





The project will receive development support from the State of North Dakota that will allow apartment rents to be kept to affordable levels, helping the hospital alleviate staffing and retention issues.



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# **Digging Up Our Roots at the Mondak Heritage Center**

The MonDak Heritage Center in Sidney has a vast library of resources for people to research their genealogy.





**By Suzie Schieffer** When you think of history most people think of the larger events in the past that changed the world on a much grander scale, but history isn't just the shock value of some life changing event that happens somewhere across the world, for some it's simply looking back in time down our own family tree. The need to learn about our family history is something that appeals to most of us. A lot of families here in Sidney have been here from the start and could probably tell you everything about their family. On the other hand Sidney could be a place you've never been to or heard of but may still be connected to. No matter what you may be looking for the people at the Mondak Heritage Center can help you. They work tirelessly there, field-

ing calls and e-mails from all over the world from people researching their family history or looking for a loved one lost from long ago. The Heritage Center and the people who work and volunteer there make it their mission to help you get the answers you need.

It's not just Ancestry. com, although that is one of the many popular tools they rely on, it's also their own time and smarts to research and discover. "It's a puzzle and we are helping these people put it together," says Leanne Pelvit, who has worked at the Center for 8 years. "We will help anyone who is looking to research the genealogy of their family. We have everything we need to help them and will show them how to do it. People find out some really interesting things. There was a lady from Sweden, I

think, and she was looking for her mother because she came to the states and then nobody heard from her again but we found her. We determined that she had married and had died, but we were able to get her the information she needed and where she was buried." The Mondak Heritage Center has put on a Genealogy 101 class and is looking to do another one soon, they are aiming for sometime in January. Pelvit encourages anyone who is looking to explore their family tree to call her at the Center 433-3500 or e-mail her at lpdlvit@richland.org.

In addition to the research, the ladies who work at the Center painstakingly document all the obituaries throughout Richland county. That means keeping a record of every obituary and cemetery plot in the county. They have close to 15, 000 Heritage record cards. These cards list the pertinent information of someone such as name, date of birth, mother and father's names, children and where they live. These cards are filled out and filed with every death. Now, Pelvit is working with Ramona Raffaell, another employee at the Heritage Center, to make a book. The main objective of the book is to show all these cemeteries and their plots and who has been laid to rest there. The biggest challenge is the stray graves. These are the ones usually not in a cemetery but out on someone's farmland. When these are found they are documented as well. They are not sure when the book will be finished because it is an ongoing list that is constantly changing.

# **DPHHS** Confirms First Influenza Case of the Season **Case Confirmed in Cascade County**

The Department of Public Health and Human Services (DPHHS) has confirmed the first influenza case of the season in a Cascade County resident.

Public health officials say that this first case is an important reminder for the public to get vaccinated against influenza as soon as possible. State, tribal and local public health authorities indicate vaccine is available and recommend taking advantage of the vaccine as soon as possible.

"Even if you received the vaccine last year, you should still get vaccinated this year," said DPHHS Director Richard Opper. "With the options available, getting vaccinated is easier than ever. We'd like to make sure everyone can stay healthy this winter."

Influenza vaccination is recommended for everyone six months of age and older. Annual vaccination is safe and the most effective method to prevent influenza infections. The composition of the flu vaccine is reviewed each year to protect against the flu viruses that research

Individuals seeking vaccine have many options, including a newer quadrivalent shot that covers four different influenza viruses, a high dose flu shot approved for people 65 and older, and nasal-spray vaccines. Public health officials recommend Montanans consult with their healthcare provider regarding the best option.


Protection provided by vaccination lasts throughout the entire flu season, even when vaccine is given in early fall. A new dose is needed every year to keep up active defense against viruses.

"Individuals with asthma, diabetes and many other chronic medical conditions, the elderly, pregnant women and young children can become very ill if infected by influenza", said Jim Murphy of the DPHHS Communicable Disease Control and Prevention Bureau. "We urge people to get vaccinated now to protect themselves and others who are vulnerable."

