Western North Dakota Native to Present Art at The Pioneer **Museum During Homefest 2019**

native Miles Bendixon will present his art at The Pioneer Museum of McKenzie County during Homefest 2019 on July 12-14. The Pioneer Museum and the Long X Art Foundation will host the event. On Friday, July 12th the exhibit will be held from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. with old-fashioned ice cream for a dime. Saturday, July 13th the exhibit will be held from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. with a public unveiling of newly commissioned art from 10 a.m. to 10:30 a.m. There will also be an open house with coffee, cookies and ice cream sundaes for a dime. Sunday, July 14th there will be an open house from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Artist Miles Bendixson is a native of North Dakota, born in Williston and grew up in Watford City. The experience of growing up in western North Dakota had a profound influ-

ence on him and his way of life. Hunting, fishing and snowmobiling in the outdoors is the way he spent most of his time growing up. It was unbeknown to him at that time, what a huge roll this would play in his development as a wildlife and western artist. To him the west has permeated his soul, gradually becoming a way of life; which has resulted in the subjects he paints today.

Miles started out his career as a freelance artist, after graduating with a degree in commercial art from Bismarck State College. He did many different kinds of graphic art, from brochure & logo design, to sign painting and illustration. Illustration became an area of focus for him, having completed many portraits and caricatures as a result of that. His break into fine art came at the height of his development as an illustrator while competing in the North Dakota Fur- Bearer Art Stamp contest. After the third time competing, fortune smiled on him and he won this coveted competition in 1986. His winning entry, Beaver Pond, a painting of a beaver at streamside became the hunting trapping stamp and limited edition print, for the State of North Dakota in the fall of 1987. Winning this competition gradually moved him away from commercial art into fine art, resulting in his first limited edition print Little Dreamer. Since the release of Little Dreamer in 1989, he has published and marketed several of his prints across the US and Canada.

A major change in Miles' career came about after attending the Pacific Rim Wildlife Art Workshops in Jackson Hole Wyoming in 1995,1997 and 1998. Each year had a different featured wildlife artist that hosted and taught a group of fledgling wildlife artists from across the world.

Carl Brenders from Belgium taught in 1995, Robert Bateman from Canada in 1997 and Greg Beecham from Wyoming in 1998. Being able to attend workshops taught by world-renowned wildlife artists as these had a profound influence on Miles and the way he approaches his art. He came away with the idea that art should be integrated into his everyday life and in doing so, great art can be achieved. A result of following these practices and disciplines, he believes he has been making better decisions, concerning a paintings design, attention to proportion and color choices. The workshops he attended cemented the idea that a bond should take place between the artist and the subject he paints and draws.

This has resulted in a spiritual connection to his paintings. The goal that he strives for is to strike an emotional chord within himself, as well as the audience he paints for. The Pacific Rim Wildlife Art Workshops enabled Miles to take a closer look at what makes great art that has truth, meaning, depth and

Miles latest endeavor has been the pursuit of historical western art. He recently secured the rights to do full color paintings from the Franke B. Fiske Photo Collection located at the North Dakota State Historical Society. The fascination of this photo collection for him is that it captures a moment in historical time that will never occur again. He has a deep interest in the historical western heritage of America, from the Native American. to the cowboy and horse era. The challenge of being able to piece a painting together from the old west is both motivational and inspirational to Miles, as it expands the learning process of doing art. He believes it's critical to keep learning and evolving through these processes and challenges.

Miles and his wife Jackie have resided in Highlands Ranch, Colorado for the past 21 years. His oldest son Ted lives in Park City, Utah and his youngest son Mike is married and lives with his wife Ritah and son Wyatt in Littleton, Colorado. Miles has a deep belief in God and knows he has given him the incredible gift of art. Having been given this incredible gift, he considers it a great privilege to share with others!



EMPLOYMENT Weeds, Weed Management Featured At Froid Field Day, June 27

Farmers and ranchers wage a continuous battle with weeds in their crops and pastures, battles that have grown fiercer with new weed species popping up and the development of herbicide resistance in existing weeds. Knowing your enemy is key for combating resistance and preventing introduction of new

species and area producers have an opportunity to brush up on their weed skills at the 2019 Froid Research Farm Field Day on Thursday, June 27, from 1-5 p.m.

The day's program features discussions on new herbicide research and formulations, and on herbicide carryover and how to avoid plant injury by MSU Cropland Weed Extension Specialist Dr. Tim Seipel. And that's not all; other weed topics presented include a weed ID and biocontrol update, and a sprayer calibration demonstration.

Also on tap for the day are handy demonstrations showing producers how they can test their soil for infiltration, compaction and acidification characteristics. The compaction demonstration includes a shallow soil pit showing underground impacts resulting from compacted soils. Other features at this year's event include a talk on pulse crop diseases and presentations on cover crop yield and forage quality; pest and beneficial insects found in oilseed and cover crop forage rotations, and another demonstration test looking at soil respiration and carbon dioxide's potential as a soil health indicator. Presenters include USDA, MSU and NDSU scientists, Extension staff and more.

