity occurs, and natural disasters happen more and more often." Badlands Search and Rescue seeks to fill that void by being based centrally, in Watford City, and available regionally over many counties. They are also willing to assist any and all public safety agencies at their request and be available to educate youth and outdoors enthusiasts in back country first aid, survival, and safety.

The current members are all highly trained to conduct responses and activities that are often drawn out over three hours or longer and require specific and dedicated assets to missions such as missing people, lost hunters/fishermen/ hikers/mountain bikers; boating incidents, drownings, falls from cliffs, personal aircraft crash, jet ski crash, technical/ high-angle rescues in Badlands terrain, and ATV and off-road vehicle incidents. The main challenges locally are the terrain and the availability of capable, trained personnel making them different from the typical fire, rescue or EMS responses that typically don't last beyond two to three hours and require an additional skillset only attained from SAR training. Badlands SAR is a member of the National Association for Search & Rescue. Their training and certifications for SAR are attained through courses provided by the association. The medical training certifications BSAR attain through North Dakota EMS Association. They are currently pursuing additional rescue, rope, extrication training through the North Dakota Firefighters Association, and State of North Dakota.

They are an all-volunteer organization, funded by donations, grants, fundraising, and individual member investments and as of June 25, 2019 they were approved for 501C3 nonprofit status so now charitable donors can receive a tax cut. They are currently in need of snow/winter weather equipment to aid in SAR calls as well as augment EMS when ambulances are incapable of traversing due to blizzards or heavy snow events. They are also seeking a base location for the team to store response vehicles, gear, have training and meetings.

Phenomenal assistance has already been provided in starting the team by the McKenzie County Emergency Manager and North Dakota Department of Emergency Services SAR Coordinator and State Radio. They received several donations, including gear and funds.

Currently, BSAR only has fifteen members and has yet to start recruiting but as the organization develops they plan to start recruiting as early as fall, 2019. Those interested in joining the team when recruitment opens can email BSAR to get information on the requirements of membership.

get information on the requirements of membership. Badlands SAR's responses are entirely free. They stand by the national approach that they will not charge for their services but will gladly accept donations in order to continue to provide help to others that find themselves in duress. The only billing that may come from an incident would be from air and/or ground ambulance services if they transport a patient, hospital if they treat a patient, or law enforcement if they choose to charge for a criminal violation or for the search efforts from their department. Donors will be informed of exactly what their contributions to the team were used for. Travis said, "It's important for them to know how they are aiding us."

Severson Pleads Not Guilty

Kyle Severson plead not guilty in district court on July 15 to the charge of deliberate homicide before Judge Katherine Bidegaray. The charge was filed in connection with the shooting death of Tyler Hayden on July 2. An omnibus hearing is scheduled for Sept. 16 at 9:15 a.m. The court set a trial date of Dec. 10-13.

Public defender, Michael Haase, made a motion to reduce bail. Judge Bidegaray set a date of Aug 12 at 8:15 a.m. to hear arguments on the motion. Severson's bail is currently set at \$2,000,000.

If convicted, Severson faces a maximum sentence of death or 100 years in prison. The minimum sentence is 10 years in prison.

According to a statement released by authorities, Sidney police responded to a report of a shooting on the night of July 2 to the Loaf-N-Jug convenience store at 706 S. Central Ave., Sidney. Upon arrival the officers located an unresponsive Tyler Anthony

Hayden who appeared to be the victim of a gunshot wound. Richland County EMS assessed the victim and determined that he was deceased. Severson turned himself in to police following the incident.

police following the incident. According to court documents, Severson waved his right to an attorney and provided a statement to police. Severson stated to police there was an interaction between the victim and Severson's girlfriend, Karina Orozco inside Loaf-N-Jug. Orozco, Severson and his young daughter were driving away from the convenience store when the victim approached the vehicle. Orozco was driving and stopped the vehicle, then Severson shot Havden.

Video surveillance from Gem City Motors located directly across the street from Loaf-N-Jug shows Hayden approaching the SUV, stopping, and immediately falling to the ground

Severson also stated that
he had begun carrying a gun

Richland County to Receive \$300,000 for Water **Infrastructure Improvement** Thanks to Tester

Grant funding will help upgrade the Sidney Water Users **Irrigation District Main Canal**

(U.S. Senate) - In his ongoing efforts to improve and rebuild Montana's aging water infrastructure, U.S. Senator Jon Tester has made a big splash by helping to procure a \$300,000 grant to upgrade water lines in Richland County.

The \$300,000 WaterSMART grant-funded by the U.S. Department of Interior Bureau of Reclamation—will help improve the efficiency of the earthen Main Canal in the Sidney Water Users Irrigation District by converting 12,200 feet of canal to a pipeline, reducing seepage and saving more than 1,300 acre feet of water. The \$300,000 grant will be matched with \$346,116 in non-federal funding for the project.

"Water is the lifeblood of our rural communities," said Tester. "In many places across our state, waters systems are outdated and wasteful, and investing in critical infrastructure like this is investing in the future of small towns in Montana."

Through his role on the Senate Appropriations Committee, Tester helped secure funding for the WaterSMART grant program to help communities conserve water and improve infrastructure. However, the Trump Administration's FY20 budget proposed cutting the program from \$34 million in the last Fiscal Year to just \$10 million.

As the only working farmer in the US Senate, Tester continually fights for rural communities. In 2018, Tester worked across the aisle to secure the Water Resources Development Act, which passed the Senate 99-1. Last year, Tester helped pass the 2019 Energy and Water Development Appropriations Act, which includes much-needed investments to help deliver clean water to communities across Montana.

Defense to Make Motion to Continue in Hinds Case

The defense for Sasha Hinds indicated it will make a motion to continue during an omnibus hearing on July 15 before District Katherine Bidegaray. The pretrial motions will be heard in court on July 29. Hinds appeared in court via video from the Montana State Hospital in Warm Springs.

