## Richland County Accepting ECP Applications For Flood Damage Until Aug. 18

Richland County has been approved to implement the Emergency Conservation Program (ECP) due to floods. Producers need to file and ECP application with the FSA before starting work on land damaged by flood water. Emergency Conservation Program is a cost share program which as sists producers with damage caused by excessive rain and the floods that have occurred. Signup for the program begins on June 20, 2011 and ends Aug. 18, 2011

A producer qualifying for ECP assistance may receive cost-share levels not to exceed $75 \%$ of the eligible cost of restoration measures. The Richland County Committee has been approved for the following conservation practices to correct damage due to the flood:

EC1 - Removing Debris from Farmland: Practice is used for removing debris from farmland. A typical example of this
is taking debris off cropland and fences
EC2 - Grading, Shaping, Releveling, or Similar Measures: Practice is used for grading, shaping, and leveling land that has been damaged by the flood and is returned to agriculture use. Example - Land has erosion caused by flood and leveling of the land is needed to restore it.

EC3 - Restoring Permanent Fences: Practice corrects damage to fences caused by the flood. Example - Fences in water gaps which have been washed out due to the high water. Cost-share is calculated up to $75 \%$ of the actual cost, after they are adjusted based on the age of the fence.

Age of fence:Allowable actual cost factor
$0-5$ years old $100 \%$ of computed cost-share
$6-10$ years old $\quad 75 \%$ of computer cost-share
11-30 years old $60 \%$ of computed cost-share

Over 30 years old $0 \%$ of computed cost-share EC4 - Restoring Conservation Structures and Other Installations: Practice restores conservation structures and installation damaged by the flood. Example - Restoration of dams, ponds that have been destroyed by the flood.

Eligibility for cost share assistance is based on a minimum of $\$ 1,000$ of eligible damage. All requests for cost share are subject to the availability of funds. Producers are encouraged to provide the FSA office with the following data at the time of application: Location of the damage and extent of the damage, such as length of fence, time needed to remover debris, damage to land or conservation structures with estimates of cost to repair. ## NDSU Offers Tips

On Repairing Flooded Lawns

The flood of 2011 has devastated many lawns across the state. As the floodwaters recede, the good news is that mid-August to mid-September is the best time to repair a lawn.
"The first step is to pick up any garbage and other debris the floodwaters brought into the yard," says Tom Kalb, North Dakota State University Extension Service horticulturist. "Be careful because pieces of glass, metal and other harmful items may be buried in the silt. Clean up after working with the soil because it may have been contaminated with toxic materials.

Lawns under water for less than four days and covered with 1 inch or less of silt may recover quickly. In this case, gently rake the ground to break the soil crust. Core aeration can help dry the soil. A half-strength fertilizer application of 1 2 lb . of nitrogen per 1,000 square feet will encourage turf recovery. Overseeding this fall may thicken the lawn.

Lawns underwater for more than four days and/or covered with more than 1 inch of silt will require major renovation. Much, if not all, of the turf is dead
"Start by grading the landscape and trying to get it back to its original topography as much as possible," says Kalb. "Accumulations of silt greater than 3 inches should be scraped away. Severely eroded areas should be replenished with topsoil. As a general rule, at least 4 inches of topsoil is needed for a healthy lawn.

Cultivate the area and incorporate the silt into the topsoil. Prepare a smooth seedbed and apply a starter fertilizer "Seeding is best done from mid-August to mid-September," Kalb says. "Spring is the second best time of the year. Use hardy grass types normally used in our region, such as Kentucky bluegrass, red and other fine fescues, perennia ryegrass, crested wheatgrass and blue grama grass. Floodtolerant grasses, such as reed canary grass, are too coarse and not recommended for home landscapes."

New sod can be applied through mid-October. The sod typically is a mix of Kentucky bluegrass that should be used only in sunny areas.

Your lawn is one of the toughest, most adaptable components of a home landscape," Kalb says. "Give it some attention this fall and you can enjoy a healthy, attractive lawn next year."