People wanting to get immunized, or have their children vaccinated, should consult their health care provider. Vaccinations are available at doctor offices, county or tribal health departments, and many pharmacies.



3. Pull the plug on stress and boost your mood. People with untreated hearing loss often feel angry, frustrated, anxious, isolated, and depressed. 



# **A Little Bit Country: Combating Antibiotic Resistance**

Last week I attended the statewide conference of NDSU Extension and Research staff. The conference offered a multitude of sessions making it impossible to attend all. One of the sessions I attended involved the use of antibiotics in the livestock industry. Dr. Gerald Stokka, NDSU Extension Veterinarian and who is also involved in the Livestock Stewardship Program, presented a report given to the President on combating antibiotic resistance. This is part of an effort by the President's Council of Advisors on Science and Technology (PCAST).

The focus of PCAST is: 1) to improve our surveillance of the rise of antibiotic-resistant bacteria, to enable effective response, stop outbreaks, and limit the spread of antibiotic-resistant organisms, and acting on surveillance data to implement appropriate infection control; 2) increase the longevity of current antibiotics, by improving the appropriate use of existing antibiotics, preventing the spread of antibiotic-resistant bacteria and scaling up proven interventions to decrease the rate at which microbes develop resistance to current antibiotics; and 3) increase the

rate at which new antibiotics, as well as other interventions, are discovered and developed.

Besides human health, medically important antibiotics are extensively used in animal agriculture not only to treat sick animals, but also to promote animal growth and to prevent infections. All of these uses can promote the development of antibiotic resistance among bacteria in animals and these resistant strains can spread to humans. While the extent to which antibiotic resistance to animal agriculture contributes to human infections is not known, the risk to human health posed by the agricultural use of antibiotics is, appropriately, a matter of very serious concern.


The PCAST report includes several recommendations. One urges USDA to develop, in collaboration with the National Institute of Health (NIH) and the agriculture industry, a comprehensive research and development strategy to promote the creation of alternatives to or improved uses of antibiotics in food animals, including through public-private partnerships and combination with biomedical research. To accomplish this and other recommendations PCAST suggests the formation of an Innovative Institute that will bring together university and USDA scientists, private companies to study antibiotic resistance and to develop alternatives to antibiotic use in agriculture, including creating opportunities for new business ventures. This Institute will require \$25 million in annual funding which already has been requested in the Presidents FY15 Budget.

As this effort to reduce antibiotic use and develop new protocols to conduct diseases, we can look forward to an antibiotic usage fee. Antibiotic sales in human health and agriculture are estimated at \$12 billion per year. A user fee of five percent could generate \$600 million. This money would be devoted to incentivize the development of new antibiotics and support additional recommendations. Throughout Dr. Stokka's presentation I did not hear of any effort of PCAST to eliminate the use of antibiotics in animal agriculture.

For an American in the 21<sup>st</sup> century it is hard to imagine the world before antibiotics. Dr. Stokka gave the following data. At the beginning of the 20<sup>th</sup> century, as many as nine women out of every 1000 who gave birth died, 40 percent from sepsis. In some cities as many as 30 percent of children died before their first birthday. One of every nine people who developed a serious skin infection died, even from something as simple as a scrape or an insect bite. Pneumonia killed 30 percent of those who contacted it; meningitis killed 70 percent. Ear infections caused deafness; sore throats were not infrequently followed by rheumatic fever and heart failure. Surgical procedures were associated with high morbidity and mortality due to infection.

