# **Small Town Christmas**

If Christmas to you means a warm sense of community, photos with Santa, and a parade of lights, Sidney is the place for you! The city will be the host of many traditional and annual events, meals and photo opportunities with Santa, a parade of lights, and many community-wide events to get you in the Christmas spirit. The season begins early, so shop local and enjoy what Sidney has to offer.

Friday, November 24: Sidney's "It's a Small Town Christmas" event begins bright an early at 8:00 AM with Breakfast with Santa, presented by the Boys & Girls Club of Richland County. Enjoy breakfast at the New Fire Hall and pictures with Santa. Santa will head over to Reese & Ray's IGA to decorate cookies with kids until noon. Cookies are free, in partnership with the Sidney Jaycees. A polar Plunge, presented by Richland County Law Enforcement, will take place at the old fire hall from noon until 2:00 PM. The Centre Theatre will have a free showing of "A Charlie Brown Christmas" beginning at 2:00 PM. The 15th Annual Parade of Trees, a cooperative fundraiser for the MonDak Heritage Center and the Boys & Girls Club of Richland County, will be open for viewing at the MonDak Heritage Center at 3:00 PM. The auction of the trees, led by Jeremy Norby, commences at 5:00. Float lineup for the parade begins at 5:30 PM in the Cenex parking lot, and the parade heads down Central Ave at 6:30PM. Live entertainment provided by the Sidney Rockettes, sponsored by Tri-County Implement, and Cutting Edge Dancers occurs in front of RestorX. Bleacher seating is available close by. Finally, join the staff at Reynold's Market for a final opportunity for pictures with Santa and refreshments following the parade.

Sunday, December 3: Join the MonDak Heritage Center to celebrate the 31st Annual MonDak Christmas from 1:30 to 3:00 PM on Sunday, December 3rd. This free, family-friendly event features free-will donation photos with Santa, desserts from local bakers for sale, and an exhibition of the wreaths and trees from the Parade of Trees. Participants can make marbled glass ball Christmas ornaments and decorate gingerbread men. The 5th grade choir, led by Janet Spracklin, and dancers from Cutting Edge Dance Studio will be performing. The event is sponsored by H&R Block and Missouri River Realty, and all donations will help support youth programming at the MonDak.

Saturday, December 9: The "Gifts from the Heart" annual gift distribution, organized by the Richland County Christmas Coalition, will take place on Saturday, December 9, from 7:00 AM to 1:00 PM. The event takes place at the Sidney Masonic Lodge, across from the Courthouse. The goal of the event is to provide an opportunity for parents and guardians in need to shop free of charge for donated gifts. Shoppers will be provided with a food basket containing the ingredients to make Christmas dinner. Recipients of the gifts must be residents of Richland County, and under the age of 18. Parents are asked not to bring children to the distribution. Donations and volunteers are welcome. Toy donations can be dropped off at any local Edward Jones; hats and mittens can be donated at any Richland County financial institution, and monetary donations can be made at Stockman Bank in Sidney. # \$1,000 Ag Excellence **Scholarship Deadline December 1**

The Hard Spring Wheat Show is offering a \$1,000 scholarship to graduating high school seniors from Richland, Williams, McKenzie, Divide, Mountrail, Burke, Sheridan, and Roosevelt Counties. The scholarship is designed to financially support students who will be pursuing a degree in an agricultural related field in the fall of 2018. To be eligible, students must have a high school GPA of 2.5 or higher.

Students interested in applying for the scholarship must write a one-paged paper on the topic, "What do you think is an important challenge facing agriculture today?" Also students must submit an application form (which can be found online at www.ag.ndsu.edu/williamscountyextension) and a high school transcript to the National Hard Spring Wheat Show via the Williams County Extension office. The completed application materials should be mailed or emailed to the office by December 1st.

The first prize recipient will receive a scholarship of \$1,000 and two runner-ups will receive a \$500 scholarship. Winners will be notified prior to the 65th annual National Hard Spring Wheat Show, and winners will be required to attend an award luncheon on February 8th, 2018 in Williston. Are you or someone you know worried about how you're going to pay those home energy bills this winter? Energy Share of Montana is accepting applications for emergency heating assistance at Action for Eastern Montana in Glendive at 406-

Energy Share is an independent nonprofit organization that helps Montanans who are facing financial difficulties which may result in loss of heat or lights in their home due to circumstances beyond their control. Energy Share helps people no matter what their heat source, but the assistance is usually only once every ten years or so because the organization is truly a source of emergency funds, intended to complement government assistance programs but not replace them.

Last year Energy Share helped 265 families in eastern Montana and 2,971 households statewide. Applications are reviewed individually, allowing applicants to explain the difficult circumstances they are facing.

The only way Energy Share can provide this individual attention to each application is through a cooperative effort. The nuts and bolts of Energy Share happens with the ten HRDCs across the state, and the volunteer Local Energy Share Committees that each HRDC coordinates. Committees across the state vary as dictated by the specific needs of the community. These Committee members donate many hours on behalf of the organizations they represent.

Energy Share is supported by donations from individuals, small businesses, utility companies, electric cooperatives and large electric users across Montana so your neighbors struggling with difficult circumstances don't have to go cold.

# Design Your Succession Plan

#### "Empowering families to get started on their succession plan."

How will your family farm or ranch business operate in the future when the owner retires or is gone? Are you currently working with another generation who may be questioning their role in the future of the farm or ranch business or are you yourself questioning your current role?