## Healthy Fish Populations In The Missouri River System <br> The North Dakota Game and Fish Department recently <br> tiful in the survey nets. Sauger numbers have been good in

completed its annual fish population sampling on the Missouri River System and found positive results in both Lake Sakakawea and Lake Oahe. The Missouri River from the Garrison Dam to Bismarck was not sampled due to high water.

Scott Gangl, fisheries management section leader, said when Lake Sakakawea began to refill in 2009, all fish populations started to rebound, beginning with the smelt forage base. "The drought of the early 2000s hurt fish populations because low water reduced spawning habitat and the available forage base," Gangl said. "Now after a couple years of higher water we are seeing a turnaround."

After years of drought, higher reservoir levels gave fish access to gravel and cobble spawning areas that were dry just a few years ago. There is also much more sheltered shal-low-water habitat in the backs of bays that are important nursery areas for many fish species.

Recent netting operations in Lake Sakakawea found abundant walleyes, with many in the 18-22 inch range. Biologists also noted substantial numbers of yearling walleye in the nets, an indication of good reproductive and stocking success in 2010.

Northern pike, yellow perch and sauger were also plen-
recent years, and the size structure is favorable for anglers. Meanwhile, northern pike and yellow perch reproduction has flourished since the return of water to the reservoirs. Although their size is still on the smaller side due to their younger age, Gangl said they are growing well.

Smallmouth bass are rebounding with the water levels as well, Gangl said, with good numbers of moderately-sized fish in the nets.
"All fish are in excellent condition and plump, a huge turnaround from a few years ago when drought conditions resulted in extremely skinny fish," he said.

On Lake Oahe, the walleye population is still strong, with numbers similar to the past three years. Although larger walleye remain in Oahe, many fish in the nets were less than 14 inches in length. Gangl said the high numbers of small walleye is the result of strong reproduction since the lake refilled in 2009.
"Northern pike numbers on Lake Oahe are also through the roof, higher than we've ever documented," Gangl added. "Like in Sakakawea, these fish are still growing in size and will produce some exceptional fishing opportunities in the coming years."

Catfish were the most predominant fish in the Oahe nets.

# North Dakota Game \& Fish Documents Fish Loss Through Garrison Dam 

Numerous dead fish have been observed in recent weeks along the Missouri River channel from Garrison Dam to south of Bismarck. The majority of these fish likely died from passing through the dam, Game and Fish Department fisheries biologists report.

Although many species are being observed, including walleye, most of the dead fish are cisco. With record releases coming from both the intake structure and spillway, just about any species can fall victim to what biologists call entrainment. "Entrainment, when fish pass through or over a dam or spillway, is often lethal to some fish species due to the extreme pressure change from quickly moving from deeper water to the surface or simply the traumatic forces of expulsion," said Dave Fryda, Department Missouri River System supervisor. "As a result, the highest densities of dead fish are right below the dam with numbers decreasing downstream as fish de compose or are eaten by birds and other scavengers."

Entrainment through Garrison Dam is not uncommon and often fish are cleaned up by birds before they drift out of the Tailrace. However, higher flows in the Missouri River this summer means more fish passing through the dam, outnumbering what the abundant fish-eating birds can consume.
"Entrainment has likely been occurring all summer, but we've seen a spike with the coldwater fish species in recent weeks," Fryda said. "As Lake Sakakawea has stratified, those fish are simply the most likely to encounter and move through the dam intakes. We can't explain why cisco far out number other fish being entrained, because smelt far outnumber cisco in the reservoir."

Fryda said fisheries biologists aren't too concerned with the losses through the dam at this time. "The cisco are from the abundant 2007 year-class, and are now too big to provide much forage for predators in the lake," he said.

Biologists are hopeful that as releases from Garrison Dam are ramped down in the weeks to come, far fewer of all species will be lost. In particular, the potential loss of smelt is a larger concern. "The smelt population in Lake Sakakawea has increased substantially in recent years and is currently spread throughout much of the reservoir due to abundant coldwater habitat," Fryda said. "While we may lose some smelt through the intake structure, the entire population in Lake Sakakawea is not confined to a small area near the dam. Hopefully, what smelt are lost in the next six weeks will not adversely affect the population."

