2023 MSU-EARC & NDSU-WREC Preparing For Annual Field Days

The 2023 MSU-EARC Field Day, Sidney, 1501 N Central Ave., will start at 9 a.m. on July 11. They have an agenda packed with speakers who will be covering their current research projects, all of which affect our local farmers and crop choices.

Marie Dorval, MSU Ph.D. student, will be discussing intercropping chickpea and flax for Ascochyta disease management.

Followed by, Dr. Frankie Crutcher, MSU-EARC plant pathologist, will speaking on cover crops affecting pulse crop root diseases.

Dr. Chengci Chen, EARC superintendent and agronomist, will share his findings especially interesting to local growers looking for alternatives to sugar beets. His studies of mung bean, adzuki bean, and dry beans as potential rotation crops for the region include variety selection, planting, harvesting, and weed management. Dr. Chen will present with Dr. Maral Etesami, research professional, their study of camelina and canola as potential rotation crops for dryland and irrigated production systems.

Dr. Gautum Pradhan, NDSU Research Agronomist, will cover black gram and soybean variety performance; followed by Drs. Jason Cook and Mike Giroux, and several other plant breeders, discussing cereal crop breeding and new released varieties.

Lunch will be served at EARC building, 1501 N. Central Ave., Sidney.

Williston's NDSU-REC 2023 Field Day will begin July 12, and plans to run from 4-8 p.m., at the Research Extension Center, 14120 Hwy 2, Williston.

There are three divisions of the Willistion-REC; Agronomy/Dryland, Horticulture, and the Irrigated Tour.

The Irrigated tour will be held separately on July 13, from 8:30 a.m.-12 p.m. at the Nesson Valley Irrigation Research and Development Farm, located 23 miles east of Williston on Hwy 1804.

Meals will be served at both, with the dryland and horticulture tour serving a steak and lamb dinner afterwards,

and the Irrigation tour plans on

offering hamburgers for lunch. The agronomy, or dryland, section of the tour will host Hannah Worral, Minot Research Center, speaking on pulse breeding and upcoming releases, and Kyle Dragseth, WREC, will share their foundation seedstock pulse varieties at stop 1. At stop 2, Clair Keene will discuss Kernza perennial grain, also considered a sugar beet alternative. Lindsay Malone and Kelsey Griesheim are two planned speakers at this stop, along with Audrey Kalil, NDSU-REC plant pathologist. Kalil will speak on the impact of planting date on root rot of peas.

In fields 3 and 4, the third stop of the tour, they plan five speakers and an optional seed plant tour for those interested. Plotted speakers and topics include Elias Elias on durum varieties and breeding update; Andrew Friskop with a scab update; Charlie Lim with a weed management update; and Gautam Pradhan with guar and black gram trial results. James Rogers is a hopeful, discussing forage grass species selection and

production The horticulture section of the tour was not able to share their plans at this time, but Tyler Tjelde, Nesson Valley Irrigation Research Farm plans to cover diseases in corn and small grains during their tour. Andrew Friskop, NDSU plant pathologist, will discuss weeds and weed management, especially in resistant varieties. Again, that tour will take place July 13, from 8:30 a.m.-noon., at the Nesson Valley Research

For producers, the field days provide priceless research updates and information valuable to their daily and future operations. They represent not only the last year's research findings and progress, but decades of scientists and agriculture professionals' labors to better our farming techniques and ultimately, results.



Burgum **Appoints Watford City** Attorney "Chas" Neff Jr. To NW **Judicial District** Judgeship

Bismarck, ND - Gov. Doug Burgum has appointed Watford City attorney Charles "Chas" Neff Jr. to a judgeship in the Northwest Judicial District.

Neff has served as a staff attorney for the Northwest Judicial District Court since May 2020, assisting judges with research and drafting orders and opinions on a variety of topics including criminal motions, oil and gas matters, administrative appeals and complex civil pre-trial motions, in addition to providing trial assistance. He previously served as the McKenzie County state's attorney in Watford City in 2017 and 2018 and as an assistant state's attorney from 2014 to 2017, prosecuting over 3,000 criminal cases, 23 jury trials, and advising the County Commission on legal matters. He also spent seven years as a reference staff attorney and consultant for the legal research platform Westlaw at Thomson Reuters, Eagan, MN, and worked for the Permanent Observer Mission of the Holy See to the United Nations during the 61st General Assembly.

