Lewis & Clark Museum To Host Great Western Cattle Trail Drive Obelisks July 18


Lewis & Clark Museum, Alexander, will commemorate the Great Western Cattle Trail Drive, Sunday, July 18 at 2 p.m. The museum has been gifted with the honor of housing one of the many obelisks and a plaque celebrating the journey of millions of cattle and horses traveling from just south of Texas to Canada during 1870s-1890s.

Rotary Clubs from south Texas to North Dakota have teamed up to mark trails with cement obelisks every 6-10 miles and North Dakota is the third of nine states on the historical trail that began marking its area. The concrete 7-ft.-long white obelisks were donated by Stark County historian and businessman Scott Olin, Dickinson Ready Mix.

Bob Petermann will be the special entertainment and a short explanation of the trail will be presented by Kathy James and Kathy White. An ice cream social will follow.

USACE Announces Lake Sakakawea **Shoreline Management Plan Approval**

Omaha, NE - The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, Omaha District announced approval of the Garrison Dam Lake Sakakawea, North Dakota Shoreline Management Plan.

The plan establishes policy and furnishes guidelines for the protection and preservation of the desirable environmental characteristics of Lake Sakakawea shoreline. It includes the permitting process for the public, private dock areas, vegetative management, shoreline zoning designations and maps.

In alignment with applicable federal laws, directives and policies, the plan is a guide to maintain balance between public and private shoreline use.

The updated draft Shoreline Management Plan was posted online, and a public comment period was held from Jan. 15-Feb. 15. 

Shahin Honored With Retirement Party



Shergill To Discuss Herbicide Resistant Weeds At EARC Field Day

Dr. Lovreet Shergill, Montana State University assistant professor and weed scientist, will be speaking about management of herbicide resistant weeds in sugarbeet cropping systems in Montana at 12:50 p.m.

Shergill works to better understand crop-weed dynamics. He knows that weed control is a critical part of sugarbeet production. For both short term and long-term profitability, proper timing and responsible herbicide usage to avoid resistant weeds is critical. Being timely with herbicide applications gives the herbicide the greatest impact for control; it is better to control small weeds rather than larger ones even when using Round-up®/Glyphosate.

It is best to scout fields to identify escapes, tank mix herbicides with different modes of action (MOA), and rotate herbicide MOA in consecutive years.

Shergill's research aims to prevent weed seed production. He looks at crop-weed dynamics in different cropping systems that improve weed management and ultimately

enhance crop productivity. He has performed research on concerns about weeds becoming resistant to HWSC. His research results showed that growers have to be integrated into large-scale, on-farm research and development activities aimed at alleviating the problems of using HWSC systems and drive greater

adoption subsequently. The primary goal of his research is to address the ever-increasing problem of herbicide-resistant weeds by developing integrated weed management (IWM) programs that include a mixture of chemical methods such as residual herbicides, and herbicide mixtures with effective SOA, cultural methods such as crop-weed competition, crop rotations, and cover crops, and mechanical methods such as tillage, and harvest weed-seed control (HWSC) tactics. Shergill's research interest focuses on weed ecology, weed biology, weed physiology, crop-weed population dynamics, and molecular biology.

Over the years, Montana State University (MSU) breeders have developed several wheat varieties and continue to do so. Dr. Jason Cook, MSU-Bozeman trait integration breeder and geneticist, will be speaking about the MSU spring wheat breeding program starting at 9-9:15 a.m. at EARC Field Day, July 20.

Cook will be providing an update on wheat varieties that are doing well in eastern Montana and sharing information on some of the new up and coming varieties that are coming out of the breeding program. He will focus on Hard Red Spring Wheat varieties and provide data on how well these different varieties yield, what their economic performance looks like out of the field, and share information on their grain protein content for quality purposes.

'The information that I will be talking about can be used by growers to decide what variety will best fit their operation," said Cook.

The MSU Wheat Breeding Program goal is to develop new varieties that increase yield and quality for its buyers and add genes that help provide disease and insect resistance.

"We develop new spring

wheat varieties for Montana producers and do genetic studies to better understand the genetics that control the traits that we are interested in to help improve and increase productivity of spring wheat varieties in Montana," said Cook.

Cook has been working with the MSU spring wheat program since 2015 and prior to that, he was breeding wheat for a private company. He received his PhD at University of Wisconsin - Madison in plant breeding and plant genetics in 2009. Cook is knowledgeable of all aspects of the MSU plant-breeding program and has a track record of success in obtaining research funding and completing and publishing research projects. His on-going research focuses on the genes impacting wheat yield, wheat stem sawfly resistance, and fusarium head blight tolerance.

Going forward he will closely monitor wheat varieties to see what is doing best under severe drought conditions.

He said, "This is a contrast to the past 2-3 years where we have had quite a bit of rain. Drought is a big topic this year so I hope to be able to provide some research information on how well these different varieties are holding up to drought conditions."



Dr. Chengci Chen, MSU-EARC superintendent, will be speaking about the potential of industrial hemp crop in Montana at the EARC Field Day, July 20 at 9:45 a.m.

Since 2018, Montana farmers have been producing Industrial hemp - it has now become increasingly popular in Montana; farmers that are growing hemp are seeing both a demand and profit increase, while farmers who have never grown hemp before are rushing to plant it in their fields.

Industrial hemp is a variety of Cannabis sativa L. and is of the same plant species as marijuana. Hemp, however, has lower levels of the psychoactive compound THC (tetrahydrocannabinol). Hemp contains less than 0.3% THC, while marijuana has over 30% THC.

Variety selection, environment, and agronomic management can affect the concentration of CBD. As industrial hemp has not been grown in the United

implementing trials of hemp at the Montana State University Eastern Agricultural Research Center, Sidney. Chen and Dr. Apurba Sutradhar, postdoctoral research associate, has been working on the hemp trials in an effort

Coyne To Discuss Yellow Pea Research At MSU EARC Field Day

Dr. Clarice Coyne will be speaking about increasing yellow pea seed protein yields by increasing seed protein concentration and total yield at the MSU EARC Field Day. She said, "We're conducting a multiyear field research study in Montana and Washington on the genetic control of pea seed protein concentrations targeting the plant-based protein market.'

Coyne is a USDA Plant Germplasm Introduction and Testing Research Unit curator/geneticist in Pullman, WA. She specializes in curation and genetics of the USDA 22,000 accession collection of pea, lentil, chickpea, faba bean and related species plant genetic resources. She works in close collaboration with USDA pea and lentil breeder Dr. Rebecca McGee, Professor Dorrie Main, Dr. Yu Ma, both of Washington State University, and Dr. Chengci

The main objective of her research is to identify

new sources for high pea seed protein concentration and understand the genetic components to assist breeders in efficiently developing high yielding cultivars with high pea seed protein concentrations.

The research team is close to completing the pea seed protein concentration determination of the 2800 pea plots grown in 2019 and 2020. "Next, working with Dr. Mike Grusak's USDA, Fargo. lab, we'll determine the seed mineral nutrient concentrations in those 2800 plots. We'll be able to confirm the most important genes for stable production of peas with both high protein and high mineral nutrients like iron and zinc and high yield," added Coyne.

This research targets the MonDak growing region by conducting a three-year study in Montana with two field sites in Sidney and the Richland County area.

She said, "By conducting the field research here and analyzing the harvested seed protein concentrations,



we can make specific recommendations on the best performing cultivars in terms of both yield and protein."


