



City of Sidney Gives Tour of New Waste Water Facility

Last Thursday, Public Works Director Jeff Hintz and Mayor Rick Norby took a few curious Sidney residents two miles east of town to view the sewage treatment lagoons. A few years ago the DEQ or Department of Environmental Quality visited Sidney and informed officials that Sidney needed to get its sewage system in compliance with federal regulations. At the time, the oil boom was in full swing and the population was well over the 6,000 persons it is today and was expected to grow even more.

The project consists of four separate phases. Phase two was completed back in February and they hope to be completely finished with all four within two years. The 1st phase started in 2015 building new infiltration cells for the treated water to go through its last round of filtration before reentering the environment. Phase 2 was building four 18 feet deep sewage treatment lagoons. These were lined with a PCV liner so water won't seep into the ground. The city just bid out for Phase 3. That is to build a new wastewater headworks building and lift station. Phase 4 will be the reclamation of the previous No. 1 pond to possibly be used for the treatment of stormwater sometime in the future. This phase will also include the installation of a center pivot for treated stormwater to be used to water fields rented out to a farmer instead of placing it in infiltration ponds as the last step. The city of Sidney doesn't currently treat its stormwater but Jeff predicts we will have to treat our stormwater sooner or later.

According to www.cityofsidneymt.com, Sidney was incorporated in 1911. Jeff said it did not get its first water treatment ponds until 1960. The ponds were unlined and sewage was brought to the ponds and left there to evaporate or be filtered by the ground. What is now factory lake used to be the city's sewage treatment pond. Now the sewage is treated a little differently. Three lift stations in town raise the sewage so that it can be gravity fed as before to the treatment plant. A fourth lift station at the plant raises it one more time before it enters the ponds. While spending the approximately forty-five days in each pond the water is subjected to naturally occurring bacteria that dissolve the solids. Occasionally enzymes are added to get rid of unknown substances the bacteria cannot handle but the bacteria is natural. The water is aerated by air heated from 120 to 140 degrees Fahrenheit for the health of the bacteria. It also keeps the water from icing up in the dead of winter. The water then enters a building and goes through one of three sets of ultraviolet light treatments. This kills any remaining bacteria in the water before it is sent to the infiltration ponds to evaporate or seep into the ground. Jeff assured the people the water is safe when it comes through the system. He said, "The water that's actually going to the river by the time it gets to the river is actually cleaner than what's already in the river."

The city of Sidney borrowed money from the state revolving fund to pay for this. They do not have the final numbers yet but it will be about \$20 million dollars to fully fund this project. The recent increase in rates for sewer many Sidney residents have noticed is to offset the cost. The new system is designed to support a population of 10,000 residents and is a state requirement. It is very expensive but much more cost effective than other systems because of its simplicity. Mayor Rick Norby said, "There is no money wasted by Sidney. We're pretty tight shoestrings here."

Richland County Reports First Confirmed **Human West Nile Virus Case for 2018**

Richland County's first human case of West Nile Virus (WNV) has been reported for 2018 on September 10th after exposure to mosquitoes locally. The adult case was hospitalized and is now home recovering. State and local health officials are encouraging Montanans take steps to avoid mosquito bites and prevent infection with West Nile virus.

WNV case tracking began in Montana in 2003. The highest number of cases reported in Richland County was 7 confirmed cases in 2007.

As of September 7th, there have been 25 confirmed human cases of WNV reported for the 2018 season in Montana. The first human case Montana for 2018 was confirmed on August 10 from Cascade County.

On August 29th, the Montana Department of Public Health and Human Services reported the first human death this year in Montana from West Nile Virus in an elderly Yellowstone County individual. This is the first WNV associated death in the state

WNV season usually begins in July and ends in October in Montana. Only certain mosquitoes carry West Nile Virus and it is spread to people through bites. There is no vaccine to prevent WNV so the most effective way to prevent infection is to minimize

the risk of mosquito bites by following the 4D's. The 4Ds of West Nile Virus prevention are:

DEET: Use insect repellent containing DEET or picaridin. A

solution with 25 percent to 35 percent DEET is best but children ages 2-12 should use repellent with no more than 10 percent


Drain: Empty standing water around your house to prevent mosquitoes breeding.

