On Saturday, Sept. 4, the Sidney Area Chamber of Commerce will be hosting its annual Bakken Brewfest at Richland County Event Center, Sidney. Doors will open at 5 p.m. for VIP ticket holders and 7 p.m. for general admission.

The event will have unlimited beer samples, boozy ice-cream, and live music by Mighty Big Jim.

"I'm pretty excited about our new "boozy ice cream." Our VIPs will receive the boozy ice cream free of charge and it'll be available to the general admission for \$5. This year we've lowered the ticket prices and added a cash food truck court. We'll also be featuring live music by Mighty Big Jim, Wibaux.

The event serves as the Chamber's largest fundraiser. It allows the Chamber to keep membership costs at a level that is affordable to most businesses. It also helps provide the funding for some of the projects they do around town and gives them funds for providing a grant match and draws tourists in from all over.

Grasshoppers Wreaking Havoc On Crops & Pastures

Farmers across the area have taken a blow this year; a combination of the devastating drought and a sky-rocketing population of grasshoppers has caused significant losses for producers.

"I believe that a majority of our farmers and ranchers are dealing with some level of damage from the grasshoppers, ranging from light damage to some pretty severe crop and/or grass loss. Of course, the damage was exacerbated by the drought so it's hard to determine exactly just how much damage was grasshoppers and how much was drought," said Tim Fine, MSU Richland County Extension Agent.

This year was a superb year for grasshoppers because dry weather increases the survival of nymphs and adults, and warm autumns allow the pests more time to feed and lay eggs.

Grasshopper outbreaks are usually followed by several years of hot, dry summers and warm falls; these conditions allow grasshopper populations to increase slowly. Weather is found to be the main factor affecting grasshopper population levels.

Area farmers have seen a stark increase in the number of grasshoppers this growing season. Grasshoppers have plagued several areas of cropland and rangeland. Grasshopper damage to wheat cereal crops can be seen on the areas between the crop and the field boundary. Individual plants will show leaf stripping, head clipping, and kernels that have been fed on or destroyed.

Grasshoppers also compete heavily with grazing livestock for forage; they feed on the desirable forage, leaving the less desirable plants behind. Their feeding, if coupled with drought conditions, is prone to causing long-term deterioration of the forage plants/rangeland. The pests can reduce the quality of rangeland in the same way as cattle overgrazing. Ranchers can help deter grasshopper damage by properly managing their range through proper stocking rates and using insecticides suitable for their operation.

Cropland takes a heavy hit when grasshopper popu-

lations are dense and food plants are scarce. The pests migrate and consume almost any plant they come upon. According to www. ndsu.edu, row crop producers should be aware of the potential for grasshoppers to move into row crops after small grains have started to dry down. The best thing producers can do is to consider spraying to keep the populations down. Both low and high-labeled rates of all insecticides provide control of grasshoppers and prevent

economic yield loss. Fine explained that getting some moisture will help tremendously and will allow crops and grasses to overcome some of the damage for the coming year. He said, "Grasshoppers seem to come and go in waves, some years we have lots of them and some years not many at all. Spring weather can greatly affect grasshopper population so there is no way to predict now what the future will hold."







Phone Scam In Richland County

Submitted by Robert Burnison, Undersheriff Richland County Sheriff's Office

It has come to the attention of Law Enforcement in Richland County that residents in our county have been receiving phone calls from a person claiming to be Officer or Detective Baker with the Richland County Sheriff's Office. He then tells them that there is a warrant for their arrest demanding money and says if they don't pay, someone will be coming to arrest them. They may leave a message for you to call a number that they provide or tell you that if you need to purchase an amount of gift cards to be turned over to him, you will not be arrested.

Remember the caller may know information about you that makes you feel like they must know what they are talking about, or they are from local law enforcement. Information can be found through other sources about all of us, like the internet or social media. You may also be left a message on your phone answering device, where they request an "Urgent" call back, giving you a number to call.

When law enforcement make phone contacts, they do not demand payment or make statements that if you do not send money or give instruction to purchase gift cards in exchange for not being arrested.

Some tips that may help you recognize a phone

· The scammer demands immediate payment.

· Demand payment for a warrant or they will be coming to their home or place of employment to arrest them.

· Ask for debit and credit card numbers or bank account numbers over the

- · Demand you use a specific payment method for payment.
- · Make threats to have someone arrested by local law enforcement if you don't
- · Scammers change the way they contact their victims, by saying they are with law enforcement, the IRS, or Social Security. In all cases they want to scam the person out of money.

CRIMESTOPPERS and local law enforcement do not want you to be a victim of a scam. If you receive a call like this or feel that you are being pressured into doing something that doesn't seem right, please check into it by talking to someone you know or to contact the Sidney Police Department at 406-433-2210 or Richland County Sheriff's Office at 406-433-2919. Please pass this information on to others.

If you have knowledge or information on any crimes in Richland County, contact CRIMESTOPPERS by calling 406-433-6666 Monday through Friday between 8 a.m.-5 p.m. You can also contact Crimestoppers in Richland County anytime (24/7) by going to our New

Crimestoppers website at www.richlandcs.com then going to Submit a Web Tip or by texting the code "CSRC plus your message to: 274637 (CRIMES). You can also contact the Richland County Sheriff's Office at 406-433-2919. You may be eligible for a cash reward of up to \$1,000.

