Self-guided community/historical tours will take place both days and the Sidney-Richland County Library will provide History tours.



One Year After GE Wheat Contamination, USDA has Failed to Protect Farmers, Wheat farmers and **Advocates Demand Immediate Action from USDA**

On the one-year anniversary of the Department of Agriculture's announcement of finding an unapproved, genetically engineered (GE) wheat in an Oregon field, farmers and allies are demanding an end to the approval of GE traits until measures are adopted to protect non GE-farmers and their markets from contamination by GE crops. A 2013 FOIA request uncovered up to 483 total field trial violations, demonstrating the serious potential for future contamination episodes.

"We're still waiting for answers," says Clint Lindsey, an Oregon wheat grower whose shipments were put on hold last year after the unapproved wheat was found. "Crop genes move in the environment and cannot be fully contained, yet USDA continues to approve experimental wheat trials. We deserve assurances that our markets won't be halted again and put at risk."

Todd Leake, a North Dakota wheat grower and Dakota Resource Council member who farms more than 2,000 acres, is concerned about ongoing experimental field trials in his state.

"GE wheat field trials are underway in North Dakota, potentially covering more than 260 acres. Our export markets have zero tolerance for GE traits in wheat products - it's not a marketable commodity. If another contamination event surfaces, the consequences would be devastating. USDA must do its part to ensure that we don't lose our export markets to other countries."

After a decade of field trials, Monsanto dropped efforts to introduce GE wheat in 2004 in the face of intense opposition from consumers, farmers, wheat millers and food companies. However, after a six-year hiatus, Monsanto resumed extensive field-testing of GE wheat in 2011.

"USDA has continuously failed to protect the food supply from GE crop contamination," said Andrew Kimbrell, executive director for Center for Food Safety. "Our farmers and food supply are severely jeopardized by such contamination episodes, yet the biotech industry responsible faces no accountability and operates with little transparency. Swift action from USDA is desperately needed."

tant wheat on over 4,000 acres in 17 states since 1994. Records also reveal that 22 new GE wheat field trials have been approved since the department's announcement one year ago. These trials represent more than 960 acres spanning ten states. USDA is allowing Monsanto to conduct six of these trials, despite remaining questions as to how the company's product contaminated Oregon wheat last year.

"Contamination events happen far too frequently," says Kristina Hubbard of Organic Seed Alliance. She points to contaminated alfalfa identified in Washington State four months after the Oregon wheat contamination event. Soon after, China rejected a U.S. corn shipment containing a GE trait not approved for import. "Farmers, seed companies, and food processors are bearing the burden of contamination. Stronger regulations and oversight are long overdue to protect the integrity of seed changes that must begin at the experimental field trial stage."

Opponents of GE wheat have long argued that it would contaminate conventional wheat, making it unsellable to many markets that reject GE products. A 2005 study estimated that the wheat industry could lose \$94 to \$272 million if GE wheat was introduced.

More than 150 farm organizations, food processors, millers, retail companies, bakeries, and seed businesses signed a letter last year calling for improvements in USDA's oversight of experimental trials of GE crops, including:

USDA should halt all new approvals of GE wheat field trials and terminate existing trials.

USDA should publish a final report before wheat harvests begin detailing the department's investigation into the Oregon wheat event, including sampling and testing methodologies.

Before approving field trials, USDA must have the appropriate tools in hand to test for unapproved GE traits in cases of suspected and confirmed contamination events.

USDA should mandate containment protocols for all GE crop field trials.

USDA should fully implement the remaining recommendations made by investigative bodies and Congress that aim to improve field trial oversight.





In a joint effort with the South Dakota Humanities Council and the 125th Anniversary Committees from the states of North and South Dakota, the North Dakota Humanities Council will commemorate the entry of South and North Dakota into state-hood with a special One Book collaboration.

The Montana Department of Health and Human Services (DPHHS) is joining the states of Washington and Idaho in advising people NOT to eat raw clover sprouts produced by Evergreen Fresh Sprouts LLC of Idaho.

The sprouts have been linked to an outbreak of ten illness as of Escherichia coli, or E. coli, in Idaho and Washington. No confirmed cases have been reported in Montana at this time.

"Memorial Day weekend is a time people get together and

eat, and enjoy the beauty of Montana. We are advising caution by urging folks not to eat these specific sprouts," said DPHHS Director Richard Opper. The suspect clover sprouts were distributed to several restaurants and grocery stores in Montana. However, state

and local public health authorities have been working to notify

recipients and believe the sprouts are no longer available for the public to purchase and consume. Montana public health officials are working with local health jurisdictions, as well as Washington, Idaho, and federal agencies to ensure the safety of residents and visitors to Montana. DPHHS officials will provide additional information as the



Fed Up with Federal Lands Manage

There are several reasons Montana is lagging behind neighboring states when it comes to oil and gas development. While North Dakota maintains nearly 200 drilling rigs at any given time, Montana has struggled to keep rigs running. North Dakota issued over 2,500 drilling permits last year. Montana issued only 297. Considering these numbers, it should come as no surprise that North Dakota is producing around a million barrels a day, while Montana pumps out less than 80,000 barrels a day. So what gives?

