

# **Railroad Experiencing A Renaissance With Oil Boom**

By Jodi McPherson Railroads seem to be experiencing a renaissance of sorts as the volume of crude oil pumped out of the Bakken continues to set records. U.S. railroads lost about six years of rail-traffic progress as a result of the recession.


Shale drilling activities are helping to lead the charge with investments made during the past two years by oil and rail companies due to the accelerated growth in oil related traffic in the past four years.

With the controversies regarding pipelines, railroads are laying more rail and along with oil companies, constructing loading stations all over the Bakken to move oil products to market

Railroad officials claim that pipelines will never completely replace rail because of the flexibility that rail provides in reaching more markets. Rail also can be cost effective and has the added advantage of preserving product integrity during shipping.

The major expansion of Dore, ND, crude-by-rail facility is nearing completion. The high-speed loading facility is getting closer to its goal of being capable of moving unit trains of crude oil from the Bakken to markets across the country.

The facility will soon have a total outbound capacity of 70,000 barrels a day. Construction of additions to the facility are nearly completed including a loading rack for unit trains, fixed tanks



and a pipeline connection to Banner Transportation's Market Center Crude Oil Gathering System located in North Dakota. Construction began in August 2011 with plans of being fully operational this spring. The site moves manifest rail car shipments to the Gulf Coast, West Coast and Mid-Continent. These types of facilities will have the capability of handling large unit train volumes along with manifest commodities such

as fracturing sand, pipe and drilling supplies.

Frac sand loading stations have also been in construction at Dore and east of Fairview in addition to the crude loading station.

Railroad lines are moving forward with improvements to rail lines to help meet the demand for the oil related stations being built in the area. Railroads have been hauling crude for 140

years so the practice is nothing new, even though the volume is greater than ever.

New crude cars are showing up in the terminals. The biggest obstacle for shippers has been time necessary in ordering tank cars. Rail car manufacturers had scaled back during the recession so oil companies were finding less supply and longer wait times.

Rail car production is already at a three-year high as manufacturers expand to meet demand for crude, gas and sand cars used in oil and nas exploration

# Brower Hired As New LYIP Manager

Brower, who officially begins his duties as manager of the irrigation project on Feb. 17, replaces Jerry Nypen, who will retire from the manager position effective Feb. 16. Brower will unofficially begin work this week on Feb. 8 however as he wants to familiarize himself with all aspects of the Project prior to Nypen's departure so he can gain insights and knowledge about the project before he takes full responsibility for LYIP. 

# City Of Culbertson Visited By DEQ

By Jaimee Green Areas receiving large increases in population because of the oil boom that has hit Northeast Montana and Western North Dakota aren't the only people adapting to the times. As new types of housing come into the area the Montana Department of Environmental Quality is experiencing growing pains of their own as they scramble to define how these subdivisions are to be regulated and how to fit them into their statutes.

In the last 20 years, there have been less than 30 new lots created in Northeast Montana but with more people flooding the area, the DEQ says those numbers are changing.

The DEQ's Permitting and Compliance Division held an informational meeting in Culbertson on Feb. 2 at the Roosevelt County Complex. With several dozen in attendance, the DEQ was available to explain their role in the recent oil boom with regards to the public water supply and waste water and potential developers, consultants and community members interested in the growth and housing issues associated with the oil development.

"Some of the things we are seeing don't fit into anything we have defined before. We've never seen the man camps and the truck servicing areas and they don't fit neatly into our rules. Hopefully in the near future we'll be able to get a better handle on what it is we are dealing with," said Steven Kilbreath, DEQ's permitting and compliance subdivision bureau.

Some community members wanted to know why the DEQ couldn't incorporate new ways of defining the rules and standards to include the man camps and other situations that are cur-

rently a gray area but Kilbreath said those rules and criteria are statutory and changes have to come from legislation.

Under the Sanitation Subdivision Act the DEQ looks at the water quality, quantity and dependability and the proper disposal of sewage and storm water and drainage. Thier four divisions consist of planning, permitting and compliance, enforcement and remediation.

The DEQ defines a subdivision as the creation of a parcel but defines it as consisting of less than 160 acres through the Planning Act and as less than 20 acres through the Sanitation Act which typically encompasses trailer and RV parks.

According to Kilbreath, under the Public Water Supply Act, the DEQ regulates subdivisions if that parcel of land services a minimum of 25 people 60 days out of the vear or if there are two or more housing units on a parcel

The DEQ also stated that ultimately it is the towns themselves that determine whether or not to allow a subdivision access to its public water system. It is the DEQ that ensures the town and personal systems are compliant with state and federal regulations.