Neff was born and raised in central Minnesota. He is a graduate of Shanlev High School, Fargo. and Cardinal Muench High School Seminary. He earned his bachelor's degree in mass communications from North Dakota State University, Fargo, and his law degree in 2006 from the University of St. Thomas School of Law in the Twin Cities.

Neff is a member of the Upper Missouri Bar Association and the Long X Arts Foundation and has officiated several sports at the high school and collegiate levels. He will fill the judicial vacancy created by the retirement of Judge Paul W. Jacobson. Two attorneys were named as finalists to fill the vacancy for the judgeship, which is chambered in Williston.

MT Depart. Of Revenue Mailing **Property Appraisal Notices**

Public Meeting Scheduled July 18 in Sidney

Helena - The Montana Department of Revenue is mailing property classification and appraisal notices to all owners of residential, commercial, industrial, and agricultural land properties.

These notices are not tax bills. They include the department's determination of market or productivity value and the taxable value for your property that will be used by your county treasurer to determine the property taxes owed for tax year 2023 and 2024.

"It's important that Montana property owners review this information," said Brendan Beatty, Montana Department of Revenue director. "If property owners wait until property tax bills are sent in November, it will be too late for the department to correct property characteristics and make adjustments that may impact the value of the property for tax year 2023. So please review the notice as soon as possible and contact us if you have questions."

If property owners disagree with the department's determination of value for their property, they may submit a Request for Informal Classification and Appraisal Review (called Form AB-26) within 30 days of the date on their notice. Owners can electronically submit the form, download it, and find more information on the informal review process at MTRevenue.gov.

In July, public meetings in cities and towns across the state will be held to help taxpayers understand the property valuation process and how the department determined the new values on their appraisal notices. Go to MTRevenue. gov for the dates, times, and venues of the public meetings



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

Thomas (Tom) Eugene Prevost was born to Paul and Lucy Prevost on July 1, 1958, Sidney, MT. Tom attended St. Matthew's Catholic School and graduated from Sidney High School in 1977. Throughout his life Tom always loved animals, especially dogs and horses. One of Tom's favorite things to do as a child was to go out to Three Buttes to play with his cousins George and Phillip Prevost.

Tom was in band in school. He played the trombone, but his real passion became rock and roll. He loved his music! There was rarely a day (or night) that music wasn't playing in his home. His genre included everything from instrumental to hard rock and roll. Not only did he listen to the music, he researched many of the bands. He could tell you random facts and trivia about them.

His passion for music inspired Tom to teach himself to play both the acoustic and bass guitar. He loved to jam out on his guitar in his bandanas and band t-shirts. He would play day or night, sometimes waking up the neighbors! At first, he learned to play many of his favorite songs, but later he wrote poetry and put chords to some of his poems. He would spend hours writing poems, listening to music or playing guitar. Tom also learned to play the harmonica,

Native American flute and the bongo drums. He truly was a music man!

Tom's other interests were photography, sketching and drawing in pencil and charcoal. Most of his drawings were of landscapes of familiar places or from his photography. He entered several of his drawings and photos at local fairs, winning ribbons.

Tom was a big fan of both the Minnesota Twins and Vikings. He often listened to the Twins on the radio just like his grandmother Cole. He loved the statistics of the game and could rattle them off. His ability to calculate in his head also came in handy when he was working construction with his dad and brother, Greg.

Besides working construction and helping on the farm, Tom worked several jobs. Most of them were at convenience stores. When he got bored, he could always find another job. He never seemed to worry when he left one job and was resilient in finding another. One of his favorite jobs was working for Linette at Miller's Corner.

Tom loved holidays, birthdays, and family gatherings. He especially enjoyed playing Santa for his nephews.

Tom was in a relationship with Jeanne Johnston for several years. They enjoyed and loved each other's company. Jeanne always made sure Tom's birthday was special.

