Senator Daines Visits Sidney, Speaks About Border Security

Senator Steve Daines visited Sidney on Saturday to attend the Richland County Republican Party's Lincoln-Reagan Day Banquet and made time prior to that event to meet supporters and veterans at the Sidney VFW Hall. Fielding questions on a number of issues, Senator Daines gave his thoughts on various political matters and took time first to discuss the importance of border security.

"I wish every member of congress would jump on a plane and go to the Southern border and spend a few nights with Border Patrol and that is what I did," Daines told the crowd of approximately two-dozen residents.

Recalling a recent trip to the American-Mexican border to survey the problems along the demarcation, Daines explained, "I got picked up by Border Patrol at 2 a.m. there in Texas in the Rio Grande Valley Sector. It was 277 miles of border, and is ground zero for the majority of where illegal immigrants are coming over as well as illegal drugs. And why are they coming over in that

specific area in the Rio Grande Valley Sector?"

Daines continued, "I'll tell you why. It's because in other sectors like Yuma, Tucson, San Diego, they put physical barriers up, employ technology, and they see reductions of 95 to 99 percent of illegal crossings."

Daines said, "I've always said if you want to find out the truth, with all due respect to bureaucrats, go listen to people in the field and they'll tell you what's going on. I spent time with the agents and they're pleading with us to provide the resources for barriers and to get this done. They're catching hundreds of illegals every night and day in just that one sector alone."

While with the Border Patrol, Daines said that he saw the apprehension of illegal aliens first hand.

"We watched them apprehend two men from Honduras at about 4 o'clock in the morning. It was misty, radios were cackling, and we saw these men run across a field and they caught them," Daines recalled.

He continued, "I instruct-

ed them to ask where they're from and where they're going. One man said he was from Honduras and going to New York. The other man said he was from Honduras and going to Miami. On average they're paying Mexican cartels eight thousand dollars raised in the U.S. from their family and are giving billions of dollars to illegal cartels."

Daines also recalled having seen cartel scouts watching the border and reaching cartel 'mules' via radio and warning them of Border Patrol activity. Daines said, "They're not being inconspicuous. They're radioing upstream to help people bring drugs across."

These drugs are making it into Montana, according to Daines. "The number one drug hitting Montana is meth," the Senator reported. "This meth is over 90 percent pure. The meth of twenty years ago in Montana was home lab meth. This meth is cartel meth, price has come down, and distribution is expanding. Because of these Mexican cartels, we have a meth epidemic right here in Montana. I've spent



time at the Rimrock Rehabilitation Center in Billings, and the number one addictive substance for moms is meth, even for mothers of small children. What's happening on the border affects us here."

The Sidney-Richland County Library has recently signed on to collect cell phones and other devices to benefit troops and veterans through the non-profit organization Cell Phones for Soldiers. The Library joins the Health Department in becoming a drop-off site for the program.

Three programs cooperatively work to answer the needs of service men and women. "Cell Phones for Soldiers" is a national non-profit serving troops and veterans with free communication services and emergency funding. Their "Minutes that Matter" program provides free calling cards to active military members to connect with loved ones. The "Helping Heroes Home" program assists veteran servicemen and women with emergency funds to alleviate communication challenges and other hardships.

Since 2004, Cell Phones for Soldiers has provided military troops with more than 300 million "Minutes that Matter" and has assisted more than 3100 veterans with emergency funding since 2012.

Both programs are funded through the recycling of cell phones and other devices. More than 15 million devices have been recycled, reducing the impact on local landfills.

Used cell phones, tablets and mp3 players may be dropped off at the front desk at the Sidney-Richland County Library during regular business hours. The devices can be in any condition, and removing personal information is not necessary, as phones are not sold or redistributed. DICKINSON, N.D. - Dickinson State University and North Dakota State University (NDSU) continue to recognize the need to provide timely, effective reclamation information to affected stakeholders in the Bakken energy development. This effort began in February 2013 when the first reclamation workshop was held in Dickinson.