Taxes, access, geology and regulatory climate all play a key role in a company's decision to deploy capital to a particular area.

Hurry Up & Wait

The Keystone XL pipeline delay provides a perfect example of the political reality of unnecessary and cumbersome delays waiting for approval of a project that is environmentally sound, and job generating. After five years and multiple **Environmental Assessments** that conclude the pipeline will not exacerbate greenhouse gas emissions, the Administration still refuses to approve the pipeline. Keystone XL is the poster child of many Federal land projects that linger for approval.

Federal lands and waters hold roughly 43 percent of all domestic oil reserves and 72 percent of oil shale acreage, according to the American Action Forum. But energy production has been stifled through lengthy permitting and more lands designated off-limits to oil and gas drilling

Drilling Down on Federal Lands

According to the American Petroleum Institute, waiting for a federal permit can take more than 10 times longer than it does at the state level. In 2013, the average wait for the federal government to approve a request was 194 days, compared to two weeks in Montana (on State and fee land). Waiting for Federal lands to be reviewed prior to being offered for lease can take infinite amounts of time with no end in sight.

Total daily federal onshore oil production is only about onethird of what is produced every day at North Dakota's Bakken formation alone.

President Obama has often taken credit for the increased oil and gas production in the United States. Last year, however, the Obama administration sold the lowest amount of oil and gas leases since 1988 and approved the fewest drilling permits since 2002.

According to the Congressional Research Service, production on federal lands has fallen from 33.8 percent in 2009 to only 23 percent last year.

The share of U.S. oil production on federal lands has fallen to a five-year low, in spite of record development on state and private lands, which has increased 65 percent in the last seven years.

The Bureau of Land Management reported last month that federal land now accounts for only 5 percent of total oil production.

Who Owns the West

The United States Government has direct ownership of nearly 650 million acres, managed by several different government agencies including the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) which oversees more land than any other agency.

The BLM, created by the Department of the Interior in 1946, owns 247.3 million surface acres, and 700 million subsurface mineral acres (oil/ natural gas).

"Federal land ownership is a huge impediment. There is no other way to put it. There is an artificial cap on energy production that is directly related or the result of federal land ownership," Cody Stewart, Energy Advisor to Governor Herbert (R-UT).

In Montana, 29.9% of lands are federally owned, while in North Dakota, only 3.9% of land is owned by the Federal government. Between Montana and the Dakotas, the BLM manages a landmass the size of Nebraska. Congress mandated the BLM to make public lands available for mineral leasing with the passage of the Mineral Act of 1920. The agency is required to hold four mineral lease sales a year in each BLM district.

Last year, 26 drilling permits were issued by the BLM on Federal Lands in Montana, down from 206 ten years earlier and 150 permits in 2007. In North Dakota, 255 permits to drill on Federal land were issued in 2013, up from 50 in 2003 and 72 in 2007.

Regulations

Resource development is heavily regulated at the state level, and by federal laws such as the Clean Water Act, Clean Air Act, and the Endangered Species Act, all of which continue to grow in reach and scope, not only on the oil and gas operators, but also the agricultural producers.

The Migratory Bird Treaty Act (1918) and the Endangered Species Act (1973) both aim to protect wildlife. Unfortunately, of the 2,105 species listed under the Endangered Species Act, only 1.3% has been delisted, according to the U.S Fish and Wildlife Service. Species are listed as endangered at the expense of business and employed tax payers. The spotted owl designation is a glaring example of defacto wilderness that destroyed large chunks of the timber industry.

When it comes to protecting wildlife, not all industries are treated the same. Wind farms kill about 440,000 birds a year. Last December, The Interior Department finalized a rule that would grant permits to let wind farms kill eagles for up to 30 years, six times longer than current permits allow. Can you imagine if similar 'permits to kill' were issued to producers of non-renewable energy sources? Instead, oil producers face five plus figure penalties and fines for harming any migratory or endangered bird.

Designations

According to the Montana Wilderness Association, The National Wilderness Preservation System currently comprises wilderness areas on 109,492,591 acres across the country, and 3,433,038 acres in Montana. Human activities in wilderness areas are restricted to scientific study and non-mechanized recreation; motorized vehicles and equipment are forbidden in these areas, limiting access for many Montanans.