Dawn/Dusk: Mosquitoes are most active during dawn and dusk so stay inside during these times or take precautions to prevent bites.

Dress: Protect yourself from bites by wearing long-sleeved shirts and pants while outside. About four out of five people infected with WNV have no symptoms.

About one in five infected people will experience mild symptoms that may include headache and muscle aches, joint pain, vomiting, diarrhea or a rash. Those cases usually require no treatment. Less than 1 in 100 people who become infected develop serious infections in or around the brain, also known as neuroinvasive disease. Life-threatening symptoms include headache, rash, high fever, stiff neck, mental confusion, and other symptoms. Individuals who develop any of these symptoms should see their healthcare provider immediately.



Begins Along Sidney Fairview Roadway

Paving

Paving is scheduled to begin the week of Sept. 17, and, weather permitting, will continue through mid-October on Highway 200 between Sidney and Fairview.

Construction crews will begin paving along Highway 200 the week of Sept. 17 as part of the ongoing Sidney to Fairview Roadway Improvement Project. Paving is the last phase of the project to be completed this fall before work ceases for the winter months.

Work will begin on the north end of the roadway and will progress south towards Sidney. Weather permitting, work should be completed by mid-October.

Previous project activity focused on road widening to accommodate the installation of center-left turn lanes and passing lanes along Highway 200. Two miles of n/s passing lanes were installed between County Road 127 and County Road 130.

Drivers should expect reduced speeds of 35 mph in work zones with flaggers and pilot cars to direct traffic.

Travelers are encouraged to allow additional travel time to accommodate delays of up to 15 minutes and are reminded to watch for work crews and equipment.


There will be a wide variety of vendors under the big top. A party and dance will follow the rodeo each night, featuring Pistol Grip from Killdeer, ND.

Mass Flu Shot Clinic Scheduled October 4

The Richland County Health Department has scheduled the annual Mass Flu Shot Clinic on October 4, from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Flu shots are also available during normal clinic hours for those who cannot attend on October 4th.

The flu vaccine will be available for ages 6 months and up, and high-dose is available for individuals 65 years and older. No FluMist is available. The Health Department carries quadrivalent, pre-filled syringes that contain no preservative. The price of flu vaccine will vary from \$35 to \$75, depending on the individual's age and the type of vaccine used. Medicaid, Medicare and private insurance may be billed for those who bring their cards. Uninsured children may receive subsidized vaccine through the Vaccines for Children program. Flu clinic paperwork may be printed from www.richland.org/rchd, on the Richland County Health Department Facebook page, or obtained the day of the mass flu shot clinic.

Clinic participants may be screened for eligibility for a free FIT colon cancer screening test during the clinic.

No appointment is needed to get a flu vaccine on October 4th, and no other vaccinations will be available that day. Flu shots, as well as other vaccines, will be available during regular clinic hours, on Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday, noon to 4:30pm. Additional clinic hours are the second Wednesday until 6pm, and the third Thursday of the month, from 1:00 to 4:00pm. Check the Department Facebook page at www.facebook. com/RichlandCountyHealth-Department for changes to regular clinic hours.





They had no phones until 1971 and there was no running water in the house until Christmas of 1979. The boys learned to drive by hauling water to the house. In spring of 1980, Bill and Donna bought the McRae ranch from Donna's mother, Ellen. Bill and Donna's son Jim and his family still live on and operate the family ranch. Their four boys each married and gave them several grandchildren to love, spoil, and help raise into fine young people. You could always find Bill with a grandchild (or great grandchild) perched on his lap, either at the kitchen table feeding them maple nut ice cream or in his recliner while tickling their backs and watching Gunsmoke. Almost every grandchild has a photo sitting in bed and drinking coffee with Grampa Bill. He never gave a straight "yes" or "no" answer because he was the type of man who didn't want to cause an inconvenience for anyone else. We heard a lot of might bes, could bes, I supposes, that'll be alrights, and maybes when we asked questions. One of Bill's favorite things was to go to town and stop at a restaurant for coffee or lunch and give the waitresses a bad time. Any little kid he met always got a high five or handshake. Neighbor Slade Fitzgerald said, "My dad always said, 'I swear, that man could play a barbed-wire fence." Bill could play about any stringed instrument you handed him by ear. The Fitzgerald kids used to call him "Mr. Fix It" because he could fix just about anything he tinkered with. He was always willing to drop whatever he was doing to go help a friend or neighbor get an old tractor or vehicle going.

