# Ace Hardware Coming To Sidney

After a 1½ years of extensive repairs, the building that once housed ALCO and Sidney's North Shopko will soon house an Ace Hardware store.

In 2015, Skip King, an owner of seven different Ace Hardware stores in the state of Montana, set his eyes on Sidney as a place for another store. He has four stores in Billings, one in Columbus, Laurel, and Lockwood. He has owned Ace Hardware stores for 37 years and they are part of a second-generation family business. According to King, he wanted

to bring a store to Sidney but at the time eastern Montana was still experiencing the effects of the oil boom. The plan did not seem feasible but times were changing. In late 2021, he was finally able to purchase the building out of the Sheriff's auction and repaired it. He also bought the lot on the north end of it.

It is 27,000 sq. ft. King said, "It was the only spot in Sidney that I could put a store in without building a building someplace. I wanted to be next to Reynolds. I think it's a draw, the center's a draw for the community and the surrounding area."

The Sidney Ace Hardware will be a full-line hardware store. They will carry products from tools and hardware to riding lawn mowers and even plan on holding a garden center in the lot, north of the building. They will carry many popular brands like Benjamin Moore paint, Honda and Toro Stihl lawn equipment, Milwaukee tools, Traeger grills, and a lot more. They will even have a toy section and try their best to keep popular toys like Legos on hand.

The Sidney Ace Hardware is scheduled to open in mid-May 2023. Reese

Gairrett, a transplant from Joliet, was hired as the head manager. So far, 12 people have been hired but King expects to have 20-25 employees to start. King's other stores already serve their communities by helping the local Rotary Club, Children's Miracle Network, and 4-H troops. Gairrett is already applying to join the Kiwanis Club. He and the rest of his crew will be honored to serve Sidney and the surrounding area through



# Selecting **Transplants** & The Sidney **Community** Garden

Many gardeners use transplants to give long-season plants time to reach maturity. If you are purchasing transplants, here are a few tips on characteristics you want to select.

Transplants of vegetables should be stocky plants between 6"-8" tall. They should have a good root system and be healthy, without any bottom leaves that are yellow. Transplants should not be too mature, and they should not yet have any flowers or fruits. If they have flowers or fruit, the plant will limit vegetative and structural growth to continue supporting flowering. If your transplants do have flowers or fruit, it is best to prune them out to help encourage this vegetative growth.

If you do not have a garden space of your own, but are interested in gardening, there are raised beds available for rent in the Sidney Community Garden. The beds are 4 x 8 in size. # Richland Rangers Peewee Team Wins Big Sky State Games

The Montana Magicians, the Richland Rangers peewee team won the Big Sky State Games held March 24-26 on the Richland Ranger's home ice in Sidney.

The State Games are a 3 on 3 team tournament. Each game has 25 minutes of run-time with cross-ice because during if two games were played at the same time. The teams were smaller in number than the usual games and the kids set up the members of the team to play. It was their job to figure out who would be best to play. They were allowed seven skaters and one goalie per team. The tournament started with pool play to see whether they would be seated in the bracket. There were five teams in the

Peewees division, so they played four games on the first day. They won all four games on Saturday, which put them in first position. The bracket games were played on Sunday morning and they played the Dickinson Night Kings. It was a very close game, and they ended up defeating the Night Kings 4-3 in the last few minutes. They then had to play the Williston Polar Bears for the championship. The game was another close one and they won 6-4.

There is no qualifying for the Big Sky State Games. It is a competition where anyone can sign up to compete in the games. The Peewee level team, the Montana Magicians is comprised of kids aged 11-13. Typically, parents pay for the travel and expenses for games but

ones at home help a lot with expenses. The teams are not allowed to use their regular season Richland Rangers team name or jerseys, so they have to create a team name and find jerseys for the team. Some teams get sponsorships from local businesses to help pay for the cost of jerseys or the team entry fee. Parents were asked to help work concessions, clean, run the scoreboards, and do any other things it takes to keep the tournament running.

According to Jessica Price, one of the parents, most of the kids that were in the Magicians this year will move up to the next level of Bantams in the next season. She said, "It was so exciting to see these kids work so hard together and get this win."