This year's seventh annual workshop is titled "Reflecting on Reclamation" and will be held Feb. 25-26, 2019, at the Astoria Hotel & Event Center in Dickinson. Hosting the event are NDSU Extension. Dickinson State University, Society for Range Management, USDA-ARS, North Dakota Department of Health and BKS Environmental Associates,

The Monday session Feb. 25, will highlight keynote speaker Graeme Spiers, Laurentian University from Sudbury, Ontario, Canada. The title of Mr. Spiers' presentation is "The Sudbury Protocol – 40 years of Landscape Healing." Vendors will also present their services and/or products in a trade show atmosphere. Legislative Report

Greetings from Helena! There are some legislators and bureaucrats who think "We the People" can't operate without the government telling us what to do. That was very evident in the hearings this week at the Capitol regarding Child and Family Services (CFS). In the four states that border us, according to the latest available information, there are 3.9 million people and they have 5,700 children in foster care. In Montana, with 1 million people, there are close to 4,000 children in foster care. We have almost 3 times as many per capita in the custody of CFS as our surrounding states. In 2016, 14 children in Montana died while under the supervision of CFS and it doesn't look like it is improving. Obviously CFS in our state doesn't have all the

much power.

A couple of bills we heard this week in Senate Fish and Game committee were SJ6 and SB185. SJ6 was a resolution asking the US Congress to take the grizzly bear off the endangered species list. SB185 was a bill that would end trapping and hunting of wolves in a buffer zone outside Yellowstone National Park. They were long hearings into the night with lots of passion on both sides. Neither hearing changed my mind. I will vote Yes on SJ6 and No on SB185.

The 2 agriculture bills that I carried, SB73 and SB137, passed through the Senate unanimously. They now move on to the House Agriculture Committee.

There were a lot of people from SD 18 in the Capitol this spend time with them.





Montana Department of Transportation **Proposes Resurfacing** Project for U.S. Highway 2 Between Poplar and Brockton

POPLAR - The Montana Department of Transportation (MDT) would like to notify the public and seek comments on a proposal to resurface about 13 miles of U.S. Highway 2 (US-2) west of Brockton in Roosevelt County.

The project begins at the east edge of Poplar at reference post 613.26 and extends east for 12.9 miles, ending near the east edge of Brockton at reference post 626.13.

Proposed work includes milling the existing surface, applying a new overlay, and finishing with a seal and cover (chip seal), culvert replacement, upgraded pavement markings, rumble strips, signage and guardrail. The existing asphalt sidewalk on the north side of US-2 through Brockton will also be replaced with a new concrete sidewalk and Americans With Disabilities Act-compliant ramps at the intersections.

The purpose of the project is to extend the life of the pavement and to reduce maintenance costs. No new right-of-way or utility relocations will be needed.

Typically, pavement preservation projects of this size and scope are advanced to construction as soon as possible, generally within two to three years. A target construction date will be determined upon completion of all project development activities and availability of funding.

Enerplus Continues Investment In Bakken In 2019

Having been established in 1986, Enerplus is a crude oil and natural gas producer with production assets in both Canada and the United States. The company trades on both the Toronto Stock Exchange and the New York Stock Exchange and is a powerful producer in the Bakken oilfield. The corporation is focusing heavily on the region's oil and natural gas production and is forecasting strong profits for 2019.

Based in Calgary, Alberta, Enerplus is planning to spend approximately 80 percent of its operating budget – more than \$635 million - on 42 wells in North Dakota. It is currently

unknown how or if they plan an expansion of production in Richland County.

Enerplus slowed their production and drilling activity toward the end of 2018 due to market volatility, but will reportedly increase their production later in 2019. The company will plan to produce somewhere between 52,500 to 56.000 barrels of oil each day. At this volume, the company projects the expense per barrel of oil produced will be about \$8 dollars, which is a competitive price.


According to Ian Dundas, the president and CEO of Enerplus, "Our 2019 plan is expected to generate double-digit returns on capital employed and competitive oil production per share growth while operating within cash flow based on prevailing commodity prices.'

He continued, "If we see commodity prices improve, we would expect to generate meaningful free cash flow."

An additional 7.5 percent of Enerplus' budget will be allocated to Canadian production and another 5 percent in Pennsylvania and elsewhere.

The company noted, "With second-half weighted production growth in 2019, Enerplus expects to deliver approximately 9 percent annual liquids production growth at the midpoint of its guidance range. Thereafter in 2020 and 2021, Enerplus expects to grow its liquids production by 10 percent to 13 percent per year. This growth outlook is underpinned by the Company's high-return, light oil asset in North Dakota."

The bulk of Enerplus' Bakken crude oil properties are located in the Fort Berthold region of North Dakota and in the Elm Coulee field in Richland County, Montana. Although the company has three main branches, the Williston Basin is responsible for the lion's share of the company's production and it's growing