Bill was a member of the National Cattlemen's Association, the North Dakota Stockmen's Association, and McKenzie County Grazing Association. He held the title of Deputy Sheriff for the Squaw Gap Community Hall during special events for several years.

Bill passed away peacefully on the morning of September 15 with family by his side at Sidney Extended Care where he had resided since January 2018.





Real Estate Market Remains Strong in Sidney and Watford City

In both Sidney and Watford City, families are settling down and companies are settling in, making the real estate market strong in both areas.

In Sidney, the housing market appears to be stabilizing following the most recent Bakken oil boom. According to Justin Jones, broker and owner of Nick Jones Real Estate, "we're seeing that people are again moving to the area and setting down roots." In the summer of 2017, there were over 100 homes for sale in the Sidney area, Jones explained. "I would say that the market is somewhat improving from the last couple of years. In general, asking prices are holding steady. The climb in housing prices we saw in 2010-2014 has definitely leveled off. We're roughly at 70 homes for sale," he said.

The local economy plays a big role in the housing market. "We're seeing a lot of buyers coming back in to the market with people feeling more confident in their jobs, and jobs opening up. We're definitely seeing more people looking to become first time home buyers. They're looking to get out of a rental and into home ownership," Jones explained. Compared to the height of the oil boom several years ago, there are fewer families living apart, and more families establishing roots in the area by purchasing a home.

Another change Jones noted was an increase in commercial real estate activity. "In 2015 and 2016 we had a handful of commercial inquiries to lease or buy." Jones said. "That appears to be changing. Our market is starting to see a few commercial properties selling. We're getting inquiries. Companies are again calling and scheduling showings and asking the right kind of questions," he said.

The stabilization of housing prices is certainly a benefit for the buyer, and Jones advises sellers to take note. "There's a lot of competition for buyers. The good news is that there are qualified buyers in the market. It is important for sellers to price their homes competitively."

Watford City

Watford City has undoubtedly experienced expansive growth over the past decade, and the real estate market is no different. Over the past decade, Watford City had developed community plans focusing on telecommunications and recreational infrastructure, has made significant improvements in the retail arena and the look of downtown Watford City, and made quality of life an important focus. Coupled with heavy oil exploration and production activities, these recent improvements have attracted many energy companies, financial and service companies, and families to move into the area.

According to Pam Suelzle, real estate agent for Watford City Real Estate Group, "There has been huge growth already, and it's presently growing. Our economy is quite strong. People are

earning good wages and it's matching what our housing market is." Suelzle said there is a high demand for both residential and commercial and industrial properties. "There's a low supply for both housing and commercial and industrial, so there isn't a large selection to choose from," she said. Suelzle said many companies are opting to lease a property, or lease-to-own,

"just to make sure the economy is going to stay stable." Associate Broker Rhonda DeHaan agreed, explaining that "companies were pretty excited about getting into a long-term lease. A lot of those are coming up on the second year, and they're still excited about the increased growth in Watford City." DeHaan is hopeful many of these will commit to purchasing.

As far as residential purchases go, explosive growth saturated the housing market for a while, DeHaan said, though "quite a bit of that inventory has been purchased." "We have a low supply and a high demand," Suelzle said, though "higher wages in the area are matching what is needed to support a mortgage." Suelzle finds that many families are surprised they can pre-qualify for the homes they are interested in purchasing. "We've got a lot of qualified buvers who are looking to become homeowners," she said.