An area that needs evaluation is the waste water treatment plants being used by incoming businesses. One area of contention is what to do with the human waste produced at these locations. Many incoming companies don't want to spend large amounts of money on waste water treatment facilities but instead prefer the pump and dump method. "One of the things I see as a hot button because of the oil is the public municipal waste water capacity. I think it's a major issue and I think one of the issues I am


going to take back with me to tem was built in the early Helena is that we need to have inspections done and get these capacities identified and defined," said Kilbreath.

For anyone planning a subdivision that will use at least 2,500 gallons of water per day they will need an engineer for the design. If the waste water system will require more than 5,000 gallons of water per day a ground water discharge permit will need to be issued and can take 180 days to receive.

As Montana communities observe what is taking place in North Dakota with the rapid growth, Kilbreath stated Montana may be better equipped to handle some of the influx more smoothly because of the County Sanitation and Subdivision Act. "We are already ahead of the game compared to North Dakota because we have this in place. This gives us a set of minimum standards that everyone has to work toward. We have big rules for little projects and we apply them evenly across the state. Our approach is to make sure our water is clean and to use a very common sense approach with what is going on." Kilbreath stated.

Currently, in Culbertson there is some room for additional usage of the public water system which is currently capable of 1.3 million gallons of water per day. However, the Dry Prairie Rural Water System currently uses half of that amount to supply the outlying area residents with drinkable, usable water. "Until they are operating on their own, there are some limitations to how many more people we can hook up to our system. Once they are on their own we will have a lot more room for the kind of growth we may be expecting," said Culbertson Mayor Gordon Oelkers.

The current water sys-



rently there have been no formal contracts requested but there has been a lot of talk and inquiries.

The sewage lagoon is getting full and plans are underway to secure funding for a \$4 million facility through a state rural development funding program. For the last two years there has been a sewer design project underway and the project should go up for bid this spring. "The current system is 50 years old and its life span has been used up. The slopes are bad and we can no longer control the flow," Oelkers said. The new design will use a system of different cells that can be shut on and off and will better service a growing population.

To date there is an estimated 900 people living in Culbertson. "We're really maxed out at this point until more housing is developed. I think the growth is good. In the 1980s we were struggling to keep the town alive and now our businesses are busy. We just have to be careful about how we build. We want permanent housing that adds to our town in a positive way," Oelkers said.

Phil is bored with having to do the same story every year, doesn't put his heart into it, and is "punished" by having to live through the same day over and over again. He hates his life - and even tries to commit suicide. Much to his chagrin, however, he wakes up, day after day, to realize that he has to live the day over again.

Phil eventually realizes that the only way he can get out of "this day" is to try his best at everything he does . . . He saves a vagrant's life, catches a kid falling out of a tree, helps some little old ladies change a flat tire, buys insurance from an old school acquaintance, learns how to play piano, treats a disliked co-worker with respect, learns how to genuinely care for the Punxsutawney townspeople, and falls in love . . . Only genuine love was able to convince the object of his affection to believe in him. And finally, after an eternity of trying, Phil was able to enter into the next day. This "next day" of his life represents the beginning of a new and more genuine phase of his life.

I think "Groundhog Day" is one of the best movies of all time. It is funny, well-acted, and has a great message. The screenplay was written by Danny Rubin and Harold Ramis. Theirs is the kind of "live better" message that is profound and yet easy to swallow. My "Dr. Dirt" column occasionally tries to address topics of this nature. I often stumble in my attempt to do so, and stumble even more in my attempt to live in a prescribed manner. But I'll keep trying. Perhaps my efforts to "live a better life" are not unlike yours. It seems that we are all like Phil Collins, the star of "Groundhog Day," and need to become motivated to make the most of each day.







# Man Camp Going In At Dore

By Jodi McPherson Local news and rumors have been stating that an 800-person man camp is underway just west of Dore. The camp is located on Richland County Road 137 just north of Valley View Feedlot, Fairview.

The first unit of the first group of trailers was being placed Monday morning by workers and a crane.

A spokesman on the site said this is just the first unit of a smaller camp planned to go in. He said the company who owns the property, Sun Valley Oil, has applied for a permit for an 800-person workforce housing facility with Richland County. He said initially the camp will be

smaller than the intended 800-person housing.

Richland County Planner Marcy Hamburg explained why property owners may not be in compliance with the county by setting a unit on the property before final approval of the permit submitted.

"When a permit is submitted, the review process can take two to six months and there should be no construction or otherwise until there is final approval,' said Hamburg.

Man camps have been popping up all over the Bakken not only in North Dakota but also in Montana in Culbertson, Bainville, Sidney and now Fairview.

Deadline for candidates to submit a list of their watchers to the Election Board is February 24, 2012. This will ensure a fair and orderly election.



#### **NEW CHANGES:**

Absentee ballots will be counted on the day of election.

All ballots for Chairperson-at-large will be the SAME color.

There will be no filing fee (the Election Board could not verify the valid passage of this section of the Election Code).