## Hunters Advised To Check Water Conditions

The North Dakota Game and Fish Department advises hunters to be cautious with their dogs around water this time of year，due to potential health hazards associated with blue－ green algae．

Dr．Dan Grove，Game and Fish Department wildlife vet－ erinarian，said late summer and early fall offer prime condi－ tions for blue－green algae growth in many state waters．In－ gestion by a hunting dog while perhaps retrieving a bird dur－ ing the early goose season，or just practicing retrieving，can lead to severe illness and potential death．

Conditions are right this year for stagnant water to be－ come contaminated，especially with all of the overland flood－ ing that has occurred，＂Grove said．

Potentially toxic algae blooms occur under conditions of hot，dry weather．Shallow，stagnant water with moderate to
high nutrient content provides an optimum environment fo algal growth．Water or wind movements often concentrate the algae，and eventually the bloom appears as a blue－green ＂scum＂floating on the water＇s surface．The threat disappears once the weather turns colder．
＂Hunting dogs shouldn＇t drink or swim in discolored wa－ ter or where algal blooms are apparent，＂Grove said．＂If dogs retrieve in these conditions，they should be rinsed off imme－ diately and shouldn＇t be allowed to lick their coat．＂

## A Little Bit Country: Glenn \& Divide Most Popular Wheat

Based on a June survey of approximately 2700 producers, the top two hard red spring wheat varieties in North Dakota remain Glenn and Faller, according to Jim Peterson, North Dakota Wheat Commission marketing director. Combined, the two varieties account for nearly $30 \%$ of the acres. Barlow, RB07 and Brennan round out the top five.

Divide remains the leading durum variety in the state with nearly one third of the acres. Acres planted to Divide have grown each of the past five years. The other top varieties include Mountrail, Alkabo, Lebsock and Grenora together they account for $40 \%$ of acres. All

Divide is a variety that is near the top for yield and disease resistant traits and also provides domestic and export customers with improved end-use quality performance, especially gluten strength. Mountrail remains stable in acres because of its high yield potential. Alkabo is gaining in popularity due to its quality and yield. For the end-users it has excellent color and gluten qualities. Other durum varieties which advanced in acres in 2011 include Tioga (NDSU), DG Max (Dakota Growers Pasta Co.) and Strongfield (Ag. Canada).

Now back to the hard spring wheat varieties. Glenn has been the leading variety in North Dakota since 2007. It holds 18\% of the acres this
year which is a slight decrease from last year. Glenn is popular with growers because of its balanced agronomics, disease resistant traits and comparatively higher protein levels. Cus tomers like it for its superior milling and baking quality Faller held onto second place despite a decline in acres. It accounts for 11 percent of the acres and is mos ent of the acres and is mos popular in the three eastern Wheat Commission districts where the scab disease has been prevalent. It never gath ered much interest among western North Dakota growers because of it lower pro tein content and reduced yield potential in drier envi ronments

Barlow, a 2009 NDSU release, had the most signifi cant gains in 2011, moved into third place with nearly $9 \%$ of the acres, compared to one percent in 2010. A variety from the University o Minnesota, RB07, captured fourth place with $7 \%$ of the acres, up slightly from last year. To my surprise, Barlow is the leading variety in the southwest district. The AgriPro variety, Brennan has moved into $5 \%$ of the acres. Barlow, RB07 and Brennan are gaining in popu larity because of their bal ance of yield and protein.

For winter wheat, Jerry remains the most popular with $38 \%$ of the acres fol lowed by CDC Falcon with $11 \%$. Other varieties in the top five include Hawken Jagalene and Overland. Jerry was released in 2001 by North Dakota State University. Over the years it has been noted for its good win ter hardiness, good yields and resistance to stem rust. also has improved resistance to leaf rust as compared to the once popula Roughrider variety. I look for
a new variety, named Decade, to eventually become popular. It is a new variety jus released jointly by Montana State University and North

Dakota State University. The Williams County Agricultural Improvement Association did approve a grower con tract with Leon Helstad

Williston, and the NDSU Ag ricultural Experiment Station A limited amount of seed is expected to be available for this coming planting season