The new Richland County Crimestoppers restarted in 2013 has already paid individuals providing information to law enforcement that led to the arrest of those committing crimes in Richland County.

The Richland County Fair and Rodeo has been exhibiting community seed pictures from area communities for nearly 70 years. These seed pictures are designed, constructed, and brought to life with the help of community members from across the MonDak area.

Participants that help make seed pictures strategically place native seeds, plants, and other natural resources to create an artistic mosaic backdrop.


This year the communities of Fairview, Savage, Sidney/Crane, and Ridgelawn submitted seed pictures. Ridgelawn received 1st place, Fairview 2nd,

Sidney/Crane 3rd, and Savage taking 4th.

The Ridgelawn group consisted of Ruth Iversen, Leann Pelvit, Larry and Marilyn Schmitt, Marlys Dynneson, Margaret Bradley, Alida Dore, Loretta Dowse, Joe and Becky Bradley, Emily Hoff, Renee Troudt and her family, and Paula Bostrom; with the group's oldest participant being 101 years old and the youngest 13 years.

In the past, there have been many more submissions and communities participating in the competition.

"There used to be several communities that have participated; I think there used to be about 12-15 communities throughout history that made seed pictures," said Margaret

Bradley, who helped create the Ridgelawn seed picture. Bradley has been helping create seed pictures for 40

years. She said, "It has been a tradition in the county for several years; communities did seed pictures way before I started doing them."

The group starts the project months before the fair and spends several hours working on their unique art pieces. All materials used must be natural and native to that community; the material must be 100% plant and/or natural resources grown or produced locally (rocks, coal, twigs, tree bark, etc.). All materials must retain its own natural color and there can be no artificial dving

Some examples of things used on the pieces are

grape seeds, beets, flax, poppy seeds, safflower, popcorn. eggshells, milkweed, lentils, corn, wool, leather, scoria, and flower petals.

After the completion and judging is done, the communities sell or donate the seed pictures to area businesses and/or people in their respective communities.

Bradley explained that the seed pictures are a great way to bring the community together. She said, "It is really enjoyable for everyone. It encourages community togetherness and is a good fellowship with our neighbors."

She also explained that she wished more communities would get restarted. "There are people in those communities that should get together and make a seed picture."





Several states also offer "Beyond BOW" opportunities which include 1-3-day events with a single activity such as kayaking on a local lake, a

weekend camping trip, or an archery clinic. "BOW Destinations" are specialty trips to special destinations offered in partnership with Green Edventures. The program even has an upcoming trip planned to Iceland.

Montana's BOW program offers activities unique to Montana. More recently Montana BOW members practiced using bear spray on a charging bear target. The event offered bear encounter safety talks and learned how to prevent conflict with bears.

"Classes are for beginners so everyone attending is starting at the same level. We also usually provide the gear to learn these new skills, as cost of gear can be a barrier to trying something new. This way participants can "try before they buy" and decide if it's something they love and want to invest in. The volunteers who teach these classes are experts in their fields and many have taught with the BOW program for over 20 years," said Smith.

Montana BOW also offers partial scholarships for women aged 18 years



and older who are full-time residents of Montana and who have not previously attended a BOW event. These scholarships enable women to participate in BOW who otherwise may not be able to afford the full registration fee.



Bragging On Our Community

Fellowship Food Bank gives away food six days a week. This constitutes thousands of pounds of food to hundreds of hungry Richland County residents. Our greatest need (usually) is frozen beef and non-perishable food items. However, we made the conscious choice in 2008 (when we started) not to fundraise in the community so this can remain our gift to the community and not compete with other charitable organizations.

The chief difference between our food bank, and the county food bank, is that (A) we don't ask for donations, as explained above (B) we serve food every day (C) we make deliveries to the house bound and elderly if necessary and (D) we don't require certain things to help, like in-county residency or limitations on frequency of use.

One other difference, I suppose, is that although we don't preach or proselytize to those who need food, we slip in a Bible with their food (without a word

spoken) and our volunteers wear a name-tag that reads, "How can I pray for you?" We help everyone without discrimination of any kind, including lifestyle choices, color, creed, address, or religion.

Meanwhile, every police officer or deputy, mental health worker, social worker, or pastor of any church is welcome to use our pantry whenever they need it to help others (all you have to do is receive a 30-minute training on how to let yourself in and out of the pantry, etc). You can call 406-433-4004 to set up a time to learn how to utilize our pantry yourself to help those under

However, being low on beef, I recently approached Steve Lunderby and asked if he had any beef he could sell us at a discount. Instead, Lunderby gave us the beef to feed the hungry. And he gave us more than our many freezers could hold. We passed some of that along to ROI and Eastern Montana Bible Camp (what we could not fit). That beef happened to be processed

at M3 Meats, and all we had to do was pay for the butchering.

However, when we went to M3, they refused to charge us for their work, as a part of their own service to the community. With every freezer full, we passed some of that along to adoptive and foster parents to help feed their families.