Public defender, Cynthia Thornton, also stated to the judge that the defense plans to complete their own evaluation of Hinds' fitness to stand trial. Documentation of the evaluation from the Montana State Hospital has not been released.

A status hearing on the case is scheduled for Aug. 26.

On April 15, Hinds entered a plea of not guilty to the charges of Deliberate Homicide and Aggravated Assault in connection with the death of her 2-month old daughter, Kylie Ann Hinds, and the stabbing of Brendan James Sheehan.

If convicted Hinds could face death, life imprisonment or a 100-year sentence. The minimum penalty is 10 years impris-



Eddie Buxbaum This Year's Honoree For Fairview's 73rd Annual Old **Timers Reunion & Summer Festival**

Every year since 1946, on the third weekend of July the people of Fairview, Montana have come together to reminisce and honor the people who have made a difference in the community. This year, 2019, Eddie Buxbaum will get his face on the Fairview Old Timer's Reunion and Summer Festival button.

Eddie was not born here. His family moved from Nebraska to Crane, Montana way back in 1930. He spent most of his childhood there until, in 1943, his father bought a farm north of Fairview. There, the family farmed sugar beets, wheat and alfalfa and raised cattle. In 1945. Eddie married Frances Gardner and they raised four children together. While farming and caring for his family, Eddie often reached out to participate in the community of Fairview. He was President of the Montana-Dakota Beet Growers Association, a member of the Fairview School board, the 1st United Bank (now Yellowstone Bank) board, Zion Lutheran Church council and a State Senator in Montana Jaycees. He also helped build Fairview's first pool. Eddie's wife, Frances opened her own dress shop in 1987 called The Modern Lady, which Eddie would help out in occasionally. Eddie and his family have known hardship as well. They lost their oldest child, Larry, to a tragic car crash and Frances went on to be with the Lord in 2008. One of his sons, Scott, stayed in the area but his daughter, Barbara, and son, Doug, left the area to start families of their own and bring up children and grandchildren to the Buxbaum line. According to Scott, his siblings staved in Montana and a few of the grandchildren moved out of state. All but one or two of Eddie's descendants are planning to come back for the festival to celebrate. Eddie has spent most of his life in Fairview and called it home until 2017 when he moved to Sidney for health reasons.

Every year the festival's board members choose the honoree for the festival. Board Member Renee Sundheim said "Every year the festival committee comes up with names of community members that we feel are well deserved of the honor. Eddie has been very involved in many things throughout the years for Fairview. It was a hard choice as there are always many

Cape Air Officials Visit Sidney

Cape Air officials met with community members July 10 to outline their plans for continuing air service to northeastern Montana. The Essential Air Service contract is up for renewal, with a meeting in Billings July 12 during which representatives from each area submitted recommendations to Washington. Walt McNutt is the representative for the Sidney area.

The biggest news from Cape Air was the addition

of new twin engine Tecnam P2012 Traveller airplanes to their fleet. The planes will offer one additional seat, a luxurious cabin with Italian leather seats, improved heating, air conditioning, and noise control. Cape Air will take delivery of the first eight planes by the end of 2019, then one per month in 2020. The planes will be phased in to the market once pilots have completed training at their headquarters in Hyannis, MA. The company is currently awaiting certification of the Tecnam from the FAA. Cape Air is the world's first airline to place the P2012 into commercial service.

The current low fares will be maintained according to company officials.

Andrew Bonny, senior vice-president of planning for Cape Air also spoke on Cape Air's partnership with Rocky Mountain College where their aviation grads gain flight time in the co-pilot seat, then are able to advance to major airlines, providing a well-paid

Questions were asked about possible service to Helena, especially during the legislative session. However, EAS only allows flights within it's designated area. Bonny did raise the possibility of charter flights out of Billings in time for the next session.





USDA Extends Deadline To Report Spring-Seeded Crops In North Dakota

Producers in States Impacted by Floods and Heavy Moisture Must Report by July 22

Fargo, ND - The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) is extending the deadline to file crop acreage reports for agricultural producers in North Dakota impacted by flooding and heavy moisture. The new July 22 deadline applies to reporting spring-seeded crops to USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) county offices and federal crop insurance agents.

"Agriculture operations throughout the state have been hit hard by heavy rains and flooding that have affected their operations," said Brad Thykeson, FSA State Executive Director in North Dakota. "The deadline extension provides more flexibility for producers who experienced planting and field work delays."

Filing a timely crop acreage report is important to maintaining eligibility for USDA conservation, disaster assistance, safety net, crop insurance and farm loan programs. A crop acreage report documents all crops and their intended uses and is an important part of record-keeping for your farm or ranch.

Producers filing reports with FSA county offices are encouraged to set up an appointment before visiting the office. Acreage reports from producers in North Dakota who set up appointments before the July 22 deadline are considered timely filed, even if the appointment occurs after the deadline.

The following exceptions apply to acreage reporting:

• If the crop has not been planted by the reporting date, the acreage must be reported no later than 15 calendar days after planting is completed.

· If a producer acquires

additional acreage after the above acreage reporting date, the acreage must be reported no later than 30 calendar days after purchasing or acquiring the lease. Appropriate documentation must be provided to the county office.

"Even though the deadline has been extended, I encourage producers to contact their local FSA office today to schedule an appointment to report acreage," Thykeson

Other USDA Efforts to Help Producers

USDA is taking additional steps to help producers across the country, including:

· Updating the haying and grazing date for producers who have planted cover crops on prevented plant acres;

· Offering special signups through the Environmental Quality Incentives Program for assistance to plant cover crops; and

· Extending the deadline to report prevented plant acres in certain places.