When combined with the many other land use allocations and designations that remove federal lands from multiple use, such as National Parks, National Wildlife Refuges, Wild

and Scenic Rivers, Wilderness Study Areas, National Monuments, and Forest Service Roadless Areas the total swells to 7,924,426 acres in Montana. Less than half of that Federal land is open to multiple-use activities that include natural resource development.

Enough is Enough

State and local economies must not be further encumbered in favor of sweeping defacto wilderness measures. Multiple use on public lands is key to economic development and sustainability in rural communities The removal of any lands from multiple use status will disproportionately affect the counties and rural school districts surrounding the public land. The 49% Fed money that is turned back to the State and local communities is a huge miss when activity and access is denied to development. All too often, national park, wilderness, and monument rules are extended into buffer zones that continue to grow beyond the original designated boundaries.

Access to our natural resources is the key to a healthy local economy. Montanans are dependent upon access to the 30% of land ownership controlled by Washington. That access is being systematically denied to multiple use by people outside of Montana. Enough is enough.

Country-of-Origin Labeling (COOL): The fight's not over.

On May 19 the 11 judges in the D.C. appellate court heard the En Banc hearing on COOL. There is no time frame for when a decision must be made. Also, the decision by the World Trade Organization (WTO) regarding whether the final COOL rule complies with the WTO's international rules is expected in June. The WTO's decision will most likely be appealed.

Recently, Brazil reported a second case of BSE.

United States food safety inspectors confirmed that Brazil was not routinely removing all high-risk tissues for BSE as required for countries that export to the United States.

Despite Brazil's failure to meet U.S. food safety standards, FSIS officials nevertheless determined that Brazil "continues to meet FSIS equivalence criteria at an adequate level for this component (the specified risk material (SRM) removal component).'

R-CALF USA CEO Bill Bullard said these facts demonstrate the need to ful-Iv enforce the U.S. country-of-origin labeling (COOL) law. "Only with COOL can consumers choose to avoid purchasing their food from countries with questionable food safety systems," he said.

R-CALF USA is disappointed by the House Appropriations Committee's passage of the Agriculture Appropriations Bill. In an effort to encourage members of the appropriations committee to vote no, a group of nearly 200 organizations including R-CALF USA, sent letters to members of both the Senate and House Appropriations Committees urging them to reject any efforts in their upcoming 2015 Appropriations Bill to insert policy riders that would harm family farmers, ranchers and consumers.

Unfortunately, the work of the groups was not impactful enough to protect family farmers, ranchers and consumers. According to Bullard, "There is no better indicator of a totally dysfunctional Congress than when members of Congress actually vote to support retaliation against U.S. family farmers and ranchers, which is exactly what the House majority did today in their Appropriations Committee."





DPHHS Computer Server Inappropriately Accessed -Agency Will Offer Free Credit Monitoring and Insurance

Officials with the Department of Public Health and Human Services (DPHHS) said today that hackers gained entry to an agency computer server, though officials said there is no knowledge that information on the server was used inappropriately, or was even accessed.

The server contained personal client information that may have included names, addresses, dates of birth and Social Security numbers, dates of service, as well as clinical information.

DPHHS employee payroll information was also on the affected server and the information included names, Social Security numbers, and bank account information.

On May 22nd, an independent forensic investigation determined that the server had been hacked. The forensic investigation was ordered on May 15th when suspicious activity was first detected by DPHHS officials. When the suspicious activity was discovered, agency officials also immediately shut down the server and contacted law enforcement.

"Out of an abundance of caution, we are taking the necessary steps to reach out to those whose information may have been stored on the server," Opper said. "We apologize for the stress this announcement is going to cause. DPHHS is committed to answering questions clients and employees may have and to help them to take advantage of the services we are offering."

Today, DPHHS released this information: A toll-free DPHHS Help Line to allow people the opportunity to ask questions. The number is 800-809-2956.

In addition, the investigation also revealed that the server was likely first accessed in July 2013. However, DPHHS only became aware of a potential issue in May 2014.

The server that was hacked into has been shut down and is now off the state computer system. A new server containing backup files from the old server has been scanned and is safely being brought online.

DPHHS has purchased additional security software to better protect sensitive information on existing servers.

As part of an internal investigation, DPHHS is reviewing existing policies and procedures to determine how to prevent this from happening again in the future.

DPHHS is in the process of mailing letters to those clients and agency employees whose personal information could have been in the server. The letter will include instructions about how to sign up for free credit monitoring and insurance offered by the state.

However, until letters are sent, DPHHS understands that Montanans will have questions now about this unfortunate situation. To help address those questions, a toll free DPHHS Help Line has set up specifically dedicated to the agency response. Additional information is also available on the DPHHS website.

If anyone believes they were affected, but have not received a letter by the end of June, they are advised to call 800-809-2956.




