

March of Dimes Celebrates 75th Year

As the March of Dimes celebrates its 75th anniversary, we take a look at the past of the foundation. The foundation was put together by President Franklin Roosevelt after his struggle with polio. Starting as the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis in 1938, the foundation was set up in order to research and fight against the crippling disease, polio.

After the mission to 'lead, direct, and unify' the fight against polio was accomplished, the foundation changed its focus to birth defects prevention. Considering the slogan used previously, 'Join the March of Dimes", the foundation was named the March of Dimes.

So on July 22, 1958 the March of Dimes was started, as did the research for prevention and treatment of birth defects. By the 1970s, the focus on birth defects and infant mortality turned the spotlight on to premature birth and low birthweight to cover all aspects of infant health. With the rate of premature birth rising, in 2003 the March of Dimes launched its Prematurity Campaign.

According to the peristats on marchofdimes.com, in an average week in Montana there are 232 babies born,

with 28 being preterm, 17 with low birthweight, and 2 that die before their first birthday. Preterm birth is described as prior to the 37th week of pregnancy, while low birthweight is considered less than five and a half pounds.

March of Dimes has been working to prevent just that, as their mission is 'to improve the health of babies by preventing birth defects, infant mortality, and premature birth.' The March of Dimes is working to find causes of premature birth, how to intervene, and to educate health professionals. They also work to provide information and support to the public.

One of the ways they get funds for research is through the 'March for Babies' fundraising walks which are held throughout the country. The first walk was held in 1970, which was the first fundraiser of its kind for nonprofit organizations. Since then the walks have raised two billion dollars to benefit the health of babies. More than 7 million people across the nation walk to support the cause, some walk in memory of a loved one, some walk in honor while some are just walking for the cause.

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Medicaid Expansion Good Idea for Montanans

In the state of Montana there are currently over 43,000 uninsured working men and women who could benefit from Medicaid, if the program were to expand. Approximately 528 of those people reside within Richland County. Medicaid expansion, in fact, is one of the topics for the 2013 legislative session. Based on the needs of Montanans, Legislature will make a decision whether or not to accept the expansion.

The financial requirements to qualify for Medicaid are currently leaving many Montanans with no access to health insurance. Soon, many people with a higher income will receive a tax credit in order to afford private health insurance, while those with a lower income either have to qualify for Medicaid or not afford healthcare. If the expansion goes through, many who don't currently qualify for Medicaid will be able to receive coverage.

Many people may think this would cost our govern-

ment extra money, but Montana taxpayers have been supporting a Medicaid expansion since 2008. In face it will cost little to the state, as the federal government covers 100% of costs for the first three years and no less than 90% thereafter.

Montanans will continue to pay for Medicaid expansion, but if the dollars are not accepted they will be redirected to other states that do accept the expansion. Many Montanans need the expansion in order to get health care coverage. In fact Montana has the highest percentage of uninsured veterans in the nation. Approximately 9,000 veterans have no insurance, while 5,000 only have VA healthcare. It is estimated that 9,500 veterans and their spouses would gain access to quality, affordable health care coverage if Medicaid is expanded.

Kristie Smith, Director of Public Affairs with the Montana Budget and Policy Center, stated "It's not only critical for our citizens, but for our economy." The expansion would support the economy as more people would be seeking healthcare, which in turn would increase the demand for doctors, nurses, and other medical staff. A Medicaid expansion could add as many as 12,700 jobs annually throughout Montana and as many as 110 in Richland County. With the increase of jobs, the labor income will also increase to approximately \$4,403,000 annually in Richland County. It is anticipated that throughout Montana, labor income will generate \$4 billion in the first eight years.

Medicaid plays a vital role in supporting the healthcare economy in Montana and Richland County. Without the expansion, many Montanans will have worse health, higher financial burdens, and cause the healthcare costs to rise. Smith also stated she is "extremely hopeful that we will see Medicaid expansion happen in Montana. It's just a smart opportunity."



Senator Kendall Van Dyk (D-Billings) introduced legislation today putting a limit on the state's 18-month oil and gas tax holiday and using the proceeds to address local impacts in communities facing the Bakken oil boom.