#### **Congratulations Due**

During the conference mentioned above the NDSU Extension Service and the Farm and Ranch Guide recognize a select few of the educational programs offered by staff. One of the top programs recognized was "Nourishing Boomers and Beyond". This program was designed to improve the "Boomers and Beyond", 50+ audiences, health literacy. The program used community classes, printed materials, recipe demonstrations and technology-based approaches to reach an average of 300 people in each class per month. The program involved nine classes. Additionally the web page has had more than 18,600 views and 1400 ongoing users. The e-newsletter associated with the program has 630 subscribers from 48 countries. I am proud to say my wife Mary Froelich was part of the team which delivered this valuable effort.






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## ND Fisheries Biologists Wrapping Up Fall Surveys

North Dakota Game and Fish Department fisheries biologists are assessing how the cooler-than-normal summer may have impacted fish spawning and stocking success across the state.

Fisheries management section leader Scott Gangl said it looks like catches varied this year, depending on the lake or fish species. "On a lot of our smaller lakes, we had extremely high catch rates of young-of-the-year fish in some, but disappointing catches in others," Gangl said. "Overall, though, I'd say we experienced average reproduction and stocking success."

With good water levels and abundant spawning habitat, Gangl said Lake Sakakawea produced good catches of virtually all young-of-year fish. Walleye were most abundant in the upper and middle sections of the reservoir, he said, with good numbers of perch and pike throughout. "Forage fish are plentiful on Lake Sakakawea this year, and both sonar surveys and anecdotal observations suggest rainbow smelt production was really good in 2014," Gangl added.

Devils Lake and Stump Lake reported fair to good numbers of young-of-the-year walleye, while yellow perch reproduction was much lower than the strong reproduction year of 2013. "Although walleye natural reproduction was down in 2014, good reproduction in recent years has resulted in an abundance of young walleye in Devils Lake," Gangl said. "Strong numbers of yearling perch will provide a good source of forage for walleye and other predators."

According to Gangl, Lake Oahe is starting to show signs of recovery from the flood of 2011. "Although smelt numbers are still very low, reproduction of other forage fish, mostly white bass and crappie, was very good in 2014," he added. "Young-of-year walleye displayed their highest catch rate since the dominant year class in 2009."

However, Gangl said the Missouri River isn't showing such signs of recovery, as catch rates of forage fish and young-of-year game fish remain low upstream from Lake Oahe. Biologists attribute poor production on the river to the massive habitat changes during the 2011 flood. "The flood scoured and changed the river channel so dramatically, it's going to take a much longer time to recover," Gangl said. "The productive capacity was taken away. It's like scraping the topsoil from a field."

#### Verify Deer License

The North Dakota Game and Fish Department urges deer hunters to find their license and check it for accuracy.

Every year the Game and Fish Department's licensing section receives last-minute inquiries from hunters who can't find their license. When that happens, it's difficult to try to get a replacement license in time for the season opener.

Another reason to check the license now is to make sure the unit and species is what was intended.

Deer hunters in need of a replacement license can print out a duplicate (replacement) license application from the Game and Fish website, gf.nd.gov, or can call 701-328-6300 to have an application mailed or faxed.

The form must be completely filled out and notarized, and sent back in to the department with a fee.

## Youth-Only Deer Hunt Comes a Week Early, Oct. 16-17 Submitted by Montana FWP

Montana's annual youth-only deer hunt is set for Oct 16-17.

The two-day special season is open to properly licensed youngsters ages 12 to 15 who've passed a hunter safety course. Additionally, 11-year-olds who passed hunter safety may hunt if they'll be 12 by Jan. 16, 2015.

The youth hunt is typically scheduled during the public schools' two-day vacation in October, which is scheduled for Oct. 16-17 this year.

This puts youth rifle hunters in the field during the final days of Montana's archery season.

"Archers and our young hunters need to be aware of the overlapping seasons and plan accordingly," Aasheim said.



Young hunters must wear hunter orange and follow all hunt-

ing district regulations, which may limit them to certain species or require a special permit.

To participate, youth hunters must be accompanied by a non-hunting adult 18 years of age or older.


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
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## 2014 Keith Steinbeisser Memorial Livestock Judging Contest





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