Although Matteo was small in stature, he had a huge love for the Lord, his family and all those who came in contact with him.

# NDHSA To Set New Basketball Classifications

The North Dakota High School Association (NDHSA) approved an updated draft for a 3rd division of basketball classification, Feb. 8, 2023,

The new classification system will be as follows: Class AA will have a high school enrollment above 650, Class A can have an enrollment of 162.5-649, and Class B will have below 162.5 students. This will be implemented the 2023-2024 school year.

Alexander will remain class B and will now be District 7, and Region 4," said, A.J. Allard, Alexander high school boys basketball coach and elementary principal. "Our new district will now include District 8 which includes 11 schools from around the Minot area. There is a challenge opportunity at the region tournament to make the state tournament. Each region will now take two teams, instead of one. However, the setup is different from what Montana currently does. Our challenge game will involve challenging a team from another region."

Alexander is excited to see what the new system brings as a competitive stance. "We look forward to playing some new teams around the region," said Coach Allard.

Terrille Jacobson, Alexander athletic director and 4th grade teacher, was a member of the NDHSA planning committee. "I was asked last spring to represent northwest North Dakota as well as Class B, on the 3-class system focus group. There were 12 from around the state that got together 2-3 times per month for Zoom meetings. We did 1 in-person meeting last fall. The most challenging aspect of the plan, that was adjusted many times, was the cutoff numbers between the classes. We also had to take into account co-ops that currently existed and we tried to foresee the impact the suggested plan would have on them." said Jacobson.

Once they established an outlined plan, they were happy with, they needed support from other schools within the state. Each school was asked to submit a letter of support or denial to the focus group by the end of October. "We fortunately got the number of letters we needed to approach NDHSA with our proposal. It then was in their court to decide If their board would vote to implement the 3-class plan." said Jacobson.

The decision was made to go with the plan (with a few modifications to our original proposal), with next year's basketball season being the start of this pilot program. "I grew up in Montana, and since our new Class B format now allowed two teams to advance to the state tournament rather than one as we currently do, I pushed for the elimination setup that MHSA uses. After much discussion, we did opt for a challenge game, even though we kept the current North Dakota format of first round, single elimination. One of the modifications NDHSA made was to not have that challenge game involve the 2nd and 3rd place finishers from one region, but to cross-over and challenge those from another region.

It is an interesting concept and I look forward to seeing how it plays out. It was a great experience being on this focus group committee. I'm excited to see three classes in North Dakota after all these years," said Jacobson.







# After Months Of Searching For Good Officers; Sidney Police Department Is Fully Staffed & Ready To Keep The Peace

The Sidney Police Department has been serving the City of Sidney since 1915. 108 years later the officers are still protecting the lives and property of the city's citizens.

According to Chief Mark Kraft, "The fundamental duty of all law enforcement in the state is keeping the peace." This gives them many tasks. Besides the usual traffic control, keeping the peace, and apprehension of criminals. Sidney's officers also do welfare checks and patrols near the schools, businesses, and housing areas during the day and after dark. Since Sidney does not have an animal control separate from the police, they also pick up stray pets and handle other tasks an animal control officer would handle in another

The officers also participate in community outreaches such as the Cool Off With Cops and Cookies With Cops events put on by Drug-Free Communities and the Richland County Housing Authority. Officers are even asked to do talks in Sidney High School's government class

Sidney Police Department is now fully staffed with a force of 12 human officers and one canine officer. They were recently approved by the city council to add a drug task force officer, which will bring the number of human officers to 13. In 2022, they welcomed officers Joel Rosales. Tyler King, James Drager, and K9 Ringo to the force. Future men and women officers are trained in Sidney before going to Helena for the police academy. Ringo, on the other hand, went to a kennel in Pennsylvania with his future partner, Officer Gomke, for his training.