SB 399 is modeled after North Dakota's highly successful tax-holiday system, which reduces oil and gas production taxes on new wells whenever oil prices dip below a certain level.

"Montanans have lived through oil booms and we have lived through oil busts," said Van Dyk. "During each cycle of oil and gas production we pray for one more boom, and we promise not to blow it next time. Now we need to make responsible decisions that lessen the impacts on eastern Montana communities."

The bill would create a trigger mechanism that offers oil companies low taxes when petroleum prices fall, but maintains taxes at their normal level when oil prices are high enough to stimulate development. Under the bill, that level would be priced at \$50.07 per barrel or below for the "holiday" to take effect.

"We can no longer afford to shortchange impacts to communities, both social and structural, all of which are significantly stressed due to the oil boom," said Brandon

FWP Releases Minimum Wolf Count for 2012

At least 625 wolves inhabited Montana at the end of 2012 according to state wildlife managers preparing the federally required annual wolf conservation and management report.

Montana Fish, Wildlife & Parks' complete report, which is expected to be available online at fwp.mt.gov by April 12, will show that Montana's verified minimum wolf count decreased more than four percent in 2012, compared to a 15 percent increase in 2011 and an eight percent increase in 2010. The minimum wolf count is the number of wolves actually verified by FWP wolf specialists.

The minimum numbers verified by FWP at the end of 2012 include 625 wolves, in 147 packs, and 37 breeding pairs. While it's the first time since 2004 that the minimum count has decreased, Montana's minimum wolf pack and breeding pairs estimates increased slightly from 2011. The 2012 calculation, however, doesn't include the 95 wolves taken by hunters and trappers between Jan. 1 and Feb. 28 of this year.

"We're making some progress," said FWP Director Jeff Hagener. "Confirmed livestock loss has been on a general downward trend since 2009, and we have more tools now for affecting wolf populations. In some areas, where hunting, trapping and livestock-depredation removals have been effective, it looks like the wolf population's growth has been curbed this year. In other areas the population may be leveling off, but we have more work to do. There are still places where we need to manage for a better balance among other Montana wildlife and with Montana's livestock producers and their families."

ment of Public Health and Human Services has confirmed the first case of Hantavirus infection in a Montana resident in 2013. The individual is expected to make a full recovery. The resident of Deer Lodge County is believed to have come into contact with the virus while cleaning an area that had been contaminated by rodents.

This case is one of 36 Hantavirus infection cases reported in Montana since 1993. Montana typically sees one to two cases a year, making Montana second only to New Mexico in the number of cases per 100,000 population. "Montanans should be aware of the precautions they can take to avoid Hantavirus and the rodents that can carry it," said DPHHS Director Richard H. Opper. "People can contract the illness when they breathe in air contaminated by the virus. It is important to avoid actions that raise dust, such as sweeping or vacuuming if signs of rodents are

present. Protecting yourself and cleaning correctly is essential."

Kaye Tufton Duane Rabbe symptoms progress to coughing and severe shortness of breath. The symptoms develop one to six weeks after exposure.

"Early recognition and immediate medical care are key to surviving the illness," Helgerson said. "If someone is exposed to rodents and experiences symptoms – especially severe shortness of breath, they need to seek treatment right away. Telling your doctor about any rodent exposure will alert your physician to look closely for any rodent-carried disease, such as Hantavirus."

The best way to prevent Hantavirus transmission is to control rodent populations in areas where one lives and works. When cleaning areas

where rodents may nest, the following precautions should be followed: Where rubber or plastic gloves, thoroughly spray/soak area with a disinfectant or mixture of bleach and water to reduce dry dusty conditions in the area being cleaned, wipe or mop the area with a sponge or paper towel (throw away any items after use), wash hands thoroughly with soap and warm water after removing gloves, never sweep or vacuum in these areas as this can stir up dust and aerosolize the droppings.