Tom loved to spend time out in nature, taking long walks or just walking around town. All his life he was willing to be a runner for others to get them whatever they wanted from the store. He was his siblings' treat go getter when they were kids and continued being a runner for his friends at Crestwood.

One constant in Tom's life was his quiet and personal faith. He acquired his faith foundation from his parents and then attended a search in high school. After that he worked several searches with his sister, Diane. Throughout his life, despite his struggles, he relied on God and his faith. They were a constant entry in all his journals.

Tom's sisters Deb and Mary played a critical role ensuring Tom got the care he needed and that his medical needs were met. He spent his last years at the Sidney Health Center Extended Care facility after suffering mini strokes. This was a big adjustment for Tom and the staff as he had physical difficulties and was unable to communicate verbally. There definitely was a learning curve with many trials and errors along the way. Throughout the process a strong bond developed between Tom and the staff. Through the staff's patience, kindness and compassion, they became his beloved family. They often would stop by his room to assist Tom with his lifelong addiction to Mountain Dew and chocolate, and of course, make sure his music was turned on. It wasn't long before Tom developed some favorites. When he was in a good mood, Tom would flash his big bright smile and his face would light up whenever they entered his room. Sometimes he even asked for kisses! He loved them and they loved him as was evident from the many visits to Tom in his last days at the hospital.



Look Out For Harmful Algal Blooms When Recreating This Summer

Reporting Suspected Blooms Helps Alert Others

Helena - When recreating on Montana's waterbodies this spring, summer and fall, be on the lookout for harmful algal blooms (HABs) that can occur on Montana's reservoirs and lakes. While not all algal blooms contain toxins, the blooms can impact human health and the health of freshwater ecosystems. Report suspected HABs at HAB.mt.gov to help others be alert and prevent

> How to identify HAB: A coloration or scum

on the surface of the water that can look like grass clippings or spilled paint.

• Blooms are often blue, green or gold in color.

HABs can occur when there is a rapid overgrowth of blue-green algae (also called cyanobacteria). The

blue-green algae can produce toxins that can cause skin irritation, sicken humans and even kill pets and livestock if ingested. Toxins do not always occur with a HAB and water quality samples are the only way to determine if toxins are present. Blue-green algae are native to Montana and commonly occur at low, safe densities in many freshwater

When in doubt, stay out. Do not drink, swallow, or swim in water that shows signs of HAB and keep kids, pets and livestock out. Direct contact, ingestion, or inhalation of the toxins may irritate the skin, eyes, nose, throat and respiratory system, or cause nausea, vomiting, diarrhea, headache, dizziness, muscle weakness or liver and kidney damage. If you suspect an HAB-related illness in a person or animal, including livestock, call your health care provider or veterinarian immediately.

The Montana Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) and Department of Public Health and Human Services (DPHHS) maintain a website where people can submit reports of suspected HABs at: HAB.mt.gov.

Before recreating in a waterbody, Montanans and visitors can check the website and view a map of reported blooms, any associated health advisories and monitoring data associated with reports. The site also has photos and information to educate yourself on how to identify HAB. If you suspect HAB, submit a report to HAB.mt.gov and state agencies will work with the local jurisdiction to sample for the presence of toxins and monitor the incident. These reports are important for the health and safety of recreators and water users

in the state, and they also help state agencies track where nutrient pollution may be an issue.

Nutrients like nitrogen and phosphorus fuel algae growth and potential HABs. Below are actions you can take to reduce nutrient pollution in Montana's waters:

- · Reduce your use of lawn or crop fertilizers.
- · Avoid trampling streamside vegetation when you're recreating.
- · If you live alongside a stream or lake - restore and protect native woody plants, flowers and grasses because they help filter pollution and stabilize land.
- If your home relies on a septic system, have it regularly serviced and consider upgrading it to a higher-level treatment system.


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














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Sidney Lions Club 6th Annual Trap **Shoot Held June 25**

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that on June 14, 2023, the Town Council (the "Council") of the Town of Fairview, Montana (the "Town"), adopted its Resolution No. 559 of its Intention to Increase Rates and Charges for the Users of the Water System.

