Scan me to save & share this week's issue Beware Of Fraud Calls "Spoofed" As Local

Nicole Senner Despite continued investment and efforts to fight illegal robocalls plaguing telephone customers, Mid-Rivers has recently noticed an increase in scam calls in the area that show up on caller ID as reputable local business names. Scammers are "spoofing" the caller ID (sending through fake caller ID names and/or numbers) to look like names you recognize, hoping to increase the chances of getting the called party to answer.

Our own business name has been used by scammers trying to obtain personal account information. They may also pretend to be a local bank, city or county government, your power company, law enforcement, hospitals, schools, or other recognizable local business names to trick you into giving them sensitive information or money.

These callers use unassigned numbers or may even copy the name and number of the party they are calling, and regularly change the fake numbers they are using, to get around call blocking services. Many of these calls originate in foreign countries.

Unfortunately, there is no fail-safe tool for stopping these calls because it is so easy for scammers to fake the location from which they are calling. You can help fight illegal robocalls by following these tips:

1. Do not give out personal information or financial information. If you receive an unsolicited call from a company that you do business with and the caller asks for personal information, tell them you will call back on their number of record. Look up their publicly available telephone number from a billing statement or the phone book to call back.

2. Do not answer calls you are not expecting or calls from unfamiliar names or numbers.

3. Never respond to a robocall. If you happen to pick up a call, hang up as soon as you realize it is a robocall. NEVER "press 1" or "press 2" or speak to the caller. If you respond it will lead to more robocalls because the caller will now know they have reached a working number or a "live" prospect.

4. Make sure your landline and cell phone numbers are on the Do Not Call Registry by going to www.donotcall.gov or calling 1-888-382-1222 from the phone number you want to

Chickens In Sidney: Community Members To Propose Raising Chickens In City Limits

On Monday, June 7, the City of Sidney Council members will have the opportunity to give Sidney residents back some of their freedoms. In the first city council meeting of the summer, Jaymi Mozeak will be going before the council to request the current ordinances concerning livestock be eased to allow city residents to own and keep chickens on their property. She will also be presenting them with a petition signed by Sidney residents wanting chickens in town.

Jaymi grew up on a small hobby farm in a small

town and so had the pleasure of caring for chickens and our animals for most of her childhood. She had moved to Sidney several years ago than away but returned to settle and raise her son. She said, "One of the first things I did when I came back was go to the police station and ask if I could have chickens in town after I bought a house. I was surprised and very disappointed when the officer brought me a copy of the ordinances concerning animals. I had just moved from a small town in South Dakota where hens were legal to keep in town. I thought

it had become normal." The current ordinance restricts all city residents from keeping any livestock within city limits. This includes chickens. Believe it or not, this is odd for towns not only in eastern Montana but all over Montana and the rest of the nation as well. Many towns and cities across the nation allow chickens as pets to varying degrees. Fairview, not even 12 miles north of Sidney, allows both roosters and hens with ordinances pretty

Spring "E-Rase Your E-Waste" Event Cancelled; Fall Event Still Planned

This year's May e-waste recycling event was cancelled again this spring, in part to give organizers an opportunity to review the "E-rase Your E-waste" program and plan for the long-term future of e-cycling in this region.

"We've had a number of calls and emails from people asking about our spring event and we've asked them, in turn, to please hold on to their items until September when our regular fall collection will go forward as usual," new "E-rase Your E-waste" Coordinator Heather Luinstra said last week. "We decided to forgo the spring event this year as we are in the midst of re-evaluating the program following a change in leadership and are exploring new opportunities to provide additional ecycling options for local residents. Once that evaluation is complete, we'll announce any planned changes."

"In the meantime, however, the fall E-rase Your E-waste event will continue as usual in September although the date is not yet set," Luinstra said. She thanked the community for their interest and their support of the program. Now in its 17th year, the local "E-rase your E-waste" program continues to offer electronics recycling to the MonDak region free of charge at least once a year. Since its inception the volunteer effort has recycled more than a half million pounds of damaged or obsolete electronics from this area, inspiring other communities to follow suit elsewhere across the state and beyond.



Richland County Farm Service Agency **Accepting Emergency Conservation Program Applications For Fire Damage**

Sidney - U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA) County Executive Director Tammy Lyseng today announced that Richland County is accepting applications for the Emergency Conservation Program (ECP) to address damages from Fire. ECP signup for fire begins on June 1, 2021 and ends on June 30, 2021.

The approved ECP practices under this authorization include rehabilitation or replacement of fences that were destroyed or seriously damaged, debris removal, grading, shaping, releveling land, or similar land damaged by fire.

ECP assists producers with the recovery cost to resaster conditions. Approved ECP applicants may receive up to 75% of the cost of approved restoration activity. Limited resource, socially disadvantaged and beginning farmers and ranchers may receive up to 90% cost-share.

Producers with damage from such events must apply for assistance prior to beginning reconstructive work. FSA's National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) and environmental compliance review process is required to be completed before any actions are taken. Submitting an application after reconstructive work has been completed may not qualify for ECP.

FSA county committees

based on an on-site inspection of the damaged land, taking into consideration the type and extent of the damage. An on-site inspection does not guarantee that cost-share funding will be provided.

The 2018 Farm Bill increased the payment limitation for ECP to \$500,000 per disaster. The use of ECP funds is limited to activities to return the land to the relative pre-disaster condition. Conservation concerns that were present on the land prior to the disaster are not eligible for ECP assistance.



Continued from page 1A. close to those they have for dogs with rules like the animals are to stay on the owner's property, the animals are to be provided with food, water, and protection from the elements. Savage, about 20 miles, describes in the ordinance the type, size, and location of the dwelling allowed for chickens. Glendive residents can keep them too. Larger cities like Billings allow residents to own chickens, as do San Francisco, Seattle, Denver, Atlanta, Washington DC, and millions of other metropolises, cities, and towns in between. The ordinances for each of these cities and towns can be found online on each one's respective

Chickens like any other animal, take time, knowledge, and care to bring up friendly birds that are healthy and happy but can be very beneficial to their owners. While most chicken feed is made from grain, according to 4-H Learning Network, chickens are omnivores. They will happily help themselves to any insects, small reptiles, or even mice they can catch while foraging for more grain. Besides providing the usual benefits of owning a pet, chickens can also help their owners monetarily by laying eggs. According to womenshealthmagazine.com's article called "WTF is a Complete Protein" by Christine Byrne, eggs are a complete protein and contain all nine essential amino acids. A rooster is not required for a hen to lay eggs although a hen's ability to lay eggs does diminish temporarily with the seasons and permanently as she ages.

The town of Sidney as a whole can benefit as well from the legalization of chickens in city limits. Not only can the city benefit from fees, registration, or permits if they so choose, but there is an interesting market for



"Public art and our larger-than-life roadside attractions continue to be of great interest to visitors and the media," said North Dakota Department of Commerce Tourism and Marketing Director Sara Otte Coleman. To implement Arts Across the Prairie, diverse stakeholder groups are being formed in each region, joining across county lines. 