More than 80 percent of farm and ranch families hope to pass the family farm or ranch on to the next generation, but research shows only 30 percent of family farms and ranches survive to the second generation, and only 12 percent survive to the third generation. A successful transition to the next generation takes careful planning.

To help North Dakota farm and ranch families start their succession planning process, the North Dakota State University Extension Service has developed a new interactive program, Design Your Succession Plan. This program will provide tools and resources for North Dakota producers who want to begin the succession planning process.

Participants will have an opportunity to open the lines of communication with family to create a shared vision for the family business. They will also learn to choose and work with professionals such as attorneys, accountants, lenders, insurance agents and tax experts to construct a plan and documents that put the family's vision into action.

"The program will prepare you to envision, communicate, plan, write and shape the legacy of your family farm or ranch business, as well as save hundreds of dollars by completing these crucial planning steps before visiting with professionals," said Marcia Hellandsaas, McKenzie County Extension agent.

This workshop will be offered as a 3 afternoon course in Watford City, ND at the McKenzie County Extension Office. The program will run from 1:30 to 4:30 pm CT on November 28, 30 and December 7. 

Of course, we also eagerly awaited the Christmas offerings on TV. I'm showing my age here, as I recall variety show specials that included the Andy Williams Christmas special, Lawrence Welk, Perry Como, and the Ed Sullivan show. We also never tired of the annual holiday favorites such as The Littlest Angel and A Christmas Carol. Every year we sat enthralled by these shows, watching them repeatedly and as avidly as if this was our first ever viewing of the program

Even the weekly series gave a passing nod to the holiday season: cowboys rescued animals and small children, Santa might make an appearance, who knew, anything was possible, and we loved it all.

However, none of these activities say 'old fashioned' to me. So I ask again, what is an old fashioned Christmas? Chestnuts roasting on an open fire? Where on earth can you find chestnuts these days? I remember eating and savoring chestnuts at Christmastime

I remember reading the Laura Ingalls books, her Little House on the Prairie in particular, and how Laura and her family celebrated Christmas. I also believe a neighbor rode over to the Ingalls' cabin on his horse Christmas Night to deliver a handmade doll for Laura.

Aside from a few gifts, to me an old-fashioned Christmas also means a small cabin in the woods, the nearest neighbors down the road and out of earshot, and sharing Christmas with the wildlife that treks through the property.

So, I still feel my husband and I will celebrate an old-fashioned Christmas this year. We've already got snow on the pines. Our cabin sits nestled back on the hill somewhat protected from wind and weather. We won't have neighbors drop by on horseback or arrive in a horse-drawn sleigh to visit us, nor will we eat roasted chestnuts. However, we have what we need, we are snug and warm in our cabin, and we've got enough wood for the wood stove to last for several winters. We don't have extra money for frivolous items, so whatever we decide to gift the other will be simple, practical, and just maybe a little bit fun

as well. We don't need a tin cup, but we might need some other small item that will make our lives a bit easier.

We plan to decorate one of our outside pines and enjoy a living Christmas tree this year. We will redecorate that pine each Christmas for years to come. We'll string a few lights to brighten dark December nights, maybe enjoy a special treat for Christmas Eve, and call it good. It WILL be good

Wherever and however you decide to celebrate, Merry Christmas from our household to yours.






Lonsdale United Methodist Church of Sidney and Boys and Girls Club of Richland County are entering into an exciting partnership that will enable both organizations to better serve the people of Sidney and the MonDak region.

On Sunday, November 5, the congregation of Lonsdale Methodist Church unanimously passed a resolution to authorize the Board of Trustees to transfer ownership of the church building and land on Third Avenue SE and to sell the parsonage to Boys & Girls Club of Richland County. This transfer of ownership will allow the church and the Club to participate in a unique partnership that will mutually benefit each organization and its constituents.

Citing the pioneer spirit of Methodist founders John and Charles Wesley and Montana minister "Brother Van", the church sees this move as a way of living into its purpose statement: "Lonsdale Methodist Church exists so that our church family and community may know the love of God revealed by Jesus". The main building has served the church for over 90 years. This is an opportunity to practice the generosity and social concern the Methodists are known for. The church will be "right-sized" for the present congregation, which will continue to worship, learn and care for its membership while exploring what it means be to be a church that serves the community

well today.

Boys & Girls Club will be conducting a renovation of the church building to best make use of the space for programming, create an energy efficient environment, and to best serve the needs of the youth of Richland County. Funds raised for the capital campaign will be used to complete this renovation with the hope that the facility will be ready to open

the doors for programming in the Fall of 2018.

When renovations are complete, there will be classrooms, offices, programming areas and meeting areas that will be used exclusively by the Club to provide after-school and summer programming for over 250 youth of Richland County. Several areas of the church, including the fellowship hall/multi-purpose room, kitchen, and sanctuary will be shared space, used both by the Club and the church. The church will retain exclusive areas for storage and office space, and will use shared spaces at times when the Club is not in session for services. funerals, weddings, and meetings. Both groups see this as a shared mission and partnership to serve the community in

new, innovative ways. The next step for Boys & Girls Club will be to construct a full-sized gym and teen center. These two elements are integral pieces of programming and future growth for the organization and will fulfill critical needs to benefit not only Boys & Girls Club, but the entire community. We will rely on the continued support of our local community, supplemented by grant funding, to complete this second stage of the project, with an anticipated completion date of Fall of 2019.