The City of Williston, in conjunction with JLG Architects, will be hosting a Community Workshop on Thursday, March 28^{th} from 6:00 p.m. – 8:00 p.m. at the Williston Community Library. The City is asking for input from the Citizens of Williston on ideas for future and current facilities needs of the various City Departments.

The City of Williston is experiencing unprecedented growth, and keeping up with the various demands that this brings has proven to be an unprecedented challenge. Planning for growth is one thing, but carrying out a strategy for unpredictable growth, both in terms of speed and size, is an entirely different challenge.

The City of Williston is taking that challenge head on, both by choice and by necessity, as they see an opportunity to address current and long-term needs for their departments and employees. The workload of the various governmental departments has increased dramatically due to the increased population and building activity, and additional space and efficiency are vital to the future health, security and performance of these various departments. This too, correlates to the health, safety and welfare of the public that they serve.

Because of this, this City of Williston is facilitating the space and operations study for the following City facilities: City Hall, Public Works and the MDU Building (Building Department). The goal of this study is to analyze these existing facilities, determine current programming needs and develop options for long-term facility needs (25-30 years) based on extensive case study research, trends and multipliers for growth.

These options will be determined and developed based off of input from Committee leadership and from the Community of Williston. With each option, cost estimates will be developed and analyzed so future informed decisions can be made regarding existing and new facilities that may be built. 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Voice Your Opinions About Health Care in Richland County Health Survey

Community members in Richland County may soon be receiving a survey form in their mailbox. This survey will be sent to a random sample of homes within the next couple of weeks which will help Sidney Health Center identify the health services needed in the community. This information will be used for strategic planning, grant applications, new programs, and by community groups interested in addressing health issues.

The National Rural Health Resource Center of Duluth, Minnesota is assisting Sidney Health Center in the analysis of local community needs, use of local health care services and overall community health. This process was developed to maintain quality health care to serve the continuing and future needs of the community.

The community healthcare assessment process promotes health care as a local affair. Health care delivered in rural communities is affordable, high qual-

ity, and necessary to the good health of the entire community. Citizens of rural counties can take responsibility for the health of their community by completing the survey they receive in their mailbox. Most communities face a large number of complex issues in providing high quality healthcare, but fortunately, Richland County can engage effective problem-solving, which is the most important factor in the survival of rural health services.

An accompanying goal of this process is to keep health care dollars within the local community. While the vast majority of health care can be provided locally, rural citizens often drive to large medical centers for care, spending money on health care and non-health care purchases that could be spent locally. It is estimated that within a typical rural community, millions of dollars of revenue is lost in this way. This revenue could be retained in the local community with stronger communityhealth care provider linkages.

Sidney Health Center's campus features a clinic, hospital, cancer care center, sleep center, retail pharmacy, medical equipment store and an extended care facility, offering services from birth to end-of-life.

"We are partnering with the Montana Office of Rural Health at Montana State University to conduct this community health survey. We hope to receive valuable information from a wide range of participants to assist in planning our programs, services and facilities to meet present and future health care needs," stated Rick Haraldson, Sidney Health Center CEO.

"We are pleased to be able to bring some of the best community health resources in the country to Sidney Health Center. The goal of this initiative is to assist forward-thinking rural hospitals and communities in aligning their resources, to address their present and future needs in the best way possible," said Terry Hill, Executive Director of the National Rural Health Resource Center.









New 118,000 sq. ft. Shopping Center Coming to Watford City

A twin-cities based national property development firm, Oppidan Investment Company, broke ground on Watford City's newest shopping center, bringing more choices and opportunities to residents and businesses in the area.

Coborn's, an employee owned grocery store chain that has several stores throughout Minnesota, North Dakota and South Dakota, has acquired Mike's Super Valu in Watford City and is opening the Cash Wise Grocery and Liquor store in the new shopping cen-

ter. It'll be the center's largest tenant with the grocery store occupying approximately 48,000 square feet.

They've recently presented a \$10,000 check to the Watford City Chamber of Commerce to help fund development of the Wolf Pup Daycare Center, a child-care facility that will be located in the new Wolf Run Village development. 
Since December of 2011, Oppidan has been said to have invested approximately \$150 million in to the Bakken region.