The City currently owns and operates a municipal drinking water and distribution system (the "System") and imposes a monthly rate charge on all connections to the System (the "Monthly Rate Charge"). The costs of the System covered by the Monthly Rate Charge are the amount necessary to pay the costs of operating and maintaining the System, to pay the principal of and interest on any outstanding or authorized debt of the System and to establish and maintain any reserves and other debt service requirements. The current Monthly Rate Charge for the System is as follows:

The Town charges a rate of \$20.00 each month for fire protection on all improved properties within the Town that are neither hooked up nor using the Town water System where available. The Town proposes to not change this Fire Protection rate.

The proposed new Monthly Rate Charge for the System is proposed to be as follows:

The reason for the proposed increase in rates is that the Town will need to borrow approximately \$675,000 (payable over 30 years at an interest rate of 2.5% per annum) as part of the Town's waterline replacement Project, and the costs of operating the Town's water system. The debt service coverage requirements for such loan repayment and reserves, as well debt service coverage on existing water debt, will be approximately \$149,513 per year and the expenses for that water system, including operation and maintenance are estimated at \$260,449 per year. These obligations, along with the increasing costs of operation and the need to maintain reasonable reserves, require a monthly base rate increase of \$12.00 per month per equivalent dwelling unit (EDU).

On July 12, 2023, at 7:00 PM at the Fairview Senior Center, located at 217 West 5th Street, Fairview, Montana, the Council will conduct a public hearing on the proposed water rate increase. Comments may be given orally at the hearing or submitted in writing to the address below before 3:00 PM on the date of the hearing. 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
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MonDak Heritage Center Announces Pat Olding's "Montana Fabric" Exhibition & Open House, **Hosts Artist Reception July 7**

Join us at the MonDak Heritage Center on Friday, July 7 from 5-7 p.m. for a reception for Montana artist Pat Olding. Olding's art exhibition "Montana Fabric" will be on display at the MDHC until Aug. 26.


Olding's "Montana Fabric Exhibition" contains paintings that incorporate Montana quilt patterns, wildlife, and images of the west. With a palette knife, Pat Olding pairs majestic animals with painted Montana graphic quilt patterns on each of her canvases. She finds the process of combining these two unlikely elements challenging, thrilling and also enlightening. Olding has combined the two with the belief they both represent our state and are diverse enough to metaphorically represent all the many threads of Montana. The treads define our humanity that makes us Montana.

The concept for this show came about after reading that Sidney women created quilts for auction during WWI & II. These unsung talents were used to support the war efforts. Olding states, "I thought if I recolonized these efforts with some of the most majestic elements of Montana, they would be seen too as equal threads and in so doing recognize all the talents, all the efforts, all the treads of Montana Fabric. The spark was ignited."

Olding explains, "My goal is to create a path of discovery for viewers and invite new awareness. By exploring and reimaging color and pattern I aim to engage the viewers' eye. I paint Montana, from the ivory rump elk and dusty cowboy to the glistening trout-filled rivers. My paintings have transformed from still life and urban landscape to amortizing subjects of Montana, rodeo action, wild and ranch animals plus breath-taking vistas. My palette knife allows me to smash, scrape and layer colors. These layered strokes create a history of marks that permanently interlocks with each subject. My paintings come to life with beautiful lighting, lush streaks of color, and texture.

Stop by the reception at the MonDak Heritage Center on July 7 to meet Pat Olding and discuss her techniques and inspiration behind her beautiful pieces. Light refreshments will be served and the reception is free and open to the public.

Katie Vasbinder is a practicing artist, a licensed architect and a mother. She was born and raised in central Minnesota and currently lives in North Dakota. She works with a variety of, from acrylic paint to ceramic clay and enjoys practicing both art and architecture, believing they dance with each other in her head, taking turns with the lead.

The process-based ceramic pieces in the show are the result of continuous experimenting and play her studio. She enjoys the endless ways you can create with clay and glaze. These pieces are made with marbling glaze through a bubble glaze technique. After a base coat of glaze is applied, a contrasting color is combined with soap and blown into bubbles that pop around the piece, leaving a marbled-like imprint. The result is an organic type of liquid air design. Placed on functional pieces, this technique creates an interesting juxtaposition between the practical and play.