Currently, the market is strong for sellers. "The market has amped up for the sellers within the last 6 months. It's a little stronger for a sell now than it was 6 months ago," Suezle said.

In the near future, De-Haan is excited at the prospect of more new construction. "I'm hoping the increase in jobs and oil activity and gas production, we will see more permanent residents. We've seen more confidence in the builders. We're starting to see

a little more activity in subdivision lot sales." she said.

There is no doubt that Watford City will grow over the next several years, and local agents will be prepped to assist both buyers and sellers of commercial, residential and industrial properties in the area. The Watford City Real Estate Group can be reached at 701-842-4500.

hen Is The Best Time To Plant?

Like it or not, the changing of foliage, the coolness of the nights and the dampness of the air as I write this, are all signs that fall is upon us.

People often ask us "when is the best time to plant?" They often are asking because they desire to succeed in getting whatever they are planting, to grow. It often sounds like a sales pitch this time of year when we respond, Now. "Oh sure, you just want to sell product" they might think. But the reality remains that now is simply the best time to plant anything that is a year after vear plant.

We often get confused

in this region because we really do have a grain growing, farming mentality. We plant in the spring, and harvest in the fall, so why is fall the best time to plant?

There are many reasons why, and I'll seek to explain them in this article.

Firstly, the warm days of summer are behind us. Heat is stressful to all living things and iust as much to plants as to anything else. Most plants do not do well when temperatures reach the upper 80s or 100-degree mark. Plants are happier and healthier when temps are in the 70s. By waiting to plant until the middle of August or early September we can be

assured that most of the warm days of the year are over. That does not mean that we won't end up with a warm day here or there but the stresses of heat on a plant are not nearly so likely.

Secondly, when planting in areas that are more remote, water requirements are less intense when temperatures are not quite so warm. If you desire to plant but do not have an easy way of watering the space, fall is a great time. The lower temps often mean fewer water requirements. Watering still should be somewhat consistent the first at least three years of a plant's life in a space. To offer some clarity



I generally refer to a young plant like an infant child. They need to eat a little bit, and fairly often. Young plants are much the same way. Until they grow up and their roots can find their own water, even the most drought tolerant of plants cannot go completely without water. In our region, we simply cannot rely on rain to do the watering for us.

A water regiment for young trees, shrubs, and perennials should change based upon the weather. During the warm summer months of late June through early August watering should often be at least every other day, if not every day. The volume of the container the plant was growing in is a good rule to follow with regard to the amount of water needed.

When cooler temps arrive in the fall we can get by with watering less frequently. Often our interval or number of days can increase in the fall, making it easier to keep a plant watered and thus a good time to plant. In the fall we can often water a couple of times a week at the same volume as we did in the warmer summer

When temps get colder yet, in late September and

early October we often think about rolling our hoses up and putting things away for the winter. We should really resist that temptation.

Our fall seasons in Eastern MT and Western ND are routinely very dry. We often get very little rain and very little snow. Since this is the case, the investment of water that we have made through the season can often disappear before winter actually sets in. This can be dangerous for a young plant. Dry soil does not protect against cold temperatures as well as wet soil does. Also when spring returns, the dry soil warms up more quickly than wet soil causing plants to wake up too early and be subject to dangerous cold spring temps.

Late fall watering then should be at least weekly to ensure that the soil around the plant stays moist until the ground becomes hard. This can often be as late as mid-November.

Lastly, with regard to the fall being the best time to plant. The cooler temperatures often result in lower soil temperatures as well. Soil temperatures in the 40s promote strong root development. Plants were designed this way

as a manner of preparing for winter. Instead of putting on leaves and branches they focus instead on developing their root systems for winter. By planting in the fall you have an already warm soil, instead of planting in the spring when the soil is still far too cold.

We have a preoccupation with "the Best" in our society. That being said the "optimum "window for planting in our climate is the 30-day window from August 15th to September 15th. You can plant up until the ground freezes but that planting window offers the prime amount of time to develop a root system for winter.