Chief Kraft does what he can to recognize the offi-

cers under him for the hard work they do. In October 2022. Chief Kraft nominated two of his officers, Brett Norby and Jonathan Ryal, for awards at the Montana Association of Chiefs of Police (MACOP) conference recognizing their performance during events that happened in 2021. Officer Norby was awarded the 2022 MACOP Officer of the Year award and Officer Ryal was awarded the 2022 MACOP Lifesaving Award. In 2023, Chief Kraft awarded Corporal James Fletcher, with the Sidney Police Department Officer of the Year award at the Sidney Chamber Annual Banquet and New Business Showcase in January. Chief Kraft said, "It's an honor to lead the officers that we have and to guide this department in a way that will benefit the Sidney community."

one rehab aide, one occu-


been referred to one of the

his ten years in law enforcement. "We take the community into consideration with every decision we make."



One new way the police department will be able to better serve Watford City and the surrounding area is with the recent purchase of a 2023 Polaris Ranger which will be utilized during medical calls that are inaccessible to ambulances, during search and rescue operations, during natural disasters such as snowstorms, and during community events where it is close to his home as they could access and he was going to walk the rest of the way, but unfortunately, he didn't make it," Jensen sadly recounted. "This fatality and the major storm events showcased the need for our agency to get a UTV."


City council tasked law enforcement to fundraise for the vehicle, and in less than nine months they raised over \$82,000. The Watford City Police Department is still taking donations to outfit the UTV with necessary search and rescue equipment.

"We were more successful than we ever imagined we would be with fundraising and this is a great addition to the fleet. We have to stay relevant with the times and be able quickly and safely respond to people who are having the worst day of their life," Jensen explained.


In addition to what law enforcement does on-thejob, many, including Jensen, are part of the Watford City Police Foundation which is composed of law enforcement officers from every agency. The organization was established in 2016 and took their own spin off 'Shop with a Cop' to create the Blue Santa program. Families in need all across McKenzie County receive \$150 worth of necessities such as clothes, as well as something fun for Christmas. This program serves kids from newborns to high school seniors. The Watford City Police Foundation is a 501c3 nonprofit organization that is operated solely through fundraising and donations. Their mission is to give back to the youth of the community, which they have successfully done, donating \$20,000-\$30,000 each year to youth and youth programs. For instance, they donated \$1,000 to the Watford City School district and \$1,000 to Alexander for post-prom and post-graduation activities. They have donated to the non-profit organization "Running Free", which promotes addiction free living and running. This is the third year they have offered two \$500 scholarships. These scholarships are for students interested in pursuing a career in law enforcement, nursing, EMS services, and firefighting.

# Meet McKenzie Health's Rehabilitation Department Therapists

The McKenzie County Health Center Rehabilitation Department, Watford City, has been an asset to the community since it was established in 1993, starting out with just one physical therapist. Now, as part of McKenzie Health, it has grown to include three physical therapists, one physical therapy assistant, and one occupational therapist.

The Rehabilitation Department can assist patients with an increased range of motion, improved function, pain reduction, proper alignment, post-surgery rehabilitation and more.

Physical therapist, Corey Samuelson, doctor of physical therapy and rehab manager, was born and raised in Watford City and has been a physical therapist for 16 years. He graduated from the University of North Dakota in 2007 with a doctorate in physical therapy and returned to Watford City

"I moved back home to raise a family and help grow the rehab department which only employed a traveling physical therapist at the time," said Samuelson. "I personally went through multiple athletic injuries and orthopedic surgeries starting in high school and throughsurgical procedures, I ended up going through many hours of physical therapy, which ended up sparking my interest in the field."

Samuelson specializes in orthopedic/athletic injuries, vertigo, custom orthotics, wound care, and aquatic therapy.

When asked if there were any specific challenges finding therapists, Samuelson stated, "Being in a rural community there are always challenges to hiring, from cost of living to housing. But I've been very fortunate to hire some great therapists that have been with McKenzie Health for many years and love serving our community."

Lynly Hebert has been an occupational therapist for just over 11 years and started at McKenzie Health in January 2018. Originally from southwest North Dakota, Hebert was living on the west coast when she decided that she wanted to be closer to family and recalls that Watford City was the first location in North Dakota that really stuck out.

While the objective of physical therapy is to assist with pain relief and restore motion and mobility, the purpose of occupational therapy is to help people live as

"At McKenzie Health, OT primarily works on maximizing functional independence and safety with activities of daily living," Hebert explained.