The day concludes with a free steak dinner at 5 p.m. sponsored by the Sheridan and Roosevelt County Conservation Districts. Other event sponsors include are available. the Sheridan and Roosevelt County Extension offices. and the USDA-ARS Northern Plains Agricultural Research usda.gov.

If you're among the 54 million Americans who suffer from arthritis or another rheumatic disease, sweet cherries may be able to provide some relief. Research shows that their anti-inflammatory properties can have the same effect as ibuprofen.

3. Gout

Gout is a form of arthritis, and sufferers tend to experience severe pain, redness and tenderness in their joints. The condition is associated with elevated levels of uric acid in the blood, levels that have been reduced with a diet

incorporating sweet cherries. A recent study with gout patients found a 35% lower risk of gout attacks among those who consumed the fruit over two days. When that was combined with their prescribed medicine, specifically allopurinol, the risk of a gout attack was 75% lower.

Vacation and travel can throw off your sleep patterns, and a good night's sleep is essential in a great vacation. With sweet cherries, you have a reliable source of tryptophan, serotonin and melatonin. Tryptophan is necessary to the development of serotonin, which, in turn, plays an important role in regulating sleep, mood and appetite. Adequate levels of serotonin can contribute to feelings of well-being, while depression has been linked to low measures. Additionally, melatonin helps maintain your body's internal clock, regulating your sleep and wakefulness patterns.

Studies show that along with this enhanced sleep quality and quantity, mood and anxiety also display improvement. Researchers say enjoying the fruit about an hour before bedtime can help stabilize your sleep cycle.

5. Blood pressure

Finally, studies point to a link between the consumption of sweet cherries and lower blood pressure, both systolic and diastolic measures. Prolonged consumption correlates with a decrease in a potent vasoconstrictor, a compound that narrows blood vessels and restricts blood flow. The fruit is also associated with increased effectiveness of vasodilators, which help widen blood vessels and reduce blood pressure.

The addition of sweet cherries to your diet can reduce common health concerns and minimize the risk for developing illnesses such as cardiovascular disease and diabetes. Best of all, they are delicious! They are only in season for a short time, so grab them while they're at their freshest, then freeze, dry or preserve them to enjoy throughout the year.

Families, individuals, and businesses are invited to help with the annual upkeep of the Maah Daah Hey Trail during

The nearly month-long event is the second annual Big Push, though the event was only officially named last summer, according to Lindsey Ybarra, who co-founded Save the Maah Daah Hey with her husband Nick. The event gathers volunteers to upkeep all 100 miles of the Trail. That's 200 miles of mowing, weed whacking, trimming and hand shoveling, work entirely completed by volunteers through as many as 700 combined volunteer hours annually.

Because of the dedication of volunteers, the condition of the Trail has improved significantly in the past several years. Between 2010 and 2015, the "perfect storm" of circumstances, including the rise in the oil boom and limited Forest Service staff, left the Trail largely unmanaged. "The trail was underused, overgrown, washed out, unenjoyable, and in some places un-usable or even unfindable due to overgrown vegetation and erosion," Nick said on his blog.

"Due to the vegetation of the Little Missouri Nation-

soil, the MDH will forever need annual maintenance," he explained. In past years, Nick and sometimes only one other volunteer would spend a weekend throughout the summer working on the trail, but more recently, with the help of many, many additional

volunteers, the work has been condensed, and completed during the month of July.

"It's such a shorter time line because we keep getting more groups and more people to help," said Lindsey. Anyone can help, she says.

"Sometimes the guys will push the brush mowers; there are ladies who come out and help: there are people who come just to drive food out. There's a lot of different ways to help," she explained. Volunteers are well-coordinated, and sign up through a form on the non-profit's website. "You'd select specifically the trail work, and let us know who you are. We'll keep families together, and place you with more experienced volunteers. We do have several volunteers that come back every year." Lindsey said.

Volunteers aren't expected to bring their own equipment. Save the Maah Daah Hey maintains the trails through a volunteer agreement with the US Forest Service. The Forest Service lends them their brush mowers, and the non-profit has purchased three of their own brush mowers, five string trimmers, trailers, and other equipment through grants and donations.

Many wonder what would motivate a group to mow 200 miles of trails. Nick's answer is "dedication," he said in a blog post. "The volunteers who worked on this trail did it because they are dedicated individuals who love the trail. Without these volunteer efforts, there are parts of the trail that would be completely impassable. Without these volunteer efforts, this trail would cease to exist. Nobody

would be able travel across Devil's Pass, gaze at the Little Missouri River from the switchbacks they're climbing, or any other unforgettable memory from the trail," he explained.

Now, the Maah Daah Hey Trail is home to several well-known extreme bike races, including the Maah Daay Hey 100 and the Badlands Gravel Battle, and foot races like the Bull Moose Mud Run, and is enjoyed by countless visitors every year.


